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LETTER FROM WESTMINSTER

David Johnston MP Member of Parliament for Wantage

There is no denying that lockdowns are grim and this one is possibly the worst, given it is the longest and we don't yet have a clear idea on the timetable for leaving



it. As I write, my phone says the temperature in Didcot is a balmy 4 degrees – which is higher than it has been in recent days and which of course makes it more challenging than the first one was. But I am reasonably confident this will be the last one.

It has been wonderful to see the progress with the vaccine, with over 5.4 million people having already received one at the time of writing, one of the fastest rates of administering it in the world. I volunteered with the Ray Collins Charitable Trust in Wantage earlier in the month, registering patients from the Newbury Street and Church Street practices as they arrived every 3 minutes for their jabs. They were delighted to be receiving them, not least as so many have spent much of the last year inside.

MPs have been advised to stay at home and participate virtually, so that is largely what I have been doing – back to asking questions and giving speeches to a webcam as I was earlier in 2020. However, you have to turn up in person if you are on a Bill Committee, which scrutinises legislation line by line, and I am on the one for the Telecomms Security Bill, which I spoke in favour of a few weeks ago. It's all about how we deal with high-risk companies such as Huawei in our telecoms networks and it is fascinating to hear from experts in the field as part of the process.

There was very nice news at the beginning of the year when Andy Baker, the founder of Play2Give, received an MBE for his services to the community. Many of you will know his story, but he has now raised over £250,000 for good causes. I am a patron of his charity and whenever I meet him he has a smile on his face, is optimistic and is full of ideas about new ways to raise money for children and health services. He is a real inspiration.

If you haven't yet, get yourself to Lushlooking Cakes on London St in Faringdon when you can. They opened a shop just before Christmas having worked from their home very successfully for some time. Having eaten cupcakes in around 20 U.S. states, I think the ones at Lushlooking Cakes are some of the best and it's great to have a new local business in Faringdon, particularly now Stay Grounded has closed. That said, the Stay Grounded van will be back in force and it's great to hear the Bell's exciting plans for the venue.

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DISTRICT COUNCIL REPORT Andy Cooke

Dear all,

<u>Coronavirus</u>

We're back in lockdown with the new more transmissible version of the virus. With the pressure on hospitals throughout the Thames valley, a major incident was declared in early January; many of the District Council staff have been seconded to the Local Resilience Forum. Some responses from the Council may be delayed due to this; please bear with us.

Please remain careful and remember that as the new variant is easier to pass on, it's more important than ever to keep two metres distance whenever possible (including when wearing a mask) and to self-isolate whenever you have symptoms. Cases look to be falling at last; we need to keep it up. This should be the final stretch now that the vaccine is rolling out at speed – as long as take-up is high, when the rollout reaches enough people, we can progressively relax restrictions and get back to life as we knew it.

Winter Support Grant Scheme

We have launched a new grant scheme to help residents affected by the pandemic buy food and keep their homes warm this winter.

We have been working closely with Oxfordshire County Council, City and the other districts on this Winter Support Grant following the allocation £1.4million of government funding to Oxfordshire.

Following discussions, the county council allocated around £1M of that funding to providing free school meals. The rest has been distributed across the districts in the county with our share being £150,000 (South £76,006 and Vale £73,430).

Our local information and advice centres, Citizens Advice South and Vale, and Wantage Independent Advice Centre will be distributing the funding to those in need.

The advice centres can support people with supermarket vouchers for food and fuel vouchers to top up prepayment meters or with paying a heating bill. This will be alongside their usual package of advice and support around budget management, debt and benefit advice and any other assistance the resident may need signposting towards.

If a resident has received a food voucher from a previous scheme, they can still apply for a Winter Support Grant.

Garden Waste Suspension

We had to temporarily delay the start of the garden waste service (due to resume on 11 January) due to reduced staffing levels – a significant chunk of crews became ill or had to selfisolate, and the decision was made to focus remaining staff on the core household waste services. The Vale are genuinely sorry for the inconvenience this will have caused and we're reviewing the staff levels as of the week commencing 18th January (when I'm writing this update) with a view to restart as soon as possible.

We have been able to keep the Household Waste Recycling Centres open, however.

Vaccines

The vaccination programme is going well; we have over 20 Primary Care Network vaccination centres operating, plus roving vaccination teams who have been working their way around care homes and doing home visits for those who are less mobile. A mass vaccination centre for Oxfordshire is due to be opened soon (at time of writing; it may be open by the time you read this). Oxfordshire as a whole is on target for vaccinating the top four most vulnerable groups by mid-February.

There are, unfortunately, fraudsters seeking to prey on the vulnerable at all times and now is no exception. There have been scams related to the vaccine rollout, usually by text messages claiming to be from the NHS offering the opportunity to sign up for the vaccine. The scam texts ask you to click on a link to an online form – where you are asked to fill out personal and financial details.

Covid-19 vaccines will only be available via the NHS. You will be contacted by the NHS, your employer, a GP surgery or a pharmacy local to you, when you're able to receive it.

At no point will anyone be asked to pay for the vaccine.

The NHS will never ask you for your bank account or card details.

The NHS will never ask you for your PIN or banking password.

The NHS will never arrive unannounced at your home to administer the vaccine.

The NHS will never ask you to prove your identity by sending copies of personal documents such as your passport, driving licence, bills or pay slips.

What to do if you are targeted: If you receive a call, you believe to be fraudulent, just hang up.

If an email looks suspicious, do not click on any of the links - forward it to report@phishing.gov.uk.

Suspicious text messages should be forwarded to the number 7726 which is free of charge.

Anyone who believes they are a victim of a fraud, should report it immediately via actionfraud.police.uk or by calling 0300 123 2040.

New Bus Services

On a non-Covid front, there has been a series of major changes to bus services and frequencies across Oxfordshire. Services will now operate more frequently between Milton Park and Didcot, with improved links to the site from Wantage, Grove, Abingdon (via Drayton) and Oxford.

Community Consultations

We've launched two consultations into how we raise money for infrastructure and community facilities needed to support planned growth across the district.

We are asking the public, local businesses and organisations to comment on our draft Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) Charging Schedule and the draft Developer Contributions Supplementary Planning Document (SPD).

December 2020 (Ed note:Chronicle not published in Jan)

As I write, it is the beginning of a very strange festive season. Rather than a list of moans and problems, I will confine myself to some positive messages in the hope that 2021 will be a better year.

At the December OCC full County Council meeting, a very significant motion was passed, that henceforth our County will be moving towards making all built up areas 20mph zones including villages. It will take time and money to achieve. Whilst there is an argument that petrol and diesel cars produce more pollution at 20 than at 30, the latest evidence is that. Traffic flows more smoothly and this, in itself, reduces pollution. This, together with improved pedestrian and cycle ways together with the move to electric vehicles should make villages like ours, safer, healthier and more pleasant places in which to live and work.

At the same meeting there was an undertaking to focus on clearing back vegetation from footpaths. This would be part of making walking and cycling safer particularly for push chairs and wheelchairs.

Secondly, the new street lamps being installed all across the County are going to save money. However many people are concerned at their brightness causing unnecessary light pollution. There is a plan to review how well the new lights are working and, where required replace the white bulbs with gentler, warmer ones.

The latest spending review contained better news for County Council finance which has been under sustained pressure from austerity for many years. Indeed, at the risk of being proved completely wrong, there will, for the first time in many years, be some room for manoeuvre (and political argument) in the next budget. At least that gives local government some choices to make rather than the relentless round of "what to cut next"!

The message from the Director of Public Health and his team is clear. Whilst there is much better news on the horizon with the expanding Covid vaccination programme. To avoid a third spike in cases, we all need to keep to the guidance for the next few months at least. So, in the meantime Hands, Face, Space and be patient!

January 2021

If, like me, you are feeling worn down by the unrelenting stream of news and updates on the Corona pandemic following on from several years of unrelenting news of Brexit, I am hoping you feel the need for something different.

Catherine and I have been discovering new walks starting and ending at home. After so much rain, much of the countryside is currently under water so the numbers of routes are increasingly limited. Trailing down roads (only where there are pavements) next door to high speed, noisy traffic is not much fun and does not allow for much conversation.

Determined to find a new route, and in spite of the conditions, last weekend we decided to take a cross country route that we had taken without mishap some years ago. All went well until we faced the one field we knew could become very wet indeed. The path around the edge of the

field was looking very deep in puddles, but there looked to be a much drier possible route across the middle. Wearing good strong wellingtons, we set forth.

After ten minutes successfully negotiating the worst of the mud, simultaneously we were each brought to a halt as all four boots disappeared fast, more than a foot into the mud. Stopping to laugh was the big mistake as they slowly continued to sink further. Grabbing each other's hand to avoid falling over, we struggled to maintain our balance. Catherine, quite fairly, in trying to extract a boot, decided to let go of my hand just as I was trying to extract one of my boots. I lost my balance and fell flat on my back into the mud. The lady who, more sensibly, was wading through the puddles and shallow mud on the assigned path, looked across with some concern at two senior citizens struggling "Do you need any help?" she called. She then realised that we were both convulsed in laughter and walked on.

Sensibly, Catherine was soon standing in the mud barefoot and making steady headway in extracting her boots. But my boots were longer, I am heavier and my boots had sunk deeper. I was also on my back. After some minutes, I managed to twist myself sideways which allowed me to pull hard enough to get first one boot free and then the other. In twisting I was now covered in mud, front and back. We eventually made it home, but before being allowed back into the house, I had to be hosed down, fully clothed.

We won't try that again.

But it was in the minutes that I was lying on my back, staring at the sky, wondering how I was going to move, that the realisation that for all the talk of the need for joined up cycle routes in our area, we also have need for a safe, joined up, clearly signposted system of well-maintained footpaths.

There was a time when the majority of the world depended entirely on footpaths. Well done to the many people who are agitating to have them better maintained. It is interesting that it takes a lockdown to make us realise how much we should appreciate them.

Walnut Meadow Recreational & Sports Pitch area

Drayton Parish Council met with Miller Homes and Vale of the White Horse District Council on 8th January to progress preparation of the recreational and sports pitch land at the centre of the Walnut Meadows development.

As updated previously, the land currently does not meet agreed planning obligations, therefore we need to ensure those obligations are met before the Parish Council can proceed with further development, as detailed in the Neighbourhood Plan.

We received a revised proposal from Miller Homes, and although it's moving in the right direction with regard to re levelling most areas, addressing privacy and aesthetic concerns raised by residents, and quality standards required for further development, the District and Parish Council feel there is more work to be done.

The District Council Planning Enforcement team have requested that Miller Homes assess the lowest level the land can be reduced to, taking into consideration drainage requirements for the area. The proposal will then be assessed by Planning Enforcement from a development and drainage perspective, and Oxfordshire County Council from a Highways perspective.

An initial response is expected mid-January, with a full revised proposal by the end of the month. A further update will be provided in next months' Chronicle.

Project Manager

Applications are coming in for a Project Manager for Drayton 2020 implementation projects. This will be an increasing workload as projects like the sports field and pavilion, and professional project management will enable us to ensure the intended outcomes. Applications and proposals will be discussed after the closing date.

<u>Bins</u>

The requested litter bins and dog bins were discussed. Location is critical for their usefulness, but also for access by collection vehicles. The PC is in discussion with Biffa, the contractor, and new bins are expected soon.

Allotment Fencing

An order has been placed for allotment fencing, which is expected to be installed after some enabling works by the contractor. New water troughs have been installed and connected, well done the working parties.

Cycle Path Improvements

Cycle path improvements continue, the latest being Bridleway 29 where drainage work and culvert clearance have reduced the impact of run off from nearby fields. This will make it more passable for pedestrians too. We are looking at specifications for a topping suitable for both horses and cycles. It is hoped

to establish a viable cycle route from Sutton Wick via BWs 29 and 26 connecting with Peep-O- Day Lane/Sustrans No.5

Community Support Working Group

With the ongoing Covid-19 restrictions it is hoped to re start the Community Support Working Group, subject to renewal of funding that made it such a success before..

Land Behind Kiln Lane


Recent interest in the land behind Kiln Lane that has been cleared of undergrowth has prompted a closer look at what, for many, is a forgotten corner of Drayton's History. It's well known that this road's name reflects the brick works that was there, and Eirwen Jones' "Discovering Our Neighbourhood" (on the Drayton web site) suggests that the rebuilding of the village after the Great Fire of 1780 used its bricks, and it may indeed have been established for that purpose.

It was not unusual for small scale brick works to exist to supply local materials for use nearby. There was a clay pit on the north bank of the Thames at Culham, just downstream of the lock, and another at the top of Spring Road in Abingdon. In an era when road transport was still difficult it made sense to source locally. This led to local variety in brick colour, for instance those here are a bright russet red whilst up near Banbury bricks have more yellow and pink in them. Further afield London stock bricks have a dark ochre colour.

The Brick and Tile Works is shown on the 1875 Ordnance Survey, with a small pool to the north of the kilns, but a look at the 1938 map (pub. 1944) shows the extent of the works by then, with the clay pit extending well to the west and right up behind the Wheatsheaf to Marcham Road. Surely an enterprise of this size was shipping its products further afield?

Many people will remember that after the brick works the site was home to Barton Garage, a petrol forecourt with workshops and a yard behind. The road through Drayton was a busy trunk road then, taking traffic from Southampton docks up to the Midlands.

It would be useful to date when production of bricks ceased and when the garage was established. Some local people remember working there, and even remember fishing in the pond that is still there, last sign of the clay pit?



ART INSTALLATIONS IN DRAYTON



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

NEIGHBOURHOOD ACTION GROUP (NAGS) SAFETY CORNER

N.B. Information correct at the time of writing, in mid-January. Coronavirus vaccination scam

Action Fraud has issued a warning about this scam, where members of the public have received text messages claiming to be from the NHS, offering them the opportunity to sign up for vaccinations.

The texts ask the recipient to clink on a link which takes them to an online form where they're prompted to input personal and financial details. In some cases the online form has looked very similar to the genuine NHS website.

When you are eligible to receive your vaccination, you will be contacted by either the NHS, your employer, a local GP surgery or pharmacy.

Coronavirus vaccinations will only be available via the NHS. The vaccinations are free of charge and you will never be

asked for your financial details or to make a payment. Suspicious text messages should be forwarded, free of charge, to 7726. If you're suspicious about an email forward it to *report@phishing.gov.uk*.

If you believe you're the victim of fraud please report it to Action Fraud as soon as possible by calling 0300 123 2040 or via the website at *https://www.actionfraud.police.uk*.

Ask for ANI support for those experiencing domestic abuse

The government has teamed up with Boots and independent pharmacies. The Ask for ANI scheme allows those at risk or suffering from abuse to discreetly signal that they need help and access support. By asking for ANI, a trained pharmacy worker will offer a private space where they can understand if the victim needs to speak to the police or would like help to access support services such as a national or local domestic abuse helplines. THE DOVECOTE

The Dovecote Residents' Association (RA) has the following update on the work that the RA is doing in support of the handover and adoption of The Dovecote, a development in the heart of Drayton:

The RA Elected Committee is actively liaising with Bloor Homes Ltd (as developer), Chamonix Estates Ltd (as property agent), SO-HA, Vale of White Horse District Council, Oxfordshire County Council, Drayton Parish Council and other parties adopting facilities on the development. As background, Bloor has established Dovecote Drayton Management Company Ltd (MC) to take on responsibility for maintenance of the common areas after Bloor completes work on site. Chamonix has been appointed by Bloor to manage day-today activities on behalf of the MC. Chamonix is leading on the handover process.

The RA has two primary streams of work in progress: (1) to influence the handover from Bloor to Chamonix, ensuring that all outstanding work is completed to the satisfaction of the residents; (2) to liaise with local government to ensure the RA has a clear understanding of any local government requirements for completion of works on the development and to support effective handover from Bloor to Chamonix and/or the adoption parties.

Handover is currently expected in the first half of 2021 based on feedback we have received, but a detailed plan is yet to be provided by Chamonix. The RA has numerous questions outstanding with Chamonix on how the MC is being set up and when the first General Meeting can be organised to allow Resident Directors to be appointed. Our real drive is to reach a point where we can influence some control over the MC. Until then we are at the behest of Bloor and Chamonix.

The RA has been fairly successful to-date in our attempts to influence work on site: the play area continues to evolve (albeit slowly) and now has a fence and two gates in place; work has started to finish off the paths onto East Way; we have been able to facilitate minor fixes around the development which have been causing residents concern. We continue to challenge Bloor and Chamonix to ensure they meet their obligations and address issues as they are raised by the residents that we represent. There is still some way to go, but we are working hard and remain optimistic that we will all see the benefit of this community asset.

The Dovecote RA has made contact with residents from the Miller Homes and Cala Homes developments in Drayton and offer our support to them in progressing with their handovers. As we have found through our own experience, encouraging residents to work together is key. 
