

Local Groups & Clubs

Drayton WIVES

This month we welcomed Captain Kamran Irani to talk to us about the work of the <u>Blood Bikers</u>. It is a nationwide Association which started in 2008 to provide free out of hours medical transportation for the NHS. Captain Irani (a retired airline pilot) went to an exhibition in London for motorbikes and was so taken with the Blood Bikes he joined them. In 2017 he became the chairman for Oxon, Bucks, Berks and Northants.

In the evenings the transfusion department of hospitals such as the John Radcliffe go to a skeleton staff, and so if any transport was needed the hospital had to pay for taxis, police, couriers etc to transport the blood, so the organisation works between 7pm & 6am and is completely voluntary.

The area covered is 1700 sq miles and there is a minimum of 3 riders each day, with 14 motorbikes and 3 4x4 vehicles for extreme weather. The motorbikes are Yamaha, BMW, or Honda, the largest being the Yamaha costing £14,500. Each bike or car has a name and it's always a lady's name, someone who has done great things in medicine.

Everything has to be paid for through fundraising, donations or sponsorship. They do have a 'Just Giving' page for donations if anyone would like to donate.

Every volunteer works from home with a common telephone number run by a controller, who makes sure the job meets the criteria for urgency and then matches up the name on the bike with the volunteer.

To qualify for the job every trainee must be over 25yrs and have an advanced riding qualification, with induction training on how to use and carry the equipment.

The other important job they do is to carry human donor milk for premature babies. These babies should only have human milk as it increases their chances of survival by 10%. This is called the Angel Programme and there have been over 400 collections in 2018. Donor milk goes out frozen and treated as urgent.

A very good talk on an interesting subject and amazingly it is run by volunteers with only donations to keep it going.

A very successful coffee morning was arranged for **Macmillan Nurses** by Liz Kidd and her helpers. It was well attended and everyone enjoyed the coffee and fabulous cakes.

DAMASCUS Ministry – Team Letter

" Remember, remember the 5th of November "

As I write, the atmosphere in Parliament seems explosive enough without the need for any fireworks. However, November is a month for remembering and sharing memories. The Royal British Legion will be fund-raising through its **Poppy Appeal** as the 11th day of the 11th month approaches.

Red poppies are the more often seen, but there are other colours too. Blue or purple poppies, used by Animal Aid, are a reminder of the sacrifice and the resource of animals in conflicts. Black poppies have been controversially used in memory of the World War I conscientious objectors. White poppies are sold today by the Peace Pledge Union, but were originally introduce in 1933 by Britain's Co-Operative Women's Guild. The Khadi poppy is the most recently introduced (2018). The intention is to recognise the contribution of the Commonwealth nations, particularly those from an undivided India, in World War I. Remembrance services will be held in the DAMASCUS Parish churches on Sunday 10th November. See details below.

Just like the weather, the Church of England has seasonal changes during the year. November is a season of remembrance. Firstly in the month is All Saints Day, when Christians celebrate those who have been an inspiration in their life of faith and an example of encouragement for others to follow Jesus.

All Saints is followed by All Souls, a special service to many who share in the loss of loved ones. It is a time to remember with thanksgiving before God, those whom we have known more directly: those who gave us life and love, encouragement or who nurtured us in faith.

November is the season for looking back to things past. It is also the ending of the Church's year. The Christian calendar starts with Advent, a new beginning, a season for looking forward and preparation. With all of these things in mind, I'm sharing my favourite prayer, used for the turning of the Millennium:-

Let there be respect for the earth, peace for its people love in our lives, delight in the good forgiveness for past wrongs and from now on a new start.

WESTMINSTER VIEW



Ed Vaizey's column (Wantage/Didcot MP; he's presently on the Commons Speaker's Advisory Panel on the Arts, also a patron of 'Kids in Museums', he is a Privy Councillor, & chairs the All Party Parliamentary Groups for Arts, Health and Wellbeing; Commercial Radio; and Creative Diversity)

I am sure that many reading this would

like an update on the latest activities in Westminster, however as I write well in advance of publication I cannot predict with any certainty what the situation will be when you read it! We may be in the throes of a general election! I regularly update my website, Facebook and Twitter pages so for more up to date news please do follow them.

Locally there have been **two major successes** in the past few weeks (I write at the beginning of October.) As the population of the local area increases so does demand for essential services. Key among these is the demand for excellent schools. Oxfordshire County Council (OCC) predicts that primary schools across the county will require an extra 25,000 places by 2031.

I was therefore dismayed earlier this year to hear that schools across Oxfordshire were having trouble expanding their facilities, in particular classroom space, to meet the increase in demand. Oxfordshire County Council (OCC) had asked the Department for Education (DfE) for permission to expand their classrooms and they were refused, on the basis that the sacrifice of playing field space at the schools would be too great.

I was asked to intervene by parents and staff of schools in my constituency; I visited one of the schools, Marcham Primary and after a **successful intervention by MPs** across Oxfordshire I was delighted to receive news last week that the applications for expansion across the county have been approved.

A further cause for **celebration** is that NHS England have confirmed that not only will **PET-Scan services** at the Churchill be protected and remain in the hands of Oxford University Hospitals (there were fears earlier this year that they may be lost to a private operator) **new scanning services** will be provided at other Hospitals serving the constituency, including the Great Western in Swindon (following intervention by Oxfordshire MPs).

Once again these issues go to show what can be achieved if communities, local councils, MPs and Government **work together** to achieve the best outcomes.

Police & Crime Bulletin

[from Matthew Barber, deputy PCC for Thames Valley]

The Home Office have announced the first tranche of police officer recruitment to meet the pledge of 20,000 new officers promised by the Government.

Thames Valley will be able to recruit an additional 183 officers in the first year of the scheme (2020-21) with figures for years two and three of the uplift scheme yet to be confirmed. Government funding for recruitment in 2020-21 will cover all associated costs, including training and kit.

This announcement follows positive conversations between the Thames Valley Police & Crime Commissioner & Govt in recent weeks and is in addition to the 209 police officers and staff supporting frontline policing (such as call handlers) announced by the PCC earlier this year.

GPS Tagging - From this month the Courts will be able to utilise a GPS tag system when bailing suspects from court. The scheme supported by the Ministry of Justice will allow courts and the police to minimise the risk of further offending and safeguard victims whilst suspects are on bail.

The courts can consider both exclusion and inclusion zones and may be combined with timing restrictions or curfews. This allows better monitoring whilst minimising the impact on the lives of individuals awaiting further proceedings. →>

WI - Life in the 20s

This letter and two others were in a box recently given to me (Ann Webb) to give more on our past as we in our local branch approach our 100th birthday.

Last month saw the original, July 1927, to Canada, and this one is their reply (there's a very different writing style!). We hope to publish the final letter in a later Chronicle, as & when space permits.

Reply to Drayton WI from Canada

Dear President & Members Of Drayton Berkshire England

The Drayton Institute, Ontario members were all delighted to be one of the first to get correspondence from England (the land of roses) and myself being a native, from Devonshire, can't really express the pleasure it gave me to receive it. I was born on the fringe of Dartmoor near Exeter but left there 30 years ago. Have been back once and spent 14 months among relatives. Promised to return in two years but two months before I intended to return my Father died (my mother having gone several years previously). So that took all my longing to return away. Enough about myself.

I have been secretary for Drayton Branch for 7 years. We belong to the West Wellington District which consists of 5 branches, viz Palmerston, Rothsay, Moorefield, Glenalley and Drayton. This year to date Drayton has 163 members. Our fee for one year is 25 cents. I don't know but I think our membership has grown little this year as we are all working for a flag - a 14ft 6inch Union Jack. Well, quite a lot to mention this month.

Firstly, and most infuriatingly, the developers at Halls Close won their appeal to the planning inspector to have planning conditions eroded, and were also awarded costs. We don't regret fighting it – it was the right thing to do.

This entire development is a legacy of the period when speculative development was rife as the Vale didn't have "a five-year land supply". This is known as "planning by appeal" - developers made speculative attempts outside of existing planning, the District Council rejected them, they appealed, and inspectors granted them simply because there is no five-year land supply.

When this happens, Neighbourhood Plans are weak and District Councils are all-but-powerless in the field of planning control. As the Halls Close development was originally put forward in that period, it was forced through at that time and the erosion of the conditions is simply a hangover of this while it would not have been granted planning permission today (as we now have a five-year land supply), the inspector noted that it had obtained planning permission at the time and decided that the conditions could therefore be removed. In effect, the developer had managed to get their foot in the door while it was ajar and we now could not prevent them from making themselves at home.

At the moment, though, we **do** have a five-year land supply, which means that attempts for new speculative developments are now far, far harder and the Vale, at last, can protect Neighbourhood Plans from these - as long as we retain that five-year land supply. We can stop them from forcing their foot in the door in future, cutting these issues off at the very start.

This brings me on to the Full Council Meeting on Oct 9th, when we debated adoption of Local Plan Part 2 (LPP2). This is supposed to be the master plan that drives and controls all development in the Vale until 2031, and Neighbourhood Plans are created to adhere to it.

It designates housebuilding and standards, controls affordable housing numbers, specifies building locations, incorporates infrastructure improvements, and governs how we meet our climate change undertakings.

The problem is that the current LPP2 was made almost under wraps, that the new administration disagrees strongly with huge chunks of it, and it leaves us in a poor position with regards to sustainable housing, affordable housing, community impacts, and environmental impacts.

The number of houses to which LPP2 commits is based on a flawed and excessive number, which ends up being doubly damaging: as the number of houses in it is too great for the builders to keep up with, our projected actual five-year housing construction decreases to below our commitment, breaking the five-year housing supply (it's currently projected to break below 5 years in 2021/22).

In addition to this, far too little notice is placed in the Plan genuinely on affordable housing amongst developments, the infrastructure improvements in it gloss over rail and public transport, and cycleways, do not do anywhere near enough to provide sustainable housebuilding (a huge amount of carbon is given off in construction; this does not need to happen), and housing developments should be (we believe) more co-located and coherent with rail and public transport systems. And so on (I can go on for hours →> (next column) on this).

→> However (and there's always a "however", isn't there?), the LPP2 is so far advanced to have been found legally sound and failing to adopt it at this stage could be very damaging. Not only have OCC threatened to withhold Housing Infrastructure essential Fund improvements to our infrastructure if anyone refuses to adopt their Local Plans, but the Government themselves have threatened to step in and force adoption if necessary (in fact, since our Council Meeting, they have attempted just that with SODC, our neighbouring council, causing uproar).

Moreover, our five-year land supply will be broken far faster if it is not adopted - within months! We are already aware of speculative developers poised to jump on some areas (I must emphasise here that there are plenty of ethical developers who work with communities and councils to produce sustainable and needed quality housing; for example, I know of villages where certain developers have worked closely with parishes to help develop their Neighbourhood Plans, and of other developers who have helped to advise both the council and myself and are intent on providing quality sustainable housing in alliance with the communities rather than chasing profit – the problem is that the ones who chase the speculative attempts tend to not be the ethical ones. The speculative grabs also discourage communities from working with development, overload existing communities, and are almost always less coherent with infrastructure). \rightarrow >

This piece was in before, but worth repeating, as YOU can make a difference! It's right to look at the dangers of engine idling and how YOU can help clean your local area's air. The Royal College of Physicians estimate 40,000 deaths a year in the UK are linked to air pollution, with engine idling certainly contributing to this.

The District Council has therefore launched an anti-idling campaign to try to help reduce vehicle emissions – encouraging people to turn their car engines off if stopped for more than a minute. It's a small and simple step that helps public health, reduces emissions, and saves money. →> We looked at the option of rewriting the Plan before adoption; but, as it turns out, **this is impossible this late in the development stage**. But if we adopt it, we can rewrite whole chunks of it and adopt an updated Plan (under our own focus, as above) in <u>two-and-a-half-years</u>. If we fail to adopt it and insist on rewriting from scratch, a fuller process is needed, which would take <u>four-and-a-half years</u>.

In circumstances where there are no good options, pilots have a saying: "Fly the crash". This means that you keep control as much as possible, and aim to minimise the impact. Or, in other words, "aim for something soft."

We concluded that regardless of what happens, we <u>shall</u> be rewriting the Plan; the question is simply how long that takes and what will happen in the meantime?

If we do adopt the existing one for now, we can rewrite it in 2-and-a-half years, maintain 5-year land supply at least until it is adopted (and, with new, plausible figures in it, aim to preserve five-year land supply indefinitely), and preserve our attempts to receive HIF funding (and Drayton's Neighbourhood Plan will have much more protection than before).

If we do not adopt it, rewriting it will take four-and-a-half years, we will not have our five-year land supply for almost all of that, opening up to speculative developers, we will be fighting about HIF funding... we would have almost no control at all.

Accordingly, we voted to 'fly the crash' and aim for something soft. The Vale will adopt LPP2 and immediately begin to rewrite it to include better and more appropriate housing, sustainable and genuinely affordable housing in concert with communities, better infrastructure, and far better principles to alleviate climate change. We anticipate a backlash over this, but it is the least-worst outcome for the people who rely on us.

And at least Drayton's Neighbourhood Plan will be protected properly in the future, and we will be protected from further speculative development.

→> After that lengthy discourse (apologies, but I do feel it's important to share as openly as possible the decision-making process, and issues with the LPP2), Council also adopted a motion to do as much as possible to help those non-UK EU members of our communities through the Brexit disruption to their lives, also a motion to move pensions into low carbon funds, and a motion to bring together (and make accountable) a variety of the organisations that influence regional development (so the likes of unaccountable and non-transparent decision-making such as the HIF cannot be done again without closer scrutiny and accountability).

Lastly, but importantly, we <u>unanimously agreed</u> to organise co-ordination meetings with Highways England and other key stakeholders to <u>press for re-routing arrangements</u> on the A34 (which frequently requires them) to avoid small roads and villages and instead to stick to primary routes wherever possible (or use contraflows if feasible); the impact of incessant heavy nightly traffic from HGVs is a blight on the lives of many.

That's all (eventually!) from me this month, take care,

Hedgehog Street

Hedgehogs hibernate through winter and need somewhere sheltered to protect them from the cold and hungry predators. Why not help a hog by building them a home in your garden?



The *Hedgehog Street* team - ran by wildlife charities the British Hedgehog Preservation Society (BHPS) and People's Trust for Endangered Species (PTES) - is urging people to **help hedgehogs by building them the perfect home**, providing a **safe haven** that's cool, cosy and comfortable.

Last year, *Hedgehog Street* launched the first ever Hedgehog Housing Census, which looked at how, when and why hedgehogs use either homemade or artificial hedgehog houses in gardens across Britain. The results show that:-

Hedgehogs **prefer homemade** houses, but artificial houses are still a good alternative if they have the right features; **they need time** to get used to a new house before they use it; **Feeding hedgehogs**, putting water in your garden & providing bedding (such as dry leaves, pet straw or both) increases the chances of a resident hedgehog moving in; they prefer houses found in back gardens, in **shaded areas**; and pets or badgers don't appear to put off a hog from moving in

County Council Report

The 'Growth Deal' >>

This has been an <u>eventful month</u> for Oxfordshire's Councils. There is much concern that the actions of one council could affect others. At its recent Council Meeting, after much anguish. VWHDC finally agreed to **adopt its Local Plan**. The good news is that, for the moment at least, the area **should be protected** from speculative planning applications which have plagued us for some years. The downside is that all Oxfordshire Councils are working towards plans with greatly increased housing numbers. Though not as bad as some, VWHDC is already slipping behind its target allocation and this could see the return of speculative planning within a very few years.

Did I say "all" Oxfordshire Councils? The **problems** of South Oxfordshire's Local Plan have been in the news on many occasions over recent years. They have been unable to agree where their housing allocations should go. Indeed, the argument has seen the disintegration of one administration and culminated in May of this year in the installation of a new one. The SODC Local Plan was always well behind the Vale's and, in the short term, they are under less threat from speculative planning. In order to make adjustments to their Local Plan, last week, their Cabinet was about to ask the Council to withdraw their plan. A simple enough decision you would have thought - but nothing in planning is ever simple.

Many months ago, Oxfordshire Councils collectively signed up to a "Growth Deal" with Government where, in return for £250m, the Councils would together deliver 100,000 new homes by 2031. In addition, OCC made a successful "HIF" (Housing Infrastructure Fund) bid for a further £150m needed to pay for a link road and river crossing from Didcot. OCC argued that this was needed if the roads supplying the many thousands of houses proposed for Valley Park, Didcot were to be built. The problem was that the VWHDC local plan depended on the successful delivery of those houses and that this government money was contingent on all Local Plans being in place.

So, (in the hope that you are still with me!), it seemed that the non adoption of the SODC Plan **could well upset the whole VWHDC Plan**. Or alternatively that Government would have to agree to a different source of funding to pay for the new link road and bridge. Last week SODC received an email from the Housing Minister, Robert Jenrick MP, "ordering that SODC must not discuss its Local Plan until he had made a decision". This notice went to all Oxfordshire Councils and the press and it raises **many questions**. Here are a few:-

- ➤ Is the Housing Minister using the right Act of parliament to justify his decision?
- > Is the VWHDC plan now in place or not?
- ➤ Given how essential it is to Government that Didcot should grow, could the money not be found from some other source?
- ➤ There has been enormous pressure from other Councils on SODC not to withdraw its local plan and accusations of bullying. Is this right?
- ➤ Is this decision a flouting of local democracy? In May, SODC residents voted in their new council in part because they did not like their local plan where does the Minister's decision leave them?

And we all thought Brexit was a complicated business!



Safety Corner - Bogus Census Group warning

Neighbourhood Watch has received reports fraudsters operating in Thames Valley who are posing as Home Office officials. They have documents with the Department of Home Affairs letterhead and claim to be confirming that everyone has a valid ID for the upcoming Census. Their true aim is to attempt to rob homes.

There is **NO SUCH INITIATIVE** of this kind from the Government. These fraudsters are moving around the area and they look presentable.

IF such criminals turn up at your door, don't let them in, call the police, and/or if there's a nearby neighbour who can quickly help, or a relative or friend, call them.

Two-factor authentication (2FA) - the easy way to keep hackers out of your accounts

The explosion in popularity of online apps and services means more and more of us need to remember an endless list of passwords. That can sometimes lead to shortcuts that are bad for our online security, such as using the same password for multiple accounts, or creating a simple password that's easy to guess.

Your important online accounts, such as e-mail or any account that holds personal or financial details, should be secured with a strong and unique password. Further protection can be gained by enabling two-factor authentication (2FA). Accounts that have 2FA enabled require you to verify your identity with your password (first factor), and then a randomised code (the second factor) that's sent to your smartphone. This means that even if your password's stolen, fraudsters will still need your phone, and if that's stolen, they'll need your password.

Passwords Advice

These hints were given a few months ago, but a reminder doesn't hurt:- Use a password comprising three random Use upper- and lower-case letters within the password (AND - most websites needing a password will grade them as being stronger if you include numbers, & 'special' characters, like # & or %, assuming they're allowed on that site).

Password managers are an excellent way to securely store passwords. BUT -- Ensure you use a unique and very strong password to access your password manager!!

If you want to write down your passwords DO ensure you store the information in a secure location! [There are cases of experienced professional people who had a password written on a yellow 'sticky' note, helpfully left on the rim of their PC screen - like leaving the car with the keys in it].

Never use public wi-fi to access your e-mail, bank or social media accounts. Never assume places such as coffee shops, hotels, restaurants, shopping centres, shops have secure sites. Always use a mobile network, such as 4G, or a VPN (virtual private network) instead.
