

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Road Closures due to Abingdon Marathon Sunday 21st October 2018

For reasons of safety, road closures and restrictions have been scheduled, in conjunction with the Oxfordshire County Council (the Highways Authority), as follows:

Vehicles will be prohibited:

- a) between approximately 08.30 and 09.30hrs from using the section of Dunmore Road eastwards from Wootton Road roundabout towards Tilsley Park (northern lane) and Twelve Acre Drive (northern lane) between Oxford Road and Audlett Drive/Radley Road roundabouts) including closure of the roundabout junction of the Oxford Road roundabout with Dunmore Road and Twelve Acre Drive, and the section of Radley Road eastwards from Audlett Drive to Thrupp Lane, Radley;
- b) between approximately 08.00 and 13.15hrs, northbound traffic only prohibited in the Milton to Drayton direction Milton Road roundabout junction with High Street & Sutton Road northwards to the B4016 Drayton Road;
- c) between approximately 08.00 and 13.15hrs, Drayton Road to Brook Street, Sutton Courtenay closed to the junction with Church Street & High Street; and
- d) between approximately 11.00hrs and 14.00hrs the section of Dunmore Road from the B4017 Wootton Road eastbound lane to Tilsley Park closed. Traffic from side roads onto Dunmore Road will be required to turn left only during the closures

Exemptions will be included for access, emergency services and event safety vehicles.

Alternative routes for traffic affected by the closures are;

Abingdon Area: For westbound traffic via Whites Lane, Radley, The Avenue and Kennington Road, Kennington, Hinksey Hill, Foxcombe Road & Fox Lane, Boars Hill, B4017 Wootton Road, to Abingdon Bath Street, Stratton Way, Vineyard, Radley Road and Audlett Drive. For eastbound traffic via Audlett Drive, Abingdon, Radley Road, Vineyard, Stert Street, High Street, Stratton Way, Bath Street, Wootton Road, B4017 Wootton, Fox Lane & Foxcombe Road, Boars Hill, Hinksey Hill, Kennington Road and The Avenue, and Whites Lane, Radley. For the closure of Milton Road, northbound via High St Drayton, High St Milton, Park Drive, A4130, B4017, Steventon Rd to High St Drayton.

For Drayton Road closure eastbound (diversion for Drayton Rd & Brook St) – Milton Rd, Sutton Rd, Milton Rd, High St Sutton Courtenay

Drayton Road westbound – High St Sutton Courtenay, Milton Rd, Sutton Rd, High St Milton, Park Drive, A4130, B4017, Abingdon Rd, Steventon Rd, High St Drayton

Documents giving more detailed particulars of the proposed Order are available for public inspection at County Hall, New Road, Oxford OX1 1ND from 9am to 4.30pm Monday to Friday, and at Abingdon Library, The Charter, Abingdon from 9am to 7pm Monday to Wednesday and Friday, from 9am to 1pm on Thursday and from 9am to 4.30 pm on Saturday.

Please Note: One-way (westbound only) traffic flow will be permitted for residents within the road closure (B4016 between Drayton Road/Milton Road junction and Brook Street/Church Street/High Street junction, Sutton Courtenay) for the duration of the race.

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Finally, remember that this is a true race – the leaders will be going all out for overall victory, the rest looking for a category win or to set a personal best time. All will appreciate any encouragement you can give them! My walks with our young Labrador, Betty, now follow a different course because of the fallen apples which she insists on eating, despite suffering the consequences!

We don't derive as much pleasure from apples as did our grandparents and the wonderful names of the hundreds of different types of English apples are now forgotten. October can be a rather depressing time for many; nights are drawing in, the brightness of summer giving way to sombre colours and weather and our news seems to follow on a similar gloomy perspective. There is a real danger if we regard ourselves like fallen apples; trodden underfoot, no real use, being too sweet, too sour or tasteless. One of many in a similar state and of no use at all.

Just before the Chronicle went to press, we had a call to say that a tortoise had been found on a building site in Eastway, Drayton.



Oxford-Cambridge Expressway route announced; could join the A34 between Drayton and Steventon

Following the government announcement of the Expressway on September 12th, I have been doing a lot of reading up of the Business Cases and National Infrastructure Commission reports, and the issues around this. The announcement leaves some options open & the southernmost option of where the east west route joins the A34 is of particular interest because it is between Drayton and Steventon!



There were three suggested options for south of Oxford (shown above), and yes, that southernmost option is between Drayton and Steventon. The announcement doesn't say where the Expressway would connect with the A34. It might curve around the north of Oxford to connect at Botley (after knocking down the various houses in the way), or curve around the south of Oxford to connect either at Lodge Hill or the Marcham Interchange or between Drayton and Steventon:

Congestion

Reading through the Strategic Business Case and National Infrastructure Commission report, one thing stands out - a key reason for this is to increase freight traffic from the southern ports up the A34 and onto the Expressway to go east. This means that we'll get a lot of extra "induced traffic" up the A34.

Unfortunately, all the options run into the fundamental problem that using the A34 as part of the Expressway won't do much to reduce congestion; it stands every chance of making it worse.

And when the main road goes down (as the A34 does all too often), where will the (now increased) freight traffic go? I'm worried the answer will be "straight through Steventon, Drayton, and Abingdon, just like now."

The lure of big projects

Governments are drawn to large-scale infrastructure projects like wasps to flames. Dramatic, impressive, hopefully "transformative," they can make ministers look decisive and visionary.

Unfortunately, they tend not to work anywhere near as well as a comparably-funded bunch of small-scale (but less dramatic) projects: they're inflexible (you're committed to your course for a decade or more), it's a lot harder to forecast budgets and schedules, they overrun those schedules, usually go hugely over budget, and rarely deliver the transformation promised, anyway. But by that time, the decisive, far-seeing leaders who kicked them off are long gone, so there's not much down-side for them.

Overruns and delays are because projects suffer from the "The Planner's Fallacy" – it's difficult to plan for the unforeseeable (obviously!), so when unforeseen events come up (as they inevitably do), delays happen and costs creep up.

The agility of smaller projects

Smaller projects are easier to understand, plan, and complete. Something called "Comparative Estimation" cuts through the Planner's Fallacy: how long did a similar project take, how much did it cost, and why? Big projects usually don't have suitable comparators to use.

Smaller projects get delivered quicker (so people see the benefits faster) and can be more agile – you can change what you're delivering when circumstances change. Analysis shows you get more bang for the buck for them – but they're less sexy, and because they get delivered faster, the person kicking them off may have to carry the can if things go wrong.

We don't know what technology will give us by the time the Expressway is due to be completed. Smaller and quicker projects are more agile; we can change what we're doing to fit what's needed at the time.

Alternatives

So, if we want alternatives (smaller, focused projects), what should we have? Just off the cuff, I can think of:

- Accelerate the East-West Rail link that's already being constructed, and look to electrify it.
- Ensure new stations on the East-West rail link are accessible by car, by bike, and by bus.
 - Target house-building in areas accessible to these stations.
- Upgrade specific choke points around the A34 and around the other cities involved (sort out the local issues first) otherwise we're just linking traffic jams to traffic jams.
- Look to extend the East-West rail link down to Swindon, which is becoming a key technology centre and is far closer.
- Complete upgrade of the A420 to Swindon as a first target and "easy win".
- Improve other specific congestion points on the existing routes between the cities (small link roads and focussed upgrades, site by site).

If we do still need a strategic road link by this point, the upgraded centres in the entire area will be less congested and easier to link through the now-upgraded existing link roads.

Public Review

There's been some public consultation on route options, and another such consultation is scheduled for next autumn. There hasn't been a consultation on whether or not it's a good idea in the first place and what alternatives could be followed. Personally, I'm planning to pitch up to the next consultation with the arguments above and suggest they look at doing a bunch of smaller projects. I'd like our District and County Councillors to consider this as well.

Good infrastructure development *is* essential - thinking ahead, providing homes for our children, linking together communities and technological centres, and so on, but it must bear the costs in mind – not just financial, but on existing communities and the countryside. Bad development just gets everyone's hackles up when any development is suggested and wastes money and effort that could be used to provide the infrastructure we do need.

And if it'll all be late, over budget, and possibly pointless when finally delivered, anyway, we'll have paid a lot (and not just in money) for nothing.

As a local local hot air balloon pilot under training and the local ballooning region chair, I would like to make a correction to the item regarding the gas balloon on the front of the September 2018 Chronicle. Below is a copy of the press release shared by a member of the

team working on the project.

The film — directed by Tom Harper (Peaky Blinders) and written by Jack Thorne (Harry Potter and the Cursed Child) will also feature some high-flying stunts as well, with producer Todd Lieberman saying that,

"A top priority for us on The Aeronauts is authenticity. With that in mind, we intend to do as much balloon filming in the sky as the weather will allow. This image was taken after we launched Felicity and Eddie 2,000 feet in the air, performing their scripted scene, while a helicopter captured it all. We're fortunate that Felicity and Eddie have the nerve to do these stunts themselves as it authenticates our entire approach."

Further information will be released next year.

A brief expanation of balloon types

There are a few types of balloons. The more common one is often referred to as the 'Montgolfier' type. This type of balloon uses fire to heat the air inside the balloon in order to gain lift. This is what you will often see floating over the skies of Oxfordshire.

A Hybrid balloon uses hot air in the same way but also has a compartment of helium or hydrogen gas in the top.

Another type is a gas balloon which doesn't use hot air and the altitude can only be controlled by dropping ballast or venting the gas. These are the balloons which are used in long distance races and records. The famous International Gordon Bennett Cup is an example where pilots from all over the world compete in Gas Balloons. This is because they require less fuel and can stay airborne for an extended period of time.

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THIS MONTH'S RECIPE

Carol and Colin Arnold

Homemade Christmas Mincemeat

Makes 6lb (2.75Kg)

Homemade mincemeat is dead simple to make. But in the past people used to have trouble storing it. This was because the high percentage of apples oozed too much juice and the juice started to ferment. In the following recipe the mincemeat is placed in a barely warm oven and so the suet gradually melts and as this happens it coats all of the fruits, including the apples, sealing in the juices.

Ingredients

11b (450g) Cooking apples, cored and chopped small (no need to peel them.

8oz (225g) Shredded suet.

12oz (350g) Raisins.

8oz (225g) Sultanas.

8oz (225g) Currants.

8oz (225g) Whole mixed candied peel, finely shopped.

12oz (350g) Soft dark brown sugar.

The grated zest and juice of 2 oranges.

The grated zest and juice of 2 lemons.

2oz (50g) Whole almonds, cut into slivers.

4 teaspoons mixed ground spice.

½ teaspoon ground cinnamon.

Nutmeg, grated.

6 tablespoons brandy.

Method

All you do is combine the above ingredients, except the brandy, in a large mixing bowl, stirring them and mixing them very thoroughly indeed. Then cover the bowl with a clean cloth and leave the mixture in a cool place overnight or for 12 hours, so the flavours have a chance to mingle and develop.

After that pre-heat the oven to gas mark ½ 225°F (120°C), cover the bowl loosely with foil and place in the oven for 3 hours.

Then remove the bowl from the oven and don't worry about the appearance of the mincemeat, which will look positively swimming in fat. This is how it should look. As it cools stir it from time to time; the fat will coagulate and instead of it being in tiny shreds it will encase all the other ingredients. When the mincemeat is quite cold stir in the brandy. Pack in clean dry jars, cover with wax discs and seal. It will keep in a cool, dark cupboard indefinitely, but is best eaten within a year of making.

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WESTMINSTER LETTER

Some good news over the summer for the broadband roll out in our area. The government have announced an extra £45 million investment in rural broadband. The new funding for the government's Rural Broadband Infrastructure Scheme adds to the £30 million investment announced last year, increasing the total pot of funding available to £75 million. broadband news, East Hagbourne have clubbed together to obtain ultrafast broadband for the village. More information in doing this in your area can be found at communityfibre.openreach.co.uk.



Oxfordshire hospitals are being given a major funding boost to to improve care ahead of winter. The Oxfordshire NHS Trust has been allocated an extra £3.21 million to improve diagnostics and patient flow. This is part of £145 million of capital investment in the NHS from the Department of Health.

Two projects in Didcot have just been awarded a combined £19,331 from the National Lottery. Didcot TRAIN, where I am a patron, has been awarded £9,531. TRAIN works with young people in the area to fulfil their potential and overcome barriers that may limit their social integration. The second, SOFEA, has been awarded £9,800. It works with young people and their families to overcome a variety of issues and build confidence and skills.

Kellogg's are running the Schools Breakfast Club Awards to celebrate best practice in breakfast club provision and recognise the role played by the schools, teachers, parents and children in helping them run. If your school runs a breakfast club, they can enter at kelloggsbreakfastclubawards.co.uk.

I was very pleased this month to visit a number of excellent organisations in the constituency. Skoob Books in Didcot have an enormous second hand book collection, and supply film sets with books for background shots. Milton House Hotel has come under new ownership and are planning a range of improvements. I was also pleased to meet with the Changing Places team, who are campaigning for fully accessible disabled toilets, and Bpas in Oxford who provide specialised reproductive health services to the

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COUNTY COUNCIL REPORT

Expressway

The decision on the preferred option (by Highways England at least) for the proposed Oxford - Cambridge Expressway has been announced as "Route B". All this tells us is that the road will not cut through miles of open countryside in South Oxfordshire or take a very wide northerly sweep above Oxford airport. Otherwise, we (including OCC Highways department) are in the dark on any further detail. OCC have responded by saying that they cannot give any detailed response as to how the impact could be managed until there is more clarity on the route and the traffic data on which the decisions are based. At least HE are now aware that a very thorough and contentious consultation will have to be carried out urgently. This will, at least give us all a chance to register our feelings on the proposal.

Boundary Review

Residents of Drayton, Milton, Marcham and Shippon will be interested to know that the latest Electoral Boundary Commissions firm recommendations are that all four villages will be moved from their current Wantage constituency into OXWAB - the Oxford West and Abingdon constituency.

Road Diversions

The road diversion in Sutton Courtenay caused by the new pipework needed by the Warehouses and Data centre, has resulted in massive disruption and anxiety in the area. Some livelihoods threatened, HGV restrictions being broken in Appleford, inconvenience to Sutton Courtenay Primary School so recently hit by the Carillion collapse and long queues at the junction of Park Drive and Milton High St. OCC have the unenviable responsibility for trying to make the road system work when planning decisions are made. There is enormous pressure on the contractors to get the work done as soon as possible. Some of the problems are being solved - but the whole area is a traffic management nightmare. The nation, never mind Oxfordshire depends on Milton Park continuing to thrive. District and County are going to have to restrict development more robustly in the future - at least until the Growth Deal has allowed major road improvements all around Milton Park to be made.

Hobbyhorse Lane, Sutton Courtenay

The original application having been withdrawn, all attention now falls on a second application (broadly the same as the first). OCC highways maintains its objections and is preparing for an inquiry should an appeal be lodged.

Outline Business Case for a Science Bridge - be careful what we wish for!

A HIF (Housing Infrastructure Bid) has been launched to help fund a Bridge and River crossing - this will be considered around March 2019. However, the current objection by OCC Highways to further development in Sutton Courtenay could be removed if/when the funding for this bridge is delivered.

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
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
DRAYTON DINERS

New Rural Crime Reporting Line

The NFU, in partnership with the charity Crimestoppers, has launched this new service for farmers and the public, so that they can anonymously provide information about rural crime. This is part of the NFU's ongoing work to tackle the serious issues surrounding criminal behaviour on farms and in the wider countryside.

Please do not report abandoned vehicles to the police.

If you suspect a vehicle has been abandoned this is the correct procedure to follow:

- Make a note of the vehicle's registration number then visit the page on the GOV.UK website which checks with the DVLA to ascertain if a vehicle is taxed and has an MOT. Link to page here: https://www.gov.uk/get-vehicleinformation-from-dvla
- 2. If this process confirms that vehicle is untaxed you can report it to the DVLA by following the link provided.
- 3. The police will act if a vehicle without insurance is seen, or reported, driving on a public road

Shed and garage break-ins

There have been attempts to break into sheds and garages over the past few weeks. Opportunist thieves identify sheds and garages as easy pickings because they're usually fairly unprotected and lack basic security measures. They often contain property that can be sold on, or implements that can be used to force entry into the owner's home. Police advice is as follows.

- Keep your shed or garage in good condition.
- Fittings should be bolted through the door and any screws concealed.
- Make it harder for the would-be thief by using tamper-proof screws or coach bolts together with a good quality pad bar or hasp and staple and close shackled padlock.
- Bond in any window glass with mastic and fit grilles or mesh, to slow down the thief.
- Lock all tools and equipment away. Ensure ladders are locked to a secure fixture in the shed or garage, so that they can't be used to reach your top floor windows.
- Mark property with your postcode or use forensic marking such as Selecta DNA and SmartWater
- Install security lighting as a deterrent and consider fitting a garage or shed alarm.
- Use plants such as thorny shrubs to act as a barrier at potential access points.
- Chain large items such as bicycles together, making it much more difficult for a thief to carry away.

October Report

Thames Water proposes to bring reservoir forward by 10 years - construction would begin in 2025!



As we reported last month, Thames Water have conceded the case for a second public consultation on their revised draft Water Resources Management Plan 2019-2024 (known as rdWRMP19). This was largely due to pressure from Oxfordshire organisations, supported by local MPs.

This climb-down has forced some hurried re-scheduling by Thames Water, and their revised plan and their response to all the public comments (individual and organisational) is expected at the 'end of September', and is not available at the time of going to press.

One important announcement has been made however, as residents will have seen in the press and on TV. **Thames have announced that their new plan will propose to bring the Abingdon Reservoir forward to start construction in 2025** (a decade earlier than previously). The size of the reservoir (50% larger than that rejected at the 2010 Public Inquiry) is now more than 50% justified on selling water to other water companies, not just to satisfy London's growth, which Thames have been forced to admit will be less than their original exaggerated figures had proposed.

It is clear that local residents and businesses have a more pressing fight on our hands than we originally thought. We cannot yet see in detail how Thames Water will justify their move until their plan comes out, but GARD and other organisations following the twists and turns of this saga, already believe that there is no economic, environmental or social justification for the reservoir as a 'storage and distribution hub' for the South-east (as it is now styled in Thames Water presentations). Thames Water so far only have one prospective water company customer (Affinity Water in Hertfordshire) and other SE water companies (South-east Water and Southern Water) have already withdrawn their requests for future supply from Thames in the last year. The whole project smacks of commercial positioning and speculation even more than ever, and local organisations should oppose it vigorously. GARD pledges to do just this. The best methods of bringing 'new water' into the stressed south-east remain transfer from Wales/River Severn, or water re-use or desalination. These are deliverable earlier than a reservoir, and more flexible and resilient against future climate change.

The second consultation will last for eight weeks. Once the details of the new plan are available we will be holding public information meetings, so watch out for details. GARD will be looking at the new plan, particularly to see if it remains shrouded in secrecy as to how projects are compared on cost, and how decisions are made. If the transparency of the plan has not improved, then we are almost certainly going to join the Vale council in demanding a Public Inquiry, and will be asking other local political organisations to join us. We have already briefed Oxfordshire County Councillors on the plan at the beginning of September, and plan to meet the Vale and the Environment Agency in the next few weeks.

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⇒ Joining GARD

To defeat the Reservoir project and ensure a sustainable water future for Oxfordshire and the South-east, we need even more members. At some point it will become very important to demonstrate the strength and depth of the local opposition to this plan, and, of course, we do need 'boots on the ground' to help push the message across. 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Fake TV Licencing and Netflix emails

There has been a sharp increase in reports about fake TV Licensing and Netflix emails claiming to offer refunds. The emails state that the refund cannot be processed due to "invalid account details" or your account needs to be "updated". The links provided in the emails lead to phishing websites designed to steal financial details. Always question unsolicited requests for your personal or financial information in case it is a scam. Never automatically click on a link in an unexpected email or text.

PCSO Recruitment

Thames Valley Police are currently recruiting Police Community Support Officers (PCSOs).

To apply for a role as a PCSO, you must:

- have a GCSE English grade C (grade 4), or equivalent, or higher qualification
- be a British EC/EEA or Commonwealth citizen, or a foreign national with indefinite leave to remain in the UK
- be in good health and physically and mentally able to undertake police duties
- not have tattoos which could cause offence
- have a body mass index (BMI) of between 18-30
- disclose all convictions or cautions
- not have served any period of imprisonment or youth detention
- not have any existing County Court judgements outstanding against you
- not have bankruptcy debts which have not been discharged for at least three years
- not be the subject of a current Individual Voluntary Arrangement (IVA)
