Letter from St Peter's (the Ministry Team)

From the Ministry Team...Journeying Through Lent

Forty Days. Six weeks. A long time to wander through the wilderness. People often don't look forward to Lent as memories surface of struggling to give up our favourite things. Words like 'sacrifice', 'discipline', and 'self-denial' are often used in ways that suggest that Lent is something to be endured rather than a time of renewal and spiritual growth. Perhaps it feels more like a punishment, or possibly just something you have to get through until Easter finally arrives. But at its heart, Lent is a journey. It's a path that we each have the choice to step onto that leads to the cross and to the empty tomb. Every year Christians celebrate Christ's death and resurrection. Lent is a time to prepare for this celebration.

We Journey Together

Along the way, there are hills and valleys, stones to stumble upon, and smooth paths to tread over with confidence; and hopefully along the way, there are moments of clarity where our faith or vision seems a little clearer, even though there will undoubtedly be moments where it seems foggy and uncertain. Why not travel with us on **Palm Sunday** as the churches re-enact Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem with a procession. But as Holy Week approaches, the atmosphere of the season darkens and the DAMASCUS Parish will be holding a Service of Shadows (known as 'Tenebrae') which will trace the story of Christ's passion. You're all invited. As with any journey, Lent is easier when travelled with companions.

When Our Feet are Tired

Perhaps you joined us as we began our Lenten journey on Ash Wednesday, or perhaps you just wondered why some people had been marked in ash with the sign of the cross on their foreheads... The imposition of ashes marks an ancient sign of penitence or remorse. As the cross is made specific words are spoken: 'Remember you are dust, and to dust you shall return. Turn away from sin and be faithful to Christ'. It is this turning away that determines how we travel, and on Maundy Thursday everyone is invited to gather for a Supper as we focus on the ways in which we are called to serve each other on our journeys, of faith or none, together.

Where Christ Walked, We Will Follow

When **Good Friday** arrives we will be retracing Christ's journey to the cross and churches across the Parish will mark this journey in different ways. Each a pilgrimage in its own way: whether by procession to the church, through the Stations of the Cross around the church itself, or by quiet meditation. However we travel, perhaps we can take time to journey well with one another, to discover the riches of moving more slowly; and afterwards share in the traditional eating of Hot Cross buns.

The Journey Ends AND Begins in Hope

So as you prepare for Easter this year, will you be ready to celebrate when a joyful dawn breaks upon **Easter Sunday** morning? God is never absent – our task is to encounter God with new eyes and in new ways, in people we meet, places we stop, in nature's beauty and our own thoughts and feelings. Our experiences will have changed us and hopefully because of that, we might grow a bit, both individually and as a community, and maybe by the end, we might even feel a little better about Lent.

You're invited to come along, just as you are, to any of the services taking place across the Parish (details included with the Easter advert in this magazine). **All are welcome.**

WESTMINSTER VIEW



Ed Vaizey's column (Wantage/Didcot MP; he's presently on the Commons Speaker's Advisory Panel on the Arts, also a patron of 'Kids in Museums')

This month I have met with Ministers to discuss two important local issues: **Health care and rail links**. I met with Andrew Jones, the Rail Minister, and his officials,

also Network Rail and Great Western. The Minister and I led discussions focussing on improvements along the Great Western Railway line, the potential for **reopening Grove Station** as part of a strategic project to develop commuter stations between Oxford and Bristol, and improved connectivity between Heathrow Airport and stations to the west, so one might travel direct to Heathrow from Reading for example. I will be looking at the East West Rail scheme and the Cotswold Line Promotion Group for inspiration in how to build a business case for improvements to commuter services between Oxford & Bristol and hope that colleagues in Parliament with relevant stations might join me.

I also met with Health Minister Caroline Dinenage, alongside colleagues from OCC, Oxfordshire Clinical Commissing Group, Oxford Health and VWHDC, she and I led discussions on how we could improve **Primary Care provision** in the constituency. We discussed the ongoing situation in Wantage as well as our plans to **develop new health hubs**, both at an improved Health Centre in Wantage and plans for a new health hub in Didcot.

In the constituency I have met with a number of residents and local businesses, including meeting with GPs in Wantage, the Thames Valley Police Commissioner and Deputy Commissioner, and a visit to the Environmental Education Centre in Sutton Courtenay hosted by Berks, Bucks & Oxon Wildlife Trust.

About Stonehill Community Garden

Stonehill Community Garden provides outdoor learning experiences for diverse groups from the communities of Abingdon, Drayton, Steventon, Sutton Courtenay and Radley.

We provide a safe space which offers more than purely a gardening experience. We bring together people of different ages, backgrounds and abilities to get active through learning practical skills around growing, building and working outdoors. Whilst creating the opportunity for people to be outdoors and connecting with the natural world, a sense of community is created through skill sharing and group Our objectives are in line with Cultivating activities. Communities' Good Practice Guide for Community Gardens:-

Build community - a sense of community develops through participation and common enterprise.

Reduce environmental impact - by reducing food miles and recycling waste.

Improve nutritional health - by increasing the consumption of fresh, organic, locally grown food.

Create opportunity - via skill-sharing, friendships & learning.

Create purposeful recreation - by getting people growing food and reconnecting with nature.

Stonehill Community Garden welcomes individuals, groups and organisations into the garden each Wednesday. Our regular participants include:- **Kingfisher school** for children with special learning needs; **Style Acre**, a local charity working with adults with cognitive learning disabilities; DAMASCUS Youth Project for local young people at risk of anti-social behaviour and offending; ex-offenders (via the Community Pay-Back scheme); South Oxon Food & Education Academy, working with people not in employment, education or training (NEETs); retired local residents; local families with young children; & ad hoc groups.

We are a Community Action Group, and a member of 'Healthy Abingdon'. We are always open to new participants and projects, and we actively seek to involve local residents and groups.

Our work since 2016 Since opening over two years ago, we have run open Wednesday work sessions to establish a flourishing community space, using the principles of permaculture (earth care, people care, fair share), and learning by doing.

With our participants, we have achieved a huge amount. We have run projects to create:- A thriving vegetable patch and a fruit cage; composting bins; 2 polytunnels (one now houses a tropical forest garden!); 2 nature ponds; an accessible compost toilet; a straw bale shelter; a cob pizza oven & a wind turbine to provide electricity (and more!).

All of our activities teach participants about sustainable, organic gardening and we are creating a thriving pocket of biodiversity. Equally important to the mission of the garden, and underlying the educational work, is our aim to build selfconfidence and social cohesion for all participants. It's a beautiful site, with potential to extend our reach to further local residents and social groups.

Impact in the Community Our work is about bringing together groups who may not normally come into contact, who can then work towards shared objectives, and in doing so begin breaking down social barriers. We also build an appreciation of biodiversity, sustainable horticulture and land conservation.

We employ two freelancers to run the garden activities. Our weekly Wednesday sessions are run by our Garden Coordinator, Richard Seamark. We have also employed a freelance fundraiser, Naomi Hope, to support the financial sustainability of the garden.

After the success of last year's fete and festival, we will again have a fun-filled fete for the afternoon and live music starting at 5pm. This year's fete has a Wild West theme, with pony rides, a bucking bronco and lots of cowboy and cowgirl themed games (sling-a-stetson, crush-a-critter, hurl-a-horseshoe . . .) We're pleased that the football club will be running the penalty shoot-out again this year to raise funds for the club; if there are any other local groups who would like a stall on the day please let us know.

Public Art Installation - Working Group

Dear Editor,

High Street

Please give this a quick read, as I'm appealing to people to come together to form a working group to decide about public art projects in our village.

One of the benefits of having new houses in our village is that we have been able to claim money from the developers for artistic improvements to enhance the attractiveness of our surroundings.

This money has come through from Section 106 of the 1990 Town and Country Planning Act, in which the Govt stipulates that a certain percentage of the profit of all new builds must be given back to the community to enhance the area, ie:- traffic calming, tree planting, community building improvements, new community buildings, recreational areas, or in our case, art installations.

This can take the form of anything from an artistic poster showing the cycle routes and footpaths in the village, to sculpture or wrought iron gates, mosaics, stained glass, timberwork, or whatever takes your fancy. **The possibilities are endless**.

To help guide us through this maze, we have a lovely lady on board, with the slightly intimidating title of the Vale of the White Horse Arts Officer, but who's very approachable and keen to help. I shall invite her to attend our first meeting, to show us what can be done. It's to be held on **April 26th**, **(that's a Friday)**, **7pm**, **Caudwell Day Centre**.

In our case, the amount is considerable. We have already received £22,407 and we've £59,100 to come. More information will be imparted at the meeting which I hope you will attend. You might say that this money would be put to better use for our school or elderly people in the village etc., but the fact is that as the law stands, if we don't use the money for the use for which it is intended, **then it goes back to the developer**. And I'm sure none of us want to see that!

So if you would like a say in the use to which our funds can be put **please get in touch with me** so I know roughly how many to expect. We already have a Steering Group with two other members of the Parish Council: Shane McAleavey and Tamsin Crane, and I'm looking for your additional support.

Just hold one idea: if you don't come along to the meeting, don't complain if a giant inflatable giraffe goes up on the Manor Farm site. You have been warned!

MOVING WITH THE TIMES Derek Pooley



EXPRESSWAY UPDATE



As mentioned in the Christmas Chronicle, I had the opportunity to go to an invitation-only **consultation event with Highways England** late last year, as the delegate of Drayton's Parish Council. Space precluded too much depth in the Christmas Chronicle.

The local councils have recently declared a climate emergency, so I thought it appropriate to provide a **more detailed update** here.

In summary: the above image is the biggest concern of mine, taken from their 'Strategic Study Stage 3 Report'. The red you see on the diagram is the amount of extra HGV traffic that the Expressway should create (blue is a decrease). The A34 past Drayton should see an extra 1,300,000 HGV movements per year (when the A34 goes down, they would be looking at coming straight through Drayton). This will have a considerable impact on carbon emissions and air quality here.

Consultation

The event was structured as a 'walk-in', with three tables of 'experts' (road construction, environmental issues, traffic planning) for detailed discussion. I did my homework (the Environmental Appendix to the Corridor Assessment Report alone is 525 pages long!) and was armed with plenty of questions.

Important ones included: Why is a link-road between Oxford and Cambridge using the A34 south of Didcot; it's not exactly on the direct route? (The first objective of their Business Case is: "Provide an attractive and efficient route for strategic car and freight movements between the East of England, South West England and South Wales, releasing pressure on the alternative M25 and M5-M42-M6 National corridors" – so, its real purpose is to provide an outer M25). Traffic projections show the road is expected to induce an extra 1.3 million HGV journeys per year. How is this expected to ease congestion or improve quality of life?

Any closure of the A34 for upgrade or accident will lead to all that traffic going through Drayton as it stands. Are there any plans to alleviate that? How much disruption would be caused locally by upgrading the A34 and other works?

Oxford (and the area around) is perennially jammed in the first place, and this won't help matters. How is it going to help anyone to rapidly convey people from one traffic jam around Cambridge to another one around Oxford?

Does anyone really need this megaproject instead of, for example, targeting upgrades to the local road network around Oxford and around Cambridge, accelerating the EW Rail link, and upgrading the A420 to Swindon to provide a faster, cheaper and more targeted way of getting a science-and-engineering Arc?

The flood risk projections take into account <u>only reservoirs</u> <u>constructed before 1975</u>. What about the huge 150,000,000 cubic metre reservoir, the second largest in England and by far the largest ever constructed on a flat plain, planned to be a couple of hundred metres off the A34 and to be constructed at the same time?

Overview Brief

They have selected down to 'Corridor B1' (west of Oxford, up to the M40 at Junction 9) or 'Corridor B2' (south of Oxford from Abingdon straight to the M40 at Junction 8). They're intending to plan out three routes on each of the Corridors for later assessment.

Answers to my questions were unavailable, but I was directed to the 'expert' tables. The representative did say that the ones on "Why is a link-road going south of Oxford?", "How will it help to convey people from one traffic jam to another?" and "Does anyone need this megaproject instead of targeted smaller ones" would be unanswerable here; those decisions are made at Ministerial level.

Road Construction

There's not yet been a decision as to whether or not to widen the A34. If they do, they will try to avoid actually closing the A34; narrowing lanes for roadworks and using a speed limit would be done instead. I pointed out the importance of the A34 to local residents, given the limitations of the local road network, and they took that away as a key point. I also pointed out that whenever the A34 goes down, all that traffic would be going through Steventon and Drayton.

There were **no specific plans** to provide alternative local roads to alleviate traffic from a jammed A34.

They hadn't taken into account the Reservoir and would need to consult further with Thames Water. As well as potentially changing all the flooding calculations, the enormous mass of water pressing down on the Vale's clay floor may cause further problems.

Environmental Issues

The big one here was **the Reservoir** – especially the flood issue. They had assumed that it was unlikely to be built. They rolled out the floodplain maps and confirmed that the location was indeed in a flood-risk area. They would "take away the issue and work on it".

Traffic Planning

They said that their time reduction estimates and traffic projections were "indicative" and not yet solidly based. They seemed surprised at my knowing about the induced HGV traffic (I'd printed out the relevant diagram and specifics from their own 'Strategic Study Stage 3 Report') and had no answer for the question of how badly this will jam up the A34, other than to say that things were at such an early stage that they might avoid the A34 entirely (so where would they go instead?).

We discussed linking to the A420 (and upgrading it) rather than the A34 and how that would be better at "improving connectivity between high tech clusters", and waiting to see the benefits of the EW Rail link between Oxford and Cambridge. We discussed the possibility that the OxCam Expressway could be obsolete when it entered operation, due to technology change in, for example, autonomous cars, and they accepted that.

Overall

I was heartened by their willingness to engage in more public consultation, and (apparent) willingness to take away our suggestions. I'm more cynical over how much the Government-level decision-makers will take them on board.

I remain, if anything, <u>less convinced of the need for this road</u>. It would be better to deliver targeted local improvements, an acceleration of the East-West Rail link, and a potential upgrade of the A420. There's already a planned upgrade of the A428 between Cambridge and Milton Keynes to go along with these. They would deliver greater benefits more rapidly, at far lower cost, and with far less disruption and environmental impact.

GARD Report

Affinity Water publish their plan for consultation - reservoir partnership with Thames Water is the 'preferred option'. Affinity Water published their revised draft Water Resources Management Plan 2019-2024 (known as rdWRMP19) on 1st March. The consultation on this plan runs until 26th April.

As expected, Affinity confirm that their 'preferred plan' is to partner Thames Water in constructing the 'mega-reservoir' next to our villages. They would take an approximately 1/3 share, and the plan proposes to start in 2025, and have the reservoir ready by 2037-8.

Affinity have no better case for needing the water from this reservoir than Thames Water. By their own admission, they have other possible sources of supply (water transfers to their Hertfordshire customers either from the Anglian Water network. or from Severn-Trent Water via the Grand Union canal from the River Trent). These water sources would be available earlier than the reservoir. Affinity have chosen to prefer the reservoir first, for the same cynical reasons as Thames: to build up a huge water surplus in the 2040s and 2050s that they can sell-on by 'transfer' to other water companies in the South-east. The analysis by GARD shows that the requirements of Affinity can be met by very simple and cheap schemes and improving leakage (sounds familiar?), until at least the 2060s.

GARD will be responding to Affinity, and making a very strong objection. CPRE Oxon have already come out against this and we hope to co-ordinate our response with local organisations.

We urge all residents to make a strong response objecting to this, and re-iterating our call for a Public inquiry before this plan is accepted. YOU can find out more about the plan at https://stakeholder.affinitywater.co.uk/water-resources.aspx

Affinity have said they are keen to engage with our local concerns and hear them, but so far they have only invited GARD along to the Stakeholders' meeting on 11th April. We hope to press for greater Oxfordshire organisations participation.

We should make sure the Oxfordshire voice is heard by this Hertfordshire water company. The local individual objections to Thames Water's plan made up one third of all individual responses sent in. We must try and dominate the Affinity consultation in the same way. Ofwat slam Thames Water and Affinity Water business plans put them 'in the slow lane' for approval.

As was widely reported in the press, Ofwat, the water regulator, has issued a damaging report on several water companies' business plans and said they are not fit for purpose. Foremost amongst these are Thames Water and Affinity, who have not received approval to proceed. This affects the prospects of the reservoir being approved. Whilst it is not, in itself, something that would lead to the reservoir plans being taken off the agenda, it is a setback, and GARD, and local political groups, should push hard to take advantage of this.

Part of Ofwat's criticism is that they do not believe that these two companies have sound enough finances to take on the huge debts of building a huge reservoir project (or any other grand scheme, it seems).

Also, Ofwat have announced that the companies will be given the ability to raise large sums of money (in some cases over £100M) from customers' bills in order to carry out a proper study of the strategic water resource options for the South-east. This includes proper comparisons of reservoirs, water transfers from the west, and desalination plants.

Whilst GARD has been pressing for many years that such proper studies should be done (Thames Water have been trying to avoid this ever since losing the 2010 Public Inquiry), we are concerned that the amount of money raised should not be a burden to consumers, should be efficiently and appropriately spent, and should be subject to proper public scrutiny at the end. We are not clear that this is the case, and we have a meeting with Ofwat in London on 3rd April, where we will be asking many questions. We will keep everyone informed.

GARD Annual General Meeting -- will be held on Tuesday 30th April at 7.30pm in the Millenium Room of Steventon Village Hall. The meeting will include an update on the Reservoir situation, and our discussions with Ofwat. We are always looking for new committee members, so if you would like to join the committee, (our membership has grown considerably), please contact Deborah Bennett (sec), at gard.secretary@gmail.com

County Council

Given everything that is happening or is soon to happen locally and nationally, I am going to focus

on a big issue for everyone in this division, but one which has nothing to do with Brexit or local elections (Ed's note – Well done Sir!). It is the Thames Water (TW) proposal for a new above ground Reservoir between Steventon, Drayton, Marcham and East Hanney. This proposal is the THIRD such proposal since 1990. The last two were turned down. TW are now arguing that the water is needed to supply much of the South East of England – it will supply little, if any water to Oxfordshire.

There are 3 threads to the argument :-

The first concerns **the Science**. Is a Reservoir needed at all? The last TW proposal, in 2007, was turned down emphatically because the case for need had not been met by TW. Would water transfer or desalination be a cheaper solution to water need? In the end, it is the scientists who must provide an answer - not just TW's own scientists, but the well-funded and top level scientists from GARD (Group against the Reservoir).


The second concerns **the Law** – in particular, the planning process which has to answer the question – Is this the best place for a Reservoir? And what are the implications for traffic and the environment?

There is, however, a third issue which is often overlooked and unappreciated. It is **the Politics** surrounding the whole proposal. And it is the politics which worry me almost more than anything. The way that the legal process works at present is that TW first approaches the regulator OFWAT with its proposal. There is every reason for TW to want a reservoir – **they will own it**, and it will sit on their balance sheet giving them a major capital asset against which they can borrow. **It will be paid for**, as will the cost of all public consultation (glossy brochures etc) by **TW ratepayers**. At the 2007 TW proposal, OFWAT allowed TW to raise £45m from ratepayers – about half of which was used to pay for legal fees to fight TW's case. When it came to a full legal enquiry, Councils trying to fight the proposal clubbed together to pay for legal representation. They managed to raise less than £1m - paid for through Oxfordshire residents' council tax.

While water companies own assets that ratepayers pay for, and while legal fees on both sides are paid for by ratepayers and council tax payers, there is <u>little disincentive</u> for water companies to keep trying their luck every few years.

<u>In France</u> I understand that the state owns the assets such as reservoirs. Private companies are employed by the state to run such assets. <u>Is this not a better, fairer, more sensible system</u>?

Investment scams

The Financial Conduct Authority (FCA) is warning people aged 55 and above to take the time to check that investment 'opportunities' are legitimate before handing over their money. On average victims of investment fraud each lost £32,000 last year, with a fifth of over 55s and a third of over 75s believe that they've been targeted by an investment scam in the past five years. There's an FCA Warning List https://www.fca.org.uk/scamsmart/warning-list - which is an interactive tool to check for firms that the FCA knows are operating without its authorisation. If you don't have online access, consider asking a trusted family member to do this for you, or get professional advice. FCA advice to avoid being a victim of investment fraud is to: -

- 1) Reject unsolicited contact about investments;
- 2) Before investing check the FCA Register to see if the firm or individual you are dealing with is authorised, and also check the FCA Warning List of firms to avoid;
- 3) Consider seeking professional, impartial, advice before

Shed and garage security

As a result of recent shed and garage break-ins the police have issued the following advice:-

Keep your shed/garage in good condition with a close shackled padlock fitted to the door.

Fittings should be bolted through the door and any screws concealed - it's easy to unscrew the ironmongery, steal contents and, in some cases, replace the screws to make it look as if the shed hasn't been tampered with.

By using tamper-proof screws or coach bolts, together with a good-quality pad bar, or hasp and staple, and a closeshackled padlock you will make it harder for thieves.

Prevent easy removal of window glass by using mastic. Fit grilles or mesh to windows to slow down the thief.

Ensure all equipment and tools are locked away when not in use. Ensure ladders are locked to a secure fixture so they can't be used to reach upper windows.

Chain large items, such as bicycles, together to make it much more difficult for a thief to carry them away.

Fit a wire cage inside the shed or garage, where more expensive items can be locked away.

Post-code or mark all property such as lawnmowers, bikes and tools with ultra-violet pens, engravers or forensic marking such as Selecta DNA or SmartWater.

Install a shed/garage alarm.

Install security lighting as a deterrent and use plants like thorny shrubs to act as a barrier at potential access points.

When building a shed put it where it's most visible to you and neighbours.

New 'brushing' scam

This type of fraud involves Amazon sellers setting up an account in a stranger's name, then sending their products to the unsuspecting recipient. The account that's been set up is then used by the fraudster to write fake 'verified reviews' in an attempt to improve their seller ratings. If this happens to you it should be reported to Amazon and you should change your password and order a new credit card. It's likely that your personal information will be been involved in a data breach. To check if this might be the case, visit https://haveibeenpwned.com, which is a website that tells you whether your data has been part of a breach.

Identity theft is a serious threat. Once a criminal has access to your personal information they can do anything from opening an account in your name and running up debt, to using it to obtain copies of your official documents.
