Letter from St Peter's (the Ministry Team)

The former Liverpool Manager Bill Shankly famously said, "Some people believe football is a matter of life and death, I am very disappointed with that attitude. I can assure you it is much, much more important than that!".

This month sees the start of the World Cup, a truly global event watched by billions on TV – even those of us who wouldn't call ourselves football fans. And this competition illustrates some key points about the Christian life. As Paul writes: But one thing I do: forgetting what is behind and straining towards what is ahead, I press on towards the goal to win the prize for which God has called me heavenwards in Christ Jesus.' (Philippians 3:13,14).

A prize to be won: The dream of every player in the competition is to be able to hold up the World Cup themselves. For us the prize is the eternal life, God's gift of relationship with him for now and eternity through Jesus. But there's an important difference between football and the Christian faith. To win the World Cup you have to be good enough, while Christ's love for us is underserved and is not dependent on how well we've done.

Training to be undertaken: If a team is going to win the World Cup, they have to train hard beforehand. Our training, as Christians, starts the moment we accept the gift of God's life. On a daily basis, we train ourselves to say no to the wrong things in our lives. As we build up our *godly muscles* we are better able to choose to do what is right in God's eyes. To enable us to do all this we need to engage in the spiritual disciplines of prayer, studying the Bible and being part of a church and small group. How is your training going?

The Chronicle always includes an entry about our monthly meetings and <u>we are always ready to welcome new members to the club</u>. Apart from the monthly talks, there are several other activities including an annual coach trip, a craft group and the <u>walking group</u>. We walk a few miles in the countryside or sometimes visit a village, a town or Oxford, depending on the season, but always exploring something which has interested a member of the group and who wants to share their experience with others. The walk may include a look around an interesting church, a glorious view or simply a pleasant stroll leading to a good pub for lunch - an <u>important feature of the walks</u>! While most of the regular walkers are club members and by definition female, husbands sometimes accompany their wives and guests (of either sex!) would be very welcome to join us in the future.

On a glorious May morning, fourteen of us met at Oday Hill to visit Stonehill Community Garden, which is open to the public on Wednesdays and is to be found down Stonehill Lane at the corner where the road bends sharply to the right. It was established at the end of 2015 due to the generosity of the owner of the land who wanted to offer something to benefit the local community. We were met by the gardener Richard Seamark, who toured the garden with us talking enthusiastically about its development. He identified <u>three main aims</u> for the garden: to encourage everyone, especially children, to come and see how fruit and vegetables are grown, to provide an opportunity for all ages and abilities to enjoy the garden and each other's company, and finally to be a sustainable source of organically grown local produce.

Fruit and vegetables in season are available as well as honey from the hives in the garden. The garden was busy during our visit with volunteers of all ages from 3 to much, much older, working on staking, constructing a polytunnel, weeding, planting out seedlings and feeding the chickens.

Rachel Hammond, the Project Co-ordinator, maintains a **Stonehill Community Garden Facebook page** which has photos of the garden in action and gives news about forthcoming events, including Rachel's **courses on edible horticulture** which are delivered at Stonehill. If you have a peep, you may see a photo of our visit to the 'forest garden'. After enjoying a quick cup of coffee, produced by water boiled on the rocket stove, we walked across the fields into Abingdon for our pub lunch after another very enjoyable outing. 
Wildlife Notes

As seen in Nature's Home Magazine (free – quarterly – to RSPB Members):- Barratt Developments, RSPB & Manthorpe Building Products have come together to give **nature a home** in Aylesbury by designing and installing new **swift nest boxes** in a brick format – the first new swift box designed with input from nature experts.

Swift numbers have almost halved in twenty years, part of this decline is being linked to a reduction in potential nesting sites. New nesting boxes are needed to help numbers recover as they return to the UK to breed every summer. Providing more nesting sites for swifts has been one of the aims of the partnership with the RSPB, launched in 2014 to look at how **nature and wildlife could be incorporated** into new communities. The first new nest boxes have just been fitted at the Kingsbrook development (Aylesbury), where Barratt Homes will install up to 900 boxes in new houses.

The bricks are an **industry first**, fully drained, ventilated and are unobtrusive, by matching the colour of the bricks. They also help nurture chicks by giving them room to stand when they hatch. They are much cheaper than any other swift brick on the market, and **we actively want other developers to use the brick** so we can all help build swift populations.

Editor's Note:- I wonder if any of the Drayton developers are going to acquire and fit at least a few 'swift bricks'???!

HEDGEHOG HIGHWAYS??

Did you know that hedgehogs need to walk a mile or more in a night looking for food and a mate? Sadly, our gardens are too often little high-sided boxes. You can help by creating **safe corridors** from your garden to the one next door.

This is a great activity to do with your neighbours to connect your gardens. Think like a hedgehog or frog! Go into your garden and put yourself in the shoes (or feet or paws) of different creatures. If you were a hedgehog or a frog, how easy would it be to make your way around the garden, and in and out? Is the way blocked by fences and walls? Are there big open areas you'd never cross in case something saw you and ate you? Add gaps at the base of your wooden fences. <u>Check with your neighbour</u> that's it's ok to do so, and think about pets – you don't want them escaping! And don't create gaps which lead wildlife onto busy roads!

If you're cutting a hole in a wooden fence at ground level, draw the shape you want with a pencil. An arch is easiest to cut, make it no more than about 15cm wide x 12cm high for larger creatures like hedgehogs, maybe 8cm x 6cm high for frogs & toads.

Drill a hole inside your shape with a wood drill bit (the kind used for making circular holes). Then poke a jigsaw or saw blade through your hole to then cut out the hole to your line. Allow long grasses or other herbaceous plants to grow next to the gap.

Let some of your lawn grow longer. Voles, shrews, frogs, toads, beetles and hedgehogs like to move through long grasses rather than out in the open.

GARD REPORT

Public consultation on draft Reservoir Plan closes - what next?

The reservoir between Steventon & Hanney (across Hanney Road) is part of ALL versions of the draft plan put forward by Thames Water (TW), to be built in the 2030-45 time-frame.

GARD submitted our response to TW's plan, on the deadline date of 29th April. As we expected, when we read the full draft Water Resources Management Plan (dWRMP), we found that TW's assessment of the various possible water sources for solving the future water deficit in the London/ Essex/ Kent areas (the last two would involve selling water on to other water companies) was highly subjective and biased towards their favourite reservoir solution. GARD's response **comprehensively dismantles** the case for a reservoir, it will be on www.abingdonreservoir.org (our website) for everyone to see by the time you read this newsletter.

We know that several local political organisations/groups have also submitted **responses against the reservoir**. Readers may have seen that Oxfordshire County Council (OCC) came out against the plan in the local press. We also know the VoWHDC have called for a Public Inquiry, as they believe TW have not followed guidelines in drawing up the dWRMP. Other local organisations which we know have written opposing are: Steventon & East Hendred Parish Councils, Campaign to Protect Rural England (Oxfordshire area) and Wantage and Grove Campaign Group. If you know of any other organisations which have opposed, **please let us know**, as we are keen to coordinate with the next step.

<u>We would also like to thank</u> the many people who came to our 'drop-in' sessions at Steventon & East Hanney, and who submitted their own objections. Thanks also to local residents who came along to TW's own 'drop-in' session at Steventon Village Hall, and gave their representatives a hard time. We have yet to hear any responses from TW to questions about the flooding risk to the area. <u>If anyone receives a personal reply from TW</u>, I'd be grateful if you could forward it on to me at:- gard.chair@gmail.com.

So, what next? **This 'consultation' has been a shambles**, as TW abandoned their population projections half-way through, and now they predict about 1.5 million less people in the London area by 2100; TW were forced to concede to meeting Ofwat's minimum Leakage target of a 15% reduction by 2025, half-way through the consultation. The combined effect of these two climb-downs would be enough to remove the need for almost all the water that the reservoir would supply!!

TW's costings for comparative schemes were completely secretive and lacked transparency, and they made key errors on the amount of water available from various sources (always in favour of the reservoir!). Plus, their Environmental Assessments are highly subjective, especially trying to equate benefits which might arise if a third party funded them (eg. sailing facilities), to balance out serious impacts which certainly would happen, e.g. a nine-year build duration, six-square mile area, construction site dislocation and local environment damage, permanent visual impact, and a serious flooding risk.

TW's figures showing that the reservoir would be resilient to long droughts, and that it would not run dry, are flawed – they are still trying to answer questions on this raised before the consultation. TW will now be submitting a revised plan to the government. GARD believes that this revised plan will have so many material changes, that a second public consultation is needed. We will be calling for a second consultation, and our MP, Ed Vaizey has agreed to support our call. We hope that local organisations and residents will support this call, we cannot let the plan slip through without further scrutiny. **If you wish to help us in this, please contact me**.

County Council Report - "Deal or No Deal?"

There has been much talk of "**The Growth Deal**" – Govt's Deal with Oxfordshire County Council in which Oxfordshire will get $\pounds 215m$ towards infrastructure and affordable housing, in exchange for undertaking to build 100,000 homes by 2031. More than a quarter have already been built, and 5 out of 6 District Councils have already signed up to build the rest in their Local Plans. So this is just extra money we didn't know we were getting, isn't it? At last we can get some infrastructure before the housing goes up. True, it is predicted we need around $\pounds 1.5b$ of infrastructure by 2031 but there are several other pots of money that could well raise another $\pounds 0.6b$, and Government says that the $\pounds 215m$ is only a downpayment. So it's a pretty good deal, isn't it?

Well, not everyone thinks so. The problem is that under the new NPPF (National Planning Policy Framework) Oxfordshire's target should be around **65,000 new homes** by $2031 - \underline{not}$ 100K. The District Councils' Local Plans were formed on the old NPPF figures. Although many tried to challenge them at the time on the grounds that extra housing numbers for economic growth were wildly exaggerated, we were not allowed to do so. So the government offer of £215m in return for building 35,000 more homes than their own figures say we need to, may not be quite the offer it first seemed. Have our Council Leaders sold us short? Given the dependence of Government on Growth in Oxfordshire, should we not have asked for far more?

It seems a number of things could derail the Growth Deal →>

What if there is a change of Govt? 2031 is a long way away.

As a result of **council pressure**, a new <u>combined Scrutiny</u> <u>Committee</u> with representatives from all Councils is being set up to scrutinize the Growth Deal and its progress. This is a most welcome development as too much has been discussed and decided behind closed doors. At last we should find out how the Deal was agreed, why it was signed and most importantly what the 'get out' clauses say should happen if either side defaults.

Cold callers Police recently received a report of a cold caller, who approached elderly residents in the Faringdon area, offering to buy jewellery from them. The man was convincing with official looking brochures and was described as 'charming but pushy'. The residents sold him a couple of pieces of jewellery, but their family were concerned about the man's intent.

<u>Have you had a similar experience</u>? Please report any similar incidents to the police by calling **101** with as much info as you can, any business flyers, descriptions, vehicle details etc.

<u>Please be aware of anyone cold calling</u> and follow the advice below if someone knocks at the door. Please talk to any elderly/vulnerable neighbours or family to also give them the following advice:-

Look through the door-viewer if you have one, or the window, to see who is outside.

IF you decide to open the door use the door-chain.

<u>Never leave callers unattended</u> at the front door without securely closing or locking it.

Check the caller's identity badge or card and, if you are unsure, ask them to wait and close the door.

Look up their organisation's phone number and call to confirm the caller's identity. **DO NOT** use any phone numbers the caller may give you.

Do not feel pressurised into buying items or services at the door. Always get three quotes for any work to be carried out.

Do not let callers into your house, and certainly do not allow any access to private rooms, such as bedrooms.

Do not divulge information about where valuables may be kept!

Always remember that official visitors will be willing to wait while you check their identity, or to make an appointment to return at another time, when you could ask a family member or friend to be with you.

Is your dog microchipped?

Having your dog microchipped can make a big difference when looking for, and trying to identify, a missing dog. In April 2016 it became <u>a legal requirement</u> for all dogs to be microchipped by 8 weeks of age. Each microchip has a unique number that must be registered on a Govt-approved database, along with information about your dog and you, as its owner. <u>You can be fined</u> if your dog is not registered on one of these databases.




It's important that the information is kept up-to-date so that if your dog does go missing you can be contacted at the correct address or telephone number. It's also important to report it to the police ASAP, including making them aware of the microchip number, so that it can be recorded on the police database. This will make it easier for them to identify any dogs that are found, and to check whether

they've been reported as missing or stolen. In 2016 the Dogs Trust recorded that, as a result of having a microchip with up-todate details, **9,000 stray dogs were reunited** with their owners

If your dog is lost or stolen it's recommended that you record it using online websites dedicated to finding them. These sites often work with police and other orgs, eg local Neighbourhood Watch groups and veterinary practices, to try to find the animals.

Recipe Time!

Raspberry Meringue Roulade

This is an unusual idea, and it makes a generous roulade, an excellent size for a party. It also freezes extremely well. Simply wrap in foil to freeze, then allow about 8 hours to thaw before serving. This recipe serves 8-10 people (& is <u>pictured here</u> >>).

Ingredients 5 Large egg whites,

275g (10oz) caster sugar & 50g (2oz) flaked almonds

For the filling

300ml (¹/₂ pint) whipping or double cream

350g (12oz) fresh raspberries

Your Method

Pre-heat the oven to 220° C (Fan 200° C), or Gas 7. Line a 33 x 23cm (13in x 9in) swiss roll tin with baking parchment.

Whisk the egg whites until very stiff. Gradually add the sugar, a teaspoonful at a time, whisking well between each addition. Whisk until very stiff and all of the sugar has been added.

Spread the meringue mixture into the prepared tin and sprinkle with the almonds. Place the tin fairly near the top of the pre-heated oven and bake for about 8 minutes until pale golden. Then reduce the oven temperature to 160° C (Fan140°C), or Gas 3, and bake for a further 15 minutes until firm to the touch.

Remove the meringue from the oven and turn it, almond side down, onto a sheet of baking parchment. Remove the parchment from the base of the cooked meringue and allow to cool for about 10 minutes.

While the meringue is cooling, whisk the cream until it stands in stiff peaks, and gently mix in the raspberries. Spread the cream and raspberries evenly over the meringue. Start to roll from the long end fairly tightly until rolled up like a roulade. Wrap in baking parchment and chill before serving.

As an alternative to the raspberries you could use lemon curd, jam or strawberries.

Tip

Leftover egg yolks can be stored in the fridge in a small container. Pour a tablespoon of cold water over the top, and then cover with clingfilm. Use within a week. *(Carol Arnold)*
