

From the Ministry Team:

On Sunday April 12th, Christians celebrate the oldest and most important festival of the Church: Easter.

Easter celebrates the central miracle of the Christian faith: the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead. This event changed everything. It proves that Jesus is God's Son, the ultimate ruler of the universe. It proves that God is true to his promises and purpose: to create a new world in which justice, harmony and love have the upper hand. And it offers us hope for life beyond death in the presence of God, who loves us more than we could ever imagine.

But this year it's different! Because of coronavirus, churches will be closed and there will no Easter services. Nevertheless, there are plenty of ways in which to celebrate at home, either on our own or with our immediate family.

Maundy Thursday is the day we remember Jesus' last meal with his disciples before his death. Why not do a random act of kindness. Or make a special meal or get a takeaway and eat it together with screens and mobiles off.

On Good Friday, we remember Jesus' death on a cross. Apart from eating hot cross buns, spend a few minutes at 3.00 (the time of his death) thinking about all it means. If you have a crucifix, look at it and remember that Jesus died because he thought you were worth it! He shared in the pain and suffering of the world. His death means that we can be forgiven for the ways we mess up and find the strength to forgive others.

If you have children, make an Easter garden together. Remember to pop some small Easter eggs in the tomb of your Easter garden for the children to discover. Then, early on Sunday morning, roll the stone away from the tomb to remember Jesus' resurrection. Read John's Gospel chapter 20, verses 1-18 (if you don't have a Bible, you can find this on the internet). Then enjoy a lovely breakfast. Celebrate that Jesus is risen – conquered death and offers his new life.

You can also join in with 'virtual' services. Go to **oxford.anglican.org** to find details of how.

Here is a prayer to help us through this time:

O God, help me to trust you,

help me to know that you are with me,

help me to believe that nothing can separate me

from your love revealed in Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen



It seems a life time away – before social distancing, self-isolating and lock down became the norm – there was a day when the sun shone, church bells were rung, tea and biscuits were enjoyed in a room off St Peter's church – and this picture was taken. DRAYTON WILDLIFE GROUP

Drayton's First Tree Planting Day!

A huge thank you to everyone who helped with Drayton Wildlife Group's tree planting event on 22nd Feb. The event was a great success. Despite some cold and windy weather, we had helpers aged from 1 - 80, from Drayton and beyond, turning out to help. Everyone enjoyed themselves, and we surprised ourselves by how many trees we managed to plant. The children were particularly enthusiastic and were a great help.

It may have been cold and windy but at least the recent rain meant the ground was soft and easy to dig. We planted about 60 new trees around the recreation ground by the village hall. We used a National Trust mix of mainly small hedging trees — guilder rose, hawthorn, blackthorn and crab apple, with a few bird cherry and corner where there is more room. The trees are only tiny saplings at the moment, but soon they will grow, and most are flowering trees so hopefully in a few years spring will bring a lovely display of blossom around the field. Not to mention, hopefully, songbirds singing in the branches.

In addition to the tree planting, volunteers collected four bags or rubbish, and further rubbish collecting was done later on by members of the football club, so the field should be nice and litter free now. Let's keep it that way! And by the way, dog walkers – please clean up after your dog. We collected at least 20 bags of dog poo left in the bushes, and there was plenty of unbagged muck as well. There is a bin in the lane just next to the village hall – please use that. Remember, young children are using the field.

Unfortunately, global warming is becoming ever more real, with the warm winter, wet and windy weather and floods all over the UK - though thankfully not in residential areas here. We're going to need to fight it on many fronts, but planting trees is one of the simplest solutions, and it has so many other benefits to wildlife and our own well-being too. We are hoping to plant some more trees around the village hall in Autumn, when they have finished their building works, but we could really do with more land to plant on. If we can prove that we have the landowners' permission, and there is public access, we can apply to the Woodland Trust for free trees — so if you think you may be able to provide a planting site please do let us know.

Many thanks to the Parish Council, who have been a great support and donated money for the trees and the tree guards, which are a new kind made of biodegradable plastic. Thanks also to the Village Hall and Recreation Ground Committee, Drayton Wasps Football Club, and Abingdon Carbon Cutters for their support, and to Julian Cook who came out to help get us started despite having a cold, and on his birthday!

Please look out for posters in the shops and on notice boards around the village, and on the Families in Drayton and Drayton Wildlife Group facebook pages for notices of upcoming events. Tree planting will be on hold until Autumn now, but there will be wildlife walks and other activities over the summer. Drayton Dog Walkers

Did you know that around 25% of households in Drayton have a dog?

Did you know that Drayton has a lake?

As the days get longer and the weather improves and with many new residents welcomed into the village, we thought we should spotlight some of the footpaths and bridleways you can enjoy in and around the village.

The Millennium Green:

The Millennium Green offers a circular gravelled path around the



walnut trees, with benches, a sundial and a small orchard. It is accessible on foot and by pushchair/wheelchair. There are dog poo bins at three of the access points to the Green. Do stop

and have a look in the pond - frogs and newts have been spotted.


Sutton Wick:

network of links footpaths Drayton to Sutton Wick. The footpaths follow generally ancient routes which



would have linked the settlements by the most convenient routes to its open fields. At the end of Sutton Wick Lane a

path takes you to the corner of Henleys Lane/Church Lane and another leads round the edge of fields behind the church and the allotments and onto the High Street. There are also two access points onto the Millennium Green from Sutton Wick Lane.





towards Oday Hill. Historically, this would have been an important route for farm workers accessing the fields. The

Stonehill Community Garden (Stonehill Community Garden Facebook page) can be found on Oday Hill.

Oday Hill/Drayton "Lake":

Towards the far end of Oday Hill there is footpath to your right, just before



Peep O Day Lane which talks you past Drayton lake until you

reach the Sutton Courtenay road. All this area was once a landfill site but nature has gradually reclaimed it. The lake is home to a number of species of aquatic birds.



Henleys Lane/Church Lane

From Henleys Lane a footpath takes you behind the Manor farm development and onto the end of Gravel Lane. By walking through an old metal gate you can then walk across a small triangular field and through another metal gate into a short walled path (called Love Lane) and onto the High Street.

From Church Lane you can access the village allotments via a footpath which links with the churchyard of St Peter's church. Further along Church Lane you churchyard and on through the

also walk through the parish burial ground, and by taking a path to your right and crossing the High Street you can

reach the East Way. Turning left you can eventually reach Sutton Courtenay (having crossed Milton road) or by turning right you reach the Abingdon road. The East Way is an old route linking Sutton Courtenay with Drayton.

West of Drayton

There are a number of farm tracks that lead from the village towards and across the A34 and beyond. One of these is Barrow Road (a concrete farm track). Once you have left the A 34 behind you this is a peaceful spot where deer,



skylarks and lapwings can often be spotted. n.b. please note that the footpath to Marcham Mill from is closed as the bridge is out. It


is possible to make this a circular walk, via farm tracks ending on Kiln Lane which emerges near the Wheatsheaf pub.


A bridleway opposite end of Sutton Wick Lane takes you to New Cut Mill. By taking the humped back footbridge bridge

over the river Ock you can even walk to Tesco. The bridleway also links with the dog walking field opposite the Morland Gardens development.

The new developments:

The Dovecote development has a path that links with the East Way footpath.





The Walnut Meadow development has a path which links it

with Barrow Road and with the new tarmac footpath to the end of Cornville Road.

We hope this gives you a little taste of some of the many paths around the village and apologies if your particular favourite has not been included. However, the good news is that Drayton Parish Council are planning to



produce a guide later this year, offering suggestions for local walks, indicating their length both in distance and time.

COUNTY COUNCIL REPORT Richard Webber

Water, water everywhere (but not enough to drink if Thames Water are to be believed).

Over the past 30 years, Thames Water (TW) have been arguing that, in the near future, we are going to be desperately short of water and much the best solution is a giant reservoir between Steventon, East Hanney, Drayton and Marcham. Indeed, if their predictions had been correct, we would have been facing severe drought many years ago.

To be fair (and I am struggling here), the population and global warming have been increasing steadily throughout that time and TW can argue that we need to be looking at the evidence of need yet again. But with TW's history of poor and somewhat alarmist predictions, it must be right to question their latest evidence via a public enquiry. There is evidence and science on both sides of the argument - evidence and science that needs to be argued in public.

With repeated Environment Agency flood warnings in recent months, and as I look out at muddy paths, sodden ground, full rivers and streams, with full and apparently merging lakes replacing gravel pits, drought hardly seems an immediate threat. TW and their reservoir surely have something to prove.

I confess I am not an angler or a sailor, but I can see that the recreational benefits of the reservoir are tempting. The potential nature conservation opportunity is also appealing - assuming that security issues do not forbid access to the reservoir area.

However, the overriding issue for me is undoubtedly the carbon output of building Europe's largest above ground reservoir over more than 10 years. Our chances of hitting our ambition to be Carbon neutral by 2050 would be very small if TW was to have it's way. Add in large scale housing and road development and the chances are nill.

That is why I remain implacably opposed to the reservoir – at least until TW have demonstrated for the first time in 30 years that the case for need is overwhelming and there is no better solution.

Current advice as per 15th March

I can't overemphasise enough the wash-your-hands advice. Soap destroys the structure of viruses and renders them inert, as long as you give it enough exposure to the virus to work — twenty seconds washing should be enough for this. The advice given is that the virus relies on help from the host and its potential victims in order to spread — it looks like it has to be transported by hand to face (and from there into the body through mouth or nose) in order to get in to you. If you obsessively wash your hands with soap and water or alcohol gel, it can't get in (there is a chance it *may* be able to be spread by cough droplets, but even if so, this is short range and a sort of back up route for it).

The virus can survive outside of the host for hours at a time (dependent on the surface it is on) – someone who is infected coughing on a surface or touching it with hands that have recently touched their face (close to the mouth or nose) can deposit live virus onto it – which can then be touched by someone else who could then touch their face or mouth and let it in. It does *not* penetrate skin – it has to be helped into your body, usually by touching the face near the mouth or nose.

Keeping 2 metres away from anyone who may be infected will also help (in case of cough-droplet spread). If you cough, please make sure you catch it in your armpit (NOT your hand). Whenever you touch something that could have been touched by someone else, or touch hands with someone – wash your hands as soon as you can and definitely before touching your face again (it's almost scary how often we all touch our own faces – keep track for a few minutes and you'll see).

Risks

The most at-risk groups are people with underlying health conditions (primarily heart, lungs, diabetes, hypertension, cancer) or the elderly (especially the over-seventies). These groups will need to self-isolate. Please bear in mind that if you are <u>not</u> in these groups, you could easily spread coronavirus to them.

The Parish Council are organising a volunteer network to help with those self-isolating – to pick up food, prescriptions, walk dogs, and so on. More on that from Tamsin elsewhere in the Chronicle today.

Communication

Try to make sure you keep communicating with those who need to self-isolate with them (telephone, Whatsapp, anything where people can still hear your voice) to help them deal with the prolonged isolation. Help them with getting shopping delivered — you can do this without coming into physical contact; things can be left on the doorstep and distance kept. Keep tabs on each other by phone, Whatsapp, text, Facebook, whatever you can — total isolation can be

psychologically damaging, and social interaction doesn't have to be face-to-face.

We live in an age with more and better communication than ever before. Hearing a loved ones' voice regularly, or even just getting a message, has a great positive effect — never underestimate this.

Further Support

The Local Authorities, together with the central Government are stepping up resources and support in the coming days. The "Local Resilience Forum" will make some announcements imminently on the further help to be provided (they may already have done so by the time you're reading this). They intend to link in with community groups and support springing up, especially via parish councils — so the work the Parish Council is doing will link in with this.

Main Council Buildings are being shut to the general public, but the Council are taking steps to ensure they continue to provide public services. Community centres are likely to be repurposed as key community hubs for further support.

I've said enough for now, so I'll sign off for now – and please, take care of yourselves and your families.

PARISH COUNCIL REPORT

Tamsin Crane

1. Covid-19 Action

Please see the next article which describes the Drayton Parish Council Community programme to support vulnerable groups, during the time of social distancing and self-isolation at home. We welcome any good ideas from residents about how we can help alleviate these issues.

2. Suspended Annual Parish Meeting

In light of the evolving Coronavirus/COVID-19 situation, recommendations government distancing, on 15 March 2020 the Drayton Parish Council decided to postpone the Annual Parish Meeting that was supposed to have been held on Monday 16 March 2020. The Council intends to continue to monitor the Coronavirus/COVID-19 emergency, and will reconvene the meeting at an appropriate time, in accordance with government rules recommendations. We will publish the new date, time and location on the Council's website and facebook page in due course, but expect that the meeting will be held towards the end of May.

In the meantime, please be reassured that the Council intends to continue its work, and at the reconvened Annual Parish Meeting will provide a report of its activities in 2019-2020 and note upcoming projects.

3. Updates on Village Developments

The Council's experiences with the developers Millers (Walnut Meadows), Cala (Manor Farm/Edward Park) and Bloor (Dovecote) have been very mixed. On the whole, we have found the Dovecote site to be running well – no significant problems identified to date. However, our experiences with Millers and Cala have been less positive.

The Council is actively and regularly engaging with Vale of the White Horse Planning Enforcement, Oxfordshire County Council and the developers to ensure they deliver what was agreed, which in some cases is long overdue. Since we last met with each developer, some progress has been made, for example, accessible access paths have been installed from the new "village green" at Manor Farm/Edward Park to Gravel Lane and Henleys Lane, but the finished surface of these paths is still not satisfactory. So, the Council continues to seek improvement of this and other items at both sites.

A more detailed update will be provided next month.

4. Keeping Village Footpaths Clear

The Council is keen to ensure that all pavements, public footpaths and byways in the village can be safely used

by all residents and visitors, not only pedestrians, but also wheelchair and pushchair users.

The Council is planning on making various improvements to certain public footpaths, but also wishes to encourage residents themselves to do their part. So, we therefore respectfully ask householders to take action to regularly trim/prune any shrubs, trees, hedges in your gardens which border public footpaths. This is to ensure that such vegetation does not overhang the pavements and restrict the space available for pavement users. We thank you in advance for your cooperation on this.

5. Dog Poo

I would (once again) urge dog-owners in Drayton to ensure you collect any poo your dog deposits around the village.

Leaving the poo alongside footpaths is totally disgusting and unacceptable, as is dumping plastic waste bags in trees or hedgerows. Foul dog waste poses a real health risk to children, and sadly, make the village a less attractive place for all of us to live.

Please note that you don't have to use a specific dog poo bin, you can use any public bin, or even take the plastic bags home and dispose of them in your <u>own</u> home bin. This is much better than allowing your dog to foul footpaths, which could result in your being convicted of a criminal offence.

6. Transport

The Council is aware of reliability issues with the X2 bus service run by Thames Travel. Currently we are in contact with Oxfordshire County Council to find ways to improve this service and provide a better experience and more opportunities to our villagers. If you have been affected by a delayed/missed bus, do get in touch with Thames Travel Customer Care Team at office@thamestravel.co.uk as well as sending an email to irma.schoonhoven@draytonpc.org so that a record can be kept. In case you are not be happy with the response from Thames Travel, or how they handled your complaint, submit inquiry please https://bususers.org.

The parish council has noted the lack of cycling paths and connectivity from Drayton to other existing cycling paths. Vale of White Horse District Council's cycling champion will be raising a motion with regard to connecting Drayton to the Science Vale Cycling Network. Further updates to follow.

OCC has encouraged villages to appoint a Fix My Street Super-user volunteer for tackling potholes, drainage issues, sand/salt distribution and other such issues as means of relieving pressure on Oxford County Council Highways department. Neighbourhood Action Group 5 Safety Corner

Scam phone calls

- Neighbourhood Watch in the NAG5 area has received numerous reports of phone calls claiming that 'loft lagging' fitted recently has been found to cause condensation, and has been declared substandard by the government. These calls appear to be opportunist and come from local numbers.
- A recent call to a NAG5 resident asked if he was still receiving scam phone calls. When he said that he was he was asked to confirm his name and address so that the caller could be sure the details were correct. Once the victim had done so he was asked to provide his banking details so that a direct debit could be set up to help prevent scam calls. Fortunately he realised it was a scam.

Reporting incidents to the police

The police stand a greater chance of catching offenders within the first hour following a crime or offence. If you wish to make an immediate report please call 101 as soon as possible, enabling the report to be logged and quickly passed on to any officer(s) who are in the vicinity. Please note that the police are aware of issues or crimes only if they're reported and officially logged. Always call 999 if you suspect a crime is about to be committed, or if there is one in progress.

Burglaries

- There has been an increase in daytime burglaries in Abingdon. If you're suspicious about a vehicle which might be associated with break-ins, please take the registration number and call 101 to report it to the police, who will check the details against their database. Always call 999 if you suspect a crime is about to be committed, or if there is one in progress.
- Ensuring windows, doors, side gates, sheds and garages are locked helps to deter break-ins. Clearly marking mowers, tools and garden equipment with your postcode makes them less desirable to thieves.

Cyclists

Some cyclists are cycling on footpaths in the dark, without lights. This is potentially very dangerous to both cyclists and pedestrians. Cyclists should use marked cycle paths or cycle on the road.

Doorstep sellers

A reminder that if residents don't buy from doorstep sellers it will dissuade them from returning. Refuse to buy politely but firmly and close the door. Call 101 if you feel threatened.

Parking

Inconsiderate parking at drop-off and pick-up times near schools is ongoing. Please do not put the safety of your child, or other children, at risk by obstructing dropped kerbs with vehicles.

Coronavirus (Covid-19)

Neighbours who are self-isolating, or who are staying at home to proect their health, may be feeling very alone. A simple

phone call and/or an offer to help with shopping might make all the difference.


