CHRISTIAN AID WEEK 12-18TH MAY 2019

I remember, as a child, my Grandmother telling me that "charity begins at home". I also remember thinking "so if it begins at home, where does it go to and where does it end?" There are numerous charities, all having specific interests. You can probably think of a few straight away. You may regularly donate to a charity special to you. There are particular times and events when charities will want to highlight their work and fundraising. Every year in May the charity Christian Aid has one week where it aims to do just that. It is a charity that has seventy years of experience helping those at home, wherever that is, and overseas. Christian Aid campaign for change to tackle the root causes of poverty and challenge the systems that keep people poor. It works in thirty-seven countries with people of all faiths and none, to stand up for dignity, equality and justice. Christian Aid believes in life before death and are part of a global movement for change, particularly poverty, which also includes climate change.

There are many disaster appeals due to the effect of climate on people living in poverty. The most immediate disaster has been in south east Africa where two million people have been affected by cyclone Idai. There are, at the same time, Christian Aid appeals for those affected by the Tsunami in Indonesia, floods in Kerala, South Asia floods, affecting almost seventeen million people, not forgetting the Syria crisis.

Christian Aid week is an important and busy time to raise awareness and funding for the challenges of charity beginning at home and spreading out to reach our neighbours near and far. The motivation is of human nature, of wanting to help those less fortunate than ourselves, and it is also a Christian one, by following what Jesus taught and did.

It was later dismantled, renovated and put in the Chiltern open air museum where it was brought back to life. Off to Boulters Lock where they painted the telephone boxes, especially to blend in with the riverside.

At Cookham there is a blue cottage with a sign that says Don't Park and All Fighting to be Over by 10.pm. Yes, it was near the pub and the owner was fed up with being disturbed by the inebriated customers.

Next. we visited the lovely town of Windsor which has many curiosities including two stations and an unusual house which leans over. Built in the 1600's, but the beams were a bit green and, as they dried, pulled the house over.

In Eaton you will find a post box with a vertical post slot. Five were made in the 1860's but didn't catch on.

In Thame, always worth an outing on a Tuesday for the lovely market, there are many ghost signs which are one sign painted over the other but the old sign still shows through.

WESTMINSTER LETTER Ed Vaizey MP

Some very good news - the Government have announced a £218million investment in roads and bridges for southern Oxfordshire. This is not only great news for South Oxfordshire and the Vale of White Horse but for the whole of Oxfordshire. This is a great example of how councils working together with local businesses.



community groups and residents can submit a significant bid to the Government resulting in success.

A number of constituents have contacted me with their concerns about the proposed change in Scanning services available at the Churchill Hospital in Oxford: the service was previously provided by Oxford University Hospital Trust but it was recently announced that NHS England had accepted a tender from a private provider InHealth to run the services. Whilst in principle I do not oppose competitive tendering for medical services I am concerned about the handling of this tender process by NHS England. I wrote to NHS England to ask for an explanation and I am pleased the decision is now under review. No changes will be made to the current PET-CT service at the Churchill while this process is ongoing.

In Parliament Brexit continues to be the issue that dominates both the headlines and Parliamentary time. As I write this column some weeks in advance of its publication it is difficult to predict where we will be when you read this. I will continue to support the Prime Minister's efforts to secure a workable withdrawal agreement and, if need be, vote to increase Parliamentary control of the process to avoid a no deal exit. I provide regular Brexit updates via email so please do contact my office if you would like to be added to that list.

In the constituency I have enjoyed visiting the Didcot Railway Centre for the unveiling of their new train (by none other than Prue Leith), Wallingford Museum, and the reopening of the recently renovated The Extraordinary Hare Pub in West Hendred. I have also met with GPs in Didcot, taken a walking tour along the A420 to see first-hand residents' concerns, and been campaigning alongside local colleagues for the Council elections.

PARISH COUNCIL REPORT

Report of the Annual Parish Assembly held on Mon 18th March 2019 and the Parish Council meeting held on 1st April 2019.

APA - Mon 18th March

The Annual Parish Assembly is the meeting where the Parish Council reports on its activities over the past year. It is also an opportunity for the various clubs, societies, and other organisations in the village to tell us what they have been up to as well.

A very brief summary of the Parish Council's work in 2018/19 would include the following:

- appointment of new Parish Clerk and 2 new councillors
- new Public Art Working Group and new Allotment Working Group set up
- new Children's playground opened at Walnut Meadow
- village footpaths maintained and allotments supervised throughout year
- consecration of additional area of burial ground pending
- extension of Conservation Area pending
- tree-planting carried out in Hilliat Fields
- other village trees assessed for safety and pruned
- illegal 'For Sale' signs removed
- Community Speedwatch maintained
- Litter removed from village by caretaker throughout the year
- Neighbourhood Action Groups held in Drayton Village Hall
- Meetings held with Miller Homes/JLES re Walnut Meadow site
- Pre-School/Nursery class project progressed with OCC
- 43 Planning Applications considered
- Grants made to various community bodies, including DAMASCUS

Reports were received from the Chairman, and the Chairs of the various sub-committees: Projects Board, Planning, Finance & Personnel, Rights of Way, Leisure & General Purposes.

Further reports were received from the following Drayton Community organisations:

- Drayton Art Group (David Icke)
- FODSA (Friends of Drayton School Association) Fundraising (Tamsin Meredith)
- DAMASCUS Youth Group (Roxy Elford and James)
- Allotments (Tim Atkins Allotment Warden)
- Community Garden (Richard Seamark)
- Drayton Football Club (Pete Ivey)

Our County Councillor, Richard Webber, also gave a report on the issues currently being dealt with by OCC. Of particular interest were the highways/traffic calming proposals which formed part of the Neighbourhood Plan. Drayton has a substantial sum of money earmarked for these, but there are many stages to go through before work can commence — design, costing, phasing, and of course, further consultation with residents.

Parish Council meeting - 1st April

Richard Webber reported from the recent full meeting of OCC at County Hall in Oxford. He said that there were two main items on the agenda. One was the Oxford-Cambridge Expressway, which apparently has the support of many councillors in the ruling party. The other item was the declaration by the Council of a Climate Emergency, reflecting worldwide concern about the effects of climate change. OCC recognizes the urgency of taking steps now that will reduce carbon emissions. Drayton residents will note that there is a more than slight contradiction between these two projects.

If the Expressway is built, it will massively **add to** vehicle emissions, because the number of large freight-carrying lorries is expected to increase dramatically (see Andy Cooke's articles in previous issues of the Chronicle). There seems little sense in pursuing this hugely expensive road building exercise at the same time as the Government plans to restore a rail link between Oxford and Cambridge. As the road is also planned to generate another million houses along its route (which will presumably clog up most of the extra road capacity as soon as it is complete), the incompatibility of the scheme with any serious attempt to limit climate change is even more marked. A lively debate ensued in the Parish Council.

PARISH COUNCIL REPORT

The Chairman and Councillor Colin Arnold reported on their planned meeting with JLES and Miller Homes on 2nd April. The representatives from Millers failed to show up, claiming misunderstanding, but the morning was not wasted and we received detailed feedback from JLES on what they have been doing on the Walnut Meadow site. Their reports and surveys are verv comprehensive, but although they were engaged by Millers specifically to sort out the many outstanding problems with the ground works on the site, it seems that Millers are effectively preventing them from acting on their findings. We will arrange another date to meet with Millers shortly.

has exceeded her target by raising £1175. Without the kind sponsorship from friends and family, she could not have achieved this.





Not sure how Drayton ranks in the Recycling league tables but here are Top Tips from Greenpeace for using less plastic and cutting down our personal plastic footprints (better for the oceans than filling up the green bins for recycling – who knows exactly where it all goes when it leaves our front gardens?)

The idea would be that we refill our existing plastic bottles of laundry liquids (detergents and conditioners), washing up liquids, hand soaps etc. instead of buying new plastic containers each time. Helping the environment and we wouldn't need to get the car out to do it either! A not-for-profit social enterprise organization based in Oxford is able to supply the products — which are environmentally-friendly, vegan-friendly, use high quality ingredients and are competitively priced.

Neighbourhood Action Group 5 Safety Corner

Can the police be trusted?

A Didcot resident was the victim of a particularly convincing scam recently. Fraudsters had visited her, saying that the police were involved in a scam and that her help was needed with undercover work to identify corruption in the police and in banks. When the police called to visit the woman, to tell her she was a victim, she wouldn't be persuaded and thought that the police officers concerned were involved in the scam. The police then resorted to posting plain-clothed officers outside the woman's house and they followed her to where she was meeting the person to hand over the money. It was only at that point that she began to realise she had been duped. The police will never ask a member of the public for this sort of assistance.

A local man was asked to buy £1,500 of gift vouchers from Argos and then read the voucher numbers over the phone to the fraudster, who said that they were invalid and suggested he try again with the same amount of Wilko vouchers. Once again the victim was told that the numbers he read out were invalid and that he should go to the bank and withdraw the cash. It was only when the alarm was raised by bank staff that the scam was picked up and, luckily, the victim did not lose his cash.

Fraudsters usually target people who live alone. If you have friends, relatives or neighbours who are elderly or vulnerable they are amongst those most likely to be the targets of scams. Please tell them about the two described above and stress that they should never use an organisation's telephone number that's been provided to them by a caller at the door, during a phone call, in a letter or an e-mail. They should look up the number themselves and make the telephone call using a different phone from the one on which they received the call.

Finally, if you are the victim of a scam or know someone who is, please report it to the police. Don't be embarrassed. You'll be helping the police to prevent it happening to someone else.

Garden equipment and tool thefts

There have been thefts in both Sutton Courtenay and Drayton over the past few weeks and the numbers of shed and garage break-ins continue to be high. Padlocks and bolts can be cut through quickly and residents are urged not to keep valuable items in insecure sheds and garages. If you do store things in a shed consider using a shed alarm, motion sensor padlock and dusk-to-dawn

lighting, which are all effective deterrents. Mark tools or equipment clearly, in large text, with your postcode using an indelible pen such as Cre-mark (available online). It will not only make items less attractive to thieves, but it will also ensure that, should your property be recovered by the police they can quickly and easily identify the owner. You can download Thames Valley Police's FREE Home Security https://www.thamesvalley.police.uk/SysSiteAssets/me dia/downloads/thames-valley/advice/home-securityguide.pdf. If you don't have online access you might consider asking a friend, neighbour or family member to download and print the Guide for you.

Construction sites have also been targeted, with container locks being cut through and large sections of the sides of containers being cut out in order to remove the contents.

Recipe at the Back

Bran Loaf

1 cup All Bran
1 cup milk
1/2 cup soft brown
sugar
1/2 cup sultanas
1/2 cup glace cherries
(or 1 cup mixed dried fruit
instead of the above 2
ingredients)
1 cup SR flour



Method

Soak All Bran in the milk until soft in a large bowl, then add all the ingredients, sieved flour folded in last! Spoon into a lined, greased loaf tin and bake in oven at 130C-150C for 45 minutes or until cooked. A skewer should come out clean when it's ready. Best served with butter. Enjoy!
