#### From the Ministry Team......

November, the month in which "the raw afternoon is rawest, and the dense fog is densest, and the muddy streets are muddiest." *Bleak House, Charles Dickens*.

November can certainly be a most dreary month; our church and public life has a sombre tone to match the weather. It is the season of remembrance and what we do with our remembering, matters. Right remembering is about more than setting a day or month to remind ourselves of the people and events that have shaped our lives.

Remembering rightly is about how we live in the light of those facts. In the Old Testament the Israelites, were forever being called by God to remember — to remember who they were, where they had come from, a call that was usually made at times in their life when things were going wrong. But that call to remember wasn't about just reminding themselves how they had got into their current mess,

it was also a call to a future that would be different. God's promise for a different future is for all nations, not just one. God asks his people to remember with both honesty about historical events, gratitude, sorrow, humility and above all, hope and vision.

I carry a small wooden cross given to me when I became a hospital chaplain. It has been shaped over several decades by many hands griping and rubbing it in their hardest of times. I find myself holding it much more frequently in November. It reminds me of past stories and people, but it always reminds me that Jesus who has gone before through the darkness of death; that I can remember the past with a sure and certain hope. November, it's a good month to 'get your hands on' a small wooden cross and keep hold of it. It puts the past, present, future into God's safe and faithful hands. November may be a gloomy season but if winter comes then Spring will surely follow. Remembering the seasons tell out the message of resurrection hope.

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
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#### **Traffic Calming**

Drayton Parish Council notes the recent posts on the Families in Drayton Facebook page about speeding in the village and safety concerns, and particularly the noise/vibrations from HGVs at night.

All of our Councillors, Parish, District and County, live in Drayton and are just as concerned about the extent and level of speeding vehicles - of all types. Personally, I live just off Abingdon Road and so am very aware of the traffic noise at night.

So what is the Parish Council's role in addressing this worrying issue? All matters road related (road conditions, traffic calming and pedestrian safety) are the legal responsibility of Oxfordshire County Council (OCC). This means it is only OCC who can improve road surfaces, install white-lining, build speed humps, install speed cameras etc.

However, the Parish Council takes these issues very seriously, and has a dedicated Traffic Calming Working Group. We have met with representatives of OCC on a number of occasions to discuss measures that we want to be taken to improve traffic and pedestrian safety in Drayton. As a next step, this Working Group has undertaken a detailed review of conditions in specific parts of the village, with a view to refining a specific list of measures to calm speeding traffic and ensure pedestrian safety. We will share this list with OCC, who will review our proposals, determine what is appropriate and achievable within the allocated budget. OCC will be responsible for designing, planning and implementing whatever measures are ultimately agreed – the Parish Council will continue working closely with them to provide input and feedback.

This process does all take some time, but the Parish Council and OCC share a common goal. We will continue to do our best to improve safety for all of our residents and visitors, and we will endeavour to keep everyone informed of the progress we make. Residents' suggestions or contributions are always welcome.

#### Parish Council vacancies

We currently have **4 vacancies on the Parish Council**. I would personally like to encourage Drayton residents to consider putting themselves forward to act as Councillors. I joined the Parish Council in 2018, and as a newcomer to Drayton (and indeed Oxfordshire), I have found it a great way to get involved in village life, and get to know other Drayton residents.

The Parish Council discusses and makes decisions on a variety of important issues that affect our community. It is a great forum for you to provide input on matters that concern or interest you in the village. Probably the most important are planning matters, traffic calming measures, managing open spaces (including footpaths and playgrounds), managing the allotments and burial ground, and making grants to local charities and organisations. The Parish Council also regularly coordinates with the Vale of White Horse District Council and OCC about issues that affect the parish (particularly planning and traffic). The Parish Council meets one evening a month (7.30pm-10pm), and there is a bit of reading of emails and papers in between meetings. If you choose to join a Working Group or Committee, then there would be an additional meeting a month. You don't need any particular experience or specialist knowledge to be a Councillor (training/guidance are available if needed). In fact, it is far better if the Parish Council reflects the diversity of the community, and has councillors with different life experiences,

interests, perspectives and opinions. So we actively welcome residents of all ages and backgrounds to get involved. You will be helping shape our community, and influence matters right on your doorstep!

#### Footpaths and Bridleways

We are aware that some of the footpaths and bridleways in the village are in less than an idea state and become very muddy in winter months. We have a working group who are focussing on these, working with local landowners to make improvements.

#### Manor Farm - Village Green

The plan is for the Manor Farm space to be handed over to the ownership of the Parish Council, for the benefit of the village. Once we own it, we can consider whether we want to do anything specific with this space – planting trees/improving etc., so that it is a nice, safe green space for all of us to enjoy, promoting outside activities and improving the environment.

Before ownership is handed over, the Parish Council wants to ensure that the developer, Cala, has done everything to this area that it is supposed to have completed according to the landscape plans, and that any issues (such as the hogweed) have been resolved satisfactorily. We have a meeting in early November with the Vale of White Horse and Cala to do a walk around to check on this.

#### **Walnut Meadows**

The developer, Millers, has submitted a further planning application to the Vale of White Horse with a proposed plan to make changes to the large public open space. The Parish Council has provided its input, and we await a decision from the Vale. We are hopeful that this area can be improved as soon as possible, so that it starts being a village amenity rather than a neglected eyesore. More on this soon.





## DISTRICT COUNCIL REPORT Andy Cooke

Dear all, Brown Bins again

To update last month's news:





I have heard, both around here and elsewhere, that collections are not infrequently a day late (and, as per the letter sent out, are often on different schedules; this latter has been due to the availability of vehicles and the requirements of the roads). They've been late due to being somewhat overstretched.

However, the overstretch should be lifting as I type and I've just been told that the garden waste service will **return to its normal fortnightly collections from next week (25<sup>th</sup> October),** so it should be back to normal by the time you're reading this.

From the 25<sup>th</sup> of October onwards, customers can put their brown garden waste bins out on their normal collection day in their recycling week every fortnight.

In addition, there will be an Extra Garden Waste Week in November (week commencing 8 November) when customers can put out one extra bin's worth of garden waste that week.

#### Coronavirus

Covid levels have been rising steadily over the past month, primarily in under-18s (secondary school ages have been particularly affected), but spilling over to parent-ages (primarily 40-49) and from there to older groups.

A total of 35 people are in hospital in Oxfordshire with covid, but only two of those are in mechanical ventilation beds.

As of yesterday (14<sup>th</sup> of September as I write), 107,869 people in the Vale have had their first dose and 100,347 their second. I don't have the figures for booster doses, but these are by far the greatest rate being administered – albeit slower than we'd like.

Whilst the covid rates are alarming at the moment, early data on over-eighties hints at the booster jabs already having an effect there, and data from Scotland (who are well ahead of England on 12-15 vaccinations) shows that their teens are, in stark contrast to ours, showing rapidly *falling* covid levels.

#### **Universal Credit**

At the meeting of Full Council on  $6^{th}$  October, a resolution was passed to write to the Government to urge them to restore the uplift to Universal Credit. The impact from removing the uplift, coming at exactly the time of increased utilities bills and the onset of winter, and affecting over 5,000 families in the Vale, will be very significant.

It may seem unlikely that the Government will listen, but I wasn't that hopeful when we did this on the planning rules and on the Expressway, and both have been at least deferred and heavily re-examined. Worth a shot, anyway.

#### Climate Emergency: 100 Network

We also passed a resolution to join the 100 Network, a network of local authorities pushing to address climate change. As well as reaffirming our commitment to carbon neutrality for council operations by 2030 and for the entire district by 2045, we gain access to a swathe of useful materials and tools to help us do so.

#### Planting and protection of trees

One of the more immediate things we can do in this respect is encouraging tree protection and planting, as they are great at acting as carbon sinks. We've created a new policy for (at trees on council land www.southandvale.gov.uk/wp-content/uploads/2021/10/ South-Oxfordshire-and-Vale-of-White-Horse-Policy-for-<u>Planting-Trees-on-Council-Owned-Land.pdf</u> ) and have created a useful page for support in getting trees protected here: https://www.whitehorsedc.gov.uk/vale-of-white-horsedistrict-council/planning-and-development/wildlife-treesand-landscape/trees/, which also provides an interactive map to show if trees are already protected.



#### Reservoir

Thames Water have once again resurrected their proposal for Europe's largest concrete-bunded reservoir to fill the green space between Drayton, Marcham, Grove, and Steventon. It has been submitted to OFWAT, who invited comments.

I made mine, noting my alarm that Thames Water had blacked out whole swathes of the environmental impacts (ostensibly on the grounds of commercial confidentiality, but I find it difficult to see how the course of the River Ock is that commercially sensitive — and no other water company needed to do this).

And to quote from my submission: "With my most objective hat on, as a Chartered Engineer, Member of the Association of Project Managers, and Fellow of the Chartered Management Institute, it does seem very strange that the Reservoir option is even being considered with the Severn-Thames Transfer option also available (and apparently less favoured by Thames Water).

The carbon cost, financial cost, time and resources cost, environmental impact, disruption, and so forth are so much against the Reservoir as opposed to the Severn-Thames Transfer option even with Thames Water's best efforts to obscure, or omit information that it's almost ridiculous that the reservoir option is still under active consideration (had I put comparable options in a Business Case and favoured the reservoir equivalent, I'd have been thrown out of the room).

Especially as it brings <u>no new water</u> into the water-stressed region and would be prone to algae (their submission on avoiding this is fundamentally inconsistent) as well as susceptible to running dry in the longer droughts, unlike the alternative.

And, with my Project Manager's hat firmly on, when considering rival megaprojects, if one would take over a decade and involve considerable engineering risk and massive disruption, whilst the other would take three years with far less risk, and if there was an ongoing concern of the situation which either was aimed to mitigate occurring, the quicker and simpler one would win hands-down."

On top of that, linking to the existing reservoirs in the far wetter half of the country is far cheaper and a LOT less environmentally damaging. Basically, if there's a need for extra water, then the transfer link is far quicker, cheaper, more reliable, provides more water (and this is new water to the region), hugely less disruptive, much more environmentally friendly, and far less likely to go wrong. The reservoir would, however, provide a massive amount of corporation tax write-down for a prolonged time; that's the only remaining advantage for it that I can see.

(Oh, and I did notice that the often-mentioned "recreational

benefits" now look to be unlikely that they'll even be attempted without abandoning any attempt to mitigate some of the environmental damage.)

I did go into far more detail in the eight page submission, but you'll be grateful to learn I'm not reproducing the entire thing here!

OFWAT did get back to me, saying that they'd extended the consultation period and are now requiring Thames Water to resubmit the environmental impact statements with less blacking out – I understand quite a few people had been on at them about it.

GARD have separately submitted a considerably more detailed critique that's even more damning and with full and rigorous working (I'm completely independent of GARD; I'm just very interested in all other submissions).

#### Home to School transport

This is a topic that raises its head every year as parents struggle to understand and navigate their way through the rules and regulations. Every year there are complaints of unfairnesses in the system as some parents are faced with bills for hundreds of pounds they were not expecting. I thought it would be useful to get a County expert on this issue to explain the rules. For those short of bedtime reading, the result is below......

It is only in a minority of cases that children are eligible, under the law and Oxfordshire's Home to School Transport Policy, to free travel to school. If children move to an address outside the administrative area of Oxfordshire County Council, the responsibility for determining and, where appropriate, providing free or assisted travel passes to the child's new home authority.

The legal basis for the provision of home to school transport is set out in sections 508A, 508B, 508C, 508D and 509AD and Schedule 35B of the Education Act 1996 (as amended by Part 6 of the Education and Inspections Act 2006) and, where appropriate, the Equality Act and English and European case law. In addition, local authorities are under a statutory duty to have regard to the Home to School Travel and Transport Guidance and the Post-16 Transport and Travel Support to Education and Training guidance. Both sets of statutory guidance were issued by the Department for Education.

Normally eligibility for free travel is determined at the time that a school place is allocated through:

• Oxfordshire County Council's Coordinated Admissions Scheme for entry at the normal points of admission; and/ or, the issuing of an Education, Health and Care Plan; and/or,the operation of the Fair Access Protocol; and/ or,the In-Year Coordinated Admissions Scheme.

Children are eligible for free travel if they attend the nearest available school or educational placement to their address, if the distance from home to school is over the "statutory walking distance" of 3 miles if aged 8 or over or 2 miles if less than aged 8 and of school age. If the nearest school is outside Oxfordshire, children are also eligible for free travel to the nearest school in this council's area, if the distance from home to school is over the "statutory walking distance" of 3 miles if aged 8 or over or 2 miles if less than 8 and of school age.

In addition, children attending the nearest available school to their address, even if it is less than the statutory walking distance, are eligible for free travel if it would not be safe for a child, accompanied by an adult, to walk from their home to the school. If the route is subsequently determined to be safe to walk the parent will be given up to 6 weeks' notice of the withdrawal of free transport. At the end of that period, free transport will be discontinued.

Also children aged 11 to 16 who are eligible for free school meals or whose parents are in receipt of the maximum level of Working Tax Credit and who attend one of their three nearest suitable schools (or places other than school at which they might receive education under section 19(1) of the Education Act 1996), are

eligible for free travel where they live more than 2 but not more than 6 miles from that school. The 2 mile distance is measured by "walking route" and the 6 mile distance is measured by road route. This entitlement applies to all children of the relevant age for the schools concerned, and applies whether a child does or does not have an Education, Health and Care Plan.

However, there is no statutory entitlement to free travel based on living in a catchment area or parental preference. The Home to School Transport Policy did provide free travel to the catchment school, subject to the address being beyond the statutory walking distance, up until 2014 but this was removed for new entrants from September 2015 after a large scale public consultation. If the policy had remained unchanged, given the increasing academisation of schools, the council would have lost control over this element of public expenditure. Essentially academies can set or amend a catchment area and could therefore quite legitimately expand their catchments and so, if there had been no change of policy, expand the financial commitments of the council.

If you have managed to wade your way through that, I reckon you deserve free home to school transport for your children. For most of us, the regulations are a minefield and most parents choose schools for their children without realising the financial implications.

Suffice it to say, I am pushing for a clear summary of the above to be issued to all parents together with school application forms.

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

It was a journalist who made it his business to record the soldiers who lost their lives when war broke out in 1914. When the enormity of the records became too large, he ,after consultation with government, handed his records over and the War Graves Commission began. It now maintains grave yards all over the world. All maintained by volunteers to a very high standard as it is only fitting for the sacrifice they made for us. In November, we will learn more about the role of medical detection dogs. There will be a dog present but not a detection dog. We would not like one of these wonderful dogs detecting something that would be a surprise or shock depending on the discovery. Thursday 11th November, at 7.30 pm in the Caudwell Centre, Gravel Lane. 

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
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# First stop.... Drayton!

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

### **OXFORD ZEZ NEWS**

In order to tackle the city's pollution problems and the climate change emergency, Britain's first **Zero Emission Zone** (ZEZ) **pilot** is set to launch in Oxford in **February 2022**, with the registration system for



exemptions and discounts going live in December 2021.

The ZEZ pilot means polluting vehicles will be charged if driven in key city centre streets ('the zone') between the hours of 7am - 7pm, seven days a week. The level of the charge will be dependent on how polluting the vehicle is. Under the scheme, zero emission vehicles will not be charged to drive in the zone.

#### The daily charges will be:

- Zero-emission vehicles (0g/km CO<sub>2</sub>): £0
- Ultra-low emission vehicles (less than 75g/km CO<sub>2</sub>): £2 per day from February 2022, rising to £4 per day from August 2025.
- Clean Air Zone compliant or Low emission vehicles: £4 per day from February 2022, rising to £8 per day from August 2025.
- Motorcycles and mopeds: £2 per day from February 2022, rising to £4 per day from August 2025

Vehicles not meeting the above standards: £10 per day from February 2022, rising to £20 from August 2025.

The ZEZ pilot will work in a similar way to the London Congestion Charge and Ultra Low Emission Zone. Signs will be installed around the perimeter of the zone and on routes leading to it to notify drivers of the ZEZ pilot. Automatic number plate recognition (ANPR) cameras will be used to enforce the zone.

The ZEZ pilot will allow both councils to gain useful experience and information before introducing a larger Zero Emission Zone covering most of Oxford city centre, subject to further public consultation.

Businesses, residents, and visitors are encouraged to visit the **Zero Emission Zone website** to understand how the scheme will affect them and to find out more about the daily charges.

To get to this point, work has included trialling e-cargo bikes to Oxford's Covered Market, updating the Lord Mayor's car to a Nissan Leaf, installing rapid electric charging points for taxis and residents and the start of cable route works for UK's largest public electric vehicle charging hub at Redbridge Park and Ride.

## Walnuts... We Cracked It!

The table was set, the bunting was up, and the band ready to play. The wind was strong and the cold was chilly, but that didn't stop our intrepid gardeners from digging in and planting all the plants we had bought to enhance our green. With the help of our jolly band, The Cat 'n Fiddle, who serenaded us with a selection of Irish music, a great time was had by all. A lot of really helpful and cheerful people turned up, and though I really didn't think we would manage to get all the plants in, thanks to everyone's help, we made it. The Drayton wildlife group was a real help, and I can't begin to thank everyone else, from the people serving coffee and cakes, to everyone with their spades and trowels. Even the charming lady from the Post Office came over and offered to lend a hand.



It was a lovely occasion, and many people from outside the village stopped to admire the installation and ask us what we were doing. A comment was that Drayton was lucky to have such an inspirational team to enhance its rather boring bit of green space. From the **kernel** of an idea, great things can grow..

I'm going to suggest that we put up a little plaque relating the significance of walnuts in Drayton's history.

We will also install signs telling people not to park on the grass, so these, together with the walnuts and the planting, should do the trick of preserving the grassy areas. We will keep up the temporary fencing until the plants are established, and though it slightly detracts from the impact of the installation, it is necessary for the time being.

At the end of the morning, Andrew de Haan gave a short speech and cut the ribbon to declare the installation open. Well, actually it was string, as we didn't have a length of ribbon long enough, but nobody cared. It was the sense of occasion, and coming together that was the important thing.

About the walnuts themselves, they are set into concrete bases, as I have explained before, and each one weighs 150 kilos, so unless you are a **nutter** and have a JCB, it would be a job to get one out, to say nothing of being slightly conspicuous in the process. Some people say they thought the walnuts should be bigger, some people say they should be nearer the edge, some say they should be rougher, some say they should be further in. Some people say they shouldn't be there at all. So my answer to everyone is that we can never keep everyone happy, and we have done our best.

I would like to thank the South Abingdon Landscape Services company for their good humour and willingness to give us a brilliant deal for the two days they did the garden installation for us. By using our own volunteers, we cut the price of labour

by a half, so that we could afford to spend more on the plants. The new soil has been planted with grass seed, so in the fullness of time, we should have a lovely green again. This time next year it will look amazing.

Breaking news, breaking news, breaking news:

Two people in the village, who would prefer to remain anonymous, have offered to **shell** out for more walnuts to complete the parts of the green that we couldn't afford to protect with Arts money funds. So thus far, we have a total of seven more in the pipeline. Andrew McKeown (**the Sculptor—andrewmckeown.com**) said that he would be able to install them in the spring. Subject to council approval, I hope that this will become a reality. Really exciting! If anyone else would like to "adopt a walnut", please let us know.

We will be holding another village meeting, probably in the village hall, to discuss further plans for the village arts projects early next year, so we will be taking votes on what art installations people would like next. More news shortly.


