All is so quickly over and all that seems to remain is a diminished bank account and extended waistline! Whilst many go over the top at Christmas, so some go under with the exhaustion, sadness or loneliness of the festive season.

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
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Football News

On Saturday 5 January Drayton FC were awarded the **North Berks December Team of the Month Award** where they received an official match ball following their unbeaten December which also included making the Quarter Finals of the Berks & Bucks Junior Cup.



Drayton maintained their unbeaten run to seven matches when they shared a point a piece with Compton when they were held to a 3-3 draw at the Drayton Recreation Ground on Saturday 5th January.

Compton took the lead after twenty-five minutes. Drayton levelled the scores when they were awarded a penalty following pushing from a corner and Josh Dennis stepped up to fire the ball home from twelve yards. Then minutes later Drayton took the lead when a fine long cross evaded all Compton defenders and the ball fell to Drayton's Pat Walsh at the far post who fired the ball home. The start of the second half was much like the first with both sides struggling to create any worthwhile chances until the sixty-minute mark when Compton were awarded a penalty which was converted to pull Compton level.

Drayton took the lead on seventy-five minutes when Callum Green ran onto a long through ball and slipped the ball past the out-rushing Compton keeper. Compton pushed forward in the final moments of the game and earned a few corners which were dealt with by the Drayton defence until with just minutes remaining Compton were awarded their second penalty of the game following a late challenge in the Drayton penalty area.

DRAYTON'S NEW PLAYGROUND

REMEMBER DRAYTON2020?

20 December was a cold and blustery Thursday, but it marked an important milestone in the implementation of the Neighbourhood Development Plan produced by Drayton2020. Parish Council chairman Richard Williams is seen here accepting the transfer of the Walnut Meadow play area to Council ownership from the developers, Miller Homes. It is one of the first concrete examples of community benefits that members of Drayton2020 worked to achieve over many thousand man-hours since the project began in 2012. Many more will follow.

The occasion was important for a second reason, too. Everyone has been deeply frustrated by the way Miller Homes seem to have abandoned the site without fulfilling its obligations to complete the roads, drainage and playing fields (as well as some of the houses). However, it is reassuring to learn that Millers have appointed civil-engineer Sarah Reid (pictured) to make sure the work is now done.

Sadly, few of those who contributed their time to Drayton2020 are likely to enjoy the benefits of the new play area, although I may sneak in when no-one is looking. There are some excellent facilities there and they will be great fun for Drayton's children, particularly those living in Walnut Meadow.

Also, for those who don't already know, there is now an excellent, well-lit, tarmac footpath linking Barrow Road with Corneville Road. This enables pedestrians from Walnut Meadow to reach the school, the post office, the Wheatsheaf, Vickery's and the Hall without walking along the man road.



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REPORT FROM GARD

January 2019

The Next Steps in opposing the Thames Water reservoir plans

The consultation on Thames Water's revised draft Water Resources Management Plan 2019-2024 (known as rdWRMP19) closed on 28th November.

GARD submitted a robust paper opposing the plan, and a copy of this will shortly be available on our website (<u>www.gardoxon.org.uk</u>). Most importantly however, there was a very strong opposition response from local residents, local campaigning organisations and local political representatives at all levels. The proposal by Thames Water to bring forward the construction of the 'Abingdon' Reservoir to start in 2025 is overwhelmingly opposed by local campaign groups and councils, and <u>universally</u> in the locality there has been a call for a Public Inquiry into the plan.

The large majority of the Parish Councils in the area have issued formal responses opposing the plans and all called for a Public Inquiry. This call for a Public Inquiry is supported by the Vale of the White Horse DC, who state that they are not convinced by the Thames Water case, and by Oxfordshire County Council, whose response formally objects to the plan. CPRE Oxfordshire and the Wantage and Grove Campaign Group are also opposed to the plans.

We must hope that Thames Water will listen to the opposition, but their past record does not give much confidence. That is why it has been important that our local MPs, Ed Vaizey (Wantage) and Layla Moran (Abingdon and Oxford West) have called for a Public Inquiry and written to Secretary of State, Michael Gove requesting this. We would like to thank them for their support, and also thank local councillors, such as Mike Fox-Davies (Steventon and Hendred) and Richard Webber (Drayton and Sutton Courtenay) for their hard work in pushing the message and actions through the County Council.

Thanks also to those who wrote individually to the consultation opposing the plans and calling for a Public Inquiry. This time round there were a very large number of <u>individual</u> contributions, many of them copied personally to me, and featuring many forceful and thoughtful arguments. We now await to see Thames Water's response. If you wrote in, you will get an individual answer from them. If you find any of the answers are dismissive or evasive, we would be very pleased if you could share them with us (via email <u>gard.chair@gmail.com</u>), and complain to your MP.

The next step will be for Thames Water's new partner in the reservoir plan (Affinity Water) to publish their revised draft plan. This is expected in March. We will be responding to this, and we hope to co-ordinate our response with local organisations, and that you will all write to Affinity expressing your opposition. Affinity are 'new kids on the block' as far as the reservoir is concerned, and they have said they are keen to engage with our local concerns and hear them. They are less wedded to the reservoir plan as a solution than Thames Water, for whom it seems to have become some sort of sacred cow.

In spite of Thames Water claiming that the reservoir will be needed by the 'South-east in general', Affinity Water (who supply Hertfordshire) are the only prospective water company customer to express any interest. Other SE water companies (South-east Water and Southern Water) have already withdrawn their requests for future supply from Thames Water. **The analysis by GARD shows that the requirements of Affinity can be met by very simple and cheap schemes and improving leakage (sounds familiar?), until at least the 2060s.** Once again the reasons advanced by Thames Water do not stack up, and Oxfordshire needs to convince Affinity that much cheaper and more quickly deliverable solutions are available for their customers.

Please keep an eye out and respond to Affinity's plan when published.





The Ridgeway – the oldest road in Britain – historically was a trackway providing a reliable trading route from the Dorset coast along the chalk Downs to the Wash in Norfolk. Today it is not only the oldest road but is also a wonderful resource for all the communities that live along its route, where all can enjoy walking, riding or just being there.

The Friends of The Ridgeway have established an annual arts competition and prize – the Swire Ridgeway Arts Prize. For 2019, it will be held in April 2019 with an exhibition in Thomas Hughes Memorial Hall, Uffington on Saturday and Sunday 27 - 28 April 2019. The aim of the competition is to bring The Ridgeway to life not only as a long distance trail but also as an artistic inspiration, and to show The Ridgeway, its history and environs, in all their aspects throughout all seasons. The theme of the competition is *'Spirit of the Ridgeway'*.

The main points of the prize competition are:

There will be separate classes for painting, sculpture (including ceramics and textiles), photography and writing (poetry or prose);

Competition is open to all, amateur and professional artists; Art work submitted must be produced in the 24 months prior to closing date;

The results of the competition will be announced, and prizes awarded at the Ridgeway Friends Day planned for 28 April 2019;

The closing date for entries shall be one month prior to the Ridgeway Friends Day (i.e. 31 March 2019);

The full rules of the competition are given in a separate document.

All entrants will receive one year's membership of The Friends of The Ridgeway Each category winner will receive a keeper prize plus £100. The overall winner will receive a keeper prize plus £250 and a trophy.

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COUNTY COUNCIL

County Report:

Last month I promised that I would devote this article to the most contentious issue facing Oxfordshire – the proposed Oxford to Cambridge Expressway.

It is common knowledge that as a consequence of all the housing we have built and are due to build (assuming we have the bricks and bricklayers to carry out the work), we are excrutiatingly short of the infrastructure that should come with those houses. There is now an undeniably serious backlog of roads, rail, bus and cycling provision.

Until recently, appeals to Government for money to address this backlog have fallen on deaf ears. The newly signed "Growth Deal" is offering £150m but the estimated shortfall in what is needed is many times this. Many of us feel that, as a result, the backlog is going to grow. However we feel about the Expressway, there is no denying that if/when it is built, we will have even more houses with no certainty that the road will be able to generate enough money to address the backlog, and every likelihood that it will simply increase the problem further.

There are now a number of protest-organisations across the County – each objecting to the road being built through their patch. Many local councilors are members of such protest groups and this presents a problem for Council Leaders and how they should handle the issue. So far, the Growth Board (the body responsible for producing a unified County response) is sending out some very confused signals on whether or not it welcomes the Expressway.

If Oxfordshire is to make its voice heard, it needs to speak with one voice and find that voice quickly. It seems to me that the holding position that most would sign up to, is that Oxfordshire residents need to understand the justification for the proposal via a full consultation and, given the present infrastructure backlog, the congestion on the A34, the A420 and many other roads, at present they are far from convinced.

As with the Reservoir, this fight will go on for some time – it is certainly far too important to be rushed.

With all the present uncertainties in Westminster, and the consequent uncertainties over how local government is to be funded, it can be hard to remain positive. Like everyone, I am determined to enjoy my family this Christmas – I hope you will enjoy yours. Let's hope that 2019 will bring some pleasant surprises and solutions to problems where 2018 failed.

PARISH COUNCIL REPORT

Report of the Parish Council meetings held on Mon 10th December 2018 and Mon 1st October 2018

December

A report back was received from the latest meeting with developers Millers on 7th December. This meeting, attended by representatives of the Parish, District and County Councils, as well as Millers execs and their contractors, set a timetable for work on the remaining outstanding issues for the next couple of months, with the next meeting scheduled for early Feb. Notes from this meeting were posted on the Families in Drayton website by parish councillor Andy Cooke a few days before Christmas. As recorded elsewhere in this issue, the new children's play area on the site was opened on 20th December.

Other matters discussed included the consultation event for the proposed Oxford to Cambridge Expressway, and the proposed changes to the planning application to build 28 houses at the back of Halls Close.

January

Updates were received from the Public Art working group, the Allotment working group and the Projects Board.

The Planning Committee was particularly concerned about the developer Blue Cedar's proposals re. Halls Close, i.e. they wish to remove the condition that 11 of the 28 houses should be designed specifically for, and available only to, the over 60s. As this provision for older people was part of the reason why the application was approved in the first place, the PC has formally objected to the change.

Neighbourhood Action Group 5 Safety Corner

Burglary

With increased rates of burglary in our area the police suggest all residents should review their home security.

- Using timer plugs to turn lights and radios on and off is a simple and inexpensive way to make it look as if there's someone at home. Use them daily, not just when you're away, and vary the times when individual timers switch things on and off. You can also purchase a device with a flickering light, which mimics a television.
- Contrary to public belief fewer burglaries take place at night. Most occur between 3 and 6pm.
- Install external security lights that switch on when it gets dark.
- Vary your routines. If someone's keeping an eye on your property it won't take too long for them to ascertain when there's no-one at home.
- Don't leave curtains closed all day. If thieves gain entry, they risk being seen if they decide to close the curtains to hide their presence.
- Thieves are generally looking for gold and gold jewellery and are very knowledgeable about value. They will take cash but normally ignore laptops, TVs etc.
- Gold jewellery and gold should ideally be kept in a bank vault. If you want to keep jewellery at home it should be kept in a safe, which can't be carried away or hidden in a very unlikely location.
- If you keep items of jewellery at home which have great sentimental value, even if they're not very valuable in monetary terms, give some thought to how you'd feel if they were stolen, and take steps to keep them safe.
- Place your jewellery on a white piece of paper, with a ruler next to it, and photograph every item.
- Mark your jewellery with a forensic liquid such as SmartWater. Visit the website at *www.smartwater.com* or call 0333 320 7797.
- The police's view is that CCTV is the best burglary deterrent of all.

Vehicle theft

There has been a recent increase in vehicle thefts from villages in our area.

- High profile vehicles are now so difficult to break into that thieves are breaking into houses to obtain the keys. Don't leave car or door keys within easy reach of the front door, or visible through glass doors and windows.
- If such vehicles are stolen the number plates are often cloned then used on a car of the same make and model to carry out crimes, such as burglaries, in another area.

- If you're advertising a vehicle or motor-cycle for sale always be sure that the number plate is obscured or not visible.
- In the cold weather it's tempting to leave your car running, and unattended, while the windows de-frost and the interior warms up. Similarly, don't leave the car running while you just pop into a shop or post a letter. It doesn't take more than a minute for someone to hop into your car and drive away.
- Don't leave possessions in your car and always ensure you close all windows and lock the vehicle when leaving it.
- If you have a portable Sat Nav and cradle always remove them and wipe any suction marks from the windscreen. Thieves will expect to find Sat Navs stored in the glove box or under the seat so always take yours with you when leaving your vehicle.


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ABINGDON PARKRUN



What do between 250 and 500 people do in Abingdon every Saturday morning at 9.00 am? They meet next to the river roughly halfway between the Nag's Head and Abingdon Lock and, after a short briefing from the organisers, start running, jogging or walking.

Plenty of people from Drayton have been spotted there! They have discovered that it is a great way to get fit in the fresh air, it's free of charge and you can be home before 10.00 am, feeling good and with the weekend ahead. Later in the day they receive an email from parkrun, informing them of their time (which, on a typical Saturday, ranges from 17 minutes to 60 minutes), and more information about personal bests, position etc.

The run is 5km and covers all terrains, from grass to tarmac to gravel and mud. Good shoes make a big difference, but otherwise anything goes clothes-wise. Runners cover the whole age spectrum, and always include a few dogs on leads and participants in pushchairs.

Local resident Mike Shepherd of Sutton Wick is one of the seven Abingdon parkrun volunteer Run Directors. They do an amazing job – probably the most challenging part of which is co-ordinating the small army of volunteers each week who act as motivating marshals, time keepers etc. Parkrun couldn't exist without the volunteers, so many of the runners volunteer themselves one week in ten or so, to ensure that the parkrun continues.

Other parkruns

Some people love the routine of doing the same route each week, getting to know the terrain and the people – but there are also other local parkruns at Didcot, Oxford and Henley and in fact all over the UK and globally. The keenest runners take their running shoes with them in their suitcases and do a parkrun wherever they are on holiday/away for work etc.!

Inspired?

If you are inspired to have a go, all you need to do is register on **www.parkrun.org.uk**. Once you've filled in your details, you will be able to print out a personal barcode and you simply take it with you - each time you run. When you complete the run your barcode is scanned, together with a position-time barcode which is given to you temporarily at the end of the run. There is no commitment to run again after you've tried it once but, judging from the vast number of people who take part, it is something you can definitely become addicted to! Margaret Inger

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RECIPE AT THE BACK

Delicious Chicken Jalfrezi

- 6 green chillies 4 boneless, skinless chicken breasts 2 tbsp oil 2 garlic cloves, peeled and finely chopped 5 ripe tomatoes 1 tbsp ground cumin 1 tbsp garam masala 1 tsp ground turmeric 1 tbsp caster sugar 1 tsp flaked sea salt 200ml cold water 2 tbsp low-fat natural yoghurt 1 medium onion 1 green pepper 2 tsp cornflour 1 tbsp water
- Method
- Finely chop the chillies deseed a couple or all of them first if you don't like very spicy food. Cut each chicken breast into 7 or 8 bite-sized chunks.
- Heat a tablespoon of the oil in a large, non-stick frying pan over a high heat. Add the garlic, chopped chillies, 3 chopped tomatoes, cumin, garam masala, turmeric, sugar and salt, then stir-fry for 3–4 minutes until the vegetables soften.
- 3. Next, add the chicken pieces and cook for 3 minutes, turning the chicken regularly. Pour over the 200ml of water, stir in the yoghurt and reduce the heat only slightly –the sauce needs to simmer. Cook for about 10 minutes, stirring occasionally until the chicken is tender and cooked through and the sauce has reduced by about a third. The yoghurt may separate to begin with but will disappear into the sauce.
- 4. While the chicken is cooking, heat the remaining tablespoon of oil in a frying pan and stir-fry the chopped onion and pepper over a high heat for 3–4 minutes until lightly browned. Add the last 2 tomatoes (quartered) and fry for 2–3 minutes more, stirring until the vegetables are just tender. Mix the cornflour with the tablespoon of water to form a smooth paste.
- 5. When the chicken is cooked, stir in the cornflour mixture and simmer for a few seconds until the sauce thickens, stirring constantly. Remove from the heat, add the hot stir-fried vegetables and toss together lightly. Serve immediately with basmati rice and mango chutney. Enjoy.
