### From the DAMASCUS Ministry Team

### Charitable Giving @ Harvest

"Charity begins at home". This I was taught by my Grandmother many, many years ago; which is fine, obviously, IF you have a home. At the time of writing this letter to you, we have seen this in action with an outpouring of donations and help to those fleeing from Afghanistan. As well as spontaneous and generous responses to one-off appeals, there are fundraising events all year round with a wide variety of ways to give charitably.

Traditionally, charitable giving was highlighted at **harvest time** - a time to share in the bountiful crops. This goes back at least 3,000 years and can be read about in the laws given for farming in the books of Leviticus and Deuteronomy.

"When you reap the harvest of your land, do not reap to the very edges of your field or gather the gleanings of your harvest. Do not go over your vineyard a second time or pick up the grapes that have fallen. Leave them for the poor and the foreigner. I am the LORD your God". (Leviticus 19:9-10). The three points are:-

- > To leave the margins of grain fields un-harvested, the width of the margins are decided by the owner.
- Don't pick up anything that has fallen to the ground.
- Harvest vines only once, leaving the later ripening ones

These three things are to be left for the poor, the orphans and widows, and also the resident foreigners, as they didn't own land and depended on their own labour for food. This is so that everyone then has the benefit from God's provision.

Times have changed, yes, but we still have the serious issues of food poverty, child poverty, also refugees and the homeless. Charitable giving has changed but the principle of "give because you can and not because you must" is still with us.

We ought to consider ourselves fortunate that we are where we are, and so whatever you give, give gratefully.

### **Councillor Vacancies!!**

There are still four vacancies for Parish Councillors. If you have a little spare time this is a worthwhile activity, contributing to the future of the village. We usually meet the 2nd Tuesday

evening of the month, and participation in various working groups is also welcomed. Please contact Lorraine Watling (see below).

### **NDP Working Group**

A new working group has been set up to progress the Neighbourhood Development Plan and the Walnut Meadow sports pitch in particular. The objective is to establish a closer link with VWHDC & OCC, to achieve adoption of the roads, and a satisfactory resolution of the land levels in the sports pitch.

Completion of the pitch itself is the long term objective, but it is hoped to establish other facilities in the short to medium term.

### Programme Manager

We are pleased to announce the appointment of Jon Fowler, who joins us with a recent background in Benson. Jon will promote implementation of the Neighbourhood Development Plan projects, particularly the Walnut Meadow sports facilities. He has completed an assessment of all current projects, so we have plenty to keep him busy, and he is a member of the NDP Working Group.

### **Walnut Meadow Roads**

The Chair has asked our County Councillor to encourage OCC Highways to respond to our request for the adoption of the roads. This is important for access to the sports facilities. The District Councillor was also asked to use his contacts to chase this up.


### **Traffic Calming**

The working group has established a dialogue with OCC and we have agreement on the pedestrian crossing for the High Street and have been assured that a 20mph limit is under consideration for the villages. The issue of pavement parking is being considered by OCC.

### **Public Art**

The parking bollards on The Green are expected to be in place this autumn, but the village signs are still ongoing, with OCC Highways and TVP still to confirm their approval.

### **Manor Farm**

It was agreed to engage a landscape consultant to finalise the green space at Manor Farm, particularly the grass and the planting at the margins. This was intended to be a "village green" for the benefit of all. It is worth getting this right as the PC will ultimately be responsible for its upkeep.

### Footpaths

The working group have met contactors on site and obtained quotations for the remediation of Bridle Way 9 (runs off the B4016 up to the footpath off Church Lane) and BW29 (off Sutton Wick Lane). This will deal with localised flooding and provide a surface suitable for both horses and cyclists. It is hoped that work can start before winter sets in.

### Garden Waste

The District Councillor confirmed that VWHDC are still looking for a solution to the driver shortage, and expect soon to resume fortnightly. The PC asked if there would be a refund of payments. And then a lower charge.

### A34 Lay-By Improvements

For the last stage of the works there will be Northbound closures on the A34 for 7 nights from October 7 between 2100 and 0600. It is then expected that the project will be completed by Oct 16th.

# **Drayton Table Tennis Club**

<u>Table Tennis is up and running</u> and the club is now able to confirm its new venue! After being given the surprising notice to quit the village school after 37 years, the search for a new location began in January this year.

Covid of course had a major impact on all the local clubs and we aren't the only one to have moved location. It's also meant a drop in membership but in some respects that makes our relocation easier to organise.

A number of sites were viewed and more than one offer was obtained. Village halls, church halls and schools were all considered. Sadly, currently there is nowhere in the village to accommodate us. <u>Maybe the proposed</u> new Pavilion will eventually be built?!

After 6 months of searching and researching we have set up in **Thameside Primary School**, Abingdon. It's only a couple of miles from the village so is still 'local'. The school has a large hall that enables us to continue with 4 tables for practice and play two league matches together. The Head Teacher expressed her delight we are there!



She explained that the hall was built for "Community use" and the school is happy to see a local community group moving in on a regular basis. From our point of view this gives us hope the partnership will be beneficial to both the club and the school, and clearly the staff at Thameside feel the same. <u>Club practice nights</u> will be each Monday with league matches every Wednesday.

It is pleasing that we now have a storeroom for the tables and equipment and the hall has minimal 'clutter' to be cleared before we can commence playing. No longer will we need to search behind school equipment



and under chairs for straying balls! Whilst we would have preferred to stay in Drayton our initial impression is the move will work well and we are now looking forward to playing again. We started back with coaching and practice on Sept 6th, and League matches started the week of Sept 20th.

The Didcot League has lost one club and about 10 teams since it last operated but will still run 4 divisions. **Drayton TT Club will have 4 teams playing**; a drop from the 7 we had in 2019-20 season. Look out for our progress reports in the next few months. **John Gould**

### Nuts – Whole Tales of Nuts

Dear Editor,

via email

<u>In answer</u> to Doreen Bourne's letter in last month's Chronicle, I feel that I need to put the record straight on a few things, especially as it is easy to get the wrong impression with a lack of information.

<u>Firstly</u>, the alleged "tripping hazard" - the walnuts will be perfectly visible, as they will be well lit after dark by the overhead street lights, which are very bright in that area. You would have to be drunk to fall over one, but in this eventuality, with the pubs just across the road, at least the grass will provide a soft landing.

<u>Secondly</u>, the whole point of the walnuts is to stop parking on the grass, not on the road, so if drivers follow this practice, those local businesses will not lose customers. There is plenty of room both for parked cars on the road, and for passing vehicles. The walnuts round the perimeter of the green will be well spaced, leaving enough room for parking between them, and any driver will see them clearly through their car window, before opening the door.

<u>Thirdly</u>, there will not be "a lot of shrubs dotted about". The planting will follow defined curved beds, designed by a landscape gardening company.

<u>Fourthly</u>, we cannot move the kerbstones, as although the Parish Council owns the green areas, the actual road is owned by Oxfordshire County Council, and we aren't allowed to interfere in any way with their property.

<u>Lastly</u>, what would be the point of putting the walnuts on the Millenium Green? The idea is that when people pass through the village, they will see the installations, which will tie in with the walnut design on the entry signs, creating a coherent, beautiful impression. We're talking about ART here, not just plonking things willy-nilly on the grass. Drayton will be the envy of people living in the county, seeing what we have done with the village's S106 (housing) money.

I sincerely hope that Doreen Bourne is satisfied with these answers, and that all her bones and teeth remain intact when enjoying the new scenic layout on the green.



### Brown Bin Suspension - & resumption!

You'll be unsurprised to learn that the Garden Waste saga has been front and centre for the Council this month. <u>Latest News</u>:-

- The service should resume mid-October, initially on a four-weekly basis, as the driver situation is still very fragile indeed.
- Any residents who have been billed over this period should receive a refund.
- All residents will find their year subscription will run for an extra two months (that is for fourteen months) to ensure they're not out of pocket.

To be honest, disgruntlement about this ran all the way up to the Council Cabinet – they were deeply unimpressed to have been told about it *on the day that it occurred*, and THEN, **to have NO way of directly contacting affected residents!** The Cabinet members did go on local radio, local BBC, run an article in the Oxford Mail, and try social media avenues, but these are no substitute for a proper Customer Relationship Management system, where you could fire off an email/SMS blast to all affected residents and phone calls to those without email or mobile phones.

Unfortunately it turns out that when the previous administration outsourced whole chunks to the 'Five Council Partnership', they omitted to cover such elements as being able to contact customers.

We did insource much of this as soon as we could after May 2019, but this took time, and it turns out that only 37% of customer contact details were available in a usable form. A **full CRM is being built** as we speak (work had begun before this happened, but it's not a fast process, especially with GDPR issues).

There will have been (when you read this) a full council meeting on Sept 21st to discuss this in detail - there was a danger for a while that other bin collection services could have been placed in jeopardy (as they have been in at least one council around the country), but it looks as though we're past that point for now.

The **shortage of drivers** is unlikely to improve much for a while yet (loss of overseas drivers, including being part of the EEA-wide logistics chains due to Brexit, reduced HGV licence tests due to Covid, drivers self-isolating, and fewer drivers due to the recent Off-Payroll legislation from the Govt all affect this problem).

### **Coronavirus**

**Covid levels** have been broadly stable for the last month as I write - cases in the Vale have been around the 50-60 per day level over that period, the number of admissions to hospital with Covid in Oxford has averaged 6-7 per day consistently over this time.

The number of ICU patients had been rising, but since the start of Sept, they've been falling again (on 7th, down to 3 ICU patients).

In mid-Sept, 87% of all over-16s have had their first dose jab, and 81% of over-16s their second.

I understand that the Govt have been looking at **contingency plans for the winter**. SAGE's modelling paper actually says that the most likely projection is for 1,000 to 2,000 hospitalisations per day. But that this could be avoided by very light-touch measures such as encouraging working from home over the next few months, warning people to be cautious, and more mask-wearing.

There was a far less likely scenario:- if we saw growth like the worst level that happened in Scotland recently, and it was sustained with no changes (something that looks less and less likely since the recent falls in infections), we could see 5,500 to 7,000 hospitalisations per day. To my total lack of surprise, the highest possible (but improbable!) figure has got the media headlines!

### <u>Planning Rules</u>

It does look as though the new planning rules proposed by the Government are going to be either scrapped or heavily diluted, which is a relief. We should retain the right to comment on and affect planning proposed in our areas.

### **Grove Station**

As we've had an unusually positive set of responses to the calls on Govt we've made to date (getting the planning rules heavily revisited, and the Oxford-Cambridge Expressway punted into the long grass . . . I wonder if certain by-election results have influenced this?!) we're re-iterating our call for **Grove Station to be reopened**. It'd be very useful to provide increased accessibility to rail services for areas in the Vale and this would help with the Climate Emergency. It's worth a shot.

### **Leisure Centres**

GLL, which runs our 11 Leisure facilities across the districts, has accepted our Covid-19 Leisure Support Package, which takes into account the impact of Covid-19 on the leisure provider. This allowed **Didcot Leisure Centre to reopen**. **Abbey Sports Centre** was able to reopen earlier this year, but as part of the agreement for the Covid-19 Leisure Support Package, work to prepare the pool has now started so that it will be available from Sept 27th. Therefore swimming lessons will resume, as will school access.

### Cornerstone & the Beacon now open

Cornerstone (Didcot) and the Beacon (Wantage) have fully reopened their doors, including Beacon's coffee shop.

### **County Council Report**

### No Easy Answers!

I believe we have all noticed the <u>increasing amounts of traffic</u> on our local roads since lockdown ended. This together with increasing numbers of reports on speeding – particularly those coming to our villages from elsewhere, has made me want to focus on <u>roads and speeding</u> this month. Some of the things I have learned over the last 16 years on these issues include the following:-

The majority of excess speeding is carried out by locals and the residents themselves. This may well be that they know their roads best and believe they

know where they can safely put their foot down.

The regular hold-ups themselves lead to frustration and the temptation to speed to make up time.

The police, in my view, rightly deem that their major focus should be on keeping down crime.

The available police resource for enforcing minor driving offences (the sort that many of us have committed) is therefore limited. It may be that minor infringements being taken over by local councils, as with roadside parking, is where we shall be in a few years.

There is an increasing dependence on voluntary support for trying to encourage us all to drive slower and with more care. "Speed watch", Neighbourhood Action Groups (NAGS) and other initiatives do make a difference. For those who would like to get involved, details are in all Parish magazines and newsletters.

There are <u>various speed reduction measures</u> that have been tried over the years. These include: 1) **speed bumps** – expensive to install, noisy and can damage vehicle suspensions. 2) **Vehicle Activated Signs** – smiley faces etc – cheaper, but plenty of evidence of a reducing impact as time goes on. 3) **Speed Cameras** – again expensive to man and maintain – many taken down after a few months as a result of public anger and only have an effect over a short distance. 4) **Raised tables** as per Drayton - but these need to have adequate warning signs and colouration for best impact. 5) **Chicanes & 'build outs'** - Reasonably affordable and increasingly used. Some evidence of excess speeding being caused by the chicane itself. 6) **Improved road design** taking into account visibility and driver perception.

There are no easy answers and each area probably needs its own specific solution. →>

### So what can be done?

Speeding and traffic behaviour on the **B4106 between Drayton and Sutton Courtenay** is an issue all down its length. Noise and building damage issues exist in both villages. Congestion at busy times of the day causes much aggravation not just to the through traffic, but also to vehicles exiting on to the road. The road has a known poor safety and accident record. The proposed build out/chicane at the edge of Sutton Courtenay – if agreed after the full, public consultation will, it is hoped, reduce the average speed – hopefully to well below 30mph.

We are told the **new HIF Road** between Didcot and the Thames will reduce the overall volume of traffic on all the roads between our villages – certainly for 10 years.

The A415 between Abingdon and Marcham is also experiencing increasing traffic volumes. The reduction to 50mph has helped, but there must be a question of the road becoming more suitable for a 40mph limit. Work has also been commissioned to find options for a redesign of the Frilford crossroads – possibly with dedicated bus and cycle lanes and even, yes, the long promised bypass.

But, ultimately, the **only long term solutions** are to encourage people out of cars, and to walk and cycle wherever possible, and provide regular, reliable public transport where that is not feasible. At present cycling on our local roads is a risky business whilst walking on many roads is even worse. Buses are too infrequent, many villages have no service. HGV traffic is another whole problem.

It may be that, in the future, computers will be able to drive more safely than humans – **but not yet**.

With the police, Local Councils and Central Government all under budgetary restraint, there is no alternative but to be inventive where possible, and as **patient as possible – particularly behind the wheel**.

### WESTMINSTER **VIEW**



Our MP (Wantage/Didcot) is David Johnston (OBE, awarded for services to Social Mobility and Education).

I am writing this after the first full week of Parliament's return, with all MPs now present. Some MPs have not been physically in the Commons for nearly 18

months. All of us who were attending physically had been subject to a socially distanced chamber with only a fraction of MPs allowed in, and all committee meetings were on Zoom.

The place is now transformed, much more atmosphere; proper debates where people can 'intervene on' (interrupt to politely make a counterpoint), and I for one felt our first Education Committee meeting was much more focussed and better for being able to put ministers and their officials under scrutiny. Virtual parliament is better than no parliament, but a lot is lost.

I spent most of recess at home in Didcot. There were some great events just before we returned. One was the Longworth Fete, a good turnout and good weather, a very competitive dog show and classics like a tombola and coconut shy. Another was a tea party at the Almshouse of Robert Stiles in Wantage, to celebrate the 75th anniversary of the Almshouse Association. Almshouses have existed in the UK for more than 1000 years and provide low-cost housing to the local community. They have something in common with fetes in that both are run by volunteers. And, as with the return of parliament, they give a taste of what's been missed through Covid.

I know that the pressure on GP services continues to be a bugbear. Over the summer, I met with both the Wantage surgeries and chaired a larger meeting of the Didcot surgeries, Clinical Commissioning Group, Patient Participation Group reps and the District Council. The long-overdue expansion of Wantage Health Centre has just had a step forward after a meeting of the CCG: the business case has been approved and the planning application has been submitted. In Didcot, there is both the particular short-term need presented by the many new houses, and a longer-term need given the expected population growth. In broad terms there's agreement about what we need. My job is to do all I can to try and ensure we get it.

Other recent meetings of note were with some residents of Appleford and some residents of Sutton Courtenay. The former was specifically about the location of the relief road, I have contacted the County Council with the points the group wanted raised. The Sutton Courtenay meeting was a broader one about the development that has taken place and promised improvements that have still not arrived – at my request, they're giving me a task list of things they'd like me to do!

A final mention for a couple of charities. Adrian is an ambassador for the Stroke Association and runs a group in Grove. He can deliver free of charge presentations to groups of any age about the risk factors for having a stroke. The other is Root and Branch, near Shrivenham, which runs outdoor activities for those with mental health difficulties. They need volunteer blacksmiths /metal workers to help run classes for those that use the service. Back 30 years and that month was only notable for the Monty Python team with their novelty hit 'Always Look on the Bright Side of Life' (much played ever since!).

40 years ago (is it REALLY so long?!) Adam & the Ants had just been #1 ('Prince Charming'), followed this month by John Church (Julio Iglesias if you prefer!) and 'Begin the Beguine', and **Police** with 'Every Little Thing she does is Magic'. Moving up were Dollar ('Mirror Mirror') and Diana Ross with 'Why do Fools fall in Love', but soon to be #1 were Queen & David Bowie, with the wonderful 'Under Pressure', & Bucks Fizz ('Land of Make Believe').

FIFTY years ago (for real old-timers) and we'd just had CCS & Redbone in the top 5 ('Tap Turns on the Water' & 'Witch Queen of New Orleans' respectively), but Slade would be #1 this month with 'Coz I Luv You' (they didn't iust have Xmas hits!). Moving up were Cher (born Cherilyn Sarkisian, and now a vouthful looking 75 - no jokes!!) with the terrific 'Gypsies, Tramps & Thieves'), also the fantastic T-Rex ('Jeepster'), but soon to be #1 (and over Xmas) was **Benny Hill** and (can you do the lyrics?!) 'Ernie, the Fastest Milkman in the West'. Hill had actually BEEN a milkman - but it's not clear who had been the widowed Sue, who lived alone at number 22?!

Can anyone recall all of 60 years back?! Helen Shapiro (Walkin' Back to Happiness) had just been #1, and Acker Bilk had the massively selling instrumental 'Stranger on the Shore' (later covered by many acts when lyrics were added). His version was on a cassette tape (remember them?!) taken into space by the crew of Apollo 10 on their mission to the Moon. Not many songs have that distinction - that mission was the 'dress rehearsal' for the actual moon landing by Armstrong & Aldrin on Apollo 11. It was a big month for instrumentals, as also a hit then was the iconic 'Take Five', for Dave Brubeck's jazz guartet.


