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RECIPE FOR APRIL

Corned Beef Quiche - Serves 4 to 6

Ingredients:

- 1 Large tin corned beef.
- 225g / 8oz Very low fat cottage cheese.
- 3 Eggs
- 1 Onion (chopped)
- Seasoning to taste.
- Pinch of mixed herbs.

Method:

Pre-heat oven to 190°C, 375°F, Gas 6. Mix the Corned beef and onion together. Place in the base of a flan dish and press down well. Beat the eggs with the cottage cheese, season to taste and pour this mixture onto the beef base. Bake for 30 minutes until set and golden brown.

Serve hot with vegetables or cold with a salad.

Can be cooked in a microwave on full power for 10 minutes, and browned under a hot grill.

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WESTMINSTER LETTER Ed Vaizey

South Oxfordshire and the Vale of White Horse have announced a partnership to promote our area's scientific prowess. Part of the partnership includes bids for new infrastructure, which could see a new Science Bridge to help traffic around Didcot, a Didcot to Culham link road and improved cycle networks around the town. We should find out if the funds are allocated in the next few months. A pilot study on green spaces around Didcot as part of the "garden town" plans has also been started. The results of the study will define green buffer zones for the garden town development plans and help protect open spaces and pedestrian routes around the whole garden town area. More information, and an excellent video, can be found at www.sciencevale.com.

This month I was pleased to host the Cycling Minister, Jesse Norman MP, in Milton Park to view new cycling infrastructure improvements, including the new Backhill Tunnel. The Government has committed £100,000 of funding to cycling safety projects, including reducing the cost of e-bike batteries through recycling used laptop batteries. I also visited JISC in Harwell, which provides broadband for all our universities and colleges, and saw the excellent new Renaissance Retirement Homes in Wantage.

The Oxfordshire Clinical Commissioning group have opened a consultation of local health services (yet another one!). You can register to take part on the 'Get Involved' section of the NHS Oxfordshire website. Our local health services have been under serious pressure, particularly with the closure of Wantage Community Hospital. I encourage everyone to share their views.

In February I received 456 items of correspondence (emails and letters) from constituents. Subjects raised with me included the NHS, Brexit and free trade.

PARISH COUNCIL REPORT **Richard Williams**

Report of the Parish Council meeting held on Mon 5th March 2018

Three parishioners attended the meeting to protest at the recent decision by the PC to increase allotment fees. It was explained that the intention is not, as has been alleged, to discourage allotment holders, or to claim the land for other uses. Quite the opposite in fact. The Council has made efforts to obtain more land for allotments, bearing in mind the growth of the village and the anticipated increase in demand for plots. However, so far we have not found a landowner willing to sell.

What is apparent is that the current fees are so low that there is not necessarily much incentive to work the plot. Hence, one or two allotment holders have sometimes left their plot untended, in the full knowledge it will cost them only a few pounds a year regardless. Meanwhile there is a waiting list of people who would like a plot. It was argued that the increase is excessive, and while it certainly looks that way in percentage terms, the PC felt that the base figure was unrealistically low. The proposed increase would not take effect until 2019 in any case, but it was agreed to look again at the issue and to consult with plot holders before making a final decision later this year.

The Parish Council reviewed the draft report from the Conservation Adviser on Drayton's Conservation Area. The only description of this area available in the past was a couple of paragraphs drawn up about 20 years ago by the Vale's Conservation Officer. While other local authorities, e.g. Cherwell, have invested in quite detailed accounts of their own conservation areas, referencing their past history, listed buildings, other important local landmarks, and so on, the Vale have not seen this task as a priority. When the PC sought their assistance in drawing up proper documentation, the Vale refused to help. We therefore commissioned our own report from a qualified conservation expert. It was this report, now complete, which was under consideration.

The report falls into three parts. Part 1 is a full description of the current Conservation area. Part 2 is a 'local list' of buildings and other significant features in the village, thought to be worthy of preservation by a group of residents and councillors, who walked around the village, accompanied by the adviser. Part 3 suggests extending the conservation area in several places. This was the most controversial part of the report, as some residents living in roads which might become part of the area were concerned it might limit their freedom to make alterations to their

One parishioner stated that in his view, the Manor Farm housing development should be de-registered as a conservation area, as it is no longer of rural aspect, and its value as a background setting for existing listed buildings has been impaired. The Parish Council rejected this view, and our adviser commented that conservation area status would continue to give some leverage to the planning department in resisting inappropriate future development on the site - new extensions, added storeys, and the like.

A follow-up meeting with the residents of Walnut Meadow, scheduled to be held on 1st March, was postponed due to the bitterly cold weather, but hopefully will take place soon. Miller Homes have replied to the residents' letter but at best, the many outstanding problems on the site are likely to take several months to be resolved.

A reminder that there are still two vacancies for councillors on the PC. Anyone interested is invited to attend the Annual Parish Assembly (see below) to hear about what has been happening in the village over the past year.



The normal Parish Council meeting will immediately follow at approx. 7.45pm. As ever, all are welcome to attend.



GARD (Group Against Reservoir Development) Derek Stork

Thames Water draft plan released for consultation – Reservoir still top prioity 'in longer term'

Recently (12th February), Thames Water released their draft Water Resources Management Plan for 2019-2024 (dWRMP19). The public (and the regulator bodies such as the Environment Agency and OFWAT) now have about 12 weeks (until 29th April) to submit comments. Thames Water then have a further period to respond to all the comments, and release a revised draft for the Government to approve. We are likely to reach the revised draft stage in the Autumn.

We have only had a few days to look at this plan (the documents run to over 2000 pages!), but we can see already that:

- Pressure from consumers, regulators (OFWAT) and stakeholder organisations such as GARD has forced Thames Water to aim for more ambitious reduction of leakage and better water efficiency as their first measures, but they are still not aiming for the ambitious targets that, for instance Southern Water are already reaching;
- pressure from GARD, CPRE and local organisations has forced Thames Water to defer the proposal to build the mega-reservoir in our local fields until the 2035-2045 period;
- instead, as a first measure, Thames Water propose to set up an 'indirect re-use' water scheme, where treated London wastewater is diverted from its normal discharge into the Thames Estuary, and piped upstream to the Thames above Teddington Weir, from where it can be extracted to fill the London storage reservoirs. This scheme is proposed for the 2030 timeframe. It is interesting that this scheme, rubbished by Thames Water at the Public Inquiry in 2010, was first put forward by GARD's consultants in 2008, and is now Thames Water's 'go-to' scheme. Proof of GARD's influence in these matters.

GARD's work during the consultation

The next few months are extremely important for the opposition to Thames Water's reservoir plans, so we urge everyone to look and comment on these (we will be giving information about how to do this). We are now sure that the reservoir occupies a key place in Thames Water's long-term plans. Even though it is now scheduled more than 15 years down the road, strong opposition at this stage is essential to get the idea ditched, or kicked so far down the road that it will essentially die as an option. We have succeeded so far, 'one more push' should do it

GARD will:

- look through the proposals in detail, using our expert consultant's help;
- press for more action on Leakage and Water Efficiency (we already know from brief look at the plans that Thames Water's proposals on these will be completely inadequate);
- work with CPRE to expose the faulty logic in Thames Water's predictions of the water shortage in the South East (this depends heavily on dubious population growth predictions);
- brief local Parish Councils and the Vale of the White Horse DC on our findings, and press them to put in opposing criticism on the reservoir plans;
- keep everyone informed through our website (www.abingdonreservoir.org) and Facebook pages, and lobby the local MPs;
- continue to lobby the Environment Agency and OFWAT about the fact that the reservoir will not be resilient against long droughts and is not environmentally the best solution;
- submit our final report to the consultation at the end of April.



NEIGHBOURHOOD ACTION GROUP (NAG5)

Scams phone calls purporting to be from the Telephone Preference Service (TPS)

The caller asks if the subscriber is still receiving unwanted calls. This is inevitably the case because the TPS is only able to reduce the frequency of such calls. Sooner or later the caller will talk about payments, claiming it is in order to help to provide a more comprehensive service. Do not be drawn in by this and do not make any payments. The call is a ruse to obtain subscribers' bank details. If you have the caller's number you can report it to TPS, who do not charge for their services. Call TPS on 0345 070707 or e-mail tps@dma.org.uk

Scam phone calls purporting to be from BT

Calls have been made to both landlines and mobile phones where the scammers have known the customer's personal details, and even provided reference numbers, claiming that this would reduce their BT bill. Please exercise extreme caution, as criminals are trying to trick customers into providing their bank details.

Fraudulent callers may:

- try to convince you that you owe money on your bill and threaten to disconnect the phone line immediately if you do not pay there and then over the phone. <u>BT will never</u> <u>disconnect a phone line during a call.</u>
- say your computer has a fault or a virus, and then try to scare
 you by suggesting that your computer will stop working if
 you do not take action. They might try to persuade or coerce
 you into installing software or ask you to perform commands
 on your computer with the intention of gaining remote access
 to it.

Such callers 'spoof' the number they are calling from. If you dial 1471 to obtain the caller's number you may get a fictitious number that masks the real destination. You may also be offered a number to call, to confirm the legitimacy of their call. A scammer will answer calls to this number, tricking you into thinking it is BT.

Protect yourself

- Be suspicious about unsolicited calls relating to a security or system problem, even if the caller claims to represent a respected company.
- If you want to make a call to check the legitimacy of the caller find the number yourself, either from your bill or from the BT website, and use a different phone from the one you took the call on.
- Ask questions about your account before continuing the call. If the caller cannot answer they are not legitimate.
- Never give any personal information, such as credit card or bank details to an unsolicited caller.
- Never type anything into the computer, install software, visit any websites or follow any other instructions unless you are confident that the call is genuine.
- Do not agree to sign up for anything and, under no circumstances, allow the caller to take over control of your

- computer system. Doing so would allow access to your personal files to obtain information.
- If you use a public, or shared, computer always remember to sign out completely when you exit any account by clicking on 'Sign out', 'Log Off' or 'Log Out'.


BT has said it is aware of these fraudulent activities, which are industry-wide problems that they are actively working on to tackle. They advise customers to check www.bt.com/scams for details of the latest developments. You can also check your account online to see if there are any problems by going to www.bt.com/mybt. If you don't have the internet check your bill for the number to call.

BT also says it constantly monitors the network to safeguard its customers. If it detects suspicious account activity, which makes them believe that an account may be compromised or at risk, they will act to secure the account immediately. They will prompt the customer to change their password when they next log in. BT never charges for support of this kind. They also have preventative measures available such as BT nuisance call blocker phones that block up to 100% nuisance calls plus advice on how they can help to deal with unwanted calls.

COUNTY COUNCIL REPORT Richard Webber

Potholes

"You can turn your back on a pothole. You cannot turn your back on a needy child."

As we enter the end of a decade of austerity, Oxfordshire, along with many other Councils responsible for Highways, has taken some tough decisions to protect our children's and adult social services from the worst of the cost cutting - at the expense of the Highways budget. We now spend less than half what we spent on our roads and Highways 10 years ago. Meanwhile social service costs and demand go up and up.

There is, of course, a limit to how long we can continue to do this. Roads do not deteriorate at a steady rate. After a few years of neglect, the rate of deterioration falls off a cliff. And the cost of bringing the roads back into an acceptable condition escalate dramatically. In other words, our present policy of "managed decline" is inevitably storing up more and more trouble for the future. We are, potentially, handing over a massive problem for our children.

I find this very uncomfortable. So what are the possible solutions?

First, if we can actually get the Growth Deal in place, the money it gives us to develop the major road network, will allow some of our present budget to be diverted to repairing the smaller A and B

Secondly, whilst we demand that Government gives more money to the Health Service, more money to social services, more money to environmental protection and more money to Education, we need to persuade them that there is now a major problem in underfunding of road maintenance.

Thirdly, Councils - including Oxfordshire - need to be allowed and encouraged to borrow against their assets to spend money on roads. Every pound we spend keeping a road from falling off that cliff, is future pounds saved.

Without good roads, local economies cannot thrive. Building ever more houses without a safe, effective route to and from work will put people off coming to live here. It will also put off companies from setting up and staying here. Without good roads, our social services suffer as people find it harder to get to shops, to schools and to hospitals.

To bring our roads back to an acceptable condition will, it is estimated, cost more than £150 million - and that's just Oxfordshire. We cannot wait for Elon Musk to fly us about in rockets or in supersonic underground tunnels and we would all prefer not to have to risk our tyres and our suspensions every time we take to the Highway.

Step one is for all of us right up to Central Government to recognize the scale of the problem. We can hide from it no longer.

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
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THE STONEHILL COMMUNITY GARDEN.

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

As I walked with my dog through Drayton, I saw three lots of dog poo on the paths, this is unacceptable. First lot was on the corner of Marcham Road and Whitehorns Way and then the other two were on Whitehorns Way

Dear Editor,

I live in East Hanney in a house that my husband and I bought from Jane Christie Miller almost four years ago.

Jane moved to live with her niece in Drayton before passing away in April of last year. I have recently found a box of old miniature photos which evidently belonged to Jane and I would dearly like to pass them on to her niece but I don't have any contact details.

I would be grateful if anyone who knows contact details for Jane's niece could pass them on to me via the Chronicle editor. Details below.

Dear Editor.

I am now feeling too scared to walk on the Millennium Green. Being allergic to dogs, especially their saliva, I have long accepted that 90% of the time I have to change my trousers and wash them after every walk on the Green because some dog has jumped up me. But yesterday I was BITTEN by a dog. The owner, a woman, could not get the dog under control and he lunged at me several more times before she grabbed him. The bite is minor, but I had to rush home, wash and apply antihistamine cream and take antihistamine to calm the allergic reaction. Today I have several puncture wounds, a bruise and a hard lump. The woman was very apologetic, but as I walked away I heard her ask the dog in a 'sweet' voice, 'now what was that all about?' I think he deserved stern words if not a slap.

I have since learned that this is not the first time this dog has bitten someone in a completely unprovoked attack. The owners have taken him for training after the first attack, but he can clearly not be trusted. What if his next victim is a child? He could reach the throat of a small child. I did not take immediate action because I needed to reflect and get over the terror of the attack. However, having posted about this on Families in Drayton on Facebook, many of the responses think it should be reported. I tried to contact the dog warden but they no longer exist and I was directed to Environmental Health at the Vale, who told me to ring 101. I now have an appointment with the police next week. The owners concerned discovered who I am and have emailed further apologies to my husband, which is appreciated. However this does not detract from the fact that they have an unreliable dog, that may bite at any time. If a child is hurt, I would feel terrible if I had not reported this.

On a more general level, I am concerned to discover on Facebook just how many families with small children avoid the Millenniumn Green because of incidents they have experienced with dogs. Even some dog owners who keep their dogs on the lead are intimidated by loose dogs pestering or attacking their dog. I know it's nice for dogs to run free, but I'm wondering whether the Millennium Green should require that dogs be kept on leads, so that ALL sections of the Drayton community feel safe to enjoy the Green.

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SCUBA DIVING

SCUBA (Self Contained Underwater Breathing Apparatus) A short article to tempt you to explore our undersea world...

Your underwater adventure to see the other 70 percent of our planet... or as Jacques Cousteau once said "From birth, man carries the weight of gravity on his shoulders. He is bolted to earth. But man has only to sink beneath the surface of the sea and he is free."

Sharks get a lot of bad press, but really they are super cool predators; many of the 500 or so species such as The Great White, Tiger, Blue, Mako, Thresher and Hammerhead sharks are Apex predators and at the top of their food chain – which, fortunately very seldom involves divers. All divers love 'big stuff', but that's only part of the dive adventures waiting to be had; there are wrecks to explore, ecosystems to understand, places to go, boats to live on, night time dives, fish to see, people to meet and make friends with, turtles to watch and you may even find Nemo...

Only a fool would strap a tank of air on his or her back, don a mask and fins and leap off the back of a perfectly good boat into the ocean without any training; so, how does it all start? For many it starts on your summer holiday when the local hotel or resort has a dive centre and the 'Discover Scuba' poster is spotted, or the kids 'Bubblemaker' programme catches the eye. Discover Scuba Diving (DSD) is very controlled for safety and is really a (very) short diving course that makes you safe and knowledgeable enough to have an accompanied sea dive, rather like a tandem parachute jump. If you want to get started before your summer holiday then pretty well all the UK dive centres will offer certification courses and pukka dive holidays for those already certified. Google local dive centres and that's it!

If the bug gets you after DSD – and it probably will, the next step is to get an open water diver certification that involves either classroom or e-learning, some confined (swimming pool) instruction and dives, followed by open water (sea, reservoir or lake) certification dives. For some that's enough and it'll allow you to go diving when you're on holiday, possibly with a refresher dive if you haven't dived for a while. For many it's just the beginning of the ladder of certifications and adventures for this unique and exciting sport.

What about all the kit? You can always rent everything you need at a very reasonable cost at the local dive centre, but a mask, snorkel and fins are your basic gear and are very personal and not terribly expensive. So, what is 'everything'; well, that depends on factors such as water temperature, the type of diving (wreck, cave, night etc), but in addition to your basic gear mentioned above, you'll usually need a wet or a dry suit to keep you toasty warm, a tank of air, a regulator to allow you to breathe it, some weights and a buoyancy control jacket – it's a bit like an inflatable waistcoat – to help you maintain 'neutral buoyancy' and become weightless, a little like being an astronaut but under water, it's wonderful! It's a technical sport and there's a ton of stuff you can get, but not all at once

So, if you want to give it a go, find your local dive centre (Oxford), pop in and enrol for their next Professional Association of Dive Instructors DSD or dive course

Shed breakins

SmartWater security marking

We are starting an initiative to make some of our areas 'SmartWater streets' or even 'SmartWater villages'. If we get an uptake of 80% of residents on a road that purchase SmartWater we can apply for signs to act as a deterrent. SmartWater is a brand of forensic marking fluid containing millions of microscopic particles that make up an individual property identification code. The liquid is invisible to the naked eye, but glows green under UV light. It can be painted onto valuable items (e.g. laptops, MP3 players, televisions, antiques) so that if the items are stolen and later seized by the police, the markings can be checked and items linked with their owners. SmartWater is a good deterrent and increases your chances of getting stolen items back. PHANTOM DEBT FRAUD

Message sent by Action Fraud

Action Fraud has recently experienced an increase in the number of calls to members of the public by fraudsters requesting payments for a "phantom" debt. The fraud involves being cold-called by someone purporting to be a debt collector, bailiff or other type of enforcement agent. The fraudster may claim to be working under instruction of a court, business or other body and suggest they are recovering funds for a non-existent debt.

The fraudsters are requesting payment, sometimes by bank transfer and if refused, they threaten to visit homes or workplaces in order to recover the supposed debt that is owed. In some cases, the victim is also threatened with arrest. From the reports Action Fraud has received, this type of fraud is presently occurring throughout the UK.

It is important to recognise that there are key differences between the various entities who seek to settle debts or outstanding fees in England and Wales. These differences range from the type of debt they will enforce to the legal powers they possess. Protect Yourself

- Make vigorous checks if you ever get a cold call. Bailiffs for example, should always be able to provide you with a case number and warrant number, along with their name and the court they are calling from; make a note of all details provided to you.
- If you receive a visit from a bailiff, they must always identify themselves as a Court Bailiff at the earliest possible opportunity. Ask to see their identity card which they must carry to prove who they are, this card shows their photograph and identity number. They will also carry the physical warrant showing the debt and endorsed with a court seal.
- If you work for a business and receive a call or visit, be sure to speak with your manager or business owner first. Never pay the debts yourself on behalf of the business you work for; some fraudsters have suggested employees make payment suggesting they can then be reimbursed by their employer when in reality the debt is non-existent.
- Exercise caution believing someone is genuine because you've found something on the internet; fraudsters could easily create fake online profiles to make you believe them.
- Double check with the court, company or public body they claim to work for to confirm whether the call is legitimate; if you use a landline make sure you hear the dialling tone prior to dialling as the caller could still be on the line and you could potentially speak to the fraudster(s) to confirm the non-existent debt. Also be sure to independently search for a telephone number to call; never use a number provided by the caller without carrying out your own research.
- Do not feel rushed or intimidated to make a decision based on a phone call. Take five and listen to your instincts.
- If you know you have a debt, keep in regular contact with your creditor and be sure to establish the debt type at the earliest opportunity if you are not aware. This will help you to understand who might be in contact with you regarding any repayments or arrears.

HEDGE HOGS

"The State of Britain's Hedgehogs 2018". is a report published jointly by the British Hedgehog Preservation Society (BHPS) and People's Trust for Endangered Species (PTES). It is the only comprehensive review of the status of Britain's hedgehogs and it shows that hedgehogs in rural areas are in severe decline, with their numbers plummeting by half since the Millennium.

"There are many reasons hedgehogs are in trouble," explains Emily Wilson, Hedgehog Officer for Hedgehog Street, a public action campaign run by PTES and BHPS. "The intensification of agriculture through the loss of hedgerows and permanent grasslands, increased field sizes, and the use of pesticides which reduce the amount of prey available, are all associated with the plunge in numbers of hedgehogs in rural areas."

However, with approximately 70% of land in the UK managed by farmers, BHPS and PTES are planning to engage with the farming community to help protect this iconic creature.

"Farmers play a vital role in producing food, but they're also well placed to help protect, maintain and enhance our countryside," continues Wilson. "The Government recently reiterated plans to reform the EU Common Agricultural Policy to reward landowners for delivering environmental benefits. Many farmers already have a sustainable approach to agriculture, and we think there's a great opportunity to work more widely with them to stem the alarming decline of our country hedgehogs."

Whilst The State of Britain's Hedgehogs report highlights a worrying decline in our countryside, it shows a more positive outlook for hedgehogs in our towns and cities: although the species has declined by a third in urban areas since 2000, the rate of decline is slowing. Hedgehogs are not disappearing from urban green spaces as rapidly as they were fifteen years ago, and might even be returning. Where they are found, numbers too, appear to be growing in some places.

It is exciting to think that the combined efforts of thousands of volunteers who have joined Hedgehog Street and pledged to make their gardens more hedgehog-friendly, may be making a difference. PTES and BHPS launched Hedgehog Street in 2011 to inspire the British public to help hedgehogs and other wildlife that depend on their gardens and, so far, over 47,000 Hedgehog Champions have signed up to help.

Wilson concludes: "Urban and suburban areas are becoming increasingly important for hedgehogs, so we need more people in those locations to sign up as Hedgehog Champions. Hedgehogs are a generalist species, so the more people can do to help them in their own back garden, the more they will also benefit other wildlife."

GOVERNMENT GREEN-LIGHTS FIRST USE OF **AUTONOMOUS VEHICLES ON UK ROADS**

- UK's first trial of autonomous vehicles on public roads will take place in Didcot
- Trial funded by Government's innovation agency, Innovate
- Project seeks to reduce car usage within a large business park by half

The first use of fully connected and autonomous vehicles (CAV) on public roads is set to take place in Oxfordshire, following the announcement of government funding into a trial project.

Innovate UK announced on 25th february the award of £2.5 million to trial self-driving vehicles in and around Milton Park, the large, high-tech business and science hub near Didcot. The vehicles will travel between private roads at Milton Park and the public roads that link the site with nearby transport services.

The 30-month MultiCAV project will be undertaken by a consortium of organisations with different sector backgrounds who are investing in the development of autonomous vehicles, and led by UK transport operator FirstGroup.

Despite being relatively close to Didcot Parkway station, most travel to and from Milton Park is currently made in private vehicles. With the site set to expand in the coming years, the MultiCAV consortium is building on the work already underway to provide the park with long-term, safe sustainable transport.

Commuters to the site will be able to connect with the selfdriving pods from local transport services, while booking and paying for their trip in one easy process.

It is hoped that by the end of the trial up to 50% of private vehicle journeys within the business park will switch to using the shared, electric-powered pods.
