This Month's Cover - Daphne Samworth kindly sent us a snap of the ghostly silken webbing in a local hedge (actually first noticed by Judy & Derek Henman on one of their walks). It may look a bit sinister, but we shouldn't be alarmed, it's not from some giant spider! The culprits are we hear a harmless caterpillar, of a group of moths called **Small Ermine moths**.

They apparently produce the webbing as a disguise against predators, and such coverage of hedges and trees is not unusual, especially at this time of year. We've added pics of an Ermine Moth (there are several slightly different species in the group), their caterpillars, and a particularly large example of a web coverage. The webs will disappear through the summer and the moths will start flying later on.

WESTMINSTER VIEW



Our MP (Wantage/Didcot) is David Johnston (OBE, awarded for services to Social Mobility and Education).

Significant change is being proposed for Oxfordshire constituencies by the independent Boundary Commission. They say:- create a seventh seat in the

county at Bicester; move the Faringdon, Kingston Bagpuize, Stanford and Watchfield & Shrivenham wards from the Wantage constituency into the Witney constituency; move the Marcham division from Wantage into Oxford West and Abingdon; and move the Sandford and the Wittenhams division from Henley into Wantage, which will get an official new name: Didcot and Wantage (I have continued my predecessor's habit of including Didcot in the name but it isn't official!).

The purpose is to give each MP roughly the same number of electors as, at the moment, constituencies in England range from 55,000 to 100,000 people. Wantage and Didcot is 91,000, so I knew they would propose a chunk being taken off somewhere; the proposal would make it 71,000. We're strongly urged not to give an opinion as these are proposals subject to consultation, but you can give yours up until August 2nd on their website (see https://www.bcereviews.org.uk).

I have launched a new project with my colleague, Claire Coutinho (MP for East Surrey), to research and propose practical recommendations to close what is called the Opportunity Gap (that's for young people from different backgrounds and areas of the country). We'll look at everything from the resources parents have (financial and non-financial) through to the recruitment processes employers use, praising those doing good work to help, and calling out those who could do more. My pre-politics career was entirely spent working with disadvantaged young people and in the post-Covid world, it's a topic that is more important than ever.

One of the most valuable things I think I can do in my job is raise issues that affect constituents in the House of Commons. Recently, I've been pleased to raise a series of concerning issues, including the case of a constituent who has been waiting 3 years for her rape case to reach court, and what looks to be a worrying rise in the prescribing of anti-psychotic drugs to dementia patients who don't have a diagnosis of psychosis.

I also took the opportunity to raise the lack of GP services to serve our growing population - and am pleased the Health Minister has agreed to meet to discuss this further. On this topic, my debate on the performance of Royal Mail is this month and I will put my speech - and other local issues I raise in the meantime – on my Facebook page {for details of that, and the contact email, see the L-H column on this page.

A few weeks ago I was delighted to become the first patron of the Childrey charity, **Team Mikayla**, set up by the inspiring 14 year old Mikayla, who has had a long and difficult fight against cancer. I was delighted to subsequently hear they received a Queen's Award for Voluntary Service, alongside other great local organisations such as the Ray Collins Charitable Trust in Wantage, and Farcycles in Faringdon. In other good news, Anna Richards of Maymessy in West Challow received the Prime Minister's **Points of Light award** too.

Congratulations to them all.

Out-dated routers a potential security risk

Consumer watchdog Which? has reported that around 6 million people in the UK could be using routers that have not been updated since 2018. This means that <u>crucial security</u> <u>updates have not been installed</u>. Potential roblems include:weak default passwords, local network issues, and lack of updates re known security issues.

'Number Spoofing' phone calls

UK telecoms regulator, Ofcom, is warning the public <u>NOT</u> to trust 'caller-ID' as a means of verifying a caller's identification.

Fraudsters are increasingly **changing their caller ID** to disguise their identity, which is known as 'number spoofing'.

If a victim is hesitant about believing a call is genuine the fraudster may suggest that the victim compares the reverse of the bank card with the number that the call is from, (ie: the number being spoofed).

A recent report suggests that the number of reported cases of impersonation fraud – including spoof calls – nearly doubled last year to 40,000. It's believed the real figure is likely to be much higher, **because many victims won't report fraud** to their bank or building society, or even tell their family or friends, due to feelings of embarrassment or guilt.

Each case can involve the theft of thousands, or even tens of thousands of pounds, leaving the financial and emotional lives of victims ruined.

'Happy to Chat' benches in Abingdon



In order to help those in the community who are experiencing isolation and loneliness, Abingdon Town Council has marked some benches in the town as 'Happy to Chat' benches. By choosing to sit on one of these benches people indicate that they're happy for others to join them on the bench for a chat, or just to say hello.

Pension scams >> BEWARE!!!

Almost eight million people in Britain have been targeted by fraudsters attempting to trick innocent pensioners out of their life savings. The number of pension scams has rocketed during the pandemic and it has quickly become **one of the most common types of fraud**. The number of reported crimes has jumped 45% this year, from 2020, according to Action Fraud. The Pensions Regulator has said it's investigating more than £54 million of lost savings, affecting 18,000 people.

7.6 million people report receiving unsolicited emails, texts or calls from people encouraging them to transfer or release money from their pension, with **cold calling** the most common way for scammers to target victims. Scammers have also increasingly used FAKE websites to lure unsuspecting victims. Aviva identified 27 fake sites between March & Sept 2020 that purported to be theirs, trying to defraud pension savers.

YOUR LETTERS

A Poisonous Topic

<u>Grateful thanks</u> to those who've forwarded a bunch of recent emails detailing the discovery of a VERY NASTY plant called <u>Japanese Knotweed</u> (it has other names too) in Drayton.

Catherine Webber (local councillor) has been involved, and 'Farid' – sadly I can't elaborate on that name as all I have is an email ID, and their surname isn't clear from that (as is often the case!). The plant has been found **by the former yard for scrap cars**, just off Sutton Wick Lane, at the bottom end.

It seems that the land is OCC's responsibility, and their relevant dept is planning to attack the plant by poisoning the roots (may have already occurred by the time this is being read).

The plant (Fallopia Japonica) is EXTREMELY invasive, and has significant issues for property owners, its presence can even affect mortgages apparently!

The RHS describes it thus:- In spring, reddish-purple fleshy **shoots** emerge from crimson-pink buds at ground level. These grow rapidly, producing in summer, dense stands of tall bamboo-like **canes** which **grow up to 2.1m (7ft) tall**. These canes have characteristic purple flecks, and produce branches from nodes along its length. Leaves are heart or shovel-shaped and up to 14cm (5½in) in length and borne alternately (in a zig zag pattern) along the stems. The stems die back to ground level in winter, but the dry canes remain for several months or longer.

The <u>creamy-white **flower** tassels</u> produced in late summer and early autumn reach up to 15cm (6in).

→> A number of plants can cause skin issues, the Euphorbia family is one, and also the 'Peruvian Lily' is one that florists have to be very careful with (known as Alstroemeria) as it's a popular flower for bouquets.

<u>Hemlock</u> isn't native to the UK but can be found in most areas. It grows in ditches and riverbanks and in disturbed areas such as waste ground and rubbish tips. Hemlock is a tall green plant with purple spots on its stem and leaves similar to the carrot plant, it has white flowers. If it is eaten hemlock causes sickness and in severe cases it can kill by paralysing the lungs.

And sadly <u>HEMLOCK has been reported</u> on the estate in the middle of the village, <u>treat it with care if removing it</u>, and <u>don't eat it</u>! (not sure why anyone would).

This picture tries to show the <u>distinctive purple markings</u> on the stem, and though we can't give exact clues for the aroma, it apparently has a horrible 'mousy' smell, and livestock usually know to avoid it. The flowers are described as forming 'white umbrellas' when they appear (normally June & July).

Drayton Footpaths - Named??

[Ed's note:- Last month's issue featured a village map, the article titled 'Improvements to Cycle Paths & Footpaths'. The map was rather a small scale, and we had several emails about perhaps showing a bigger map, with a related topic about maybe REVIVING the old village footpath names? That of course supposes that SOMEONE out there knows what they are?!]

That in turn led to <u>former editor Derek Pooley</u> scouring the Chronicle archives to find a relevant footpath map first published many decades ago. Well done Derek!

This map is from the 80s, stems from the creation of the then-new 'History Society'. A leading member was <u>Daria Stimpson</u>, and the illustrations were done by <u>Margaret</u> **Jones** of Sutton Wick.

Residents of the village's new estates should be aware that back when that map was drawn up, their houses weren't even a gleam in a developer's eye!



Coronavirus

Well, my hope that the now-renamed Delta variant would fade away like the South African (Beta) and Brazilian (Gamma) variants has bitten the dust. Nevertheless, it took a surprisingly long time to stumble out of its hotspots, but it is finally growing around the country.

Indications are that the vaccines still work very well – the variant has managed to evolve a degree of immune escape, but that seems limited to eroding the protection from mild symptomatic illness in those with only first doses. The second dose still slams the door on the virus, even with Delta's best efforts (It means that getting the second dose is VERY important: efficacy against mild symptomatic infection looks to be 30-50% from 1 dose and 80%+ from two doses; and from hospitalisation/death look to be 80% reduced from 1 dose and somewhere between 95% and 99% from receiving both doses). The spread is overwhelmingly in the pre-vaccinated younger population and those who have refused the vaccine.

There have been some headlines about the number of breakthrough infections, especially those in hospital and those who still sadly died. Remember when reading those, though, that the rollout was targetted to the most vulnerable: those who have now been offered both doses are those who accounted for most hospitalisations and between 95-99% of deaths.

This means that if, say, 30 unvaccinated or single-dosed people have sadly died from Delta, we would previously have expected something in the region of 600-3000 deaths from those groups now offered both doses. I understand that instead of that, we've seen 12, nationwide. That implies a risk reduction of over 95% and quite possibly over 99%. No vaccines are perfect, reducing the risk by so much is very good indeed.

Remember those ratios when you see these headlines: If however-many unvaccinated people have died, we "should" have seen between twenty and a hundred times as many of those now double-vaccinated dying, in the absence of vaccines. The second dose is so important.

Covid levels in the Vale did increase a little up until June 1st, but <u>look to be falling again already</u> as people have increased their caution – despite the fact that Delta now makes up nearly all cases of the virus in this area (however, rates are still climbing in South Oxon and Oxford City at the time of writing). With the vaccine rollout continuing at pace, the virus will be running out of the ever-dwindling pool of those who can still spread it. As I write, we have had the Government's news that the final relaxation day is being put back from June 21st by four weeks. In that time, we should see that the pool of those susceptible to spreading the virus is greatly reduced. \Rightarrow >

Beacon Arts & Community Centre to reopen

As it will no longer be needed for provision of symptom-free testing due to the much-increased rollout of alternative options for LFD tests (workplace testing, secondary school and college testing, collecting home test kits from pharmacies, or our symptomatic testing sites, or going online to request a home delivery), the testing element will close from June 26th and it will be prepared for a <u>full public reopening from Sept 6th</u>.

<u>A34 Dravton Lav-bv</u>

We've been notified that Highways England are going to be converting this "unofficial lay-by" into a proper and official standard lay-by (realigning the verges, resurfacing, laying new road markings, improved drainage, etc).

They are also going to plant new vegetation on the "slip road" embankment area, replace the existing gates with heavy-duty gates, install new timber fences, remove the concrete blocks and replace them with a new section of interlocking concrete blocks.

The main construction work will start from Monday June 21st and is <u>expected to be completed in September</u>. Work to clear hazardous material from the lay-by and vegetation clearance should have already begun by the time you read this.

Walnut Meadows

To add to my briefing last month: just because we're (hopefully) looking for a breakthrough about land levels, we're not going to forget the rest of the other outstanding issues! It's my hunch that the land levels are by far the most expensive and intractable area that should unlock everything else – once those are resolved, the incentive is for Miller Homes to finish off properly.

My latest information is that Miller Homes did submit new drawings, but these met with negative feedback from us (didn't do the job) and they are working up a new planning application which we expect to receive shortly.

Who likes a Puzzle?

Drayton Beauchamp

Drayton Beauchamp is in Buckinghamshire, and this is another in our occasional series of articles describing <u>other</u> **Draytons**, both here in UK, and abroad.

The Village that Time Passed By

Drayton Beauchamp is a parish and hamlet nestling at the foot of the Chiltern Hills close to the Hertfordshire border. The main settlement lies alongside an ancient 'holloway' which runs downhill from the Upper to the Lower Icknield Way.

Where the summer pastures at the topmost end of the parish used to be, a farm and handful of houses are nowadays separated physically from the lower settlement by the A41 Aston Clinton bypass. Only half a mile in width and with only 100-150 residents, the parish of Drayton Beauchamp extends down from those hills for almost 6 miles to Puttenham Bottom Lock on the Aylesbury Arm of the Grand Union Canal.

The parish is situated in the **Chilterns Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty**, and parts of it lie within the Drayton Beauchamp Conservation Area.

There was a settlement here long before the Domesday Survey was commissioned in 1085; archaeological finds have included Iron Age, Saxon and Roman artefacts. The ancient St Mary the Virgin Church which stands in the peaceful setting of a field is one of several listed buildings in the parish. A famous marble statue of William Cheyne (Viscount Newhaven) in the chancel of the church attracts many visitors.

A manor house nearby, surrounded by medieval moats and fishponds, was built by the Cheyne family who were awarded the Lordship of the Manor by Edward III in 1364. After the death of the childless Viscount Newhaven in 1728, the Lordship of the Manor was bought by the wealthy Gumley family of Isleworth and a new manor house to replace the demolished original was built south of the main village. The Lordship of the Manor thereafter passed via various nieces and cousins to the Jenney family who married into the Harpur Crewe family of Calke Abbey fame. The final Jenney, Lord of the Manor to live locally died without heirs in 1948 and Airmyne Harpur Crewe, last of her line and childless like her two brothers, died in Staffordshire in 1999.

→> Drayton Beauchamp was traditionally a farming village, with <u>straw-plaiting</u> by the women and children bringing in welcome additional income.

The entire parish, apart from Lock Cottage and the canal, was owned by the Lord of the Manor – land, farms, cottages, and even the patronage of the village church. A Church of England school was built in 1844, but closed around 1903.

Although the appearance and composition of Drayton Beauchamp (always pronounced "Beecham" locally) have changed greatly since the Jenney/Harpur Crewe era, the village remains a **charming and peaceful backwater**.

There are no schools, pubs or shops, no mains drainage or gas, no street lights or pavements. Villagers must drive the 3 miles to Tring or 6 miles to Aylesbury for services, and work may well mean a commute to London. A feeling of community, however, continues.

Drayton Beauchamp remains a place in which people love to live and which they find hard to leave.

County Council Report

Topical Updates

Since the May elections, much has been happening – not least the need for the new administration to get its feet under the table as it picks up a mass of issues across the County.

Below is an update on just some of the issues affecting our area >>

Marcham and Frilford Junction traffic

Work is going on to consider options to address these issues. All options and their implications are on the table, including a possible Marcham By-pass, investment in public transport, cycling and active travel. Trying to predict the needs of a transport system beyond a few years is an enormous challenge.

Balancing the impact of new technologies, and the climate emergency, against the needs of a prosperous growing area is staggeringly complex. I hope that once the constraints of Covid are behind us, we can set up a brainstorming session with interested residents in the new Marcham Community Centre to get some input into the OCC considerations.

Rights of Way

The Liaison Committee, together with the Parish Councils of Sutton Courtenay and Appleford have met with FCC and OCC Pathway officers to arrange work on outstanding issues of overgrown and poorly maintained pathways and byways on FCC/Wren land (FCC = the municipal waste site at Sutton Courtenay). Not everything is agreed yet, but work will be started imminently on improving and maintaining the many rights of way (welcome news to walkers and horse riders!).

Solar Farm

The FCC application for a large Solar Farm is causing much concern amongst local residents over its potential visual impact and its impact on present rights of way. The opportunity for people to comment has been very limited. I have requested that the application must go before the planning committee where further public comment and opinion can be presented before any decision is made.

→> HIF1 Road (the proposed Didcot relief road)

The change in administration at OCC has allowed a review of these proposals [Ed:- this scheme involves a new river crossing near Culham]. There are, we are told, a number of constraints that we cannot change. These include:- 1) The Govt time limit on the delivery of the road (completion by the end of 2024), & 2) Threat of speculative housing applications all across the wider area to District Local Plans if the scheme falls through.

In meeting the deadlines, the planning application must be submitted for consultation by Sept 2021 and brought before a planning committee in Feb 2022. Even then, the timetable for delivery will be tight.

Moving the road and flyover to the west over old tip land would, (we are told), be prohibitively expensive involving digging out the area and replacing soil. It would also introduce a further delay to the delivery of the scheme.

The good news is that both the strategic and the detailed traffic modelling data on which the whole scheme is based will be released for scrutiny in the next few weeks. There will also be a number of <u>public engagement events in all affected areas</u> before the planning application goes in. This will, at least, <u>give</u> <u>residents and Parish Councils some say in the process</u>.



Last year, despite the reduction in travel due to Covid, £2million was lost to holiday and travel-related fraud.

At least a third of these reports related to social media platforms, such as Facebook.

Top tips to avoid holiday-related fraud are:-

Check that the <u>online web addresses are legitimate</u>, and haven't been altered by slight changes to the domain name - such as going from co.uk to com.

Do a thorough online search to ensure that the company is credible. If a company is defrauding people, there's a good chance that there will be consumer posts warning about using the company. **Look for the ABTA or ATOL logos** on the company's website, **AND you CAN check yourself** if a firm's ABTA/ATOL claims are legit, put 'ATOL Holder Search' into Google, or use **www.ABTA.com** for ABTA.

Whenever possible pay by credit card {*** Extra tip follows!}. Never pay directly into a private individual's bank account. Check receipts, invoices and terms and conditions. Be very wary of companies that don't provide this information.

If it seems too good to be true, it probably is. Pay attention to your instincts!!

Suspicious Email Reporting Service

This **new service** has been launched by the National Cyber Security Centre and the police. In the first few months, they had hundreds of thousands of reports, leading so far to several thousand links to bogus websites being removed.

If YOU receive a suspicious email **please forward it** to **report@phishing.gov.uk** – then of course delete it from your inbox! (this excellent new service is quickly having an effect, please note they DO send you a confirmation email)

→>> Mobile phone upgrade scams

Action Fraud has warned about an ongoing scam where consumers are cold-called by **crooks impersonating employees of legitimate mobile phone operators & suppliers**. Reported losses since Jan 2020 exceed £86,000!

Victims are offered early handset upgrades, or new contracts, at significant discounts. Once customers have been convinced that the deal is genuine and have agreed to proceed, the scammers then ask for their online mobile account credentials, including log-ins, address and bank account details.

Criminals then **place orders with genuine companies** on behalf of victims - but select a <u>different handset</u> to that which was requested - and have it shipped to the customer's address.

When the victim receives the incorrect handset, the criminal assures them that it's an error and instructs them to 'return' the handset to an address which is not affiliated to the mobile company. These **BOGUS addresses** are usually residential.

After intercepting the 'returned' handset the criminal ceases contact, and victims find themselves without a phone and liable for the entirety of a new contract taken out in their name.

To avoid becoming a victim of this scam:-

If you're not sure if the person calling you is who they claim to be, <u>don't provide any personal information</u> and end the call.

Only contact your network mobile provider on a <u>number you</u> <u>know to be correct</u>.

If you receive a device that you didn't order or expect, contact the genuine seller immediately. The details on how to do this will be within the parcel.

All genuine mobile network operators will send out a jiffy bag for you to return a handset without incurring additional costs. *Never* post a device directly to a given address.

*** Extra Credit-Card Payment Tip:- As seen on the excellent Money Saving Expert site, using a Credit Card is an extra safeguard when buying items of OVER £100 (and under £30K). It's known as 'Section 75' cover.

LESS well-known is that you are STILL so protected if you merely pay a DEPOSIT by credit-card. Search for 'Section 75' at https://www.moneysavingexpert.com

To contact the police call either 101 (if it's urgent) or 999 (for emergencies). IF POSSIBLE, please use their online reporting method at **www.thamesvalley.police.uk** (you'll be contacted within 24hrs of filing a report)


