

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
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
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LETTER FROM ST. PETER'S

SEQUENCE DANCE CLUB

A short history - and what it is all about:

The Drayton Sequence Dance Club was formed in 1987 by six founder members. They were Richard and Joyce Cheney, Fred and Mavis Hays and Charles and Pearl Botley. They held their club nights at Drayton School. In 1990 the club moved to the Village Hall where at the first AGM, membership subs were set at £1 a head. The membership was set at seventy people with a waiting list so that names could be registered then in the event of people leaving the club, new people could be invited to join.

The current main players running the club are Brian and Sylvia Stimpson who joined in 1990 just about the same time that the club moved to the Village Hall. At that time, Richard Cheney played the music for dancing and of course in those days it was all vinyl records. A few years later, Richard became unwell and showed Brian how to organise the music and asked him to take over the task of playing the records. These days, of course, it is all compact discs and computers, but Brian remembers the difficulty in the early days of placing the needle in the right place so that the music played at the start of the track and didn't play the end of the music for the previous dance.

Brian has the current title of Chairman of the club and his wife Sylvia together with Cyril Ball arrange the social events. Dennis Sumner is Treasurer and sometimes helps Brian with the music. These form the nucleus of the club's organisers, but they are ably assisted by other members that pitch in to help as necessary.

Like most clubs, they could really do with some more members, the current membership level is about half that of the original membership.

For those that haven't come across sequence dancing before, it involves dance steps as in normal ballroom dancing but danced in a sequence so all the couples dance round the room all doing the same steps at the same time. Forget strictly, Drayton Sequence Club is all about social dancing. Even if people have no experience of dancing and don't know any sequence dances, don't worry, more experienced dancers can show you how to do it. And don't worry about going wrong, that is all part of the fun, in fact, the club has become a social club as much as a dance club.

Sequence dancing is a good way to exercise (ask your GP) and it keeps your mind alert so why not come along and see what it is all about, you will be made most welcome and there will no fee for an initial visit. Dances are held in Drayton Hall most Thursdays, 7.30

pm - 10.00 pm with an occasional Saturday evening dance.

Cheese and Pickle Quiche:



Ingredients:

350g short-crust pastry 1 teaspoon paprika plain flour, for dusting 4 medium eggs

150ml whole milk

200g Branston pickle (small chunks) 250g mature Cheddar cheese, grated

Preparation time - 25 minutes plus chilling time Cooking time - 1 hour 10 minutes

Method

- Take the block of short-crust pastry, flatten it out slightly and sprinkle all over with the paprika. Fold the edges in over the top, then knead the pastry until all the paprika is incorporated. If the pastry starts to stick to the worktop, dust with flour.
- 2. Wrap the pastry in cling film and place in the fridge for 15 minutes. Meanwhile, preheat the oven to 180°C/160°C fan/gas 4 and put a baking tray in to heat up.
- 3. Dust the work surface with flour and roll out the pastry to the thickness of a pound coin and large enough to cover the base and sides of a 23cm diameter, 3–4cm deep, loose-bottomed flan tin.
- 4. Line the inside of the tin with the rolled-out pastry. Press it into the edges, right into the grooves, leaving some overhang. Pierce the base all over with a fork. This stops it puffing up while baking.
- Cover the base and sides with a large piece of baking paper and fill with baking beans to weigh the pastry down. Take the hot baking tray out of the oven and place the prepared tart tin on it.
- 6. Bake for 25 minutes, then take out of the oven, remove the paper and baking beans, and bake for another 15 minutes.
- 7. Meanwhile, put your eggs into a jug and lightly whisk. Add the milk and stir.
- 8. Once the tart shell is out of the oven, spread the pickle all over the base and cover evenly with the grated cheese.
- 9. Pour in the milky egg mixture and place the whole tray back in the oven, on the middle shelf, for 25–30 minutes, until the filling is set and golden with just a very slight wobble in the middle.
- 10. Once the tart is cool enough to handle, slice off the pastry overhang using a sharp serrated knife. Leave to cool in the tin for 30 minutes, then transfer to a wire rack to cool completely.

Tip: This tart is best served lukewarm or cold and is great for picnics, lunchboxes or food on the go. It can also be frozen for up to a month – defrost it in the fridge before eating.

DRAYTON IN THE DOMESDAY BOOK

In 1085 William the Conqueror commissioned a survey of his possessions in England and Wales in order to ascertain how much they might produce in tax revenues. Within a year, reports on 13,415 places had been compiled and hand-written in Medieval Latin to produce what we call the Domesday Book.

Drayton gets just three lines (reproduced below) but a lot of information can be gleaned from them. It shows that before the Norman Conquest it was one of many parcels of land owned by Godwin, Earl of Wessex and father of King Harold. After the Conquest William assigned the freehold to Hascoit Musard, a Breton who was part of his army of invasion.

The Domesday Book records that at the time of the invasion Drayton consisted of $3\frac{1}{2}$ hides, reducing to one hide in 1086. A hide is roughly 120 acres, enough to support one household. There was land for one plough (taxable land that can be ploughed by a team of eight oxen) and there were four villeins, unfree peasants who worked for their lord but who also farmed some land for their own benefit. During the 20 years following the Conquest Drayton's value had fallen from £3 to £1.

King Harold had succeeded Edward the Confessor in January 1066 but his reign was brief. His crown was also claimed by both Harald Hardrada, King of Norway and Duke William II of Normandy (soon to become the Conqueror). On 25 September King Harold beat Harald at the Battle of Stamford Bridge then had to rush 241 miles south in order to intercept William, who had landed 7000 men at Pevensey Bay. At the Battle of Hastings on 14 October, Harold was killed by an arrow in the eye, at least according to the Bayeux Tapestry soon to come to Britain. The rest is our history.





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A NEW PRE-SCHOOL? Janet Manning

Although it has always been a happy place the Pre-School is housed in a temporary building that was designed for something else, and is wearing out. Staff, parents and trustees have sometimes struggled to provide the facilities that the children need and it is no longer adequate for Drayton's growing population. But that problem may also be the solution; as a result of the Neighbourhood Development Plan the developers behind our new housing are contributing £88,000 towards a new one.



The good news is that we already have detailed plans and planning permission for a permanent, purpose-built replacement. As well as being bigger it will comply with the latest OFSTED recommendations and provide a bright, attractive environment in which children will begin their first learning experience. It will be built on the current site so that links with the Primary School will be maintained.

Less good news is that we still need to raise a lot more money to pay for it. However, the Earl of Plymouth Estates, former owner of Manor Farm, are making a charitable donation of £50,000 towards the cost, for which we are very grateful. We are also applying to various grant-awarding bodies and exploring other opportunities for raising the necessary funds. If all goes well, we will have a new Pre-School by the end of 2019.

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Thames Water announcement expected 'soon':

We were expecting that Thames Water would by now have released its draft Water Resources Management Plan for 2019-2024 (dWRMP19, as it is known for short) for public consultation. However, on Friday 5th January, we were informed by Thames Water that the release would be delayed until 'end of January' (which is unfortunately after the deadline for this newsletter).

The reason given is that the Department for Environment, Food and Rural Affairs (DEFRA) have not yet cleared the draft reports to go out for consultation. By the Government's rules, DEFRA have to check the draft reports for 'National Security' and 'Commercially confidential' issues before release to the public for comment. This has taken longer than usual, probably because DEFRA are very heavily involved in BREXIT issues – we do not suspect anything underhand in this delay. Anyway, we await the issue of the draft so that we can comment.

Once the dWRMP19 is released, the public (and the regulator bodies such as the Environment Agency and OFWAT) have 12 weeks to submit comments. Thames Water then have a further period to respond to all the comments, and release a revised draft for the Government to approve. We are likely to reach the revised draft stage in the Autumn.

GARD's work during the consultation:

The next few months are extremely important for the opposition to Thames Water's reservoir plans, so we urge everyone to look and comment on these (we will be giving information about how to do this). We are not sure exactly where the reservoir fits in Thames Water's plans, but we are sure from their briefings that they have not abandoned the idea – and, however it is mentioned, whether to be built in the next 5 years or the next 15, strong opposition at this stage is essential to get the idea ditched, or kicked so far down the road that it will essentially die as an option.

GARD will:

- look through the proposals in detail, using our expert consultant's help;
- press for more action on Leakage and Water Efficiency (we already know from briefings that Thames Water's proposals on these will be completely inadequate);
- work with CPRE to expose the faulty logic in Thames Water's predictions of the water shortage in the South East (this depends heavily on dubious population growth predictions);
- brief local Parish Councils and the Vale of the White Horse DC on our findings, and press them to put in opposing criticism on the reservoir plans;
- keep everyone informed through our website and Facebook pages, and, if the situation is urgent, lobby the local MPs;
- continue to lobby the Environment Agency and OFWAT about the fact that the reservoir will not be resilient against long droughts and is not environmentally the best solution;
- submit our final report to the consultation at the end of April. GARD intends to call public meetings in the villages at the end of February/beginning of March, to inform residents on the plans please keep an eye out for information on these.

Joining GARD:

Once again, thanks to all those who have recently joined GARD, and to existing members who have sent donations into our fighting fund. Our numbers continue to grow, but we still need your support.

Reporting suspicious behaviour

Modern slavery

We all think it wouldn't happen in our village but, shockingly, three modern slavery crimes are recorded every week in the Thames Valley and many more go unreported. Victims of modern slavery can be any age, gender, nationality or ethnicity. They are tricked or threatened into work, and may feel unable to leave due to fear of intimidation. Email www.thamesvalley.police.uk/hiddenharm to access protection and support. The police rely on information from members of the public. If you suspect it, report it!

Would you recognise the signs? How do they look? Scruffy, dirty, malnourished, injured? How are they acting? Anxious, afraid, reluctant to talk? What's their work situation like? Long hours, unsuitable clothing, wrong equipment? How's their accommodation? Overcrowded, poorly maintained, curtains always closed? What are their movements like? Never leave the house alone, limited contact with friends and family, no access to money or identification?

Save your life with a message in a Bottle:

When the Emergency Services are called to the home of someone who has collapsed or been involved in an incident, they are faced with many questions. Who is this person? What medication are they taking? Are they allergic to anything? Who are their next of kin or carers? Are there any pets in the house who will need care if this patient has to be taken into hospital? The small plastic 'bottle' container contains a yellow form on which the owner has provided vital information - medical conditions, regular medications, allergies, doctor's details etc. This information could obviously prove critical in deciding any appropriate treatment or other necessary action. The bottle is placed inside the fridge on the door shelf just above where the milk is kept and a green sticker is placed on the outside door of the fridge. A second sticker is placed on the inside of the main entrance door.

The Message in a Bottle scheme is very strongly supported by our

local Emergency Services who are impressed by the simplicity of the system. It is also now a national scheme – run throughout the country by Lions and some other organisations all with the same aim – ensuring that their community is being helped to the maximum. There are now over 100,000 of these little bottles in the fridges of Oxfordshire alone.

And with a message in a Wallet:

This was Introduced in 2017 and folds, concertina style, to the size of a credit card and should be kept in a wallet or purse. Ideally you need a bottle and a wallet so that the information's available if you have either an incident or accident at home or while you're away from home.

AVOIDING INTERNET SCAMS

Using the internet for shopping, banking, booking etc. has become increasingly common and is already almost essential if the services now on offer are to be fully accessed. Yet almost daily we read in the newspapers of someone whose money or even their identity has been stolen, usually caused by responding to a phishing email or because they clicked on a hyperlink contained in

something which seems to have come from a utility or a bank or from a friend. Always be suspicious and careful is the best advice but it's easy to make a momentary mistake and find oneself in trouble.



The Global Cyber Alliance has come up with a new tool, called 'Quad 9', to help users avoid accessing malicious sites. It was developed with the support of the City of London and New York Police departments and is recommended by many British police forces including the Thames Valley Police – and it's free. However, Quad9 is not the only tool which can help. The best of today's internet browsers, such as Google Chrome, Microsoft Edge and


Mozilla Firefox, already provide significant security provided they are up-dated regularly. The jury is out whether Quad9 will help ordinary users very much.

DNS - What is it?

Domain Name Systems (DNS) are like public phone books for the web. They're the reason you only need to remember a website's name and not its IP address (think of these as phone numbers for computers). When you type "www.youtube.com" into a browser, a DNS service translates that into the associated IP address (199.223.232.0) for you.

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RAISING THE BAR IN RECYCLING Rachel Burns

Do you know that each household in Oxfordshire produces one tonne of waste each year? We are amongst the best in the country at recycling and composting for a few years now at about 60% but recycling rates have started to drop in Oxfordshire.

We want to do better at recycling and the new joint countywide waste strategy is critical to this. We know that on average over half of the items put in the general waste bin could have been recycled by placing them in the other bins available.

Residents are being given the chance to talk rubbish and recycling and tell Oxfordshire's county, city and district councils how they can help them recycle more and create less waste.



Through this consultation residents are being asked what would help them to reduce their overall waste consumption and recycle more. This includes expanding the range of materials that can be recycled at the kerbside and tips and advice on left-over food, upcycling clothing or donating or buying second hand goods. The councils are also seeking views on more radical schemes that have been implemented elsewhere in the country, such as changing bin sizes and collection frequency.

The app will also send users a notification if their waste collection day changes due to a bank holiday – very handy for keeping track of what day bins will be emptied over the Christmas period.

It will also let residents know if collections are disrupted by snow or icy conditions.

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PARISH COUNCIL REPORT

Report of the meetings held on 4th December 2017 and 8th January

December 4th:

A parishioner put forward a case for making Church Lane and Henleys Lane a no-through road, with entry blocked at the Henleys Lane/Abingdon Road junction. It was explained that a number of different solutions have been suggested in the past to address



the problems of these roads being used as a rat run between the High St and Abingdon Rd. Unfortunately, all of them have drawbacks of one sort or another, and the narrowness of Church Lane in particular would cause practical difficulties for delivery trucks, refuse vehicles etc. It does right now of course. It was agreed to set up a working party of councillors to investigate the options further. This to include a survey of the residents living in both roads to canvass their opinions.

The PC approved in principle its intention to approach the Public Works Loan Board for a loan to part finance the sports pavilion at Walnut Meadow. The application will not go ahead until there has been appropriate public consultation on the matter. The sports pitches and other areas of public open space at Walnut Meadow also have to be handed over to the Parish in acceptable condition, which they are most definitely not at the present time (see latest info below).

January 8th:

Richard Webber, our County Councillor, reported that in the Conservative government's Autumn Statement last November, a sum of £212 million has been set aside specifically to fund infrastructure projects in Oxfordshire. This is in recognition of the fact that new house-building is placing increasing pressure on the existing road network. The plans for Didcot Garden Town should be advanced with the help of this money, and we could be looking at new roads and even the long-mooted new Thames crossing. Given the past history of these plans, readers are entitled to be sceptical about this announcement, and to wonder what strings might be attached to the deal. If nothing else though, it shows a recognition that something needs to be done before we face total traffic gridlock. The PC understands that local parishes have objected to the proposed huge new housing development in Culham, on the grounds that Culham Bridge could not cope with many more vehicles than at present. It is suggested that large-scale development in the area be blocked until 2021 at the earliest. Hopefully, the authorities will take note and common sense prevail.

A meeting was held with representatives of OCC, Thames Travel, and TVP at Walnut Meadow to discuss the possible placement of additional bus stops (north and south bound) close to the entrance into the site. This is considered feasible by the experts, but we wait for them to consult with the team looking at the traffic calming scheme for Drayton and report back. Other issues regarding the junction of Walnut Meadow continue to be a concern and a satisfactory lighting scheme has yet to be submitted by Millers. A meeting has been arranged with Millers management to discuss the many other problems on the site regarding work which has not been carried out or completed as promised. A meeting with the residents of the development is also planned, at which we hope both Vale and OCC councillors will be able to attend. This will probably take place in late Jan or early Feb.

Finally, I should note that there are still a couple of vacancies for councillors on the PC. Anyone interested is invited to attend the next meeting (see below) to see what goes on.

Please forgive yet another article on planning and development. I will try to find something else to write about in future, but it may not be easy.

The impact of local development on Drayton's roads and its Neighbourhood Plan, the impact of development on the A417 through Marcham, Barrow Rd and the Marcham AQMA, the impact of development in Sutton Courtenay on Culham Bridge and an A34, itself already under extreme stress running




through the middle of it all - it sometimes seems as if this County Division, of which we are all part, is being singled out for very special treatment. The truth is, of course, that many parts of the South of England are under similar stress.

However, with our very low unemployment and our local economy thriving, Government is wanting, expecting and depending on us to grow. For almost the first time, the stresses – particularly on our road system - are now so obvious and so acute that Government is realizing that without more infrastructure, there are fewer and fewer sensible places to put the nation's much needed extra housing. Money has to be found and the calls for infrastructure before housing are becoming ever louder and more persuasive.

Hence, the "Growth Deal" - an initial "down payment" (Government term, not mine) of £215m over 5 years, to help us cope with all the housing our Councils are already committed to - may not be enough, but it's a start. Given that our housing is due to be delivered over the next 13 years, it appears that, if the deal is signed, there is the prospect of some infrastructure *before* houses. This is something we have been requesting for many years now.

On January 23rd, a planning appeal hearing will begin over 2 potential major developments in Sutton Courtenay. The OCC Highway officer's view is that the road network will not cope, at least not until a new bridge over the Thames has been built. This might happen in five years at the earliest. The planning appeal is due to last at least 8 days, we are told. We will know if the Growth deal is to be signed on February 1st. The timing of all this and the planning decision is going to be highly significant. The result, however it goes, will impact not just on Sutton Courtenay and the immediate villages around, but on the whole of Oxfordshire and almost certainly on planning in the whole of the South of England. I would urge all those with an interest in planning and housing to join me in watching the progress of that appeal very closely.

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WESTMINSTER Ed Vaizey

The main focus of the November budget was housing - a deeply controversial issue in our part of the world. Nevertheless, people do know that we need to build more houses; property ownership has fallen dramatically and houses have become unaffordable for many people. I am therefore encouraged that the Chancellor outlined the Government's ambition to increase housing supply to its highest level since



1970 by the end of this Parliament. This will put us on track to deliver 300,000 homes a year by the mid-2020s with £15.3 billion new financial support for house building over the next five years – taking the total to at least £44 billion.

On a local level, it was promising to see an additional £215 million set aside for Oxfordshire to build infrastructure, deliver new homes and increase economic productivity across the county. This is a welcome step in ensuring our local area is fit for the future.

I also welcome the announcement from Chris Grayling of the £47.9bn overhaul of the rail network in England and Wales, including restoring the Oxford to Cambridge rail link. This is part of the overall strategy suggested by the National Infrastructure Commission's report earlier this month on infrastructure growth across the Cambridge-Milton Keynes-Oxford Arc. I will be continuing to campaign in Parliament for a new station at Wantage & Grove whilst there is so much interest in rail infrastructure.

The Department of Digital, Culture, Media and Sport (DCMS) has recently compiled a handy list of funding sources available for arts, heritage and cultural projects which may be useful for local organisations. There are many different avenues that organisations seeking support can pursue and I would recommend that anybody wishing to make an application first contacts the relevant local office. Full list can be found at: goo.gl/QihSKD

On a similar note it is fantastic to see that over the past three months the Big Lottery Fund has provided nearly £55,000 of funding to 6 projects in the constituency. Every week over £13 million is awarded across the UK to support community activity with the money raised from National Lottery players. The organisation works hard to ensure the money reaches the people and organisations who make a real difference and it's great that the benefits are being felt in our area.
