

Obeying the Rules?

This time last year we were still wondering how many of us would be obeying the new Covid rules.
There had been quite a bit

of posturing by those who seem to regard rules as challenges to be confronted: "Rules are there to be broken". However, recent studies have shown that we've all been remarkably good!

Of course, lockdown was effectively unenforceable because the police couldn't be outside every house and on every street corner – but it seems that disapproval from other people played a big part in whether the rules were being obeyed. The law has helped by making the rules clear and helping people to work together, and there has been a sense of common identity in trying to protect the NHS.

But now, we might ask, are people going to follow the social distancing rules when it won't be against the law to mix, and they are just being asked to be careful? Or are they going to throw their masks away on June 21? There's much talk now about "Getting back to normal". But the guidelines, the rules about how to care for each other while the pandemic lasts, will still be there. It will only be a 'new normal'.

The thing about quotations such as "Rules are only there to be broken" is that they are usually a part of longer quotations which have been very well thought out – and not a call to blind disobedience, but a call to think; like this quote from Terry Pratchett: "Look, that's why there's rules, understand? So that you think before you break 'em."

Reason tells us that, sometimes, we need to obey rules to live in a safe and ordered society. Reason tells us that if we don't obey the road safety rules, we, or someone else, might get seriously injured or killed. Reason may tell us that the Covid danger might not be over by June 21, and that the logic behind the rules remain.

Jesus gave us an illustration. He got into real trouble with the religious authorities one day because his disciples had picked ears of corn to eat on the Sabbath - because they were hungry. But, said Jesus, the rule to rest on the Sabbath was made for the benefit of the people, not to make a rod for their backs (or words to that effect). He went straight to the original intention of the rule, and he applied it. We need to do that with the Covid rules.

Sometimes, by mindlessly applying a rule – or mindlessly dismissing it - we can completely miss the greater truth it is pointing towards. The greater truth here is the love of God, and his love and care for all people – and their safety and well-being.

Now that all our churches are open for Services again, we continue to be careful with our social distancing precautions. People report that they feel safe, and we are always delighted to welcome any who would like to join us.





Andy Cooke (Councillor) News Letter



Coronavirus

Still on this subject, with the recent (at the time of writing) kerfuffle about the India Variant (B1.617.2): For all the sound and fury in the media, it does look like the brief "spike" in cases, hospitalisations, and deaths from this (I put "spike" in quotes as the number of each at the top of the spikes was low in comparison to what we saw as routine

just a month ago) ... came almost exclusively from cases brought into the country, rather than community transmission.

Of course, by the time this is published, a week from the time of writing, I could look a bit foolish, but as it's proven susceptible to our vaccines (the spikes were in groups that either refused the vaccine or hadn't yet been offered it), I strongly suspect that this will fade away like the previous variant fears. It doesn't mean that we're wrong to be looking at it carefully; that's what gives us an early start in combatting any real problems, but the takeaway message seems to be "Keep Calm And Carry On Vaccinating."

Covid levels in Oxfordshire have remained low and steady recently; we'll have had more than a week since the 17th of May relaxations when you read this and have a decent idea of how things are unfolding. I believe the best guidance is to remain sensible and use our common sense as things unfold – by the time you read this, we should have had over 37 million first doses given, and 22 million second doses given; we are in an ever-improving situation and staying sensible should be all we need to continue on the roadmap.

Potential Waste Collection Disruptions

Biffa, who drive our bin trucks, are facing a shortage of drivers due to a number of factors (including travel restrictions for workers from abroad, a lack of driving tests over the past year due to Covid-19 and many drivers switching to fill the increasing number of jobs doing online delivery work). There have been a handful of cases across the District where waste collection services have been disrupted. They are on a recruitment drive to try to see off the problem before it develops further.

Proceeds from the White Horse Lottery central community fund will be spent on providing vital support to a wide range of local organisations and community initiatives which have a beneficial impact on the local community.

Dovecote and drains

We have recently had reports of multiple drains on the new Dovecote estate being seriously clogged up by works carried out (sand and silt that was not cleared). This has been flagged up to both the Vale (for Environmental Health) and County (for roads). I have found that there are limited powers available beyond strongly advising Bloors to rectify the situation, as they still own the roads and drains; we can't issue enforcement notices on them (yet). They have been advised that the roads are unadoptable without rectification work; speaking with both councils, they have a snagging list prepared that is being shared with Bloors.

In discussion with residents there, I noticed a little confusion about what a councillor is and does. To remove confusion — I am not an employee of the council (and therefore have no compunction whatsoever about being as awkward as necessary towards them about issues raised, although I very rarely have to be; they're usually as helpful as possible). I was elected as the representative of the community to the council, and of the council to the community. Please do not hesitate to email me with issues relating to the Vale of White Horse District Council (planning, environmental health, leisure centres, waste collection) — my role is to follow up on those issues and ask the awkward questions. It may very well be that the Vale doesn't have the power or remit to sort certain things out, but if we don't raise them, the chances fall to zero.

On this, I have learned in my two years just how limited are the Council's powers, especially in enforcement (If they can't

demonstrate that they have taken every opportunity to resolve issues without legal measures, it damages their standing in court, and some (not all!) developers are skilled at inching along just enough to show apparent movement towards resolution in the apparent hope that people will get sick of it and just let them go). However, my philosophy is that it's the squeaky wheel that gets the oil, as they say, and being stubborn and sticking at it is often the way to overcome the "inching along" issue (eventually it looks more expensive to do that for the developers than just getting on and doing it right).

Accordingly, I'm going to be prodding the council weekly about these drains, giving them the ammunition to prod the developer about it in their turn, which underlines to the developer that it's not just going to go away so they have to do something about it.

Walnut Meadows

In addition, by sticking at it methodically, the developers can run out of road in trying to inch along. I'm hopeful that this may have <u>finally</u> happened at Walnut Meadows. After a **far**-too-long drawn-out series of arguments, ably and extensively supported by the Parish Council, we appear to have reached a point where a very specific instruction to lower the land levels on the future sports pitches *all the way to the original levels* has been formally issued. Crucially, this instruction is supported by specific and supportable environmental requirements, meaning that enforcement action should be properly (and finally!) available if they do not comply.

However, I've thought before that we've got there, so I won't yet be holding my breath, but will be keeping an eye on this keenly. I understand Miller Homes are very eager to leave the site; well, all they've got to do is finally complete what is outstanding. The land level reduction should unlock the rest of what needs to be achieved to get the sports pitches and sports hall created.

Grants

A reminder that the Restart Grant is open for applications until 30 June and final payments will be made by 31 July. More info at svbs.co.uk/restart-grant. This grant is for "restarting" business delivering in-person services for the general public are now available, paying up to £6,000 for non-essential retail businesses, and up to £18,000 for hospitality businesses, accommodation, leisure, personal care and gym or sport business premises. If you run a local business, please check svbs.co.uk and sign up for the newsletter there to get early visibility of any grants.

Community Lottery

The Vale of White Horse District Council's new lottery, the White Horse Community Lottery will launch in June with a special virtual event.

Organisations from the district's voluntary and community sector will be invited to attend the event on Monday 14 June to find out how they can benefit from income raised through the Vale's new community lottery.

The lottery will have a weekly jackpot of £25,000 and will be available for residents to play online. The draw will take place every Saturday, with a jackpot going to anybody who matches a sequence of six numbers. The other prizes are £2,000, £250, £25 or three free tickets.

Residents can get involved by buying tickets which will cost £1 per week with 50p going towards the player's chosen local good cause. 10p of the remaining money goes into the central community fund, 20p to the prize fund, 17p towards the administration of the lottery, and 3p on VAT.

The first draw for the White Horse Community Lottery will take place in September.

We've had 2 Cabinet Ministers visit the constituency in the past month. First up was Priti Patel, Home Secretary, in support of Matt Barber's (successful) campaign to be the Police and Crime Commissioner. She visited Great Western Park, where residents have had considerable problems of unau-

thorised traveller camps. This is something I have raised in the House of Commons on more than one occasion and something that Matt has campaigned against with people like ClIr Ian Snowdon. GWP residents appreciated meeting her as she is bringing forward the new laws on this problem.


The second was Kwasi Kwarteng, Secretary of State for BEIS. This came about after I told him about Johnson Matthey's new flagship site at Milton Park to develop and test the next generation of electric vehicle batteries; he said he'd be pleased to visit. After the official opening I took him to Greencore Construction's Springfield Meadows development in Southmoor. I have already brought the Minister for Science, Research and Innovation to see their impressive homes and set up Greencore to meet the Government's Net Zero Champion, too, but I am keen for as many in government as possible to see how they've built not just net zero but carbon-positive homes.

While on the subject of the environment, I am holding a pre-COP26 summit for constituents on 1st July at which we'll talk about some of the key issues we need to make progress on, showcase some of the great local organisations we have locally – including Greencore – and agree ideas to send to Alok Sharma, President of COP26, ahead of the summit.

It has been good to be able to have more face-to-face meetings and visit more places as lockdown has eased. I have had very enjoyable visits to all sorts of shops, pubs (such as the Radnor Arms in Coleshill) and restaurants (such as the Fish in Sutton Courtenay). Other highlights have included Tom Brown's School Museum in Uffington, still in its original 1617 school building, and Flowers from Molly in Faringdon, which allows you to nominate someone to receive a bunch of flowers or a letter of hope if you think they could do with a lift.

I have secured the cross-party support I needed to be able to hold a debate in parliament on the performance of Royal mail; it is clear we are not the only area that has been having problems. It is now just a question of when the debate can be scheduled. I read in the paper that in Wantage and Grove some residents have just received post from up to 13 years ago as a former postal worker had it in their home this whole time, but I don't think that accounts for the problems we've had!



Improvements to Cycle Paths and Footpaths in Drayton

Anyone who uses the bridleways and footpaths in and around the village will be aware that a number of them have become very muddy in recent years. Some routes have become difficult to use, particularly during winter but also during some of the wet whether we have been having lately.

Fortunately, as a result of the housing developments in the village over the past few years, the Parish Council has access to a sum of money specifically earmarked for the improvement of cycle paths and footpaths in the village. Our initial thinking has been to focus our attention on some key routes that are popular for recreational use and provide links to other footpath and cycle networks but which suffer particularly badly during winter months.

With reference to the footpath map (also available at http://www.draytonvillage.co.uk/wp-content/uploads/2015/06/Footpaths-map.pdf), we are currently looking at improvements to bridleways 7, 9, 29 and the section of East Way that borders the Dovecote development. Bridleway 7 is badly rutted and we would hope to be able to improve this. The other three are in need of improved drainage and surfacing. Bridleways are intended to be used by walkers, cyclists and horse riders and we plan to provide a surface that is suitable for all of these users. Note that the idea is not to replace rural pathways with tarmac or concrete but to use a more natural compacted gravel surface, where appropriate. We have been particularly careful to ensure that the surface used will be suitable for all users.

We are now seeking your views on our initial priorities and suggestions for further projects. For example, as well as upgrades to a number of heavily used footpaths within the village, there is the possibility of doing some work on the section of East Way that runs towards Sutton Courtenay, linking to a future Abingdon to Milton Park route.

Our donkeys Wizard and Muffin, live with my husband and I at our farm in North Moreton.


