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

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# LETTER FROM WESTMINSTER

# David Johnston MP Member of Parliament for Wantage (inc. Didcot, Wallingford & Faringdon)

### Climate Change

I held a very productive pre-COP26 summit for Wantage and Didcot constituents this month. We had a great

range of speakers, including the CEO of the independent Climate Change Committee. Interesting fact: the UK is currently 20 years ahead of the global average for cutting emissions, as well as cutting them faster than the other G20 countries. It won't surprise you that the way we build houses featured regularly.

I put the event on because tackling climate change is very important to me, very important to a significant number of constituents and we have a big opportunity to demonstrate leadership when the world's leaders come to Glasgow for the actual UN summit in November. It was also a great chance to showcase good local organisations like Greencore Construction, Westmill Wind and Solar and the Earth Trust. I am sending a summary of the concerns and ideas raised at the event to Alok Sharma, President of COP26, and will let everyone know how he responds.

### Royal Mail

As you might have seen, I held my debate in parliament on Royal Mail's performance recently, making clear again that I don't blame their workers for the problems. The following day I visited the Didcot Delivery Office. It's clear that Royal Mail HQ have taken the criticisms seriously and have worked to try and improve the service – many people have told me it has. But you should let me know if you continue to encounter problems.

### AEAT Pension Campaign

My first '10 minute rule bill' will be on behalf of the AEAT Pension Campaign. This constituency has more of the AEAT Pensioners than any other constituency and they were all encouraged - via assurances that turned out to be false - to transfer to a pension scheme that has meant their pensions are now worth considerably less than they should be. It is a tale that sounds familiar, but a unique case in that it was advice from the Government's Actuary Department in the 1990s that was strengthened to encourage the transfer and, at the moment, the advice can't be investigated as the Ombudsman in question doesn't have the powers to. The Bill would enable the Ombudsman to investigate the advice given and was first introduced by Ed Vaizey not long before he stood down. It is a long and difficult route to pass a law this way, but I am full of admiration for the campaigners who have been dogged in seeking to right the wrong.

### **Recess**

Recess is fast approaching. I will be back home in Didcot for most of it, albeit working, contrary to the suggestion MPs are on holiday! In addition to regular meetings, surgery appointments and visits, I'll be holding some roundtables on issues constituents have raised repeatedly with me (including on GP appointments) and trying to attend as many of the events that couldn't take place last year as I can – let me know if you think there is a good one for me to attend near you.

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# DISTRICT COUNCIL REPORT Andy Cooke



# Dear all, <u>Coronavirus</u>

I'm writing this article on the 19<sup>th</sup> of July (the day that the Government are releasing a bunch of restrictions) which means that by the time you read this, you'll know considerably more than me.

As at today, cases have been climbing again (mostly in the unvaccinated or single-vaxxed) and whilst the ratio between hospitalisations and deaths against cases has decreased considerably, the link still exists.

Covid levels in the Vale did not continue their decrease from a month ago; they started a rapid climb again around the 21<sup>st</sup> of June and now may be approaching the same level as their January peak (most recent data incomplete). However, the number of patients in hospital in Oxfordshire with covid is far lower than it was at a comparable time. It unsurprisingly skews far younger as well, as the older and more vulnerable are far better protected. Oxford City remains by far the worst-hit area in the county – but it *might* be subsiding there, maybe partly due to extra testing measures and pop-up vaccination clinics.

A word of caution at this point: whilst the vaccines work very well at protecting against serious illness, they are not a magic suit of armour (a decent analogy is Formula 1 race cars. They have had huge swathes of safety measures to protect against fatalities, and death rates have plummeted – but crashing can still be very painful and even, in rare cases, fatal. Should regulations permit far more frequent crashing, we would see more serious events on the race-track).

Following two doses and fourteen days to come up to speed, effectiveness seems to be:

- against symptomatic disease at all: 66%-90% (That is, your chances of developing symptoms are a third to a tenth of if you were unvaccinated. Transmission seems to be impaired by certainly over 60% but not quite 100% so even double-vaxxed people *can* pass it on, albeit at a considerably lower chance of doing so due to the far lower viral loading)
- against severe disease (hospitalisation-level): 95-97% (Your chances of being so ill you're hospitalised are between a twentieth and a thirtieth of what they were when unvaccinated)
- against death: 97%+ (Your chances of being so ill that you die are decreased by a factor of over 30).

This does leaves a residual risk, albeit a <u>lot</u> lower than before being vaccinated. However, if you are considered vulnerable (or even if you'd like to avoid a potentially rather unpleasant illness, even if you're far less likely to have a bad outcome), it would be wise to be cautious until this peak subsides (it has to run out of susceptible hosts sooner or later). Whilst cloth masks protect others rather than yourself (and they may become pretty rare after today), FFP3 masks (which are quite a bit more expensive, unfortunately) do give considerable protection to the wearer. In addition, keeping away from less ventilated indoor spaces and keeping some distance from others where possible, and reducing the average number of daily interactions would have a significant effect.

Schools closing this week will probably help bring R down (it seems to have had that effect in Scotland), but the relaxation of restrictions will cause an unknown boost to infections. Dropping all restrictions today is therefore very much a gamble by the Government. By the time you read this, we'll probably have a decent idea over whether or not the gamble has paid off. I would personally have liked the mask mandate to continue until the wave was complete and possibly an interim step between the restrictions we had in Step 3 and those for Step 4. I am hoping hard that I'm simply too cautious.

No matter what – if you're not double-jabbed, I would strongly encourage you to get the vaccination (both doses). I understand the gap between doses is decreasing from 12 weeks to 8 weeks. With the increased infectivity of Delta, it looks to becoming a simple choice: everyone will get antibodies. The choice is down to infection or injection.

The increase in 'self-isolation alerts' from the increased case loads means that more people may find themselves struggling financially. Anyone who has been told to isolate by NHS Test and Trace, or who is a parent or guardian of a child who has been told to selfisolate, and who meets the relevant eligibility criteria, can submit a claim for an additional £500 in financial support. Eligibility criteria:

- you must be employed or self-employed;
- you must be unable to work from home;

- you will lose income as a result as a result of being selfisolated or caring for a child who must self-isolate;

- and, you must be currently receiving Universal Credit, Working Tax Credit, income-based Employment and Support Allowance, income-based Jobseeker's Allowance, Income Support, Housing Benefit and / or Pension Credit.

Those applicants who are not in receipt of the listed benefits can still receive a grant if:-

- a single applicant has a gross income less than £21,500 per annum

- a couple or single parent has a gross income less than  $\pm 32,250$  per annum

### Garden Waste service reopens to new subscribers

# Waste Collection Disruption

Ironically, given the above, there have been disruptions to bin collection over the past couple of weeks. This is due to an ongoing shortage of HGV drivers (which is occurring nationwide). This is, I am told, from a different set of staff to those administering the Brown Bins subscription service (administering rather than driving HGVs). Staff are working weekends to try to catch up. If bins are not collected, please leave them out for up to three days to give the staff a chance to catch up. If black bins are still uncollected, you can leave an extra three black sack's worth the next time.

### Five Year Land Supply

A few years ago, developers were able to all-but-ignore the Neighbourhood Plan due to the Vale not having a "Five Year Land Supply" (they could appeal negative planning decisions and almost automatically win an overrule from central government as the Vale did not have a 5-year land supply). This changed a while back and on the latest review, it was confirmed that we have maintained a five year land supply, reducing any opportunity for new speculative development.

### Climate Change

The need for a push towards a net zero carbon future has been underlined recently by extreme weather events around the world. Temperatures soaring to 49 degrees Celsius (over 120 Fahrenheit) in areas of British Columbia (which usually has a similar climate to ourselves) has killed hundreds there. Meanwhile, extreme flooding in Germany from record rainfall has caused at least 120 deaths there.

Whilst extreme weather events are not unknown, when once-in-a -century events (or considerably rarer ones, or unprecedented ones) are happening more and more often, things do start to look more extreme. We are pushing towards a net zero carbon future (in such things as house-building, transport, and land-use) as much as we can in our own powers. The flooding events do look (to me) to underline the need to resist the unnecessary Thames Water reservoir (linking instead through Severn Water to the plentiful reservoirs in the far wetter part of the country would solve any water issues – and the proposals had red risk statuses for potential to cause floods in Abingdon and the local area due to preventing an existing rain runoff into the floodplain). It seems to be in limbo somewhat at the moment; we need to ensure it does not leap back up.

That's it for this month.

# COUNTY COUNCIL REPORT Richard Webber

### **New Roads**

The new Lodge Hill slip roads are designed to alleviate traffic in Abingdon but also in the wider area. Traffic currently coming south around the inner ring road to access the A34 at Marcham Rd will be able to access the A34 going south at Lodge Hill. This should reduce queuing at the McDonald's roundabout so the traffic along Ock St and Drayton Road will be able to flow more freely.

If the new link relief Road between Didcot and the Thames is delivered on time, it is hoped this too will have a major benefit to the area's traffic issues. Much of the traffic arriving from the South, together with traffic from new Didcot housing developments, much of which currently uses village roads, will, it is expected, use the new, much faster road.

If it all works as the experts hope, these new roads will produce a major reduction in traffic in our area. The more alarming prediction is that it would take 10-20 years for traffic to build back up to current levels. Again, hopefully, self-drive cars, better public transport and far more people abandoning their cars in favour of "active travel" – cycling and walking – will prevent the need for more roads.

The Frilford crossroads is the other major traffic pinch point in our area. There is a study sponsored by OCC into possible solutions. All options from a Marcham by-pass downwards are being considered. The new Didcot Road is costing £0.5billion and, although a Frilford solution would be much less expensive, there is no obvious pot of money large enough to pay for it. It seems, therefore, that a solution is some way away.

### Covid

Like so many people, our planned large family holiday in the Channel Isles (originally booked in November 2019) has had to be postponed yet again. Not only the changing policies of our own government have complicated things, the Bailliwick of Guernsey has now joined the party. One added problem is the family and the children keep growing. Like so many others, I am reconciled to staying at home this summer, but like them, please, please government do not produce any more regulations to restrict our families coming to see us soon.

Meanwhile, enjoy the summer break and all the sunshine we can muster.

# July 2021 Report

### **Traffic Calming**

The Traffic Calming working group has drawn up a list of priorities based on the NDP and current needs, and were able to discuss them face to face with OCC. The emphasis is currently on safety (footpaths, pedestrian crossings etc). It is hoped there is funding for two new crossings. There has also been extensive discussion about the narrowness of roadside pavements, especially on the Abingdon Road.

### Footpaths

The Rights of Way & Footpaths group has obtained a proposal and quotation for remediating BW29 (in Sutton Wick, past the scrapyard). Some drainage has already been carried out and the objective is to lay down a topping so that it is suitable for both horses and cyclists. The specification is from an experienced contractor, and as used by local racing stables. It is intended to complete this before the winter.

### Walnut Meadow

The PC has continued chasing Miller Homes to correct land levels for the sports pitches, and some progress has been made. We have also continued lobbying OCC and our County Councillor to resolve the adoption of the roads at Walnut Meadow. This is becoming urgent as the issue is blocking progress on delivery of the rest of the project, and it is felt that OCC could be more co operative.

Bearing in mind that so much of this is time critical, an NDP working group has been re formed. Its first task will be to review progress on the MUGA and the pitches.

With this in mind, and for delivery of other NDP projects, we have been recruiting a Programme Manager. The variable workload anticipated has made it important to define the role, but after several interviews we think we may have a decision on this.

### **Church Lane/Henleys Lane**

In Public Participation a resident, who had written to the Clerk, attended and asked the PC to take action over the volume of traffic using the lane as a rat run. The road is only about 3 metres wide at its narrowest, and it is felt that the speeding traffic presents a danger to elderly pedestrians, mothers with buggies, and horses, because parked cars often block the pavement. The PC discussed previous efforts of a local meeting to agree a solution, but suggestions of speed humps and one way traffic were felt by our County Councillor to be unacceptable to OCC Highways.

### **Parish Councillors**

Due to the resignation of three councillors we have asked for volunteers to be elected and to serve. This is an interesting and important time for our growing village, and we are grateful to Claire Woollard, Garin and Irma Schoonoven for their enthusiasm and commitment.

# Resigned to the designs for the signs

It's high time we had an update about the entry signs for the village, and the news is not particularly good I'm afraid.

First things first: we had a vote if you remember, when the PC asked for your feedback on which features you would like to be included on the entry signs to the village. We had a number of suggestions, all of which were considered, from Berkshire pigs to the church, and the resounding majority favoured the walnut image, with no further embellishments. The PC agreed that this would be the best image to convey, as the signs would be less distracting to incoming motorists, if they weren't trying to decipher images of a river, kites and dray horses as well as the 30 mile limit sign and the word DRAYTON in the mix. So apart from the majority vote, this was considered to be the safest option. Thank you to those who voted, and sorry to those whose imaginative ideas didn't get the green light. Excuse the metaphor.

So now for the bad news: after the artists had produced a lovely image of their design, we heard from the police that Drayton is classified as an area of "special interest", meaning that they required crash tests to prove that the signs wouldn't damage any vehicle with "jagged edges" in the eventuality of a crash. As the signs would be well above the level of any car or motor bike, we found this very confusing and off putting, as the dimensions of thesigns had been specially chosen to avoid this from happening.

In fact this was so off putting, that the artists resigned from the project in despair. I was also in despair, as we had put so much work into this, and invested so much creative energy and vision. After some cajoling, the artists have agreed to come back on board, as long as we, the council, can sort out the problems. I'm working on it, and believe me, it hasn't proved to be easy. The buck has been tossed around, but I will keep it in play.

So at the moment, our signage is on hold, but we will do our best to make it happen. More news when the police give the sign.

# Walnuts - we've cracked it!

Now for the good news! Our project is on schedule to be completed before the end of November. The art installation has been given the go-ahead both by the PC and also by OCC, with the funding in place. In fact, I have taken on board suggestions for planting the area on the green, and this will be an integral part of the artistic installation, also agreed by OCC.


The final installation will be thus: the soil that has been eroded due to cars parking on the grass will be reinstalled up to the edge, and grass replanted to restore the look of the area. Some walnuts will be placed on the edge of the green, at a distance of 50cms from the edge of the kerb, to deter cars from parking over the grass, and some will be placed in groups on the various parts of the grassy areas, to achieve an artistic effect. It is agreed that small shrubs around the walnuts and abutting the kerbs will be planted to further deter parking on the grass, and to achieve a beautiful landscaped effect. The total amount of walnuts will be 17, so we will have plenty to play with.

The artist will give the school an online workshop to introduce the concept of the design and what we hope to achieve. After the walnuts have been installed, over one day, the PC has agreed that we should have a community planting day, during which volunteers from the village will come and help to plant the plants around the walnuts. This will achieve three results: people will take a personal interest in the installation, will have fun in contributing to a communal resource, and their help will save money! Better than **shelling** out needlessly for extra labour! November is an ideal time for planting new shrubs, as they will receive a good watering over the winter. The trouble is that the weather can be a bit inclement at that time of year, so fingers crossed for no downpours while we are planting. Otherwise is could turn out to be a **nutty** idea.

More on dates when we know for sure from the artist when he is ready to install. I think I've covered everything, and if not we can always have another crack at it.



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# **OX-CAM ARC**

People across South Oxfordshire and the Vale of White Horse are being urged to have their say on the Oxford-Cambridge Arc, a government led project which will have an impact on the district in the future.

The Oxford-Cambridge Arc includes the area between Oxford, Milton Keynes and Cambridge and aims to make significant economic, social and environmental improvements across the region by 2050 and beyond. The government is currently developing a vision for the Spatial Framework – a long-term strategic plan for growth across the area – which will help support planning for the future with the aim of helping to create jobs, drive investment, protect and enhance the environment, and provide infrastructure to make the Arc a better place to work and live. A 12-week public consultation on the future of the Ox-Cam Arc has been announced and people are being encouraged to help to create the Spatial Framework's vision for the area to 2050 under the following themes:

- The Environment
- The Economy
- Connectivity and Infrastructure
- Place-making

Once agreed, the shared vision will help to determine which new policies are developed and ultimately will shape government plans for the Oxford to Cambridge Arc region.

The consultation also seeks views on the work the Government has done to set the scope of the Sustainability Appraisal, and the Government has also announced a new expert panel to advise on sustainable economic and housing growth in the Arc.

Cllr Sue Cooper, Leader of South Oxfordshire District Council, said: "The Ox-Cam Arc will have an impact on our residents in South Oxfordshire for many generations to come, especially if the high population growth forecasted materialises. It is therefore vital that development is properly managed and planned and that the project's vision really focusses on protecting and enhancing our natural environment, while also providing green focussed improvements to our local infrastructure and employment opportunities which will have genuine benefits for people living and working here.

"We as a council we will do what we can to influence the direction of this project, however it's very important that people understand what this project means and that they are able to have their say at each stage of the process. I therefore urge everyone who lives and works in South Oxfordshire to have their say in this consultation, particularly our younger residents who will be most impacted by the longer-term effects of any Arc projects."

### How to have your say

This public consultation is the first of three that will guide a new Spatial Framework over the next two years. To find out more and to have your say visit **placebuilder.io/futureofthearc**. The consultation is open until 12 October 2021.



As we go to print, one of our major users (Short-mat Bowling) has just had their first session – coincided with a blisteringly hot evening, so probably not ideal?! But they should get into the swing of things through August. The U3A Craft Group had managed a (carefully distanced!) session for real (as Zoom has its limitations), and they should be back to normal this month (2nd Thursday – afternoon). We've gained a new exercise group (Tuesday lunchtime), some ladies who play what I think is called 'Short Tennis'; the Hall's badminton court markings are fine for this, and it's played with a special ball, not too damaging for fittings, people or the eyesight.

I had a funny call the other day, someone asking about a kid's party. I explained that we usually do a 4-hour slot for those, and they said "oh, we might need a bit longer". I said we could do that too, some brave souls do a 5-hour party, and they replied that they might need all day . . .and a few adults too. This then morphed into the adults needing a drink or 3, and that's rather a different booking. I then thought to check where they were, and the answer was "Acton". There are quite a few Draytons round the country (Chronicle has mentioned a few), and the Hall they thought they were talking to is at WEST Drayton (not far from Heathrow). And it has a London number – I get a few calls wanting that one, it seems that a Google list (Halls pretty much in random order) is especially hard to work out for people down that way?!

The first Antiques Fair went very well it seems, next one is Aug 1st, later ones are the first Sundays in Sept, Nov and December.

One more point, those groups who need to open or close our STAGE CURTAINS should by now all know that the winding mechanism was damaged recently, which we think wasn't normal 'wear & tear' as the control wire had been replaced not that long ago. The mechanism is just about usable, with care, most have been told what to do, but just in case, here's another reminder :- whichever way the reel is turned, the wire is pulled down onto one side – in either direction, just add a bit more tension to the wire, hold the wire onto the reel so that it winds onto the next groove on the winder. And do it slowly! We're researching any possible new mechanisms, none seem very cheap (!), but a new one may appear soon.

### Pathways to a zero carbon Oxfordshire


An interesting new report has just been published offering several choices for the county to achieve a zero-carbon economy by 2050.

Along with a number of other Oxfordshire partners, we've supported the development of The ECI Report, which was created by the University of Oxford and sustainability organisation Bio-Regional.

The report highlights the challenges in transforming the county's energy and transport systems, as well as the need to upgrade Oxfordshire's building stock. It predicts that the rapid uptake of electric vehicles in the next decade will help reduce carbon emissions but it also identifies areas where behaviour change and investment is urgently needed.
