As we look with hope for future social gatherings and freedoms from lockdowns, we need to prepare for the "new normal". We perhaps need to review the past year and ask ourselves questions:-

- What have we lost and must remain lost?
- ❖ What have we lost and must regain?
- ❖ What have we gained and must retain?
- What was gained and was alright for a while, but can now be lost?

These four questions were put forward after the first lockdown by the Bishop of Lincoln, and are worth thinking about again in 2021. So many things we took for granted have changed or been lost. New ways of daily living have been found and gained.

As I read back the letter I wrote last April, I can certainly say that things have changed since last Easter! However for Christians, Easter remains the highlight of the year: when Jesus' resurrection is celebrated. His showing to the world, that there is hope, there is life which is eternal. It is a time of new beginnings, of starting a fresh, and also a reminder that we can always start anew with God. His faithful forgiveness will always mean we can start again, begin afresh; a new beginning.

Coronavirus

I'm waiting for the day I don't have to mention this on articles, and it may be only a few articles away... [Ed: WE hope too!]

Cases in Oxfordshire & the Vale of White Horse, once more, are down considerably from last month, which is very encouraging. With the publication of the roadmap out of

restrictions, **there was some concern** that people might drop their guard; reassuringly, this doesn't seem to have happened (at least not in significant numbers). Because people are remaining sensible, at least at the time of writing (March 15th), we look to be well on course to hit the roadmap dates.

We've also seen more than 24 million first doses given, and for over 17 million of those, they've had more than 21 days since receiving that first dose and will have built up good protection already. I also understand that recent supply issues are in the past and we expect to see a considerable acceleration.

We expect to meet our target for Groups 1-9 vaccinated in Oxfordshire by April 15th.

You may have read recent concerns over <u>blood clots</u>. Ironically, when the data is scrutinised, the rate of blood clots in vaccinated people (with both vaccines – AstraZeneca & Pfizer) is *lower* than the rate amongst unvaccinated people.

The MHRA, the NHS, the World Health Organisation, and the European Medical Organisation are all united in <u>underlining</u> that there is NO evidence of any increased danger of blood clots from the AstraZeneca vaccine (and nor the Pfizer one).

With consummate timing in allowing me to put my money where my mouth is, I got phoned up today to be offered my vaccination, with the AstraZeneca vaccine — which I happily accepted. By the time you read this, I'll have had my first dose. I strongly urge you to take your opportunity when it's offered as well.

Symptom-free testing centre

Across the county, the three centres have picked up six positive tests so far – remember this is from routine tests for people who aren't displaying symptoms, so the system is showing the benefit it provides already.

The **community testing roll out** is expanding gradually, with it currently available for anyone who works or volunteers in a role where they have close contact with people outside their home or is a childminder.

If you fall into that category, **please don't hesitate** to pop along to your nearest centre (the Beacon, Wantage) for a test to protect others. Plans are already underway to expand the testing further towards the end of this month/beginning of April to all members of the public that cannot currently access them from their workplace. We're working on what needs to be in place to offer this.

Winter support grant deadline extended

The deadline for Winter Support Grant applications has been <u>extended</u> by a couple of weeks to April 16th and we now have some additional funds from the government to support residents with supermarket vouchers and fuel vouchers or the direct payment of energy or water bills. <u>Anyone needing help</u> should contact the Community Hub (see page 19).

WESTMINSTER



Our new MP (Wantage/Didcot) is David Johnston (OBE, awarded for services to Social Mobility and Education).

I was delighted that 2,620 people responded to my survey regarding Grove Station within just 2 weeks – thank you if you did. Some 98% of respondents

supported it being reopened! We have stiff competition as there are 85 different bids to Gov't for stations or lines to reopen, but I will keep bashing away until we eventually succeed.

I continue to be frustrated with Royal Mail. Our postmen and women work hard, but something is clearly not right as constituents have been complaining to me about mail deliveries for several months, also reported in the national news. When I called a meeting with them last year they said they had gone from 'a letter service delivering parcels to a parcel service delivering letters' and it does seem to be the parcels they prioritise. Every fortnight I enter the Parliamentary ballot (to debate their service) and hope I shall be successful soon.

Unauthorised traveller camps were the subject of my speech in the Police, Crime, Sentencing and Courts Bill debate this month. The Bill has wrongly been accused of restricting our right to protest when actually the protest measures target actions we have seen by organised protest groups in the past year, such as people glueing themselves to roads and stopping ambulances getting through, or shutting down printing presses because they don't like the editorial line of the papers involved.

It is a wide-ranging bill that increases the sentences or time served for a wide range of violent and sexual offences, but it also clamps down on unauthorised traveller camps which are a regular source of distress in the constituency. At the time of writing, in 20 of the past 34 weeks there has been at least one such camp somewhere in the Vale or South Oxfordshire, frequently involving mess, noise, vandalism and other antisocial behaviour. The Bill will allow the police to remove such camps more quickly and impose stiffer penalties.

I had my first appearance on the BBC's Politics Live on 18th March, an interesting if slightly strange experience. Whereas YOU can see everyone's face when you watch on television, each of the panellists look into a black screen on our computers as we can't see anyone! We discussed various topics including the EU's latest silly comments regarding the supply and safety of the AstraZeneca vaccine, which has again been confirmed as completely safe. Despite the noise, we shouldn't worry – we've now vaccinated over 25 million people, half the adult population, and remain on course to see every adult offered a jab by the end of July.

EXOTIC HOLIDAY CAUTION!

<u>Looking forward to holidays, sometime, anytime</u>? Indeed. But this <u>BBC story</u> suggests be wary of the most exotic locations!

A woman in Alaska says she "jumped up and screamed" after she was attacked by a bear while using the toilet.

Shannon Stevens sustained a puncture wound while using a remote outhouse toilet at Chilkat Lake. After hearing her scream, Ms Stevens' brother went to see what had caused the injury, only to find a bear's head in the hole of the toilet. [NB Remote Alaskan camp-sites are unlikely to have mains sewage!]

Ms Stevens says the wound was caused by either a bite or a swipe from the animal's claw. She was spending the weekend in a yurt when the incident occurred. "I got out there and sat down on the toilet and immediately something bit my butt as I sat down" she told the AP news agency.

She screamed for her brother who came out with a head torch to help her. After she pointed him to the toilet, Erik saw "right there at the level of the toilet seat was a bear face," he said.

She managed to treat her wound using a first aid kit. The following morning, they noticed bear prints by the firepit and the outhouse. A local expert thought the animal was a black bear.

"She might be the only person this has ever happened to, maybe other folks have had bizarre things - but during February to sit down in an outhouse and have something like that happen is very unusual". Ms Stevens told the Anchorage Daily News that she will practice a "look before you.. sit" policy in the future....

[Ed:- we went camping once, spent half a week in a Scottish launderette trying to dry things - & us - out. In this case, I feel sorry for the bear! Oh, and in Oz it's snakes & spiders?]


YOUR LETTERS

The Burning Issue

Dear All,

Editor Avenue

<u>Grateful thanks</u> to ALL those (lots!) who emailed or phoned as a result of <u>last month's cover picture</u>, and accompanying



letter, re some burning rubbish on Frogmore Tree Bridleway. The letter was concerned re the likelihood of fly-tipping being the cause (on p4 of that issue).

This is a <u>composite reply</u>, concocted from all received, as they'd occupy far too much space as individual letters here!

They ALSO **pretty much all said the same thing** – that this is the farmer's land, it's a quite <u>normal practice</u> that's occurred for many years now, (several emails were from long-term

walkers over that way), and one letter recalled a similar query being raised with a local councillor perhaps 20 years ago?

One or two replies did suggest that those people who move to the country might expect country-type things to occur there, with reference to complaints on the local Facebook sites re the occasional manure aroma ('Eau de Cowpat'? - yet to happen this year), and the heavy rains some weeks ago, which caused outbreaks of mud on certain paths.

An Accident Waiting . . .

[Ed's note:- this arrived as a copy of a letter to several councils, and the local MP. The path in question runs next to the former 'Sitting Room' furniture shop]

Dear Sir/Madam,

Plough Lane

I am <u>most concerned</u> about the growing practice of motor vehicles using the pedestrian footpath to access and exit the Dovecote development - especially in terms of serious threats and endangerment to the safety and welfare of the very many pedestrian users of this footpath.

This Footpath runs alongside our bungalow and comes out into Drayton High Street, the road to Sutton Courtenay.

It is constantly in use (quite properly) by very many pedestrians, also Children going to and from school, Dog Walkers, Joggers, Runners, Cyclists, Toddlers on trainer bikes (with their parents), Elderly people exercising (with walking aids), Young mothers with pushchairs, Horse riders, and Night time walkers with headlamps on their heads.

This Footpath has no pavement edge – on either side – and therefore has no safe refuge from a motor vehicle illegally driving down, often at speed, in pure self interest & personal convenience.

The dangers are only too obvious and if this is allowed to continue, it will only be a matter of time before there is a personal injury incident . . . or worse!



My wife and I have observed numerous vehicles using this route in and out of the estate at all times of the day and evening. I have remonstrated with a number of drivers, to no avail, and they just keep coming.

I affirmed with Bloor Homes, when buying our bungalow, that this was <u>definitely a footpath</u>, & therefore no motorised vehicular use was permitted. Indeed, if it is designated as a footpath, motorised vehicular use is illegal and a criminal offence, breaching the Road Traffic Act.

A number of residents are calling for a permanently fixed bollard to be installed at the north end of the footpath, as it joins the High Street. This will not only prevent motor vehicles from using it – in any circumstances other than the needs of emergency vehicles – but would also be a clear and immediate visual deterrent from actually even trying to use this footpath in a motor vehicle.

There must also be a sign erected at a strategic point at the start of Plough Lane, inside the development, that clearly states "This is a Dead End". These must be installed as a matter of urgency, before a tragedy occurs.

Recipe Time!

(Courtesy of www.carolinescooking.com) This is Flammekueche (the German name) or (French) tarte flambeé (but you don't set fire to anything!). It's essentially a bacon & onion flatbread/pizza. It may seem like only a few ingredients, but they are transformed into a truly delicious dish - easy to make, too.

I know when you think pizza, you almost certainly think of a traditional Italian pizza with a tomato sauce base.

This dish is from the Alsace region of France as well as the neighboring areas of Germany. The Alsace region has gone back and forth for centuries between Germany and France. As a result, it definitely has some character from both, language and food included. It seems pretty French in the ingredients, using creme fraiche (or fromage blanc), onions and lardons (strips of bacon). Some sources suggest it was originally made by German farmers, to test the heat of the oven the farmers used to make bread. The high heat was perfect to cook this "flamed tart", using just enough toppings to make a tasty meal, too.

The <u>base for flammekueche is different</u> from typical pizza in that there is <u>no yeast or other leavening agent</u>. It's just a pretty simple dough. While it doesn't rise, it does, however, mean the dough rolls out easily and still crisps well. **Just don't be scared to roll it as thin as you can**.

True to the original, less really is more in this dish. If you try to load this pizza up too much, the base won't crisp up properly and will be soggy. **Keep the toppings light** and you'll still get plenty of delicious flavour.

Flammekueche is easier than the average pizza, and with such great flavours. It may have humble ingredients, but the result is crisp, flavourful and oh so good. Give it a try, and you'll be adding it to your regular list as we have!

Notes

If you can't find creme fraiche, try a mix of sour cream and Greek yogurt. Topping with gruyere is optional, but delicious!

Some recipes don't cook the onions or bacon ahead of time. I'm afraid I disagree on this, as while they'll both cook a bit, I think you get a better flavour pre-cooking. If not pre-cooked, the onions might crisp, but they'll taste more like slightly charred raw onions?!

Don't get me wrong, that can be good, but I prefer the gentle sweetness of softened onions. And I think the bacon has a

better flavour when pre-cooked.

Nutmeg might sound a little unusual, but believe me it gives a little lift in flavour to the creme fraiche base. If you can't find creme fraiche, try a blend of sour cream and Greek yogurt to get a similar flavour and texture.

You'll find a few variations on this beyond the basic cream/cheese base, onion and bacon. One is **adding a little gruyere cheese** which was too good not to pass up, to me. You can skip this and it will still be delicious, but it does add a lovely extra flavor.

Ingredients For the base

1 cup all purpose flour 140g plain flour

1 tbsp oil (olive oil/vegetable oil as you prefer)

¹/₄ tsp salt; ¹/₄ cup water 60ml, or a little more as needed

For the topping

2 oz bacon 65g ½ onion medium
½ tbsp butter 3 tbsp creme fraiche
1 pinch nutmeg 1 pinch salt & 1 of pepper

Instructions

Mix together the flour, oil, salt and water in a bowl. If it's too dry and won't come together, add a little more water, but it will be a relatively dry dough. Knead for a minute then set aside while you prepare the toppings.

Preheat the oven to 450F/230C. Line a large baking sheet/tray (half sheet) with parchment.

Cut the bacon into thin strips ('lardons') and cook in a small skillet/frying pan over a medium heat until they are just starting to brown. Remove from pan and set aside.

Add the onions to the pan, along with the butter, and cook for a few minutes until the onions have softened but are only just browning.

Add the nutmeg, salt and pepper to the creme fraiche and mix well.

Roll the dough out on a lightly floured surface into a circle/oval as thin as you can (around 1/8 inch / 3mm).

Transfer the dough to the lined baking sheet then spread the creme fraiche (mixture) over the top, leaving a space around the edge without any topping.

Spread over the sauteed onions, then top with the bacon, spreading them as evenly as you can. **Top** with the gruyere then bake for around 10 minutes until the edges are lightly brown and crisp and the toppings are just starting to colour!

All Hail Drayton!

Drayton's Night of Hail, 1849.

On June 5th, 1849, Drayton suffered a **natural disaster**. Newspapers across England reported on a 'terrific thunderstorm' that affected towns and villages from Leicestershire to Sussex. Crops were destroyed, livestock and wild animals killed, and homes flooded. Several people were struck by the 'electric fluid.' In Oxfordshire, a man was killed when a fireball fell on a hovel, and an elderly woman died of fright.

The storm produced huge round hailstones, some 'the size of a pigeon's egg'. Napton (in Warwickshire) experienced very serious damage from these hailstones 'of a great size, falling with such force as to shatter the glass', leaving hardly a pane of glass intact in the village. In Brighton, hailstones were 'larger than walnuts', some as large as 3 ½ inches in circumference, and 'very hard, with sharp jagged edges'. They 'fell in congealed masses of christalised ice, committing great havoc.'

The hail-fall was extremely localised to particular villages, and even parts of villages. The storm was particularly violent in Drayton. The weather had been oppressively hot for several days, and on Monday June 4th, thunder had been heard all day until the storm finally broke around midnight, with the heavy hail falling at 1 o'clock in the morning. Some damage was also caused in Steventon and Sutton Wick, but by the time the storm reached Sutton Wick, it had abated.

→> A land surveyor and resident of Drayton, John Dymock, wrote to the *Oxford Journal* a week later to provide 'a correct statement of the dreadful hail storm at Drayton.':- 'I consider the damage to the growing crops exceeds *two thousand pounds* [almost £260K today!], as there are three hundred and ninety five acres that are partially or totally destroyed . . .and, I regret to add it is *all uninsured*. Some idea may be formed of the storm, when I inform you that partridges, larks and mice were found dead in the fields. In addition to this slates were broken into pieces on the roofs, and hundreds of squares of glass were smashed to atoms. The poor will suffer greatly, as the garden produce is much damaged or destroyed.'

Many farmers sustained significant losses. The storm passed 'exactly over' the farm of James Lyford, who received the 'chief fury' of the storm and lost 100 acres of beans and wheat worth £1000. William Caudwell also lost 89 acres. Nevertheless, seven of Drayton's farmers, who were relatively affluent, set up a donation fund, overseen with the help of two clergymen, to support four of the worst-affected occupants of damaged land. The farmers acknowledged that the storm had been caused by 'an All-Wise Providence' (ie God), but asked that people help these 'deserving individuals whose slender circumstances make their loss more severe.':-

WILLIAM BRADFIELD with wife and two children, occupies 10 Acres of Arable Land: the whole of his crop damaged.

WILLIAM MILLS with wife and five children, occupies 6 acres: nearly the whole of his crop destroyed.

WILLIAM LYFORD with wife and four children, occupies 19 acres: 12 1/2 acres damaged.

JOHN HUMPHREYS with wife and seven children, occupies 31 acres: 13 1/2 Acres damaged.

Others were quick to try to profit from the hail storm at Drayton, adverts soon appeared in county newspapers for HAIL INSURANCE!

As I write this, on March 13th, hail is - believe it or not - falling in my back garden, but I'm cosy and warm inside, and I'm not depending on my allotment to feed my family. In spite of COVID-19 - our current natural disaster - I can't help but think how lucky I am.

County Council Report

Infrastructure and Growth

For the last 10 years, the six ancient Oxfordshire villages of Appleford, Sutton Courtenay, Milton, Drayton, Marcham and Shippon that make up our County Division, have all been under pressure from rapid development and housing expansion. It is the same in many parts of the South of England, but our thriving economy has made us a focus for growth and an increasing need for more infrastructure. As a result we seem to need more roads, bridges, rail lines and reservoirs. And it all generates millions of tons of carbon and is making our targets to address climate change ever harder to achieve.

The UK is chairing the Cop26 Climate Conference (Glasgow) later this year and government is well aware of our responsibility and need to be seen as a world leader in attempting to solve the Climate Emergency. It seems very likely that we will have to reconsider how we balance economic growth and recovery from the pandemic with understanding and controlling the carbon footprint of so many infrastructure projects.

Everywhere has been under enormous change in recent years and it has certainly not all been an improvement.

I hope that future generations will look back at the work of the Parish Council and the efforts of Drayton volunteers and agree that the changes they have helped to bring about to our village were all very much for the good.

After having the vaccination **you should STILL continue to follow the rules**. It's not yet known if it's possible for those who have been vaccinated to pass on the virus to others, and there are concerns about further mutations.

COVID-19 vaccination

When it's your turn to have the vaccination, the NHS will contact you - by phone, letter, email or, more recently, by text-with information on how to book your appointment. There are a variety of ways in which appointments are made: either via a phone call from your GP surgery, or you may be asked to make an appointment by phone or online. Please be aware of the warning about vaccination scams, below.

If you've received a letter, but not booked an appointment, you may receive a call from the NHS Immunisation Management Service - this will be from 0300 561 0240 and will be a reminder to book your vaccination appointment. The caller will ask if you need any help or support.

Vaccination SCAMS

If, during the appointment booking process, you are asked to provide ANY of the following IT IS DEFINITELY NOT a genuine communication from the NHS. There are many such scams in circulation, and you should not proceed any further.

Your bank details. . . Your PIN or banking password . . or . .

Copies of personal documents to prove your identity – such as your passport, driving licence, bills or pay slips.

The **COVID-19 vaccination** is available **only** through the NHS and is free-of-charge.

<u>'Regular' Scams</u> Coronavirus has prompted a huge increase in scams. The latest reports include:-

A **Royal Mail text scam**, where the recipient is asked to click on a link to pay a small amount of money to have a package delivered. If you receive one of these texts <u>do not click on the link</u>, since the aim is to obtain your financial details. **Please forward the text to 7726** (free of charge), so that your network provider can investigate.

An **HM Courts and Tribunals Service** (HMCTS) **scam**, where criminals are using the Royal Courts of Justice contact information to claim that victims owe money to HMRC and that arrest warrants have been issued. Victims have been contacted by phone and email. If you receive any communication from HMCTS regarding HMRC **you can be sure it's not genuine**. The Royal Courts of Justice will never contact you about tax matters. If you receive one of these emails, report it as follows:-

Suspicious Email Reporting Service

This <u>new service</u> has been launched by the National Cyber Security Centre and the police. In the first few months, they had hundreds of thousands of reports, leading so far to several thousand links to bogus websites being removed.

If YOU receive a suspicious email **please forward it** to **report@phishing.gov.uk** – then of course delete it from your inbox! (this excellent new service is quickly having an effect, please note they DO send you a confirmation email)

To contact the police call either 101 (if it's urgent) or 999 (for emergencies). IF POSSIBLE, please use their online reporting method at **www.thamesvalley.police.uk** (you'll be contacted within 24hrs of filing a report)

→>> And a National Insurance scam

Action Fraud has issued a warning about this scam.

Victims receive an automated telephone call saying that their "National Insurance number has been compromised".

The victim's told that this can be fixed by giving them a new National Insurance number, and that they should "press 1" on their handset in order to be connected to the caller.

Once connected to the "caller" victims are pressured into giving their personal details so they can receive a new National Insurance number. **In reality they've been connected to a criminal** who can now use the victim's personal details to commit fraud.

It's important to remember that if you're contacted out of the blue by someone asking for your personal or financial details, this is <u>99.9999% a SCAM!</u> Even confirming personal details, such as your email address, date of birth or mother's maiden name, can be used by criminals to commit fraud. **If you have any doubts** about what is being asked of you, hang up the phone. **No legitimate organisation will rush or pressure you**.

This month <u>TEN years ago</u> our news bulletins were full of concern for the **Fukushima** (Japan) nuclear disaster, its reactor had been badly affected by a major earthquake and tsunami. But we cheered up near the end of April as record numbers watched **William & Kate's** wedding.

In April 2001, the first Space Tourist, one Dennis Tito, paid \$20million for a trip on a Russian Soyuz craft to the International Space Station, spending about a week orbiting the Earth. SIX TRADITIONAL KITCHEN 'HACKS'

{Allegedly French hints, but probably grannies will say they knew of them here ages ago!}

GET RID OF BAD SMELLS

Put a bowl of white vinegar in the kitchen and it will absorb all those malingering cooking odours, from fish to onions to cabbage. Phew, that's better!

RESCUE OVER-SEASONED DISHES

If you've been a bit heavy-handed with the salt or the chilli powder, don't panic - peel a potato, pop it in the dish and leave it to do its work - it will absorb the excess spices. Just remember to remove the potato before serving...
