#### From the DAMASCUS Ministry Team

#### Church of England launches energy rating tool for churches - as Synod considers new 'net zero'

The Church of England is launching an <u>energy rating system</u> similar to those used for household appliances. The aim is to help monitor the **carbon footprint** of its almost 40,000 buildings, as General Synod has recently voted on a major new proposal to reach 'net zero' CO2 emissions. The hope is for all parts of the Church of England, from parishes to national bodies, to aim for **ambitious year-on-year reductions in emissions** to reach 'net zero' by 2045 at the latest.

In a first step, parishes are being offered **a new rating tool**, which calculates their **energy consumption**. It will take into account factors including the type of power they use, whether they are on 'green' tariffs, the size of the building and usage.

The Bishop of Salisbury, Nicholas Holtam, the Church of England's lead bishop for Environmental Affairs, said:- "The Church has buildings in every style & material from the past 1,500 years, which pose some unique challenges when it comes to energy efficiency.

"However, churches are not museums, but living buildings serving their communities every day of the week, and being greener isn't about doing less, it's about equipping parishes to get **smarter about energy consumption**.

"Christians are called to safeguard God's creation and sustain and renew the life of the earth. Faced with the reality of catastrophic climate change, which will affect the world's most vulnerable people the soonest, **radical and immediate action is our only option**."

A paper sent to Synod members before February's General Synod also outlined the potential impacts of climate change directly affecting the Church.

It warned parishes that, as impacts start to accelerate, more churches will need to be prepared to play missional roles in their communities, including offering sanctuary in extreme weather events, as was seen at (church) St Cuthbert, Fishlake, following flooding of the River Don last year.

The DAMASCUS PCC is committed to running **energy audits** on all our churches and looking for ways to develop as 'Eco-churches'. Watch this space!

# **Drayton WIVES**

This January we had an excellent walk of Drayton new and old. The walk was led by Liz Branson and showed us places that I didn't know were there !! Even if you have lived in a place a long time it's still nice to see it from someone else's perspective and maybe discover places you didn't know about.

The monthly meeting was the **Body Shop** and the talk was by Sarah from the shop at Didcot. Sarah has been with the company for 13 yrs and said it has evolved a lot.

In 1976 in Brighton, Anita Roddick created the company to sell cosmetics which were ethically sourced, natural and cruelty free. Anita started with 25 shops and used bottles from the local hospital to fill them with labels which were hand written.

The original shop was painted green as that was the only colour she had! In 1977 she sold 50% of the business to a local garage owner. By 1984, 87% of the stores were outside the United Kingdom

Now the company sells over 1200 products in 3000 stores in 65 countries. In the UK there are 239, with one locally in Didcot. They sell one <u>Hemp hand cream</u> every 9 seconds to both men and women, with the next best seller being Shea butter made from shea nuts from Ghana.

They then started getting involved with organisations such as GreenPeace, and charities combating violence in the home and sex trafficking young people. And it is committed to reducing plastic in the sea where there is more plastic than fish!! In India there are 1.5 million waste pickers who work with the Body Shop to recycle plastic.

Body Shop is committed to 23 countries where it gives work to over 25000 people -- it has recently been taken over by Natura from Brazil but also now owns Avon and an Australian company.

In the shop at Didcot the staff have over 56.5 years experience and offer consultations for makeup and skin care and also offer adult and children's parties; so go and meet them next time you are shopping and have a pamper!!!

# WESTMINSTER VIEW



Our new MP (Wantage/Didcot) is David Johnston (OBE, awarded for services to Social Mobility and Education).

The first weeks as an MP are a whirlwind, whether you've worked in politics or not before. I hadn't, but even as someone who has run organisations

it is a considerable adjustment, and it is just as much of one for those who've worked for MPs or Ministers before. One challenge is simply finding your way around: although the House of Commons is supposed to have only 4 floors, all the nooks and crannies mean it has around 65 different levels! [Ed's note:- we did a Commons tour last month, and David is right, the place is HUGE!].

The moment you are elected you begin receiving 150-200 emails every day, but you don't have an office or any staff and so people end up waiting for you to reply a lot longer than you want them to. I try to prioritise constituents in urgent need first, followed by local organisations, as national ones just bombard all MPs regularly whether or not you have any direct connection to the issues they deal with. I have picked up some local campaigns where my predecessor left off, including that to try and reopen Grove station. I've also become patron of two local charities, Play2Give and Secret Santa 365, both of which may well be familiar to you.

Beyond the constituency, I was pleased to get my maiden speech out of the way on Jan 14th, during a debate on education. I was asked to be the Conservative **Co-Chair of the All Party Parliamentary Group on social mobility**, given my background in running charities that tried to improve social mobility before coming into politics. I have also been elected to the **Education Select Committee**. I look forward to learning how both types of structure can influence policy.

One of the privileges of being an MP is that every week you see more of what your constituency has to offer and more of the great initiatives that local people are involved in. I am writing this in the middle of February having just visited the 21 acre site of the Didcot Railway Centre, getting a great behind the scenes look that I'm keen for my mother, a railway enthusiast, to experience.

I also went along to the **Big Fix Repair Cafe** organised by Sustainable Didcot, in which volunteers mend everything – from toys and clothes, to tools and electricals – so that the items get a new lease of life and don't end up in landfill.

Having just collected the keys to the new home we'll be living in in the constituency, I am looking forward to immersing myself in the community more fully.

#### Abingdon Reservoir - Latest GARD News

Ofwat and The Environment Agency have responded to water companies' plans by requiring a <u>major strategic study</u> to inform fresh plans for water resources across the South-East. GARD will be closely monitoring developments during the research period, likely to be the next three years. In the meantime, GARD will continue to:-

**Keep up the pressure** on the water companies and continue to ensure that government ministers, local MPs, councillors and all other stakeholders are kept well informed.

**Work with** local parish and district councils, and Oxfordshire County Council, encouraging them to engage with the consultation process. Some have registered their interest as stakeholders in the strategic study, and more have agreed to.

**Press our view** that the abandonment of water companies extracting from threatened chalk streams, something which we wholly support, does NOT require the reservoir to be constructed (as is put out in Thames Water and Affinity Water propaganda). In concert with CPRE in Oxfordshire and Hertfordshire we will press for our cheaper, more easily delivered options, using existing reservoirs near London or water transfers from the Midlands to supply the Hertfordshire Chiltern area and take the pressure off the streams.

Additionally:- **Commission an extended study** into the issue of flooding in the reservoir area. We hope this will provide detailed information about the risks for each of the surrounding villages and South Abingdon.

**<u>GARD's AGM</u>** will be on **Tuesday April 28th** at 7:30 pm in the Millennium room, Steventon village hall. We urge you to attend if you can.

# Introducing . . . Drayton

#### (the one in Somerset!)

Drayton, Somerset is just 2.3 miles from Langport in the heart of the Somerset Levels and can boast the remains of two Roman villas. We are just a couple of miles from Muchelney Abbey, which was destroyed by Henry 8th during the Reformation. If you look carefully at our assortment of houses you will spot some of the dressed Blue Lias stone robbed from the ruins.

On the Somerset Levels, we are surrounded by apple orchards. Cider-making was an important occupation in the village but now we just have one person doing it. Past occupations included lime burners, farmers, willow cutters, cow and pig men, agricultural labourers, carpenters, blacksmiths and gamekeepers. Women were collar makers, shirt makers, glovers and domestic servants. Now we have a number of retired and active servicemen, RNAS Yeovilton being just a short drive away.

With a population of just 379 at the time of the 2011 census, we have a village Hall and 15th century church, but no shops, school, gas supply, street lighting or public transport.

Our recently re-furbished pub is the Drayton Crown and villagers were relieved (and thirsty!) when, after a two-year re-fit, it opened again and is now the social meeting point of the village.

On Twelfth Night (January 5), Drayton is only one of a handful of villages left in the country that still carry out the long tradition of Wassail. Our Wassail night is not the blessing of the apple tree but to wish goodwill on friends and neighbours. Men from the village call on selected houses and sing their Wassail song outside. At the line 'Oh Maid, Oh Maid, with your silver head pin, pray open the door and let us all in', the Wassailers are invited into the home to partake in a drink, always alcoholic, and quite often mulled cider or wine. They call at around 12 houses and start and finish at the pub, so you can imagine that there are a few sore heads the next day! This tradition has gone on unbroken for hundreds of years and we are very proud of it. For those who have heard of Cecil Sharp, the man who collected folk songs at the beginning of the 20th Century, the Drayton Wassail Song was the second one that he wrote down.

We are very proud of our thatched War Memorial - just one of only five in the country. It stands on the corner, opposite the pub, displaying the names of our brave men who lost their lives during the Great and Second World Wars. **>**>

# Your District Councillor



This month's report is on the <u>budget</u>, I'm afraid, and the <u>finances</u>.

You may recall that in my election literature, there was quite a bit on **balancing the books and fixing the finances**. Well, we've had our own budget this year, so I can report on how we've done.

**<u>Firstly</u>** – the **financial pressures aren't solely on us**. The cuts in funding sourced through the Government over the past several years have meant huge pressure on all councils (in a recent press article, more than a fifth of councils in the country are going to have to make cuts that would significantly affect the public, and a tenth of councils are in danger of failing to meet their legally statutory services). It used to be unthinkable that a council could effectively go bankrupt – but Northamptonshire County Council went insolvent in 2018.

<u>Secondly</u> – the Vale of White Horse District Council has two specific issues with funding. <u>The first</u> was that the level of business rates we are allowed to retain (the vast majority get passed on to central Government) was based on our business tax base the year before Didcot Power Station was to close – which ripped away 20% of our business tax base at a stroke. This means we get a very poor amount of money retained from business rates. <u>The second</u> was that thanks to some decisions made by the last administration, we're highly reliant on the New Homes Bonus funding (it's about a third of our income). The Government are phasing out NHB funding for councils over the next few years...

The **Five Councils Partnership** was supposed to reduce our costs to help with this – unfortunately, it actually *increased* them. Outsourcing in an attempt to reduce costs also ended up <u>increasing them</u>.  $\Rightarrow$ >

[Ed's Note:- I'm guessing there'll be some people round the village – and especially if they've worked in procurement – who may find that 'increased/ing' quite a head-scratcher?!]

→> When we came into office, Andrew Crawford (the new Cabinet Member for Finance) knew he had a very difficult job ahead of him. I'm pleased to report that he's done better than I'd hoped. The new budget has <u>no</u> cuts to frontline services, **extends exemptions** to Council Tax for <u>disabled people and single parents</u>, and managed to turn a deficit of £1.8 million for the upcoming year into a surplus of £0.14 million. We are, as we feared, going to have to **raise Council Tax** – but only by about £5 per month for Band D properties.

Pulling out of the Five Council Partnership is going to help with costs – as well as improving local responsiveness. We're still concerned about the longer term – there should be a rebasing of the business tax bases in a couple of years and Government are looking at some form of replacement funding stream for NHB (albeit we can't expect it to be nearly as lucrative as before), so we're also looking at potential for merging with South Oxfordshire District Council – but we want to make sure it would improve finances before we seriously consider it (we don't want another Five Council Partnership debacle) – it would force an immediate rebasing of business rates, for example, which should help us out. We do need to be very careful going forwards – fixing the finances longer term will be a more lengthy process.

Anyway, **the summary is**: no cuts to front line services (from VoWHDC level, anyway), books balanced (for now, anyway), a £5 per month increase in Band D Council Tax (I'm sorry – but it's about in line with inflation, anyway), extension to Council Tax exemptions for disabled and single parents, and books balanced this year – but significant challenges still remaining.

That's all for this month. Take care, Andy Cooke

This piece was in before, but worth repeating, as YOU can make a difference! It's right to look at the dangers of engine idling and how YOU can help clean your local area's air. # **Health Hints!**

## **DIABETES** – On the Increase?!

**Avril Smith** grew up in Drayton and left in 1981 on getting married. She is a **qualified Registered Nurse** with a specialist **Diabetes nursing qualification**, and is very passionate about the disease. She believes that the more people know and understand about this long term condition, the more chance they have of not having to suffer the consequences of poor management and increased risks of other complications such as heart attack, stroke, blindness and lower limb amputation.

Avril writes: We need to talk about diabetes so let's get started! This article [we intend to have an occasional series] talks about the basic **differences between Type 1 and Type 2 Diabetes**.

Diabetes is a long-term condition that occurs when the **blood** glucose (sugar) is too high. Blood glucose comes from most of the food we eat, our bodies need it for energy and cell development.

The **pancreas**, a small organ near the stomach, produces a hormone called insulin, which is needed to help take the glucose to the cells. The average daily secretion of insulin from the pancreas of a healthy person ranges from 30-50 units and this can be influenced by certain factors such as **higher intake of food rich in sugar and fats and ...larger portions**!

To differentiate, there is Type 1 Diabetes (formerly known as Insulin–dependent diabetes or IDDM) and the more common Type 2 Diabetes (formerly Non-insulin dependent diabetes or NIDDM). However in the clinical setting these terms are no longer used as some Type 2 Diabetic patients go on to have to have insulin due to a number of factors, which will be discussed.

People who have Type 1 Diabetes need Insulin to survive. Type 1 diabetes is where the body does not produce any insulin and this group of people need insulin, otherwise they will die.

Type 1 Diabetes is not caused by being overweight or having an unhealthy lifestyle, it's **NOT the person's fault**. It is thought to be <u>an auto-immune disease</u> which occurs when the body's immune system attacks and destroys the insulin secreting cells of the pancreas. The exact cause is still being investigated.

With **Type 2**, the body either does not produce enough insulin or there is a problem as it cannot get to the cells, caused by insulin resistance; <u>this version is by far the most common</u> and it's estimated that 90% of UK people with diabetes have Type 2.

Several factors are taken into consideration when deciding what is the best treatment for an individual with a Type 2 diagnosis, and this can be as basic as dietary and lifestyle changes. However it is known that Type 2 Diabetes is a long-term, progressive condition and that other treatments and interventions may have to be considered in order to give the person the best options for good health and risk-reduction of further complications.



County Council Report The 'Blame Game' >>

When things go wrong, it seems there is always someone to blame. "Heads must roll!" or, more recently, "Deputy Heads must roll". It seems that if heads of some sort don't roll, we are never satisfied. In politics, at all levels, it seems that this rule is even more fiercely applied than elsewhere. If the social worker did not pick up on someone in trouble, or the train doesn't run to time, or the bus doesn't turn up, or the pothole hasn't been filled, or the streetlamp has been off for months, or my neighbour is annoying me, *someone* is always answerable. Whilst it may be true that everything that goes wrong is always at least one person's fault, society often seems to want to spend more time and energy discovering who is to blame than it does in trying to ensure that the same mistake doesn't happen again.

I wonder how many well-meaning, hard-working people have suffered as a result. I am not talking about scapegoating here – that is unforgivable – I am talking about people who may well have got things wrong, but who are then asked to pay a far too heavy price as a result of society's attitude to blame.

So, why am I writing this? As a District and County Councillor, I am often painfully aware of how blame can be shunted around because no-one is prepared to risk being blamed.

"That's not my job, it's his/hers."

"That's not my department, it's theirs."

"That's not my Council's responsibility, it's the other's."

" I never received the email."

"Government won't give us the money to do it, or to do it better."

I receive more than a dozen or so emails a day requiring me to act. Here is how I <u>apportion blame</u>:-  $\Rightarrow$ >

 $\rightarrow$  As far as possible, I try to act quickly (Not always successful – my fault).

I nearly (my fault) always manage to pass on to a relevant officer or council department the concerns expressed in the email. Quite often, I have to follow up with a further request (their fault) to get anything done.

Sometimes, in the eyes of the email writer, I am wholly responsible for the issue (not fair, their fault). Sometimes things slip through the net because I thought the problem was resolved (my fault) or because someone at a Council has let it slip (their fault) or nothing can be done (government's fault or everyone's fault).

I am sure you get where I am going with this. In the end, the only thing that really matters is that the problem is solved and, if it can't be, it is passed on or up to someone else who may be able to solve it.

It seems that "pinning blame" on someone has become an <u>objective above all else</u> and this does not necessarily create an atmosphere where individuals work best, where councils and councillors work best and where society works best.

Blame properly and fairly applied should improve things. It should always be tempered with patience and understanding that people make mistakes and, in most cases, they are the people most likely to avoid the same mistakes in future.

The <u>Police and Crime Commissioner</u> (PCC) for Thames Valley has **awarded voluntary & community organisations** £166,800 from the Police Property Act Fund.

The Fund is created from **money recovered** by the police and the proceeds from the sale of items that cannot be returned to identified owners, including seizures **from criminals**.

There were 169 applications to the current funding round with 42 organisations successful in receiving funding of between £1,000 & £10,000 to support the PCC's Police and Crime Plan objectives. Community and voluntary organisations play an important role in the Thames Valley. We have seen successful recipients providing important services to communities across the area.

#### Amazon Prime scam calls

In the three months between October 2019 and January 2020 over  $\pounds 1$  million was stolen from victims as a result of this scam. One person alone lost over  $\pounds 65,000$ .

Victims receive an automated call saying they have been charged for an **Amazon Prime subscription** and are prompted to 'press 1' on their phone keypad to cancel the subscription.

Once they've done so **they're directed to a fraudster** posing as an Amazon customer service representative, who says that the subscription was purchased fraudulently and that remote access is needed to the victim's computer in order to fix a security flaw, and to prevent it from recurring.

They're asked to download a remote access application, often the 'Team Viewer' app, which grants the fraudster access to the victim's computer. That software is then mis-used by the criminal to monitor the victim logging into their online bank account, thus providing their personal and financial details.

There are other variants of this crime, one being where the fraudster tells the victim that they're eligible for a refund on an unauthorised transaction on their Amazon account.

#### Always question uninvited calls, texts or e-mails.

Contact the company directly using a known phone number or e-mail address. <u>Have the confidence</u> to refuse requests for financial or personal information. It's easy to get embarrassed or flustered, but it's fine to stop the discussion if you don't feel in control. <u>NEVER</u> ever install any software or visit a website as the result of a cold call.

[Ed's note:- a dodgy email, supposedly from Amazon (!), should be sent to **stop-spoofing@amazon.com**, you get a detailed reply back. NB, apologies, this 'Fraud & Scams' section just below was omitted last month, due to a lack of space].

#### Fraud and scams

Vulnerable and elderly people in our area are being targeted by fraudsters who <u>claim</u> to be **under-cover police officers**. Their ultimate aim is to obtain money fraudulently. The victim is told that they can help in exposing corruption within the police force, and that they must deal only with the **supposed** under-cover officers. That if they contact the police themselves it would alert the corrupt officers. The victim is then asked to withdraw money from their bank account (the victim may be coached what to say to avoid alerting bank staff), which will be used as bait to arrest the corrupt officers. In reality it's picked up by the fraudsters.

<u>Victims say that this is a particularly convincing</u> and credible scam, with the fraudsters sounding completely genuine. In one instance the victim wouldn't believe the police, when they called to speak to her and to explain that she was a victim of this fraud. She was convinced that these particular officers were corrupt! The effects of such scams on victims can be profound and damaging. The police will **never** ask a member of the public for this type of assistance.

Fraudsters usually target people who live alone and/or those who are vulnerable. If <u>you have friends</u>, relatives or neighbours who are <u>elderly or vulnerable</u> they are amongst those most likely to be the targets of scams. <u>Please tell them</u> about the scam detailed above and also stress that they should never use an organisation's telephone number that's been provided to them by a caller at the door, during a phone call, in a letter or an e-mail. They should look up the number themselves and make the telephone call using a different phone from the one on which they received the call.

#### Fake PayPal e-mails

Between October and December 2019 Action Fraud received over three thousand reports about these fake e-mails. Victims reported losing a total of £1,121,446 during this period. Those targeted included people selling electronics, vehicles, phones and household furniture via online marketplaces.

Fraudsters send the victim an e-mail, purporting to be from PayPal, in an attempt to trick them into believing they have received payment for an item. The fraudster then sends a followup e-mail requesting a tracking number in the hope that the victim will be rushed into shipping the item before they've had a chance to verify the payment.

**Log into PayPal** and check for any new activity rather than acting on the e-mail or clicking any links. PayPal will e-mail or notify you in the app if you've received any payments.

**Check the basics** by looking out for misspellings and grammatical errors. Phishing scams often mimic the look and feel of PayPal e-mails and request sensitive information, which is something a genuine PayPal e-mail would never do.

**Avoid clicking** on links or downloading attachments. Hover over the link to see if it looks genuine.

Consider using a protected payment method, such as PayPal, for online purchases. PayPal can reimburse you if your purchase doesn't arrive or match the product description.

Use common sense and steer clear of anything that seems to good to be true!

If you think you've received a phishing e-mail you can forward it to *spoof@paypal.com* without changing the subject line. PayPal will let you know if it's fraudulent.



#### **DRAYTON HALL NEWS**


