

From the Ministry Team......New can be messy!

On Easter Sunday I stood at dawn in a garden, one voice among many celebrating that 'Jesus Christ is risen today'. In the meantime, we are looking forward to the Ascension (13 May) - where the risen Jesus leaves his disciples – and to Pentecost (23 May) - where we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit. These events coincide with loosening restrictions on 12 April, then 17 May, as we work towards 21 June, when, if all goes to plan, most things open up again: theatres, cinemas, music venues, gyms, churches. Much to celebrate together as a new normal appears. Yet, as we emerge from the pandemic are we filled with joy or doubt? What is the new normal? What are the effects of long Covid and how can our NHS be strengthened? Will offices reopen, will the centres of our towns and villages ever fully recover, when will foreign travel be possible? It will take time to find answers to these oncein-a-life time questions, just as it did for the disciples of Jesus.

They knew for certain that Jesus' resurrection was so, so important; and before his Ascension, Jesus did a number of things to 'convince' them that he is alive again. He eats and drinks. After his death and resurrection, Jesus appears first to Mary Magdalene, in the garden outside his tomb and, later that evening to the other disciples. Mary mistook the risen Jesus for a gardener and Thomas didn't believe his fellow disciples when they tell him that they've seen Jesus. Thomas wants the empirical evidence of his own eyes. A week later, Jesus tells Thomas to look at his hands and touch them, to 'reach out' his hand and put it in his side wound, he says 'Do not doubt, but believe'. The resurrection hasn't made Jesus look perfect – but the renewal is transformational. And that is what God is about - making you new. New can be messy. It seems to be part of God's way; things won't always look the way we think they should. We may have more questions than answers right now, but a good question, lovingly held, can hold us open to the possibility of different answers, of new life.

So what does resurrection look like from within this pandemic? Perhaps we've already been answering, through new ways to work, or closer connections to creation, or unleashing our creativity, or by re-imagining how we see our neighbours — the same faces yet having experienced very different journeys.

Perhaps new life comes as we admit that we are indeed fragile, that we need each other, that letting go is often how we open our hands to receive. But we don't have to go back to how things were, when we can go forward with some faith that things can change, as we can change, for good.

So as we hold the questions open, and look forward towards Pentecost and beyond, you are invited to come along, just as you are, to any of the services taking place across the Parish (details included elsewhere in this magazine). All are welcome.

God the Holy Spirit invites a response from each of us to live as Christ, even on our most uncertain days; and in the words of Paul (from the Message version of 1 Corinthians 13) we are given something to work with: 'Trust steadily in God. Hope unswervingly. Love extravagantly.'

May we wish you every blessing this Eastertide.

LETTER FROM WESTMINSTER

David Johnston MP Member of Parliament for Wantage

I was the 135th speaker for the House of Commons motion to pay tribute to Prince Philip, but they only got to the 131st MP. Had I been able to speak I would have recounted an anecdote in James



Callaghan's book in which he found himself squeezed into a small car with Prince Philip and Margaret Thatcher. Despite the fact he had been PM, he wrote "I recognised at once the force of their characters and decided that my best contribution to the general happiness would be to remain quite quiet." Sensible man. Few people will serve their country as long and as steadfastly as Prince Philip did ours.

So far, so good, on reopening post lockdown. I spent most of the first full Friday I could visiting shops and pubs who were, as you can imagine, pleased to have reopened – despite that snow on day 1! Just before the retail visits, I'd been at the Sylva Foundation and the Earth Trust in Little Wittenham and been inspired by what both are doing. Make sure you check out the brand-new Earth Lab the latter has been building, which will open in the near future, not least to admire its construction. It is built with glulam beams and has a rammed earth wall, straw installation and a wildflower roof – I got a sneak peek and was very impressed.

I am among the MPs who has returned to parliament Monday-Thursday each week (parliament only sits on occasional Fridays). It's not exactly lively yet — many MPs are continuing to participate virtually and there are so many restrictions in every part of the building, including the continuation of the 50 person limit in the House of Commons, that you don't see many people in the way you used to. But important business continues to proceed, including the Domestic Abuse and Finance Bills.

Much continues to be by Zoom however. It has been a pleasure to continue to attend meetings of parish councils, most recently that of Aston Tirrold and Aston Upthorpe. I am always impressed with the dedication of people who sit on parish councils as there is not a lot of glory to the posts, but they're vital to ensuring that very local issues get the consideration they should. And, of course, parish councils played a key role in the community's response to Covid. I also continue to take searching questions from school children via Zoom – as I did just before Easter with Sutton Courtenay primary school. Some of the questions children ask you are tougher than the ones adults do.

The constituency and Oxfordshire have done very well from the Government's Culture Recovery Fund, with Didcot Railway Centre, Oxford Philharmonic Orchestra and Origin Technical Productions receiving a combined £400,000 in the latest round and 31 organisations receiving over £5 million overall — I hope we see them all flourish when they can get back to normal.

DISTRICT COUNCIL REPORT Andy Cooke

Coronavirus

Still on this subject, but with the encouraging continuation of the reduction in cases, hospitalisations, and deaths (brought down by lockdown, increasingly kept down by vaccination), we can focus more and more on the nuts and bolts of what's needed to help people.

Variants

While there has rightly been surge testing on the variants of covid that have made their way into the UK, it's become clear that the vaccines we already have do provide excellent protection against severe illness from them. A recent outbreak of the "South African" variant (B.1.351) in a care home in Lambeth (brought in through staff who had refused the vaccine) caused zero serious illnesses or deaths amongst the residents who had been vaccinated with the Oxford/Astrazeneca vaccine.

It is right to test and trace these, but some media outlets have blown them up into scare stories that these evade the vaccines. While some erode (to a degree) the protection against transmission and asymptomatic illness, or even mild illness, the protection against severe illness and death appears as strong as ever.

Grants

Grants for "restarting" business delivering in-person services for the general public are now available, paying up to £6,000 for non-essential retail businesses, and up to £18,000 for hospitality businesses, accommodation, leisure, personal care and gym or sport business premises. Please contact grants@southandvale.gov.uk if you think you may have an eligible business, and don't hesitate. And, once more, sign up for business email updates from the newsletter at sbvs.co.uk to get any potential grant information as soon as possible. The scheme will be open until 30th June 2021.

(We had originally intended to make immediate automatic payments to business rate payers without needing an application form as we have for similar grants, but the government has said it wants us to collect additional information and carry out counter-fraud checks. This meant that a new application process had to be designed just for this scheme, so PLEASE check to see if you can apply if you're running any sort of business)

Test and Trace £500 payments

The government recently expanded the scheme to pay £500 to eligible people who lose income having been told to self-isolate through the Covid test and trace system — it now includes eligible parents and guardians who lose income if their children are sent home from school due to positive cases among students or staff. A revised application form will be available on our website soon.

If you are on a low income (under £306 per week) and will face financial hardship as a result of self isolating, you may be eligible for a payment. Check at the District Council website at https://www.whitehorsedc.gov.uk/vale-of-white-horse-district-council/coronavirus-community-support/support-for-people-who-need-help/financial-support-available-for-those-on-benefits-who-are-told-to-self-isolate/

Leisure services reopening

We're gradually reopening leisure centres and outdoor pools. Centres, facilities, and activities are only opening where it is possible to do so and maintain social distancing. The capacity and procedures in place will be kept under constant review.

White Horse Leisure & Tennis Centre, Wantage Leisure Centre, and Faringdon Leisure Centre are all at least partially reopened under covid-secure rules; all activity sessions need to be prebooked ahead of visits (Fitness Classes, Creches, Sauna/Steam Rooms, and Coffee shops are still closed at the time of writing (19th April)).

We intend to reopen the outdoor pools at Abbey Meadow in Abingdon and Riverside in Wallingford; exact opening dates yet to be confirmed.

Garden Waste

Our Garden Waste systems are undergoing an upgrade – we are currently unable to accept new applications. The upgrade should be complete "by early May"; I haven't managed to get any more specific dates.

Cycle Hub at Didcot Parkway

Didcot Parkway Station has just opened its new cycle hub with space for an extra 600 bikes. The hub caters for standard and non-standard bikes to be securely parked. It is fitted with CCTV, motion sensor LED lighting and bike repair stands. The new cycle hub has opened ahead of 16 May, when GWR aims to run around 90 per cent of its usual timetable of trains.

That's all for this month. Stay safe, take care, and with any luck, we'll be on the run-up to the final relaxation of restrictions next time I write one of these!

The Arts

Those who know me best, will be aware that I am an ardent Arts fanatic. Indeed I have three children involved in the arts an artist, a cellist and an actor – so I write with some feeling. The past eighteen months have been a trial for all of them with events cancelled and venues closed. The artist has come through least scathed while the cellist has been able to continue with private tuition and performance opportunities are beginning to resurface. The actor has kept going with a second career whilst awaiting the reopening of venues, some of which may not survive.

Most of us have depended for the past year on potted entertainment provided by the likes of Amazon and Netflix, but the opportunities for new talent to emerge have shrunk dramatically. We wait to see how live theatres and concert halls will manage in the unlocking from Covid process. There is a worry that the public will be reluctant to visit such venues in time to save some of them.

New building developments demand contributions towards sculptures, mosaics and murals from developers. There is no such long term provision for live arts – theatre, music, dance etc. If and when Covid restrictions allow, those of us who appreciate live arts will need to reengage as soon as possible if the industry is not to suffer long term damage.

Local Elections

All of us involved in politics at any level need to know we have the support of the people we represent. Most local elections are won on a 35% turnout or less. Democracy and all those who have fought for it, and those who have died for it cannot thrive long term with that level of involvement. Please vote on May 6th.







Sculpture Tribute to Drayton Resident

On Christmas Day 2014, Mary Lyon died at the age of 89. It is typical of her modesty that, although she had been a long-time resident of Crabtree Lane, many of her neighbours were unaware that she was one of the foremost geneticists of the 20th century. Officially, she retired in 1990 but, in different capacities, she continued working until two years before her death.

Mary was pivotal in leading and developing mouse genetics at Harwell, and perhaps her greatest achievement was the discovery of X chromosome inactivation in 1961. In recognition of her work, she was made a Fellow of the Royal Society and in 1984 received their Royal Medal; she was also awarded the Pearl Meister Greengard Prize, the March of Dimes Prize and the Wolf Prize in Medicine. She was elected a foreign member of the US National Academy of Sciences in 1979, and in 2013, the UK Genetics Society created the Mary Lyon medal in her honour. The Mary Lyon Centre, a national facility for mouse functional genomics, opened in 2004 on the site where she worked.

Her discoveries led to great advances in our understanding of X-linked inherited diseases such as haemophilia, Duchenne muscular dystrophy, fragile X syndrome and certain cancers. Now, a sculpture commemorating her work has been installed outside the new training centre, Advance. Advance is a bespoke scientific training centre at MRC Harwell offering specialist practical and theoretical training courses to develop the skills and knowledge within the life sciences. It has long glass spears with unique double helix air twists within it. These glass spears are surrounded by 150 metal X-chromosome shapes, each with DNA shapes cut within them.



The sculpture was designed and created by Jenny Pickford, an artist blacksmith from Herefordshire. Jenny creates sculptures using a mixture of glass and metal, saying she loves the interesting contrasts between the fragility of the glass and the strength of the ironwork. It is a fantastic tribute to the history of MRC Harwell's mammalian genetic research and the groundbreaking work of Mary Lyon.

SCAMS

According to the banking industry body, UK Finance, UK consumers were scammed out of a record £479 million last year, with a five per cent annual rise in money lost by customers unwittingly sanctioning payments to criminals. This included a 94 per cent increase in "impersonation scams" where criminals posing as trusted organisations, including the NHS, HMRC, the Royal Mail and DVLA, (some examples of texts below), conned customers out of nearly £97 million.

Bank card scam

A local resident, and Neighbourhood Watch member, reported receiving a phone call in which she was informed that her bank card had been compromised by someone using it overseas to withdraw several hundred pounds. She was asked to use the phone number provided to call to arrange a replacement card. Fortunately, the resident recognised that it was most probably a scam and ended the call. She called her bank, on a different phone line and not using the number that the caller had provided, and ascertained that her bank card had not been compromised, and that it was indeed a scam.

Five signs you might be being scammed

You're contacted out of the blue, even if the caller claims to be from an organisation that you use.

The offer seems too good to be true.

You feel under pressure to make a decision.

You're asked to share personal and financial information. You're asked to keep it a secret.

Ensure you have anti-virus software installed on your devices and always update it when prompted. Use passwords containing a minimum of eight characters, including upper and lower-case letters, numerals and symbols (e.g. *,!,#). Change your passwords regularly.






DID YOU KNOW?

GARDENING FOR BEES AND OTHER POLLINATORS



Bee facts

There are about 250 species of bees in the UK; 224 wild solitary bees, 25 wild bumble bees and 1 domesticated honey bee

A honey bee produces a teaspoon of honey (about 5 grams) in her lifetime.

To produce a kilogram of honey, bees fly the equivalent of three times around the world in air miles.

The type of flower the bees take their nectar from determines the honey's flavour

To get more bees, grow more colourful plants. Bees love blue and prefer cluster plants such as lavender and rosemary.

Trees to help pollinators

Male grey willow (Salix cinerea)
Goat willow (Salix caprea)

Small-leaved lime (Tilia cordata)

Apple (Malus sp - any, fruit bearing, or ornamental)

Cherry Plum (Prunus cerasifera)



Wild Hawthorn (Crataegus monogyna/laevigata)

Gardening tips to help pollinators

Provide flowers throughout the year – some bees emerge as early as February.

Buy organic, if possible, to ensure bulbs and plants haven't been treated with neonicotinoids.

Have a flowering lawn.

Provide a source of water for bees.

Leave a patch of bare earth – mason bees gather mud to build egg cells.

Leave the dead plant stems over winter. Hollow stems may be used by bees for over wintering.

Include a variety of flower shapes – different species have different tongue lengths.

Fenny Drayton – the centre of England

Fenny Drayton folk have long thought that their village nestles in the heart of England's Green and Pleasant land. In 2002 The Ordnance Survey agreed with them when it determined that Lindley Hall Farm on the outskirts of the village was the geographical centre of England. Alas the centre is not open to the public but some years ago the farmer did allow a village walk to view the monument that has been erected to point to the precise Centre of England which is in the middle of one of his fields.

Fenny Drayton was formally known as Drayton-in-the Clay. It is divided by an old Roman road and the excavations for the foundations of house extensions often throw up Roman coins. The oldest building in the village and its focal point is the Church of St Michael and All Angels. The church was originally built in the 12th century and is of Gothic design with Norman features. The church is surrounded by a circle of 28 yew trees thought to be one of the oldest yew circles in the country. The church has been upgraded through the centuries, the most recent addition being a small community room/kitchen and loo. These most modern of facilities mean that in normal times, in addition to the usual church services the church is used for rock concerts, banquets and talks on all manner of subjects from the history of the trumpet to fly mating rituals. The medieval banquet and Harry Potter Murder Mystery Evening had the unintended consequence of traffic calming as speeding motorists rubbernecked villagers walking to church in a wide variety of costumes. The older ladies have coffee mornings and those of us of a certain age met once a month for 'Friday with Friends'. There is a difference food theme each month and we enjoy a glass or two of our favourite tipple and put the world to rights.

There are approximately 220 houses in the main village settlement and several outlying farms. There are a few Victorian cottages, but the architectural style of the homes reflects every era of the 20th century. Like most small villages the school, pub and shop are now part of village history and although the occasional bus laden with school children

passes through even the bus shelter is no longer used. The only other village amenity is the children's playing field this is again used for village gatherings and a Summer Festival. The farmer who owns the adjacent field organised beacons as part of the national chains to commemorate the Queens Jubilee in 2012 and the centenary of the end of World War 1 in 2018. Many villagers worked from home even before the pandemic, the only visible businesses are those associated with diversification by the local farmers.

Fenny Drayton's most famous son is George Fox (1624-1691), the founder of the Quakers. In normal times we have visits from Quakers from all over the world including an annual visit in August from students of the Quaker School in Tokyo. Many of the road names reflect the Quaker heritage. There is a memorial obelisk and interpretation board and a stand of trees planted to commemorate the 400th anniversary of George Fox's death in 1991.

Historians debate the precise location of the Battle of Bosworth Field and whether it was actually in Bosworth. Like most of the neighbouring villages we have an historian who thinks it took place in our village. Fenny Drayton is just South of Bosworth Field and Richard III's cortege passed along the road adjacent to the village. Fenny Drayton received one of the highest reparation payments after the battle but whether this was because one of the armies was based at the village or for crops and damage is still matter of debate.

Some villagers claim to have heard the ghosts of Dick Turpin and Black Bess riding through the village even though he was hanged in York. Dick Turpin used to hold up stagecoaches on the nearby Watling Street (now the A5) and hide his horse Black Bess in the cellar of The Cock Inn at Sibson, 3 miles north of the village. Our remaining 'village' pub is The Royal Redgate half a mile south of the village is where most village teenagers get their first job. Unfortunately, it is only accessible by car as there is no footpath. It is famous for its pies and according to legend earned the Royal part of its title when Queen Adelaide, wife of William IV, stopped at the Royal Redgate Inn as she travelled from Warwick Castle to Gopsall Hall in Leicestershire in the 1830s. The pub has a less salubrious past in the early 1800s, it did a brisk trade while hosting bare knuckle fights. Because the pub is directly on the Leicestershire/Warwickshire border if the constable from Nuneaton turned up to break up the fight the pugilists and spectators would step over into Leicestershire where the constable had no jurisdiction.

It is said the best things come in small packages. Fenny Drayton is a small village, indeed the local council deem it a



rural hamlet, but it has a strong identity and a vibrant community spirit. When the virus is done with pay us a visit.
