From the DAMASCUS Ministry Team

Despite what you might have heard, Christmas has not been cancelled this year! Whether or not we are able to gather for worship, Christians in the DAMASCUS Parish and all over the world will still celebrate the birth of Jesus Christ, the Word made flesh, God with us.

As I write, we are in lockdown once again although hopefully it will end as intended early in December. But the restrictions do make planning for Christmas quite difficult, for churches as much as for everyone else. As I think about the next few weeks, the great Advent themes of darkness and light seem especially relevant. 2020 has felt particularly dark.

Most of us have had moments of anxiety and uncertainty about the future. For some there has been fear and sorrow, others have experienced illness and loss, and <u>ALL of us</u> have endured unprecedented restrictions, limiting our physical contact with those we love and forcing us to keep our distance from each other. But despite all this, there have also been <u>moments of light</u> in the darkness. Many of us have been spending more time with our families. We have become more aware of what is really important to us. There has been great humour and forbearance. We have risen to the challenges that have confronted us. As a community, we have been looking out for those in particular need.

We have been wearing masks, not for our own benefit, but to keep other people safe. The great Christmas Gospel tells us that 'the light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it' (John 1.5). We don't know the actual date on which Jesus was born. It is just possible that early Christians took over the pagan festival of Sol Invictus. But it is very appropriate that we celebrate Christmas in the middle of winter, when the weather is coldest and the nights are longest. By a cosmic coincidence, on the longest night of this year, Dec 21st, there will be a rare 'great conjunction' between Jupiter and Saturn. The two planets will appear very close together, their closest conjunction since 1623.

The two heavenly lights will almost converge, becoming a single light shining with <u>exceptional brightness</u>. Many people think that the 'star' the Magi followed to Bethlehem might have been a planetary conjunction, or perhaps a comet. Abraham, the ancestor of God's chosen people, was promised descendants as numerous as the stars of heaven (Genesis 15.1-6). The familiar lights in the heavens became for him a sign of hope and trust in God. When you look up at the night sky on Dec 21st, the light from Jupiter will have taken about 50 minutes to reach you, that from Saturn about 85 minutes. The three stars of Orion's belt are over 1200 light years away, celestial distances are mind-boggling, and Space is very dark. But the light of the stars still reaches us, bringing hope and joy to those who look up and see it. <u>The light shines in the darkness</u>. We may be socially distanced, <u>but God</u>, 'through whom all things came into being' (John 1.3) is with us.

The American theologian and civil rights leader, **Howard Thurman**, wrote this poem about <u>lights in the darkness</u>:-

"I will light Candles this Christmas, Candles of joy despite all the sadness, Candles of hope where despair keeps watch, Candles of courage for fears ever present, Candles of peace for tempest-tossed days, Candles of grace to ease heavy burdens, Candles of love to inspire all my living, Candles that will burn all year long. When the song of the angels is stilled, When the star in the sky is gone, When the kings and princes are home, When the shepherds are back with their flock, The work of Christmas begins:- To find the lost, To heal the broken, To feed the hungry, To release the prisoner, To rebuild the nations, To bring peace among others, To make music in the heart".

LOCAL W.I. HISTORY

Looking back over 100 years of Drayton Women's Institute -- a review of our achievements. *Ann Webb*

1920 - we were founded by Lady Rucker. We met in the Wesleyan Chapel, but we were asked to find another venue as it was unseemly for Ladies to meet in the chapel. So we went to the ***Buff's Lodge in the High Street, here we were standing round snooker tables - also not satisfactory! A move to the Village School was next, this was also not practical, (small desks, grown up Ladies, no other seats available!), so it was decided that we needed our own Hall. {***NB The "Buff's" term is slang for the Royal Antediluvian Orde of Buffaloes, of which some folk may not have heard, but they are usually considered similar to Freemasons. Not so many around now}.

1922 - The Hall was found and erected on land given to us, formally opened by Mrs Lloyd of Lockinge. From then on we ran whist drives, gymkhanas, dances and tennis tournaments to raise money for upkeep of the Hut. Christmas Parties were held for young and old.

1938 - War was now imminent and our meetings change to afternoons, not so popular, children home from school and evening meal to prepare. The hall was then free for Home Guard to practice in preparation for the inevitable war. The Young Men's group was suspended, they also had been called up, and we were taught first aid should we need it. A lot of members were doing war work so numbers were still small. We had a sudden arrival of evacuees to be rehomed in the village.

We made jam and preserves with the allocated sugar allowance from the Ministry of Food, also canned plums and tomatoes from local gardens using the canning machine loaned to use from Canada. Presents were gathered for the troops overseas, and at home we were asked to help with the planning for rebuilding after the war. One point we made strongly was that water and sanitation should be indoors in future. (Ed's note:- younger readers may not be aware of the, um, delights of an outdoor toilet – mind that spider! – especially on cold, wet nights, or the issues with using a tin bath, usually placed in the living room near the coal fire or stove).

→> 1960 - We were asked to make bootees to complete a 'layette' for the new Royal baby, as Berkshire's contribution.

1963 - was the <u>extremely bad winter</u> and we missed a meeting because no fuel, so no heating.

1967 - The WI held the first of many Produce shows, and more importantly the hall, now almost fifty, was showing signs of decay. Health and Safety made it almost impossible to keep the building up to the required standard for public use and it was decided to give it to the village! It took five years of meetings, letters and consultations before it was settled. We carried on as usual without the burden of constant repairs and upkeep of a failing building.

The <u>Drayton Amenities Society</u>, & the '<u>Hall News</u>' (now the Chronicle) were born, and they took over this task while a new Hall was designed and built. **The new hall was opened in May 1975** and we were given some concessions because the old Hall provided enough funds to start the build. In the following years we also ran a very successful produce show called **Grow**, **Cook And Sew**, open to all the village. We had some amazing pieces of work displayed and fantastic cookery exhibits. It was always amazing how a precise recipe and instructions arrived looking all so different! This ran for many years until we thought of the quiz, ('Wit and Wisdom'), very popular with local WI groups and villagers alike, raising some <u>excellent charity contributions</u>.

We are now quite a small group (with the modern technology we are having a job to compete). Last year we began our plans to **celebrate this year in style**. Plans were made, we had a new president and a wonderful year to look forward to until . . . you know what!!!! But like a lot of people we have moved kicking and screaming into technology, we now Zoom with those who have the ability.

Who would have thought 100 years ago that we could talk to and see one another without leaving the comfort of our own homes? Our planned 100th birthday party had cake and champagne! No socially distanced cream tea in a box.

But like so many other people all over the world, fingers crossed we will celebrate next year when we are 101.





Garden Find (Historical Challenge?!)

Dear Editor,

Plough Lane

In December last year, we relocated as a family of five from Bedfordshire to Drayton. We spent some time discovering the area, decided on a new build on the Bloor Dovecote estate, and have settled here nicely with the kids all starting the local primary school and us all getting to know our new neighbours. We have found the neighbourhood to be warm and friendly and are grateful to be accepted into the community.

Once all the dust had settled following our relocation, we decided that we wanted to extend the patio and set about contracting the work. Whilst taking off the first few inches of soil under the turf, the lads discovered a lump of cast iron that appeared to be a maker's plaque of some sort. I gave it a brush down and discovered the words "Shand, Mason & Co." with an address in Blackfriars, London. Curiosity got the better of me and I undertook some internet searches to find out who they were!



According to Wikipedia, **Shand Mason** was a British company that designed and manufactured **steam powered fire engines** and other fire-fighting equipment during the 19th and 20th centuries. The first commercially successful fire-engine was a water-borne version developed by them and put into service in 1855. In the 1860s the company developed land-based fire fighting equipment including hand pumps and horse drawn fire engines – both manual and steam engine versions.

This must have been an exciting time for the development of firefighting, as innovation in equipment allowed the introduction of machine-assisted firefighting techniques. Shand, Mason & Co. must have been pioneers of their day and across the internet we can see their equipment was in service across the globe.

Through researching this garden find, we note that the badge has various styles over the history of the company; our find appears to be from a horse-drawn fire cart from the 1860s/70s era, as per the Brigade Fire Engine from the 1851 Great Exhibition (entry 410).

We are now in the process of cleaning the badge up, and will give it a rust treatment and repaint, before it takes **pride of place** on the garage wall! We wondered if anyone in the village can shed any light on how this may have ended up in our garden?

It is possible it was brought in on a grab truck by the builders with the soil for the development, but then again someone in the community might have other ideas! We look forward to hearing your replies!

We have been writing to **Clinically Extremely Vulnerable** (CEV) residents, by email and letter. We've also been calling all the 676 people across the Vale and South Oxfordshire who received government assistance with food dowards the end of the initial shielding phase.

<u>If you are in either category</u> and haven't heard from us – or if you are in neither category but <u>would like some help</u>, *please* **don't hesitate** to contact our Community Hub on the telephone number, website, or email address above.

Vaccines

Vaccine news has been extremely promising, with all indications that efficacy (effectiveness of the vaccines in development) are far higher than we'd dared hope. At this point, many of us will be wondering about safety and whether or not safety corners may have been cut.

I did mention in last month's article that there had been **no compromise on safety**. The MHRA are VERY concerned about safety, and they are insistent (quite rightly) on full safety protocols being followed. Each vaccine will have gone through lengthy safety testing with 20,000+ people involved for months. For comparison, if everyone in Didcot over the age of 12 was jabbed, that's still short of the numbers on which each separate trial had for safety testing, watching them like hawks throughout (so with 3, 4, 5 vaccines possibly available in the near term, we're looking at multiple towns-worth of people who've already had it given to them and been carefully watched). \rightarrow >

Planning

The Government's proposed Planning Reforms (which remove a lot of local power to feedback, direct, reject, or amend planning applications) are, we are told, being revised following massive pushback from many Local Authorities & MPs.

Given that the number of applications we have approved far outstrips the number under construction, we rather feel the Government's proposals are aimed in the wrong direction. We have, in my mind, got to the point where we've put together a decent system; the Neighbourhood Development Plans have brought local concerns into the decision-making process.

We believe that local people MUST have a say in planning proposals affecting them, it's an important democratic principle, and removing the right of the people to have a say in order to mindlessly bulldoze things through will inevitably lead to massive blowback.

COVID, Lockdown, and Vaccines

With the news that a vaccine or vaccines may be be closer than we thought, it is very tempting for us all to take our foot off the caution pedal, but there remain many immediate threats which have to be addressed before we can indulge in mass celebrations. Our own Oxfordshire data suggests that the problem has moved away from the behaviour of the young to the behaviour of older people. It is the tendency of them (or perhaps I should say "us") to want to get together with friends and family in our houses and gardens that seems to be the source of local spread of COVID-19. The second national lockdown gives us a window to get the figures under control. There are signs that the rate of increase is slowing, but we need it to flatten (or get the "r" number below 1). All of us are feeling anxious to see friends and family but if we are to get together at Christmas and/or as soon as possible in the New Year, the health message is clear. We owe it to friends, family and each other to accept it.

Information overload?

In the meantime, the local community COVID groups continue to perform a vital function in looking after people of all ages, ensuring everyone is fed, has access to medicines and advice on where to go for specialist help. Given the hundreds of contact names and numbers and the detailed pages of instructions and guidelines from government and Councils, it would be easy to get lost in the plethora of well-meaning advice.

The simple message is that the local Community Group are the ones who can point us at any advice or help that may be needed.

Roadworks and congestion

One of the predictable outcomes of the Drayton Neighbourhood Plan was that the ambitions to improve road safety in the village would wind up with a period of traffic bedlam and hold-ups while improvements are carried out. Anyone driving through the village recently will have been held up outside the development in the village centre. It was unfortunate that it has taken three attempts for the developer to get it to the correct design in the right place. However, the work is now done and the result is a "table" that should act as a traffic calming device. Given the ambition to have at least two similar tables elsewhere on Drayton's roads in the next two years, we probably need a year to recover from the frustration that roadworks cause, before the next table is constructed!

One consequence of all the development in and around Drayton, Marcham, Milton and Sutton Courtenay is that **services have to be upgraded** – particularly water and sewage services – and this also involves temporary roadworks which can wreak havoc with local congestion and threaten local businesses already hard-pressed by COVID.

Another Covid-19 lockdown continues! Another period of restrictions and limitations on our work and home lives, our activities and hobbies, but let's hope that these sacrifices do

result in a reduction of cases such that we can soon start to move back to normal life. The Parish Council hasn't restarted its volunteer programme, but will look to do so if we become aware that it is needed.

The Parish Council continues its usual work during this second Covid-19 lockdown, in compliance with government guidelines. We continue to hold our regular monthly meeting, although via video-conference call rather than in person. All residents are welcome to join these video-calls, and details are included on the meeting agendas which are posted the Village website. (NB from Jan 2021 we shall be meeting on <u>Tuesday evenings</u> instead).

Our usual work continues, with discussions and decisions being taken on a variety of projects. These include:-

Planning matters. The Parish Council recently submitted a response to the Government's *White Paper on Planning for the Future*, which proposes a fundamental change to planning policy and the way in which decisions are made.

Footpath renovations. We are working on ways of alleviating flooding/muddiness on some paths.

Allotment improvements. The Parish Council has approved the installation of fencing around the allotments with a view to minimising local wildlife eating produce, and are waiting for the contractor to confirm the date to do this work. A new second water trough has also been ordered, so hopefully this will make watering your plots much easier in the summer months.

Village Green area, centre of village. We are taking steps to improve the centre of the village. The bus shelters will be deep-cleaned and painted early next year; we also plan to add installations to stop parking on the grassy areas opposite the post office, so that these stay green instead of a muddy mess! In the meantime we urge all residents and their visitors to park on the road surface – there is plenty of room to get past without going up on to the grass.

Developments at Walnut Meadows, Manor Farm and Dovecote >> We continue to work with the developers to ensure that any outstanding issues affecting residents and our community are resolved as soon as possible.

<u>Dovecote</u> - we will be doing an inspection of the development in mid-November, to identify any landscaping issues and to understand when the various playgrounds will be open for use.

Manor Farm - the public open space seems to be improving, with the grass finally growing! The intention is for this new Village Green to be handed over to the Parish Council, at which time we will investigate how we can further improve this area, for example potentially with additional tree planting and cultivating a proper wild flower meadow. We continue to liaise with Cala to ensure that any existing dead trees are replaced, certain stony pathways are stabilised, and to get the low level lighting installed and switched on (critical in these dark winter months).

Walnut Meadows – Millers have resubmitted revised plans for the sports pitch land showing a new elevation and these plans are under review by the Vale of White Horse District Council's planning team. As regards the junction of Chestnut Drive (within the development) and Abingdon Road, as you will all be aware a section of Abingdon Road was shut while certain work was undertaken; inclement weather prevented the final stages of this being completed, and so further works will be required although we understand that this will not necessitate a full road closure (thank goodness)! A street light also needs to be moved, we await confirmation of the dates for this, and the roadworks.

Finally, the Parish Council is aware that the **raised table** which has been installed at the junction of <u>Abingdon Road/Hilliat Fields</u> (for the third time) appears to be problematic, and seems to be adding to or causing flooding problems, which is very frustrating for road users and pedestrians trying to walk or cross here. As all road works are the responsibility of the **OCC Highway Dept**, we have been in touch with them urging an investigation to see if the works have been completed correctly in accordance with plans, and to visit the site as soon as possible.

On a more positive note, FODSA (Friends of Drayton School Association) have been very active recently organising activities for the village's younger residents, including the wonderful Fireworks Trail and the Halloween themed art competition for Drayton's younger residents which was free to enter and just for fun. Prizes were kindly donated by Waitrose in Botley.

I was **very pleased** to be asked to <u>judge the entries</u>, and they were all really fantastic – we have a talented bunch of children living in our village! It was really difficult to choose between the pictures, but there could only be one winner in each age category, as follows:- **Congratulations** to the winners, and well done to all those who took part. Scam warnings

Action Fraud has warned about **fake PayPal accounts**, where criminals trick online sellers into believing that payment for their items has been received and they're safe to send the items to the (criminal) purchaser. There are a myriad of scams purporting to be from GOV.UK or other government agencies.

Be **very cautious**, as these emails look completely genuine. Check the sender's email address, that the grammar and spelling are correct, as these can be give-aways. If you receive a suspicious email, follow this instruction!

Suspicious Email Reporting Service

This **new service** has been launched by the National Cyber Security Centre and the police. In the first few months, they had hundreds of thousands of reports, leading so far to several thousand links to bogus websites being removed.

Love Food? - Child of the 60s?

Then you should remember most of this:-

Pasta had not been invented. "Kebab" wasn't even a word, never mind a food. Curry was an unknown entity (& Indian restaurants were only found in India!). The only **vegetables** were spuds, peas, carrots, turnip, cauliflower and cabbage.

Chilli was in South America, Scotch Bonnets were worn by old ladies in Aberdeen. A **take-away** was a mathematical problem, and a **pizza** was something to do with a leaning tower. A Big Mac was what we wore when it was raining. **Oil** was for lubricating your bike chain, not for cooking.

Olive oil was kept in the medicine cabinet (for earache!). Spice went in Christmas cakes. Herbs were used to make medicine, we think. All crisps were plain. All soft drinks were called "pop". Coke was something that we put on the fire, we never drunk it and we certainly didn't sniff it.

Rice was a milk pudding, never, ever part of our dinner. **Tea** was made in a teapot using tea leaves. The tea-cosy was the forerunner of all energy saving devices. And tea had only one flavour, it was . . . tea flavoured. A microwave was science fiction. None of us had ever heard of "yoghurt".

Figs & dates appeared every Christmas, but no one ever ate them. Coconuts only appeared when the fair came to town. Mayonnaise was called Salad Cream, "Hors d'oeuvre" was a spelling mistake. Dinner consisted of what we were given, and not negotiable. Only Heinz made baked beans.

Leftovers went in the dog. Sauce was either brown or red. Eating raw fish was called madness, not sushi. The only ready meals came from the fish & chip shop. Frozen food was called ice cream. Nothing ever went off in the fridge because we never had one. Brunch was not a meal. Cheese only ever came in a hard lump.

If we had asked for **bacon, lettuce and tomato** in the same sandwich we would have been certified insane. Eating outside was called a picnic, not "Al Fresco". Seaweed was not a recognised food. Eggs were not called 'free range', they just were, and the shells were white. Pancakes were only eaten on Pancake Tuesday - it was compulsory.

The phrase "boil in the bag" would have been beyond our realms of comprehension, and "oven chips" would not have made any sense at all. We bought milk and cream at the same time, in the same bottle, before you gave it a shake. Prunes were purely medicinal. Pineapples only came in chunks in a tin. We didn't eat Croissants because we couldn't pronounce them, we couldn't spell them, and we didn't know what they were (and for Baguettes, see Croissants!). Garlic was used to ward off vampires in films, not eaten. Water came out of the tap; if someone had suggested bottling it and charging for it—they would have been locked up.
