- 2. If you cannot send your contribution by email, send us a **good quality paper version**, using fairly large, **simple** black typescript, without underlining on white paper, A4 or smaller.
- 3. Finally, we do accept hand-written items. However, in this case please write the names of people and places in capital letters. This does save a lot of mistakes.

St Mary Magdalene - the woman with a past

Later this month Christians all over the world will commemorate probably the most unlikely saint in the Bible, Mary Magdalene. There was something in her background that has always fascinated people. All we are told about her 'past' is that Jesus had cast 'seven devils' out of her, but on that slender if intriguing evidence she has become the patron saint of 'fallen women'. Some see her as the woman 'who was a sinner' who washed Christ's feet with her tears at a respectable dinner party. Of that person Jesus remarked that 'she had been forgiven much' and consequently 'loved much'. Whether she was that woman or not, the description perfectly fits her. No one who has heard or read it could surely fail to be moved by her tearful encounter with the risen Jesus in the garden on Easter morning, the man she had taken to be the gardener revealing Himself in one word, Mary, as her beloved Teacher.

The problem with a good story – and hers is as good as it gets – is that people can't leave it alone. Fake news is not new! Down the centuries she has been John the Apostle's fiancée until he left her to follow Christ. She has gone with Jesus' mother and the same John to live in Ephesus and died there. In art and literature she has become an alluring, sexual figure, disapproved of by the mother of Jesus. There is no historical evidence whatsoever for any of this. In fact, the Gospels suggest the two Marys were close in their shared devotion to Jesus.

Her popularity is shown in the fact that 187 ancient churches in Britain are dedicated to her, and a college at both Oxford and Cambridge. Whatever the details of her story, we cherish it because it shows that having a 'past' is no reason not to have a future. It was when Mary went to anoint the body of Jesus at the tomb that the risen Jesus appeared to her. He told Mary to go to His disciples and tell them what she had seen. She was obedient and became the first human witness to the resurrection and the 'apostle to the apostles'. In those days, the witness of a woman was worthless. Despite ridicule, Mary had the courage to speak about Jesus in a place of great disbelief. We have to ask ourselves do we have the same courage as Mary? How prepared are we to stand our ground to share Jesus with others in the face of those who mock and scoff at us? As Mary discovered, Jesus can give everyone a new start; a new purpose and direction in life. Like Mary we can thank Him for blessing us, loving us and forgiving us and moving into practical forms of service. Only Jesus can transform our lives so that we can glorify God in all that we do.

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MOVING WITH THE TIMES

Derek Pooley

The first edition of the Drayton 'Chronicle' was dated January 1978. It succeeded the Drayton 'Hall News', which had been published 44 times during the 1970s, to keep villagers informed of progress with fund-raising for the Village Hall. This current Chronicle (July 2018) is around the 225th, and you can see how things have moved on by looking at the issues pictured for three Januaries: 1978, 1998 and 2018, separated by intervals of 20 years.



Looking at what members of the team are doing also illustrates change: Daria Stimpson is typing paper copy for cutting and pasting in 1978 but by the early 2000s Geoff Long (then an editor and the Chronicle team leader) with Tony Holmes and Derek Pooley are using a computer to assemble the Chronicle for printing.

Sadly, Geoff Long died in 2006 but Dave Lee was recruited to replace him as an editor. It has been my privilege to be a part of the team since early 1998; my first solo effort was April 1998 and my swan song May 2018. Maurice Puddick is taking over from me, dealing first with the August 2018 issue; I wish him well and hope that he finds the job as rewarding as I have done. Dave has asked me to sign off by writing this piece about how editing the Chronicle has changed over the 20 years that I have been part of the team.

The most obvious change is more colour. By the end of 1997 we were using a little colour for the front page of each December (Christmas) issue, but it was difficult for the editors

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And consequently extremely limited in scope. Today, much-improved printing technology makes full colour very easy, as the comparison shows:

Another change which is obvious in the printed product is much more use of pictures, thanks to digital photography. The first



Chronicle (Jan 1978) contained photographs at all, though it did include this one of first editor Harry Bisby's marvellous sketches. Even by January 1998 there were still no photographs, but in the Jan/Feb 2018 issue there were nearly 30 photographs, all in full colour.

Yet another change is sheer size, i.e. number of pages. Chronicle number 1 did contain 12 pages but for many of the

next 20 years, including January 1998, there were frequently only 10 pages and occasionally only 8. In contrast, December 2017 and 3 of the 5 Chronicles published so far in 2018 contained 20 pages, which is now no longer exceptional, though 16 pages is still common.

And just as much has changed behind the scenes, not obvious by looking at the printed products. When I joined the editor team most of our input material came as typing on paper; quite a bit was still hand written and some from technophile contributors was left in Lawrence Vickery's famous box on floppy discs — do you remember them? Now almost everything is sent to us by email to editor@draytonchronicle.net, using the web-site set up for us by our wonderful advertising manager, Stephen Fearnley. An occasional advertiser may still leave a paper copy in Vickery's box, of how they want their ads to look (and leave the cheques some still use to pay for their ads) and we editors still occasionally get handwritten letters. Floppy discs were replaced for a short while by CDs, but no-one uses either format now and we would probably have difficulty dealing with either.

Our dealings with the printer have also changed out of all recognition. When I began to edit, we used to send copies of each page to the printer, printed with a good-quality laser printer that we shared. The pages reached the printers thanks mostly to our volunteer couriers: Derek, Rosemary and Andrew Chapman, who did it as they went to work in Oxford on Mondays. When the printers moved premises and the Chapmans retired we had to find other ways to do things, but fortunately technology came to our aid once again and, with just a few minor glitches in the transition, we quickly switched to sending copy to the printer by email in what is called pdf (portable document format). We still do that.

Moreover, we no longer rely on just the printed paper

publication. The village website, refurbished few years ago by Jules Meredith and now maintained by him, contains copies of the latest Chronicle well as archive copies of every issue back to Jan/Feb 2004 some earlier than that. have as objective to extend the electronic archive back further but doing that is tedious and time-



consuming, though Chronicle number 1, from January 1978, is already in the archive.



This is a very simple salad that proves very popular at BBQ's and summer parties.



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
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WESTMINSTER LETTER Ed Vaizey

Lots of good news for our local area. Last month Business Secretary Greg Clark launched a major new scientific centre in Harwell Campus and announced its first major projects. The Rosalind Franklin Institute, which is backed by £100million in government investment, will focus on a number of projects, including the development of the world's best ultra-fast video camera for imaging, which will be invaluable for both detecting and treating disease.



The Big Lottery Fund has announced £17,280 of funding for projects in the constituency such as the The Pelvic Partnership in Harwell, which focuses on treatment for Pelvic Girdle Pain. The fund distributes money raised by the National Lottery to good causes which seek to improve lives and communities. If you have a cause that you believe deserves funding you can apply at biglotteryfund.org.uk.

Huge congratulations to Wallingford School, who have been awarded the prestigious ISM Trust's Silver Certificate in Music for 2018, and King Alfred's, who have been awarded the Bronze Certificate. This means that more than 15% and 10% respectively of all the schools' GCSE students who entered into GCSE music achieved an A* to C grade. This is a huge achievement and demonstrates a real commitment to music in both schools. The Teaching Apprenticeship Programme (TAP) launched across the country last month to help schools recruit, train and retain the best graduates into teaching roles. TAP offers a one year programme which guides apprentices towards Qualified Teacher Status and schools can also use the Apprenticeship Levy funding to train and retain the best graduates into teaching roles. If you are interested in how the Apprenticeship Levy works you can find all the information you need at the Teaching Apprenticeship website.

Over the last month I was pleased to meet with representatives of 'Hands off Hagbourne Fields' to discuss Taylor Wimpey's plans for developing the land between West Hagbourne and Didcot, meet with local councillors to discuss how to tackle litter on the A34 and visit Enesi Pharma in Milton Park to see their revolutionary work on vaccines.

Dear Editor,

Has Drayton 2020 achieved a good outcome?

Having spent some time looking around the new developments in the village I am concerned at how these have manifested, in particular the benefits for Drayton village residents.

My main areas of concern are safety, pricing and the completion of village facilities negotiated as part of the developments.

Exiting left by car from Hilliat Fields towards Abingdon during busy times, a driver will inevitably focus their attention looking right. Positioning a crossing so close to the junction does not appear to have been risk assessed and the likelihood of a driver failing to notice someone crossing until very late is high in my view. I cannot see how this is a safest option.

The pricing of houses is prohibitive to young working people, more so than many developments in the region; Edward Park has 2-bedroom houses starting a close to £400,000. There are choices for the well-off plus the houses available for Local Authority including part buy part rent however; young people in their early employment are completely priced out of the market. I wonder if there was any negotiation for fair pricing for young people when these developments were initially proposed?

Finally, will facilities such as the sports pavilion and grounds ever be finished; it looks a long way off to me. There is a long history of developers not making good on similar promises and I wonder if this is another one for the list?

I understood Drayton 2020 as the village having a say in its own future, I believe it tried. However; in the reality of the commercial world and the financial resources of developers, I personally do not feel the outcome is much more than disruption over many months and more expensive houses that local people cannot afford – especially the young.

Committee System v Cabinet System?

Most residents are not particularly interested in how their councils organise themselves. But it is a matter of great concern for the councilors who serve on those councils.

Backbencher local politicians often get a raw deal. Whether their party is in power or in opposition, decisions are made by members of the Cabinet (rarely more than 10 members of the ruling party). All other politicians often feel that they are little more than voting fodder – expected to support their own side through thick and thin. Under the whipping system, there are occasions when they are under pressure from their own side to toe the party line – even though they may not agree with it.

This is the Cabinet System and is followed by most Councils. Its advantage is that decisions are made efficiently and quickly. Its disadvantages are that only a very small proportion of councilors (the Cabinet) take part in the decision-making, and other councilors can become disillusioned with their role and enthusing potential new recruits gets harder.

In recent years, a number of councils have switched to an alternative system – the Committee System. Here, each council department has a Committee making the decisions - made up of councillors of all parties. The numbers on each Committee are set to ensure that they are in line with the proportion of councilors of each party. This ensures that the ruling party always has the ability to hold the majority on each committee. The advantage of the system is that all Councillors sit on at least one Committee, all are involved in discussions, vote on decisions and all are obliged to work hard. The disadvantage is that decision making is slower.

Oxfordshire County Council is currently studying a number of Councils which have switched to the Committee System. The evidence so far is that it particularly suits a Council where there is an even balance of power between parties. Oxfordshire County Council is just one of those. A decision to change, if it happens, will be made next year.

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PARISH COUNCIL REPORT

Richard Williams

Report of the Parish Council meetings held on Mon 14th May and Mon 4th June 2018

May

The May meeting is the Parish Council's AGM, where officers are elected for the coming year. Richard Wade agreed to take on the Chairmanship of the Drayton 2020 Projects Board, but otherwise, the existing office holders remained in place. The Projects Board continues the functions of the former Implementation Committee, but with some changes to terms of reference and membership. As the name indicates, it will supervise the progress of the various projects identified in the Neighbourhood Plan, such as the new playing fields and sports pavilion at the Walnut Meadow site; the new village green at Manor Farm; and future redevelopment of the village hall.

Huw Thomas from Thames Water addressed the meeting on the subject of sewerage capacity in the village, in the light of concerns that it may be insufficient to cope with all the new housing development in Drayton. With the aid of maps showing the current extent of sewerage provision, he explained that Thames Water's on-site investigations had shown there was adequate capacity in the existing system and that major upgrading works would not be required.

Following further representations and a large number of responses to the recent E-mail consultation, a Working Party was set up to meet with allotment holders later in the summer and discuss with them the proposed rent increase and any other related issues.

Two responses were received to the consultation regarding the proposal to approach the Public Works Loan Board for a loan towards the construction costs of the sports pavilion. Both questioned aspects of the project, but in practice, the application will need to be deferred until such time as the Parish Council actually owns the land on which the pavilion will be built. This depends on how long it takes for Miller Homes to hand over the site, bearing in mind that the PC will not accept the land unless it is in satisfactory condition. We understand that the system for applying for loans may also change in the near future, and this could be an extra complication.

Richard Wade reported on the public meeting held on 11th May at St. Peter's Church Hall to discuss traffic and parking issues in Henleys Lane/Church Lane. The meeting was very well attended by local residents, and generated a good deal of discussion on how to alleviate the problems. A wide variety of views were expressed, some of them very far from agreeing with others (!), but there was sufficient consensus in some areas as to suggest possible ways forward. The Working Party meets again on 13th June to consider the points raised, but we should again stress that any proposals put forward by the PC will ultimately depend on the support of OCC and the Vale, and the availability of funds.

Interviews for the post of Parish Clerk took place on 4th May at the Village Hall. There were two candidates, both very well qualified. The interview panel reported its recommendation that the post of Parish Clerk should be offered to one candidate, while the other should be offered the post of Projects Manager for the Drayton 2020 projects described above. The latter post to be on a 3 year contract, potentially renewable after that period. The PC agreed to both recommendations.

June

Further to the previous paragraph, the post of Parish Clerk was offered to Lorraine Watling, who accepted the job. The other candidate declined the post of Projects Manager. It was later agreed to revisit the job specification for the latter post and defer advertising until later in the year, or at least until such time as the handover of the sports pitches and land for the pavilion is completed.

Lorraine is very experienced in the role of Parish Clerk. She was the Town Clerk for Woodstock Town Council for several years, and is now, in addition to her appointment with Drayton, also the Parish Clerk for Deddington, in which role she will continue. These days it is not uncommon for Parish Clerks to serve more than one parish.

Lorraine was present at the June meeting, but as an observer only. The July meeting will be her first as the new Parish Clerk. This was therefore David Perrow's last meeting as the outgoing Clerk. A tribute to David has already been printed in the last edition of the Chronicle, but on this evening, the PC took the opportunity to thank David for his eight years of truly outstanding service to the village. Later this month we hope to thank him in a more tangible way with a richly deserved farewell party!

As David will be using the remainder of this month to hand over to Lorraine, in the transitional period, it is suggested that to contact any members of the Parish Council, you should continue to direct all enquiries to him, in the first instance. Depending on the nature of the enquiry, David may re-direct you to Lorraine. He can still be contacted via E-mail at draytonclerk@gmail.com or by telephone on 07909 176061, and he will ensure that any messages are passed on, either to Lorraine or to the relevant councillor. Any Drayton resident may also ask to be added to the Clerk's E-mailing list, so that they receive prior notice of meetings and any associated documents.



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If you suspect a vehicle has been abandoned, this is the correct procedure to follow:

Make a note of the vehicle's registration number then visit the page on the GOV.UK website which checks with the DVLA to ascertain if a vehicle is taxed and has an MOT. Link to page here: https://www.gov.uk/get-vehicle-information-from-dvla.

If this process confirms that vehicle is untaxed you can report it to the DVLA by following the link provided.

The police will take action if a vehicle without insurance is seen, or reported, driving on a public road.

You can do this with just a handful of households or an entire street or section of street. It's a great way to get to know your neighbours better and it also helps to make a new neighbourhood feel like a real community! Information about parking restrictions

- You must not wait or park on yellow lines during the times of operation as shown on nearby time plates.
- Double yellow lines prohibit waiting at any time including parking and stopping to set down or pick up passengers.
- You should not stop near or park across school entrances, dropped kerbs, in front of an entrance to a property or block Emergency Services access.
- Police advice is that vehicles should not park partially on the
 pavement. This encourages traffic to attempt to squeeze past,
 increasingly the likelihood of vehicle damage. Parking
 vehicles fully on the road encourages traffic travelling in one
 direction to stop and give way to approaching traffic, thus
 providing a natural chicane. It also allows pushchairs,
 wheelchairs etc full use of the pavement.

Going on holiday? Don't forget...

- To cancel milk, newspaper and other regular deliveries.
- To tell a trusted neighbour that you're going away.
- To ensure tools, bikes, ladders etc are safely placed in locked sheds and garages.
- To leave lamps on timer plugs, making it look as if the house is occupied.
- To lock all windows and internal doors from conservatories, and to set a burglar alarm if you have one, before you leave.
- That leaving curtains closed all day can be an indication that there's nobody at home.
- Not to put photos and posts on social media which show you're away.
- To consider asking your neighbours to park a car on your drive during your absence.

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DRAYTON'S MURAL PAINTERS

Among Drayton's hidden talents is artist Kevin Arrowood. Kevin has just completed a 60ft mural along the walls of the White Horse Tennis Centre in celebration of the sport. It features many local landmarks including Abingdon County Hall Museum, Uffington White Horse and the King Alfred Statue in Wantage. Painting on this scale was a challenging commission.

After the design had been agreed it had to be illustrated, scaled up and drawn onto the wall. Only then could Kevin paint it; finally it had to be sealed with a clear acrylic for protection.

This is by no means Kevin's first work of this kind. Last year he completed murals for the remodelled library at the Manor Preparatory School in Abingdon.

Kevin has been living in High Street for 11 years with his wife Antonia and his two daughters. Sadly we will soon be losing his talent because the family is planning to move to Bristol.

Murals seem to be something our artists are good at. In 1984 Margaret Jones of Sutton Wick was commissioned to depict Abingdon's history along the walls of the subway under Stratton Way - a length of 490 ft. In 2001 she was asked to update 'The Abingdon Murals' as they became known, to celebrate the 450th anniversary of the town's Royal Charter. Margaret also did the mural along the walls of the alley between Stert Street and the Market Place.

WORKING FROM HOME - IS IT FOR YOU?

The number of people working from home is rising dramatically - by 2020, 50% of workers are predicted to be working at least partly from home.

Who is doing it?

remote employees

working anything from a day or two a month to full-time at home

- freelance workers.
- small business owners.

Many types of occupations are suited to it, with some obvious exceptions such as pilots, zookeepers, construction site workers etc. Many jobs have elements of work that can be done at home, and a lot of employers are considering it, partly because they may be able to save on the cost of office space. More and more global businesses do without fixed office space completely, by using global networks of remote staff who may meet physically as a group just a few times a year.

Why is it happening?

Technology has created the opportunity – internet broadband speed, instant messaging and the ability to share large files of data. And there can be advantages for workers....



- top of the list is probably the avoidance of commuting. Seen as a waste of time and money and cause of stress by many people, this is a big incentive. You only need to look at the faces of drivers and passengers in the rush hour to see that commuting is not a favourite part of the day for many people. And the environment benefits too, through less pollution.
- Simpler life you can wear anything, including pyjamas. Possibly a smart top half if you are video conferencing, but otherwise you can wear exactly what you like all day long. Reduced expense on office



wear and minimal clothing stress in the morning.

- Flexible working hours, particularly if you are a freelancer or small business owner. Are you a morning person? Get started early. Are you a night owl? Lie in and work when you are most productive. Need to visit the doctor, dentist, optician, do the school run? It might all be possible in the working day because it's all local.
- Create your own bespoke working environment. Have the temperature/lighting/desk exactly to your liking.
- Improve health by eliminating stress from commuting, avoiding germs and bacteria from enclosed office environments, doing your stretches and exercises whenever you like.

What's not to like?

Nothing is perfect. Some disadvantages have been observed:

- Working from home does not suit everybody. A certain amount of self-motivation and self-discipline is needed to make it work. You need to be good with time-management and able to work without close supervision.
- It can be hard to separate home from business life.







- There are potential distractions: children, pets, doorbells ringing, washing machines spinning to name a few.
- There is no IT technician to come along and fix the computer.
- You may miss face-to-face human interaction, watercooler chats, informal information gathering. You will be Home Alone much of the time.

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POLICE NEWS

Tackling dwelling burglary remains a priority for Thames Valley Police. We fully recognise the traumatic effect that these offences can have on victims and the impact on the wider community.

Operation Monitor commenced on the 1st of June and is South and Vales response to this type of crime, for the next four months there will be a dedicated team based at Abingdon Police station with a focus on burglary.

The team consists of two Detective Sergeants, five Detective Constables and five Police Constables.

They are divided into teams that cover each of the geographic areas on the police area. They aim to attend all reports of domestic burglary and work alongside our local Neighbourhood Teams and CSI unit to ensure a high quality investigation into each offence. All reports of burglary to a dwelling will be investigated by detectives from this team.

Operation Monitor will also target known offenders to disrupt their activity and work with our partners to seek to divert them from this type of offending.

We will be posting regular updates and crime prevention advice from the team under the hashtag #opmonitor.

"Lovely weather.....for Burglars!"

We've all been enjoying the sunshine recently, but with the nice weather comes opportunities for thieves.

Did you know that a large number of burglaries reported to us have no signs of a forced entry?

Many burglars target homes with open doors and windows during the summer months, they rely on people forgetting to lock doors or windows that have been left open during the day for ventilation.

Here's some straightforward advice to help you, help us to reduce burglary.

Before you go to bed at night, just take a couple of minutes to check around your home and make sure doors and windows, especially on the ground floor, are secure.

If you can afford them CCTV systems and alarms are great deterrents to thieves, but you can prevent crime by using less expensive means too.

Security lighting at the rear of your home or a courtesy light at the front door illuminates any activity and removes the cover of darkness for criminals.

If you have a side gate, fit a bolt and padlock to prevent easy access to your garden. Did you know that you can buy combination lock bolts to fit on the front face of the gate to allow access to authorised people?

Keep car keys out of sight and out of reach of your letter boxsome burglars are adept at using implements to reach through letter boxes and hook keys from hall tables and shelves.

Some thieves will knock on the door of an address to see if its occupied before trying to break in. If you see or experience something suspicious or that you're unsure of please call us, we'll always do our best to get to calls of suspicious activity quickly if we think a burglary may be taking place.

Don't purchase goods from sources that you aren't happy with, your bargain buy may be the proceeds of a heart breaking crime for a victim of burglary and the next victim may be you or someone close to you. We know that some thieves will use Facebook selling sites to dispose of stolen property, we will always seek to prosecute those we suspect of handling stolen goods. If it seems too good to be true- it is, be careful.

The Op Monitor team is working hard to reduce burglary and to target and convict the callous criminals who commit this type of crime. We need your help, remember that you can contact us with information regarding burglary in confidence via 101, or via Crime Stoppers on 0800555111.

Courier Fraud

The National Fraud Intelligence Bureau has identified an increasing number of reports submitted to Action Fraud from the public concerning courier fraud.

Fraudsters are contacting victims by telephone and purporting to be a police officer or bank official. To substantiate this claim, the caller might be able to confirm some easily obtainable basic details about the victim such as their full name and address. They may also offer a telephone number for the victim to call to check that they are genuine; this number is not genuine and simply redirects to the fraudster who pretends to be a different person. After some trust has been established, the fraudster will then, for example, suggest;

- Some money has been removed from a victim's bank account and staff at their local bank branch are responsible.
- Suspects have already been arrested but the "police" need money for evidence.
- A business such as a jewellers or currency exchange is operating fraudulently and they require assistance to help secure evidence.

Victims are then asked to cooperate in an investigation by attending their bank and withdrawing money, withdrawing foreign currency from an exchange or purchasing an expensive item to hand over to a courier for examination who will also be a fraudster. Again, to reassure the victim, a safe word might be communicated to the victim so the courier appears genuine.

At the time of handover, unsuspecting victims are promised the money they've handed over or spent will be reimbursed but in reality there is no further contact and the money is never seen again.

Protect Yourself

Your bank or the police will never:

- Phone and ask you for your PIN or full banking password.
- Ask you to withdraw money to hand over to them for safekeeping, or send someone to your home to collect cash, PIN, cards or cheque books if you are a victim of fraud.

Don't assume an email or phone call is authentic

Just because someone knows your basic details (such as your name and address or even your mother's maiden name), it doesn't mean they are genuine. Be mindful of who you trust – criminals may try and trick you into their confidence by telling you that you've been a victim of fraud

Stay in control

If something feels wrong then it is usually right to question it. Have the confidence to refuse unusual requests for personal or financial information.

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
