PARISH COUNCIL UPDATE



Dear Drayton residents,

New Councillors: I am happy to announce that at the July and August parish council (PC) meetings four residents were co-opted as councillors – being a mix of newcomers and some longer-term residents. This means we now have a full

complement of 11 councillors.

Walnut Meadows/Miller Homes: the PC is aware of the ongoing issues at this development, and is actively working (alongside the District and County Councils) to ensure these are resolved satisfactorily as soon as possible. A meeting is scheduled with Miller Homes and VOWH next week to discuss status and action items.

Blue Cedar/Halls Close: Blue Cedar is pursuing an appeal to remove the planning permission condition which requires that 11 of the 28 houses should be designed specifically for, and available only to, the over-60s. As the PC originally approved the planning application specifically on the basis that housing would be provided for older people, the PC has again formally objected to the proposed change. We await the decision.

Infrastructure: in response to requests for a pedestrian crossing on the High Street, the PC has formally proposed this to the responsible body – Oxford County Council. We will report back in due course on where and when it will be installed. The PC has also asked OCC to consider certain traffic calming measures, and Richard Webber has reported that these are under consideration.

Public Transport Liaison Representative: many thanks to Daniel Scharf for his many years acting as the PC's public transport liaison representative, in his valiant efforts to get our village moving! One of our new councillors Irma Vastakaite is now taking on this role, and will liaise with bus companies and other authorities to try to ensure a timely bus service.

Abingdon Reservoir/GARD: Thames Water/Affinity Water's plans to develop the Abingdon reservoir are still ongoing, as is GARD's campaign. Derek Stork of GARD gave an update at the August meeting; the key point being that Dr Therese Coffey MP (Parliamentary Secretary of State for Environment and Rural Life Opportunities), indicated at a parliamentary debate in July that the reservoir was likely to receive "a warm welcome". The PC has joined GARD and other organisations to make a Freedom of Information request to understand on what basis Dr Coffey made this comment, so we are in possession of all relevant facts to understand fully and properly assess the impact (whether positive or negative) for Drayton.


Village "look and feel": having moved from a big city, I personally cherish living in a village, and am keen like others to maintain its rural feel as much as possible. Residents have made interesting suggestions to the PC about wild meadows, herb planting, encouraging bees, and the PC welcomes volunteers to help develop and organise these ideas. On a similar topic, the PC gets a lot of emails about untidy grass verges. In fact, Oxford County Council is responsible for cutting verges that adjoin any public highway, and you can report problems to OCC online via "fixmystreet". The PC is responsible for grass cutting at the village green, the PC burial ground, the Lockway playground, the Lyford Close BMX track, the village hall football pitch, and some areas on Sutton Wick Lane. Our caretaker keeps these in good shape but please do let us know if anything looks untidy.

The PC is aware that the Sutton Wick pond is looking a bit sad, and so we are investigating if and how it can be improved. The VOWH is carrying out a "deep clean" in the village on 28 November – 4 December which involves litter picking, sweeping and removing weeds/moss on pavements. Please let us know if there are any particular areas we should highlight to them.

Admin matters: The next Parish Council meeting will be on Monday 2 September at 7.30 pm, in the Caudwell Day Centre in Gravel Lane (behind the bus shelter at The Green, across from the Post Office; the Day Centre is at the far end, only limited parking, so do please walk or cycle if you can). All residents are welcome to attend. To contact any members of the Parish Council, all enquiries should be directed to the Parish Clerk, Lorraine Watling; she may be contacted at clerk@draytonpc.org or 07909 176061, and will ensure that messages are passed on to the right people.

has been involved with the Chronicle for over 35 years, she was originally just an agent but quickly became part of the team running the Chronicle Lottery. In those days the tickets were a two part affair with one part being given to the purchaser and a counterfoil on which agents had to write the customers details. Each of these counterfoils then

had to be folded and placed in a suitable receptacle, when this process had been completed the receptacle was taken to a variety of locations around the village for the draw to be made.

Another responsibility that Trudi undertook was to be an observer to ensure that the draw was carried out correctly and in accordance with the rules. The rules also required there to be a minimum of three people present when the money was being counted and ensure that the income matched the ticket sales. For the last few years the draw and money counting operation has been carried out on Trudi's dining table. This continued right up to the last ever draw in July.

August Council Report...In the current atmos-



phere, it is very difficult to understand what might happen next. Almost everyone has their very own prediction of how things will turn out. Most of the predictions range between gloomy and utter despair. In order to cheer ourselves up, some friends and I played a game of "determined optimism" where each of us had to come up with three good things which could happen in the next year and how they might be achieved. It is a game I recommend to

everyone, but the problem is that we all wished the world to be in different places so it is by no means a guaranteed way of spreading peace and harmony.

At VWHDC, what to do with the Local Plan is occupying everyone's minds. Much will depend on the HIF grant (£250m) and whether or not this will be guaranteed if either SODC or VWHDC were to decide to withdraw their plans in order to modify them. For VWHDC, this is particularly critical as their Plan is dependent on the delivery of "Valley Park, Didcot". Without the HIF money, OCC cannot afford the road improvements needed to deliver it. OCC would then be compelled to object to the plan which might then fail. In which case, the whole Vale would be back to coping with speculative development all over the District.

No-one wants that and we are all waiting for some clarity from Government. Unfortunately for Oxfordshire, Government is rather preoccupied at present so maybe to keep calm and sane, I will continue to play the "determined optimism" game.

Councillor Andy Cooke... First off – my apologies



for missing out a report last month. I sent it in after the deadline: my mistake entirely (I had a bunch of similar deadlines at work and for family matters and I confused them).

Housing enforcement is very much on everyone's mind in the Council, and I think Drayton is one of the places where we've had it worst. We're sick and tired of delays to agreed provision and infrastructure, and

the way too many developers seem to casually ignore their requirements. I am personally very much in favour of controlled house-building: the house prices we see around here, caused by scarcity, price our children out of the market, which is why I was delighted by Drayton passing its Neighbourhood Plan and setting up controlled building – but if the Plan is bypassed, and if developers fail to deliver what was promised, residents will very naturally and rightly get angry and disillusioned with the entire thing.

The new Administration is making it very clear that we expect and require enforcement action to be taken. Yes, we recognise that it can and will take time, but if we don't start, it'll take forever. The planning guidance for enforcement is being beefed up with a presumption towards action (I know this for a fact; they let me draft big chunks of it...). We also want existing Neighbourhood Plans (such as our own) to be given more "teeth" and weight in the Local Plan and future planning decisions.

Included in this is the strong guidance that the Council will fight speculative attempts at planning erosion, such as the Blue Cedar attempt to erode the planning conditions that they managed to bull through on appeal at the site behind Halls Close.

As an aside, more and more people have been getting annoyed at the overgrown verges. While this is a County Council area, I conferred with Richard Webber who clarified that OCC are now only funded for one cut per year and tend to aim to make it later in the year – but if it's getting dangerous (and, in some places, it is), you can flag it up on fixmystreet.com and it has to be actioned.

Full Council met on the 17th of July and passed a number of actions and resolutions. Important amongst them were the establishment of a Climate Emergency Advisory Committee (declaring a Climate Emergency is all well and good, but you actually have to *do* something about it) and a motion to oppose the proposed Expressway - and use the funding to accelerate and enhance and electrify the East-West Rail link and improve local transport infrastructure.

Readers of the Chronicle will know my long-standing scepticism over the "Ox-Cam Expressway" (which apparently needs to use the A34 and pass by Drayton and Milton, which seems rather the long way around for something sold as linking Oxford and Cambridge...), and will be unsurprised that my maiden speech was in support of the motion to oppose the Expressway.

It would devastate the local environment, cost many billions and provide nothing for twenty years, anyway (by which time changes in car usage and capabilities, such as autonomous cars,



could make it an expensive and damaging white elephant), and deliberately induce well over a million extra HGV movements per year up the A34 plus many extra car journeys as

well, and without upgrading local infrastructure to cope. It is, as given away in the Business Case, actually intended as a sort of outer M25 (which explains why it comes south of Oxford – it has to, to link down to the M4 and further south to the southern ports). Of course, when the A34 goes down, which is not an infrequent occurrence, that's an extra million HGVs to come through Steventon and Drayton and into Abingdon.

I do think that the Council doing everything we can to stop this deluded megaproject is very important for residents of Drayton. The negative impact of it would be huge, the increased congestion considerable, and the consequences permanent. There is so much better infrastructure we could fund that would arrive far sooner, far cheaper, and with far less impact on the environment (maybe even improving the environment).



Burglary:

Anti-social behaviour (ASB):

The team has seen an increase in reports of antisocial behaviour in the Abbey Meadows area including the outdoor swimming pool and near The Abbey Cinema. We have had reports of young people accessing the swimming pool after it has closed, putting their safety at risk. The area is being patrolled by the neighbourhood team during the evenings to try and prevent this behaviour. If you wish to ASB please call 101 or 999 in an emergency. 45 Wilsham Road, 208 Saxton Road and 140 Gainsborough Green have all had closure orders issued. The closure orders were granted following concerns around ASB and safeguarding at the properties. A closure order is issued on premises where there is a persistent nuisance or disorder and states that the premise is out of bounds to anyone accept the occupants (and in some cases a few people who are specified on the order). This is usually for a three month period. Anyone else entering the premise during the closure order can be arrested.

A survey to health-check Britain's hedgerows



The hedgerows that criss-cross our countryside are not only an iconic sight, but a vital habitat and corridor for many of our native species. However, they are becoming increasingly fragmented which is threatening the wildlife that depends on them.

So, this August, wildlife charity People's Trust for Endangered Species (PTES), is launching a new national survey, the *Great British Hedgerow Survey*, encouraging the UK to health-check the nation's hedgerows in an attempt to safeguard the future of this important habitat.

The survey offers instant feedback about the health of each hedge, as well as tailored advice on what type of management will ensure it thrives in the future. The results also provides conservationists with vital data helping build a national picture of the health of Britain's hedges.

The survey attracted the attention of BBC Countryfile, and earlier this month presenter Helen Skelton joined PTES' Key Habitats Project Officer Megan Gimber and Dormouse & Training Officer Ian White in Warwickshire, to find out why hedgerows are in need of more wide-scale management. They explained what the new survey involves and why PTES is calling for people to take part. The episode will be broadcast this Sunday 25th August on BBC One.

Who can take part?

The Great British Hedgerow Survey is aimed at landowners, farmers, wildlife groups and anyone interested in healthy hedgerows, who are encouraged to complete hedgerow health-checks online.



Landowners and farmers already assess the health of their hedges to guide their ongoing management, but by taking part in the *Great British Hedgerow Survey*, they will receive detailed and tai-

lored management advice which will introduce the idea of managing hedgerows in a cycle.

For wildlife groups and individuals, the website also provides a handy place to store and display the hedgerow data they collect. Taking part will contribute valuable information to a national dataset that will inform conservation decisions in the future.

Why should we care about hedgerows?

Historically we've lost about half our hedgerows since WWII. Although the rates of direct hedge removal have been reduced, we are still seeing the loss of hedgerows simply through the way they are managed.

Megan Gimber, Key Habitats Project Officer at PTES, explains: "With 70% of UK land being agricultural, hedgerows offer the safest route for wildlife to travel across farmland. Sadly, many hedgerows are becoming 'gappy', which fragments this amazing network, and without more sensitive management, many hedgerows are at risk of being lost altogether. This is problematic, especially when we're seeing a fall in numbers of the animals that depend on them, such as hedgehogs, bats, hazel dormice and the song thrush"



Hedgerows and wildlife facts

- One study counted 2070 different species in just one 85m stretch of hedge
- 55% of the priority species associated with hedgerows are dependent, or partially dependent on hedgerow trees
- Poor quality, gappy hedges are detrimental to several farmland bird species
- Since different shrub species flower and fruit at different times, having a wide diversity of plant species extends the flowering and fruiting period. This benefits nectar and pollen feeding invertebrates, and their predator species
- In Britain, habitat fragmentation is thought to be a limiting factor for the distribution of some species and a threat to the survival of others. Corridors play a vital role in the preservation of a number of species deemed to be 'at risk' from the impact of habitat fragmentation
- 16 out of the 19 birds included in the Farmland Bird Index, as used by government to assess the state of farmland wildlife, are associated with hedgerows.
