WW1: 100 Years On

This continues our series of remembrance

In Memory of GEORGE MOORE (Private)

Sherwood Foresters (16th Battalion)
Aged 28 Service Number - 92103
Killed in action - November 10th 1917
3rd Battle of Ypres (Passchendaele)

Son of John and Mary Ann Moore, Drayton

Remembered with Honour







For those unaware, **Passchendaele** was an especially brutal and grim battle, with an exceptionally high loss of life on both sides.

Tyne Cot is a massive, and very moving memorial, just outside Zonnebeke. It's the largest cemetery for Commonwealth forces in the world. The gravestones are of about 12,000 burials, and the huge wall (pictured) lists the names of UK & New Zealand personnel missing from actions in the 'Ypres Salient'. Despite its size, listing about 35,000 names, the Tyne Cot memorial wall is only an overflow from the Menin Gate (in Ypres, or 'Ieper', the site of the 'Last Post' ceremony each evening), which was already due to be inscribed with well over 50,000 names by August 1917.

There are two very good museums at Ypres, which try to recreate some of the horrors, the **Flanders Field** museum (in the main square), and the **Hooge Crater** museum (a few miles east).


We had a spooky night with bats, nasty nibbles and ghoulish games for Halloween.

From the Ministry Team

Two Minutes Silence In the month when we think about those who have given their lives in war, the two minutes silence is a familiar act of remembrance. We can use the silence to reflect on those who have suffered in war or on what it means to work for a peaceful world. Or do we end up thinking about lunch or panic that we haven't switched our phone off?

Victor Frankl, a victim of Auschwitz, suggested that the most intolerable of all human conditions is not imprisonment or hunger, but lack of meaning. The two minutes silence enables us to connect with Jesus' message, which offers true meaning to our lives and world. He spoke of giving ourselves in love for each other and the world, 'Love your enemies and pray for those that persecute you' (Matthew 5:44). He also demonstrated such love in sacrificing His own life, 'Greater love has no-one than this, that he lay down his life for his friends' (John 15:13). In observing the silence, let's use it to reflect on this sacrificial love, as we remember all those who have experienced pain and conflict.

Of course, we should be serious about **silence and stillness** in the whole of our lives, not just for two minutes at an act of Remembrance. In busy lives where so much is clamouring for our attention, silence enables us to **reassess our priorities** and **rediscover true meaning** in our lives. Jesus made a habit of withdrawing to experience silence. He did this before choosing his disciples, after He heard of John's beheading, after feeding the 5000, after healing a leper, at the Transfiguration and to prepare for His death. 'The seeking out of solitary places was a regular practice for Jesus. **So it should be for us**.' (Richard Foster).



Well the classroom is built and we are now back playing ping pong at the school! We were able to sort the first few fixtures and fingers crossed there will be no more problems.

Editor's Note:- I had this response from Ed (column to the right >>) re a recent fly-tipping story in the news:- I take this crime very seriously indeed. It blights the areas it occurs in, poses risks to environment and human health, and affects the livelihoods of those involved in the legitimate waste management industry.

I am therefore pleased to tell you that new regulations have been brought in to give the Environment Agency & local councils more effective tools to use in investigating and prosecuting waste crimes. These include letting them seize vehicles for a wider range of suspected offences, if they have reasonable grounds to believe one has been committed.

The Environment Agency investigates larger scale fly-tipping incidents: these are offences committed by organised gangs, those involving more than one lorry or tipper load of waste, or where hazardous waste has been dumped. Local authorities are responsible for investigating and clearing up smaller scale flytipping on public land.

The maximum penalties for fly-tipping on summary conviction are a £50,000 fine and/or twelve months' imprisonment. If a case results in conviction in a Crown Court, the maximum penalties are an unlimited fine and/or five years' imprisonment.

Naturally I would urge anyone with information about any waste offences to report it either to the local authority, or the Environment Agency as appropriate.

WESTMINSTER VIEW



Ed Vaizey's column (Wantage MP; he's presently on the Commons Speaker's Advisory Panel on the Arts, also a patron of 'Kids in Museums')

Last month the Herald published a small and innocuous article, with the heading 'Response due on Wantage-Didcot name change plan', but I'd like to point out that

no such change has ever been considered. Didcot and Wantage are two entirely wonderful, but separate, towns with their own distinct identities, and this will most certainly continue indefinitely. What is being proposed, as the rest of the article makes clear, is merely changing the Parliamentary constituency name from 'Wantage' to 'Didcot and Wantage' as part of a UK-wide boundary review by the Boundary Commission..

I have been receiving a lot of correspondence recently on the 'EU Withdrawal Bill' (the 'Great Repeal Bill'). While I supported it at second reading, that is on the basis that it's improved upon in the committee stage. There has been much discussion around the so-called 'Henry VIII' powers that will give ministers the power to change or update EU laws without putting changes before Parliament. On a practical level this measure is sensible, as putting every change before Parliament would be an impossible task due to the volume of legislation. However, I feel that the proposed powers go beyond what is reasonable for the Govt to achieve its stated aims. To this end I have put my name to **three** amendments, all designed to ensure that the powers given to ministers are proportionate and strictly focused on achieving the policy objective.

Last month it was a pleasure to meet the team at Immunocore, in Milton Park. 

Narrow Roads - Too Many Cars

Dear Editor

Church Lane

Whilst in total sympathy with last month's Chronicle letter (on-path parking in the village), I wonder if the correspondent has taken into account the following points (& though I relate solely to Church Lane I do understand similar problems occur in those roads mentioned in the letter).

Church Lane is (especially near the Church) very narrow and some houses don't have driveways for off-street parking. When car owners park outside their property, the lane, in parts, becomes too narrow for other vehicles to safely pass hence the need to overlap the footway.

During Church services and Church Room events, attendees park outside the Church and the same problem necessitates overlapping the footway. Even then it is often reported that parked cars have their wing mirrors or paintwork damaged.

Service vehicles (refuse vehicles in particular) could not get down Church Lane without causing damage, if it were not for on-path parking at some locations. **I have myself experienced** having to walk in the road as the **path is blocked** by parked vehicles BUT when this happens my main concern is with speeding vehicles trying to negotiate the Lane without due caution, and NOT with those considerate motorists who can see the problem and will wait for pedestrians to pass the transgressing obstacles.

Church Lane & Henleys Lane incorporate several bends and narrows that bind them together which proves difficult enough to negotiate at the best of times: walking, jogging, pram pushing, cycling or driving, but this route is increasingly used by 'rat runners' from Abingdon Road to High Street and vice-versa, at busy times – this I suspect will become the norm as more houses are built in our village and the roads become further congested at those peak times.

What then may the answer be:- **Would a 20mph limit help**? Maybe - it has been applied to great effect in some villages so why not in our village on the lesser roads? Would pedestrians on road or pavement then feel any safer?

Would a gated road twixt Church and Henleys Lanes help? – one that makes each one a 'No Through Road'? Maybe – it would at least mean only those who live or have business in the lanes would drive into them. This would surely cut down on the volume of speeding traffic and allow the shared system of cars and pedestrians to be more equal.


Yellow lining possibly? But what of those who have nowhere else to park and those wishing to attend Church or just visiting? Surely a 'No Parking' zone is out of the question. These are village lanes NOT Kensington High Street!

The Dutch system maybe? Roads that do not allow through traffic and only service vehicles and residents of the area allowed access and then only at a much reduced speed—why not? After all we are told it's our village and we should have a voice about the way forward.

We all have to share our village roads and I understand part of the 2020 plan details the 'road sharing' principle. For that to be achieved we need both considerate motorists and understanding pedestrians and the help and support of local authorities in putting together a sharing system that deters speeding or rat-running, and encourages unselfish attitudes on all sides.

New trucks and changes to the way your waste and recycling is collected:-



The first of the district's new fleet of waste and recycling trucks are now out and about collecting your rubbish. BIFFA, our contractor, is awaiting delivery of the rest of the vehicles and we are expecting these to be on the road within the next few weeks.

The new fleet includes two different types of trucks - one larger vehicle, which will be used for recycling and household waste, and a smaller vehicle for food waste recycling.

What does this mean for you? At the moment, all of your waste or recycling and food waste is collected in different compartments of the same lorry. With the introduction of the new fleet, this will change - your waste or recycling (depending on which collection week it is) will be collected separately to your food waste by the different vehicles.

This means that the <u>different types of bins may be emptied at different times of the day</u>. However, there will be no change to your collection day, or the way you put your bins out.

County Council Report

<u>A34</u> →> Carving its way through the middle of our county, separating the West from the East, packed with traffic, noisy, too narrow, accident prone, the A34 affects the lives of all of us. Built in the early 1970s to connect the South Coast docks with the Midlands, the concerns of Oxfordshire residents were never the highest priority for the road.

We would have the 'benefit' of access to a new high speed connection to North and South but it was never planned to be a means of relieving congestion in Oxfordshire towns and villages.

As the road has steadily filled up with more and more traffic (as roads do), the high speed 'benefit' has become a thing of the past. Under the sole control of Highways England, **Oxfordshire has had little say** in how the A34 is organized. As traffic volumes have increased, there have been more accidents, breakdowns and hold ups. Roads assigned as 'Relief roads' - only to be used for diversions in emergencies when the A34 was blocked - are now used many times a year causing long tailbacks through villages, towns, and even Oxford City. **The A34 now seems to be much more a pain than a benefit**.

The problem of noise blighting the lives of nearby residents in Steventon, Drayton and Abingdon has been partly addressed by resurfacing with high density tarmac. The trouble faced by Highways England, and necessarily picked up by Oxfordshire Highways department is that improvement works to the A34, however great or small, involve closing the road while work is done, and diverting traffic through places and on roads not designed to take it.

This is annoying enough for those on the official diversion routes as their sleep is disturbed by heavy traffic pounding past them in the early hours. OCC Highways does its best by trying to ensure that a minimum number of people are affected. But it is particularly annoying for the dozens of people in villages and towns not on the diversion routes as HGVs ignore the signs, follow their SATNAVs and plough through the main roads and high streets.

Surely we can solve this? Apparently it is not easy. The police say they do not have the resources to police the villages and towns all night. There is no law that says it is illegal to ignore a diversion route, and how would you enforce it? OCC is obliged to keep the roads open for all the normal traffic so can only put up notices to try to direct the diverted traffic down the right routes.

Highways England agree it is a problem all over the country but are unable to offer a solution beyond getting the work done as quickly as possible. It seems the only solution is to improve Satellite Navigation, HGVs should have SATNAV systems whereby Highways England and local Highways can feed in official diversion routes.

<u>The good news</u> is that I am told the A34 work is all but complete for the next few months at least. The not so good? With all the infrastructure work in the pipeline, many more diversion routes will be in operation for the next few years. We can only pray for plenty of patience and plenty of creative thinking.

Parish Council Richard Williams

Report of the Parish Council meeting held on Mon Oct 2nd

The meeting was attended by two members of the public as well as the councillors. **Stuart Davenport**, Drayton's Vale councillor, gave an update on the **removal of a section** of the <u>Millennium Green boundary hedge</u>, along with some trees, by a neighbour - <u>without permission</u>. The Millennium Green Trust, who are responsible for the land, have erected a temporary fence to stop children and dogs running into the road. They have also spoken with their solicitors with a view to possibly taking legal action against the neighbour in question. It is not clear whether this (wholly unauthorized) work amounts to criminal damage, but without doubt it was reckless and thoroughly selfish act. Needless to say, it will take years for the hedge to regrow to its former state.

On a more positive note, and by way of complete contrast with the foregoing, properly planned work on the **paths on the Millennium Green** has now begun. The new circular route is now complete; several link stretches have been put in, and the final surface is now being added. The result is a **massive upgrade** to the path network in appearance and usefulness, and the <u>Green as a whole has never looked better</u>. More's the pity that an act of **sheer unwarranted vandalism** has undermined the good work done by the Millennium Green Trust, the Parish Council, and all the other volunteers that keep the Green in trim.

With the publication of the Vale's Part 2 Local Plan, (Ed's note – Vale Plan, only been 4 years coming!) Stuart noted that the Govt's housing targets for the area are more likely to increase than decrease. In particular, Oxford City's unmet housing needs will have to be provided for by the surrounding local authorities, and it has been agreed that the Vale's share of the City's shortfall will amount to 2,200 extra dwellings, i.e. in addition to the 20,560 houses already required to be built by the year 2031.

An Extra-Ordinary meeting of the Finance Committee was held on Fri Sept 29th to consider in detail the financial aspects of the business case for the proposed **Walnut Meadow** Sports Facilities. There was insufficient time for the findings to be written up and circulated to councillors before the Oct 2nd PC meeting, but this will be done, and a revised version of the case will be circulated and presented for sign-off at the November meeting.

→ Councillors and the Parish Clerk recently met with the Vale planners, and with Stuart Davenport, to discuss the most recent planning application to **build 3 new houses on the site of No 19 Eastway**. This is in addition to the 8 houses on an adjoining site which have already been granted planning permission.

The Parish Council shares the concerns of neighbouring residents and others in the village, and believes that the way both applications have been handled - by the Vale, in relation to the planning aspects, and by OCC, in relation to road access - has been **profoundly unsatisfactory**.

The PC **objected to both applications** and its comments can be seen on the Vale's website. The second application is to be heard on 25th October, so at the time of writing, the outcome remains to be seen, although the Vale officers' recommendation is to grant planning permission. It is the PC's intention to write a separate article specifically about this application in the next issue of the Chronicle. Right now, it looks as if, whatever we do, the development will be given the green light, but hopefully, the article will address some of the criticisms raised by residents and explain why we are where we are.

Suspicious activity and anti-social behaviour

Police advice to the public is to call 101 if they see anyone behaving suspiciously. Reporting suspicious behaviour ensures that the neighbourhood police team are kept updated about activity in specific areas.

Thames Valley Police will not tolerate anti-social behaviour at any time of the year. To report anti-social behaviour, call 101, the **24-hour TVP non-emergency number**. If you feel threatened, if it's an emergency, or if a crime is in progress, call 999.

<u>Home security</u> The neighbourhood police team offer FREE home security surveys. They take about 30 minutes with info & advice about the best locks, lighting and plants for your house and garden. Please call 101 and request a survey, or you can email via AbingdonOuterNHPT@thamesvalley.pnn.police.uk

A house in darkness is usually a sure sign that there's no-one at home. Consider purchasing a timer plug-in device that can turn lamps on and off to make it look as if the house is occupied while you're out at work, out in the evening or away on holiday?

Don't leave anything of value, such as laptops, tablets, mobile phones or cash visible through windows or front doors.

Never leave keys in locks. Thieves always look for the quickest exit, which isn't necessarily the way they entered a property.

Insurance companies often regard **conservatories** as insecure. Therefore, any internal doors to and from conservatories should always be locked, and the key removed, before you leave the house and before you go to bed.

Lock tools, ladders, garden equipment etc away. If left out, or not locked away, they may actually aid a break-in.

Keep side gates, garages and sheds locked with a good quality lock or padlock, AND **Don't advertise** the fact that you're going, or away, on holiday with photographs and posts on social media (as with well-known footballer John Terry!).

Vehicle security

There has been a spate of thefts of **expensive cars**. If car keys are left near the front door it won't take long for them to be found and stolen. AND – <u>anything</u> left in a car is an invitation to thieves.

Halloween

Police will be carrying out patrols on **Halloween** to ensure that people who are trick-or-treating are doing so in a friendly way, and not causing a nuisance. If you feel **unsafe**, don't open your door if you're unsure about who is there. Use a spyhole or look out of a window to see who it is. Use a door chain if you decide to open your door. Have a neighbour or good friend's telephone number handy, just in case you need to phone them.

If you're part of Neighbourhood Watch and don't have internet access ask your Coordinator to download and print a 'no trick or treat' poster for you to display on your door.

The top 10 deterrents for home thieves, according to a recent 'Neighbourhood Watch News' are:- 1. CCTV camera 2. Sound of a barking dog (neighbours not so keen?!) 3. Strong heavy doors 4. TV that's turned on 5. Locked Upvc windows 6. Cars parked on driveway 7. Overlooked property 8. Surrounding fences 9. Gates outside of the property 10. Motion activated security lights.

Yet Another Scam Doing the Rounds?!



Yes, a new one every week it seems. I (editor) met this one myself, a few weeks ago. A call *apparently* from **Phones Ltd**, talking about good deals on mobile phones. But 'apparently' is the key word, the scammers are

in Pakistan (or similar) and are just trying to get your account details. I twigged what was going on – their accent & poor English helped, but DO BEWARE such a call.

Phones Ltd is a LEGIT British firm, and their website warns of this scam – they do NOT do business this way, (so no 'cold calling'), they merely respond to calls/emails for advice from us, and hope to get fees from firms after they put customers in contact with a good deal. 
<u>Doggie 'Doos' – and sadly some Don'ts?!</u>


