Drayton WIVES

Our latest monthly meeting welcomed a talk by Hugh Granger on "Can plants talk"; Hugh has become very interested in the evolution of plants and why some plants think one way and others are completely different. It is all basically down to survival and keeping one step ahead.

Plants rely on the wind to carry pollen about but they also use colours that humans can't see to attract birds and insects to help them pollinate. Some flowers only open at night and close shut during the day to attract night time helpers such as bats & moths.

In Central Africa there are plants known as Corpse flowers that smell of rotted meat, but apparently it does attract insets which help them pollinate. Not a good aroma for us!!!!

Coconut pods travel miles as they are so hard to crack and so have no enemies. **Beware if you have any Rhododendron plants** as nothing will live under the bush - it produces poisonous chemicals and drugs from its flowers. Honey made from Rhododendron flowers is poisonous to humans and that's why bees avoid the flowers - but this is also why the bushes are so prolific.

Swiss cheese plants, known as hurricane plants because of the holes in their leaves, produce poison, so never have them near pets, although they do seem to have gone out of fashion.

Even herbs produce animal-rejecting poisons so they can keep surviving. But some plants such as **Lupin and Marigold will protect other plants from insects** (such as black fly) which is why it's useful to grow these next to your runner beans.

So it became obvious that plants do think. so that they can survive. It has even been proved that plants have memories and enjoy music, so, be kind to your plants and they will love you back!!!!!!

DO Beware some other poisonous plants, for people, pets, or both. Many of gardeners amongst us will know but it doesn't hurt to mention such as lots of other people will be less of the pitfalls. Foxglove (purple fairly common, poisonous to touch.

The Poinsettia (pictured) is a Christmas favourite, but beware if you've a cat or dog that likes chewing things! They're in the plant family 'Euphorbia' and just about all of them will irritate your skin, so too the 'Alstroemeria' (popular as cut plants); they're in the Lily family, well known for the showy pollen to be a problem for pets, but the whole plant can be an irritant to some people. Tulips are in that family, and if you plant out some bulbs, careful if you've a dog that likes chewing things! Even good old Chrysants, very popular cut flowers, can cause an allergic reaction to some.

The RHS has a good list of potentially problem garden or house plants, see https://www.rhs.org.uk/advice/profile?pid=524 but they do point out that "all these plants are safe to grow provided they are treated with respect. Remember, they are ornamental plants, often very beautiful - they are not meant to be eaten by children or pets".

WESTMINSTER VIEW

Last month I attended a rally in Wantage protesting the fact that after two years, **Wantage Community Hospital** remains "temporarily" closed, with no indication of

when it will reopen. Originally, the hospital was closed because of concerns of legionella, this resulted in the closure of the remaining in-patient beds (Maternity & Physiotherapy were maintained, though the latter has since been discontinued).

We have been promised a number of consultations to discuss reopening the hospital but so far nothing has happened. After months of frustration, I have arranged to speak with the chief executive of Oxfordshire CCG to discuss plans for the provision of healthcare in the constituency. I hope that they will have an update for us soon. I've also written to the Secretary of State for Health and Social Care to raise the issue of Wantage hospital and make clear the level of feeling the community has for it.

Every year in September, **Heritage Open Days** sees places across the country throw open their doors for free to celebrate their heritage, community and history. It brings together over 2,100 organisations, 5,500 events and 46,000 volunteers, and is coordinated nationally by the National Trust, with support from players of the People's Postcode Lottery. For more clues about the types of building open near you, please see website details and a few suggestions on page 10.

The latest **funding round for grants for local charities** opens in three of the Postcode Trusts, funded by players of People's Postcode Lottery. More information can be found at the three websites for the local trusts, each one has a different funding focus and I recommend charities ensure that they apply to the Trust most relevant to them:- postcodetrust.org.uk focuses on projects which specialise on prevention of poverty, promotion of human rights & equal rights; postcodelocaltrust.org.uk focuses on projects on health & wellbeing through grass roots sports, arts and well-being programmes; postcodecommunitytrust.org.uk focuses on projects supporting outdoor spaces, local environment and wildlife.

WALNUT MEADOW Development

(- An Update on Progress)

The title of this piece may be a misnomer, since over the last few months especially, progress has been in short supply at Walnut Meadow. Without going into a detailed history, communication with the on-site management has always been difficult, and despite the fact that Drayton 2020 have been meeting regularly with Millers once a month for the last year and a half, it was obvious that works were falling further and further behind schedule, and a number of planning conditions were just not being met.

Following a meeting this March with residents at the Village Hall, it was decided that both the residents and the Parish Council would, independently, write to Millers HQ, demanding that the company produce a schedule of works, with specific deadlines attached to each item. Millers duly requested their subcontractors to come up with the agreed schedule, this did not happen, and those contractors have now been sacked.

Bringing things up to date, representatives from the Parish Council, OCC, and the Vale's Planning Enforcement Dept. met on site with Millers executives on August 2nd. We were introduced to **their new sub-contractors**, who have promised to carry out a full survey of the site as soon as possible. The new contractors appeared very professional and they have a positive plan in mind, but appearances notwithstanding, in the end it is only results which count.

There are some signs of progress. The children's playground ought to be ready in a month or so, provided the newly-laid turf is regularly watered. Unfortunately it was not possible to open the playground in time for the school summer holidays, but of course the necessary work should have been done by Millers months ago. As residents know, the play equipment was in place well before last Christmas. We made clear to Millers that the PC would not take on ownership of the playground until the turf has had time to properly root and ROSPA have approved the play area on safety grounds (NB Ed's note, a similar playground in Sutton Courtenay was built, then kept fenced off, for many months, far longer than the hiatus here).

Elsewhere, some pavements and roads have been properly surfaced, though others have not. We are promised that the new pathway to Corneville Rd will be completed in time for the start of the new school term, but work needs to start soon if this target is to be achieved. The drainage arrangements across the site and clearance of the playing fields area remain serious issues, and OCC have not yet commenced work on the junction of the entrance to the development with the Abingdon Road. In the case of the latter, we were warned by OCC that the necessary legal procedures would take a long time to process.

The involvement of the Vale's Planning Enforcement department, and the appointment of new sub-contractors for the on-site ground works give cause for cautious optimism. In the meantime, Drayton 2020 will continue to push for Millers to complete all outstanding works, and we will keep a close eye on every aspect of what happens in the ensuing weeks. Everybody involved with the site in Drayton 2020 or on the Parish Council wishes we were not where we are at the present moment. The fact is that moral pressure is the only kind we are able to apply, as we have no legal or financial sanctions we can impose. Although local authority planning departments do have these powers, there is no doubt that the planning system overall favours developers and makes it hard, if they do not act responsibly, to hold them to account.



GARD REPORT

Thames Water concede the case for a second public consultation on their plans: On 10th August, Thames Water issued a press statement conceding the case for a second public consultation on their revised draft Water Resources Management Plan 2019-2024 (known as rdWRMP19). They also announced a month's delay until 'early September' in producing the revised plan, which will be published alongside their response to all the public comments (individual and organisational) which they received in the first consultation which closed at the end of April.

This action by Thames Water is as a direct result of the pressure from Oxfordshire organisations, led by GARD, in demanding the right for the public to look again at Thames Water's plans, as it was obvious from the shambles of the first plan that they would be forced into making deep changes, and not just minor revisions. GARD, Oxfordshire County Council, Campaign to Protect Rural England, Wantage and Grove Campaign Group, and Steventon Parish Council all wrote to the Secretary of State for Environment, Food and Rural Affairs (Michael Gove) putting a strong case that Thames Water must be forced to consult again. This call was heeded and it is a good example that *public pressure works* when we all work together. GARD would like to thank all the organisations for their support, and also particularly to Councillors Mike Fox-Davies (Steventon and Hendred) and Richard Webber (Drayton and Sutton Courtenay) for leading the County Council's campaign, and our MP, Ed Vaizey for his support in intervening with Michael Gove.


The second consultation will last for 8 weeks. We now await the details of the new plan. GARD will be tackling the new plan, and looking particularly to see if it remains shrouded in secrecy as to how projects are compared on cost, and how decisions are made. If we find that the transparency of the plan has not improved (and hopefully it will have since both Ofwat and the Environment Agency asked for more transparency), then we are almost certainly going to join the Vale council in demanding a Public Inquiry. It is regrettable that the actions of Thames Water force these conclusions — it remains to be seen if they have had a culture change, or whether they must be dragged into a legal process in order that Oxfordshire's citizens can be protected.

We of course do not yet know the contents of the revised plan, but we do know, from statements by Thames Water on TV (ITV Meridian news – 10th August) and in the press (Oxford Mail - 10th August) that the mega-reservoir is still the centre-piece of their plans, and may even be advanced in time to be begun in 2030. GARD will be fighting such proposals every inch of the way, and insisting on an honest, level-playing-field comparison of options.

Thames Water finally forced to take action on leakage

Another snippet we know of the revised plan is that Thames Water have finally committed to a proper plan to reduce their appalling leakage. They are committing to reduce leakage by 50% by 2050. They have been forced into this commitment by the water regulator Ofwat, who finally lost patience with Thames Water's leakage programme, as leakage has actually got worse in 2016-2017 (going close to 700 Million litres per day for the first time). Ofwat's report concludes that the failure to reduce leakage has little to do with the difficulty of the task and is mainly due to Thames' poor management, and lack of Board-level commitment to the leakage programme. In order to avoid a massive fine for missing the leakage target, Thames have had to commit to the Ofwat target of 15% reduction by 2025, and a 50% reduction by 2050. If this 50% reduction is met, it amounts to a saving of 300 Million litres per day of water, equal to the amount which the proposed reservoir would supply. So, local residents would be right in concluding that the case for the reservoir would be even harder to justify.

At some point it will become very important to demonstrate the strength and depth of the local opposition to this plan, and, of course, we do need 'boots on the ground' to help push the message across. 

Privacy, Openness and Transparency

Last week, we met a friend, to whom we have not spoken for some time, over the garden wall.

We spent a happy twenty minutes catching up. Within the hour, we received a phone call from the same friend to tell us that she had just received a message from Google asking her to rate her visit to Orchard Barn (our home).

The first reaction was to laugh, the second was to wonder how Google knew of our conversation. The third was to realize how much Google (and others) can find out about us via mobile phones, emails and social media (*** see below). There was absolutely nothing in our conversation which would have interested anyone else, but it was private. It's a scary world.

Whilst I believe, passionately, that Privacy is an important principle that we should do everything possible to protect, Privacy is too often a defining principle in Government – both national and local. On a recent visit to Nottinghamshire County Council to find out how they run themselves, we were told that they are now passionate about openness and transparency. Everything they say, think and do is put in the public realm. No more secret papers. All salaries, plans for the future and failings of the Council are published alongside their successes. The only papers kept from public view are those that concern commercial confidentiality (while bids for contracts are coming in) otherwise everything is open to public scrutiny). They claimed that this approach had already had three major benefits.

One: There was a noticeable increase in trust of their Council by Nottinghamshire residents.

Two: There were now no time-consuming and costly Freedom of Information requests.

Three: Their relations with the local Press had improved immeasurably.


To be fair to Oxfordshire, it is probably more open and transparent than many local authorities. Its new Corporate Plan will contain not only a list of the Council's success, but also a list of its failures and what it intends to do about them. This is all commendable. Not so transparent are the conversations around shared services and management with Cherwell District Council, or the discussions around the Growth Deal and the Oxford to Cambridge Expressway.

Until Government treats those who elected it as wholly deserving and capable of being involved in discussions and considerations of policy, they can hardly be surprised if they are not trusted.

Parish Council Richard Williams

Report of the Parish Council meetings held in July and August

July 9th: Derek Stork from GARD gave councillors an update regarding Thames Water and the latest version of their long-term water management plan. It is clear that TW still favours a huge reservoir as the answer to their projections of the growth in demand for water — right up till the year 2100! However, the company's data on a whole range of issues has been challenged (see separate GARD report in this issue) and found wanting. Furthermore, their losses from leaks are easily the worst of any of the water companies. GARD is pressing them to revise their Plan, come up with more realistic figures, and work harder to plug those leaks. It is also calling for a second round of consultation.

An inspection of Henleys Lane/Church Lane was carried out by Richard Webber and an OCC Highways inspector, and it has been agreed to **resurface the High St end of Church Lane**. A barrier will also be re-installed at the end of Footpath FP14 (Gravel Lane to Henleys Lane) to protect pedestrians. Richard reported that the highways maintenance budget has been doubled for the coming year to try and reduce the backlog of repairs. Long-term investment in maintenance will also increase in recognition of the scale of the problem.

There was a lengthy discussion on the outstanding works at the **Walnut Meadow** housing development. **Please see the separate article** elsewhere in the Chronicle.

With a view to progressing the application for a loan from the Public Works Loan Board, it was resolved to engage the Oxford Playing Fields Association (OPFA) for 12 months, within a budget of £3000. The 12 month period will not start until the Walnut Meadow pitches are ready for hand-over. Based on past experience, no one is hazarding a firm date for this.

Safe Places Scheme in Vale of the White Horse

The Vale's Community Safety team is Working with Thames Valley Police, Oxfordshire County Council's Fire and Rescue Service, Oxfordshire Family Support Network and local communities to launch the nationally recognised 'Safe Places' scheme across the Vale and South Oxfordshire.

The Safe Places Scheme aims to help vulnerable people feel confident and safe whilst out and about. If someone is feeling lost, anxious, confused, bullied, abused or harassed they can go to a Safe Place. These offer support to elderly people, people with dementia, those who may have a physical or learning disability, people with mental health needs and people who feel unwell.

Safe Places are identified by a nationally recognised logo which will be visible on a sticker in the window of participating shops, cafes and community centres.

Cards can be carried by the individual with contact numbers on for family members, adult social care and the police. You can pick up a 'Safe Place' card from a Safe Place location, or by emailing communitysafety@southandvale.gov.uk.

If you have a Safe Places card, a member of staff can phone your nominated person, whether it be a carer or family member. Whether you have a Safe Places card or not, you can enter a participating location and ask for assistance. A trained member of staff will be able to help you.
