

This Month's Cover – is intended as a small tribute to Margaret Jones, who sadly passed away recently (page 10).

That page shows her with her mural in the Stratton Way underpass, but the cover also shows her work in the alleyway from the <u>Market Place to Stert Street in Abingdon</u>.

The description on **Abingdonblog.co.uk** (thanks to them also for the picture, they've lots more Abingdon info) states that this work, showing <u>three stone landmarks</u> (or former ones) in Abingdon, was commissioned by 'Friends of Abingdon' (1991).

The Queen Victoria statue had been in the Square, but was moved to the Abbey Grounds after WW2. The middle one in the shot had been demolished by Cromwell's forces, and the furthest image is an 'Obelisk Lamp Standard', from the first days of the town's gas lighting, in the mid-1800s.





<u>Our previous meeting</u> (report just missed the December Chronicle) was a <u>wonderful and heartwarming talk</u> by **Mr John Caldicott** about a girl called Daisy. Mr Caldicott is a former governor for the Thomas Coram Foundation for children, the UK's oldest childrens charity.

Imagine being a young unmarried mother in the 1930s and you had nowhere to go apart from the workhouse? Daisy's mum Rebecca was born in 1893 and married a well-off gentleman, but unfortunatly she later remarried to a Charles Throsell who was not of great standing. Daisy didn't get on with her stepfather who would often go missing and then return home without any money.

Daisy worked in Golders Green as a domestic servant but then decided to go and join her sister Nora, working in a laundry in Luton. Daisy then meets a chap (1935) and finds herself pregnant - as she tells him he leaves her.

She finds it difficult to work and applies to a Luton workhouse for sanctuary, but Daisy was not eligible to live in the workhouse and was transferred to Redhill in June 1936.

The foundling hospital there took in children from mothers of good character, who were then given new names.

Daisy had to provide a statement of when she met the father and his name. Nearly all fathers were John Smith. But she was investigated to make sure it was all true and had to go in front of a jury where if it hadn't been for a vicar who spoke up for her she might not have had her child taken into care.

Things looked up when Daisy went to work as a housekeeper for a gentleman (Edward) to look after his children and he asked her to marry him. Daisy wanted her child back but Edward said no. He then died and his family asked Daisy to leave the house.

Off she went and finally married a farm labourer. <u>Now the</u> surprise was that John Caldicott was the original son of Daisy.

He did make contact with Daisy and her brother Fred and had their first meeting in 1981 where Daisy told him his father had been the love of her life, but no other details.

It was a lovely story that had such a difficult start but a wonderful end.

#### Tidy up of St Peter's graveyard


We would like to thank everyone who responded a few years ago in endeavouring to keep St Peter's graveyard <u>eco-friendly</u>.



# **Your District Councillor**



#### Coronavirus

I'm hoping that by the time you read this, the Omicron wave will have well and truly subsided and we will be well on our way back towards more normality. As I write, the cases and hospitalisation numbers have started to point downwards, which is encouraging.

Regardless, and as we've been hit by variants in the past, I'd urge **anyone who hasn't had the chance to get a booster to get one**. Although Omicron managed to elude antibody protection to a degree, it was still curtailed heavily by recently-boosted people, and protection against severe disease (**primarily mediated by T-cells**, which weren't dodged by Omicron) was exceptionally good. To the point where boosted 70+ year olds had a LOWER chance of ending up in intensive care with Omicron than unvaccinated 18-year-olds. Let's hope this is the last of the prominent variants.


#### Reservoir

I proposed a resolution at December's District Council meeting that unless or until Thames Water manage to put forward a credible reason why they need the continent's largest bunded reservoir to be built here (and **"It would be a great commercial asset for our company" is NOT a good reason**!!), we should officially oppose it – and that Thames Water need to include far more environmental impact analysis, details of the cost (those given were extremely dubious and high level) and full details of their convenient new flood modelling which they claim makes the <u>flood risk</u> go away completely, but **they can't let us know the details right now**.

There are other far less disruptive, costly, and environmentally damaging ways to resolve any water need (which would actually bring new water into a water-stressed region, rather than further stressing the River Thames) than building a mega-reservoir larger than Abingdon (which would make Farmoor look like a village pond in comparison), heavier than five towns the size of Swindon, hugely disruptive during the lengthy build, and expensive (in both financial and environmental terms) – and a facility that would not only **fail to provide any water to Oxfordshire itself**, but which would have a strong chance of being <u>unsuitable for any recreation usage</u> due to fears of contamination by intrusive non-native species.

I was gratified and heartened to receive unanimous cross-party support and the resolution was carried, which means that all levels of local government have expressed their serious concern to OFWAT and Thames Water.

In less positive news, the Reservoir proposal passed "Gate 1" of the OFWAT process. Looking into it, it appears this is pretty much a box-ticking exercise and a given; OFWAT have responded to the many concerns and criticisms stating that Thames Water will be expected to address them at "Gate 2", expected late this year. They did, though, include my request that if it fails yet again (they've been trying this repeatedly for 25 years now), Thames Water should release their earmarking of the land so we can end this repeated nonsense.





#### **Domestic Retrofitting**

This is probably the least sexy motion ever passed by a council, and I helped to write it and second it, but it's an important one for combating the climate emergency (in my not-so-humble opinion): emissions from **heating houses account for 20% of all** greenhouse gas emissions. Upgrading houses and retrofitting them can reduce that drastically, but it does not only cost more than many householders can readily pay up front, it can be awkward to navigate the various things to do and there's a lack of the skills to do it nationally. We've proposed that if Government can stump up a long-term grant (they've dabbled with short-term grant systems and chopped and changed repeatedly), we can do the on-the-ground element of linking up with providers and providing an easy and coordinated route for householders and providers to access what is needed and relevant grants.

#### Housing Requirement changed in Local Plan

The Local Plan's target of housebuilding (in which we have 5.04 years of housing supply – just above the 5 year threshold where we lose protection against speculative development) is significantly higher than the numbers that the Government's standard method of assessment would provide.

We've therefore done what looks to be obvious: officially switched to the standard figure, which turns out to be just over two-thirds of the figure in the original Local Plan. The main upshot of this is that we now have considerably more land supply announced, so should be a lot safer from speculative development (something that was a curse a few years back).

#### Pilot Scheme to simplify Neighbourhood Plans

We've successfully applied to get onto a limited scheme to simplify Neighbourhood Planning. We'll be working with South Oxfordshire District Council to come up with a simplified and more streamlined way of doing Neighbourhood Planning, which will be accepted by Government. It's originally targeted at areas that haven't yet produced a Neighbourhood Plan, but could be of considerable use when Drayton eventually needs to update the existing Neighbourhood Plan.

# WHAT Happened to Drayton's Brickworks? (Andrew Bax)

In the Chronicle of February 2021, **Josie Midwinter** drew attention to an <u>unusual headstone</u> in the west graveyard of St Peter's church, unusual because it is made of **brick**. It was erected in memory of Walter and Emma Clarke who acquired the brickworks in 1899 and they remained in the ownership of their family until the works were discontinued during WW2.

At one time the brickyard covered some three acres bordered by Steventon Road between the Wheatsheaf and Kiln Lane.



Oxfordshire History Centre reveals that, in 1854 the works were owned by William Norrington, a local baker and farmer, who with B. Norrington, presumably his son, continued to operate them until the Clarkes took over. However, it is probable that the brickworks existed in some form from a much earlier date. Much of the village lies on a deposit of **Kimmeridge Clay**, recognisable in the rusty-coloured bricks from which many of Drayton's older houses are built. The **Wilts & Berks Canal**, (opened in 1810), passed to the west of the village and enabled coal to be brought in for firing the kiln, and bricks to be transported along its length so Drayton bricks found markets far beyond the immediate locality.

In 1979 **Mrs Dorothy Clark** (née **Dunsdon**), of 33 High Street, was interviewed as part of a brickworks research project by the Oxfordshire County Museum Service.

Her father, **Jack Dunsdon**, (born 1881), worked in the brickworks from leaving school, aged 15, until it closed.

There were five claypits, up to 40ft deep, and a waggon on rails for carrying the clay to the shed in which a steam engine drove machinery for **pugging** the clay (a process for ensuring consistency) and making wire-cuts. During Jack's time the original funnel-shaped kiln was replaced by a square, flattopped down-draught kiln with six outside stoke holes. The Victorian County History notes that the works manufactured bricks, tiles and drainpipes, and that the kiln was also used for **lime-burning** (to produce plaster). Sand was obtained from a gravel pit down the road to Sutton Courtenay. Transport to and from the canal, and surrounding villages, was by horse and cart.

Jack was one of six labourers employed at the works. In the 1920s they earned a basic rate of **12 shillings a week**, working dawn to dusk, six days a week. That meant they worked much longer in the summer months, increasing the productivity of the brickworks and their basic wage to  $\pounds 1$  a week [Ed:- that  $\pounds 1$  equals just over  $\pounds 60$  in today's terms]. Jack was the only one skilled in hand-throwing bricks and is recorded in a local paper as producing **99 bricks in an hour**!

In 1942 a garage was opened on the site of what is now Mott Cottages. **Roger Alder** has provided the accompanying photograph and told me that the garage was painted a patriotic red, white and blue, and that **ROP** stands for **Russian Oil Products**. In 1946 his father-in-law, **Dave Burt**, bought it and transferred to Drayton a garage business he'd started in Barton Lane, Abingdon, so it became known as **Barton Garage**. Dave was a Drayton man, having earlier run a small farm from his home in High Street.

In the 1950s four of the claypits were filled in and developed for what became **Whitehorns Way**. The rest of the site included the Old Post House, in which Dave lived, and a yard for the garage, at which Roger was to become mechanic. In the 1970s Dave moved to a bungalow he had built next to the remaining claypit and sold the Old Post House to Roger. Eighty years since it was last in use, that claypit has now been filled in for development but an enduring reminder of Drayton's industrial past is preserved in the name of <u>Kiln Lane</u>.

# **County Council Report**



## <u> Richard Webber - Oxon CC</u>

My children like to make sure that I am fully informed and updated on any new ideas and ways of thinking. This Christmas, I was given a book by

a young, eminent Dutch economist who is passionate that many of our economic problems could be solved with a universal basic income given to everyone together with policies providing housing to the homeless free of charge and obligation. He believes that there is overwhelming evidence that the homeless, the unemployed and those below the poverty line would respond very positively. Whilst I am not fully persuaded, I am intrigued enough to start reading the economist's follow-up book.

However, in our part of Oxfordshire - particularly in the Vale we have, thankfully, very low unemployment, homelessness and poverty. But we do have <u>a related problem</u>, getting steadily more acute. This is the problem of <u>housing affordability</u>.

A few weeks ago, I was approached by a young local scientist who was despairing of ever being able to get onto the housing market. He was in his early thirties, on a well above average salary but had no access to bank of mum and dad. He had been saving towards a house deposit but price increases were outstripping his rate of savings. The village he would like to stay in now had almost nothing for sale under £350,000. There are almost certainly far more people in our area in this bracket than those in poverty.

One possible solution is simply to build more homes. But we've been trying that for some years now!

 $\Rightarrow$  One possible solution is simply to build more homes. We've been trying that for some years now. The latest Govt survey had both VoWHDC and OCC in the top 10 of 150 councils for the numbers of houses built since 2010. But whilst housebuilders insist on building more large homes for the wealthy, and London commuters, this simply **feeds more house price inflation**. We need more affordable housing or rather, housing that people can afford. But there is little profit for developers in low cost, affordable housing. And there is no evidence in this country that building more houses reduces house prices.

With some ingenious use of capital reserves, VWHDC has managed to build 10 affordable homes in the past year. Very few councils have been able to do this and, anyway, it is a drop in the ocean of what is needed. <u>Without major changes in the way</u> <u>Councils are allowed to finance building</u>, it is doubtful that solutions lie in this direction.

So how does a wealthy area like ours provide homes that the next generation of local residents can afford? No one really knows. There is, however, some unlikely light at the end of the tunnel. Latest ONS statistics suggest that population numbers in this country (and indeed worldwide) are falling. This may give us some economic challenges, but fewer people need fewer houses. If this trend continues, one might expect a steady downward pressure on house prices which would allow more young people to get on the housing ladder. It would also mean less house building in the future.

But does this mean that the solution lies in less economic growth? I need to get on with my Dutch economist's next book.

WESTMINSTER VIEW

My debate on the role of <u>developers</u>, <u>housebuilders & management companies</u> was held at the beginning of January.

You can see it on my Facebook page, but I used as many constituency examples as I could of the lowquality of some homes; their environmental impact; the lack of affordable homes; the role of management companies, who charge large fees for very little work; and the overall broken process by which the houses come into being, including the failure to provide the infrastructure that is always promised.

**My recommendations** included ensuring a higher building standard for the homes; 'use it or lose it' planning permission; making builders build to the latest environmental standards, not the ones that existed when they got planning permission (often several years before); a tougher regime for management companies that prevents them hiking their fees and treating home-owners badly, and for the supporting infrastructure to go in first, as people no longer believe it will follow afterwards!

As I said, my campaigns for **better infrastructure** – including Grove Station to be reopened, improvements to the A420 and A34 and much better medical facilities for the constituency – are the least we should see given the number of houses we've had. There was quite a bit of cross-party support for what I said, and it is something I will return to regularly.

Making predictions about <u>Covid</u> is a mug's game but, at the time of writing, we do seem in a much better place to what we were last year. I am glad that people could, in general, have a better Christmas and New Year than they did the year before. I am particularly pleased our schools have remained open for all children (most were open for at least vulnerable children throughout the pandemic) as it's the best place to learn.

Regular readers will know that I am the lead parliamentary sponsor of the **Local Electricity Bill**, which would enable local communities to buy their energy from local, renewable sources. At the moment a community operation generating renewable energy would have to pay in the region of £1 million set-up costs to access the grid and agree to supply the whole country, rather than just, for example, their local village. This year, I'll be chairing a new All Party Parliamentary Group of MPs and Lords to try and help push this forward.

I know many of you are continuing to have **problems with your post**. I am in regular contact with Royal Mail about this, something I held a debate on in Parliament in June 2021 and which I have raised multiple times. As ever, the Royal Mail staff are working hard but something is still not working correctly. I'll continue to keep on the case of Royal Mail HQ.

**FIFTY years ago** (for real old-timers) and we'd just had quite a bunch of memorable hits in the top 5, **T Rex** with 'Telegram Sam', also **Don McLean** ('American Pie'), and **Harry Nilsson** with the amazing 'Without You'. Asking their fans to 'Meet Me on the Corner' were **Lindisfarne**, **Gilbert O'Sullivan** was 'Alone Again (Naturally)' and the **New Seekers** had a big hit with 'Beg Steal or Borrow'.

Can anyone recall **1962**?! **Cliff** had just been #1 ('The Young Ones', from the film of that name), and the **Everly Brothers** had a big hit with Cryin' in the Rain, so too **Karl Denver** with 'Wimoweh'. Oh, and the iconic **Sam Cooke** was there too, Twistin' the Night Away. Sadly, those who were doing the Twist back then likely can't manage it now without a following visit to a chiropractor?!

The Church page (4) 'Letter' uses as part of its message the 1967 hit for the Troggs, 'Love is All Around' (an even bigger hit when re-released by Wet Wet Wet in the 90s).

The **Troggs** were from Andover, but lead singer **Reg Presley** sounded as though from deepest Zummerzett.

In a TV interview (possibly after they came to fame with 'Wild Thing'), Presley famously said "Oi puts zex on the stage, dunn eye" {he hadn't a typical sex-symbol look . . .}

Sadly Reg died this month 2013.

This month <u>TWENTY years ago</u> we lost Princess Margaret, sadly in the Queen's 'Golden Jubilee year (and then followed in March by the Queen Mother's death). In the entertainment world, **Will Young** won the first series of 'Pop Idol', **Dot Cotton** got married in Eastenders (it was reported that the chap's guide-dog was sent for remedial tuition), and **Martin Kemp**'s character got blown up.

We also sadly lost **John Thaw** (of Morse fame, and The Sweeney), and two wonderful comic talents, **Dudley Moore**, and the unique lunacy of **Spike Milligan**.

In **1992**, the **Maastricht Treaty** was signed, (founding the EU), and the Bosnian civil war was just starting. And we were soon to hear of the Duke & Duchess of York's separation (strangely topical with Prince Andrew in the news?).

Back in **1982**, Argentina was preparing to invade the **Falklands**, and here, **Laker Airways** went bust, stranding some 6,000 passengers, and the **DeLorean** factory (in Belfast) also went down the financial toilet. But just starting was the '**Next**' clothing chain.

And in **1972**, the UK was soon to see the closure of the last **Trolleybus** system (in Bradford), and the final trip for the famous **Brighton Belle** 'pullman car' train. But **Aardman Animations** (eventually creating Wallace & Gromit) was founded, and **Watership Down** was published.

# **GARD (Group Against Reservoir Development)**

#### Through to the next stage

There have been lots of developments this month regarding the proposed Abingdon reservoir. The regulator has released their view on the water companies' recent submissions as to how they will provide water over the next 50 years and the reservoir has been given the goahead to proceed to the next development stage. **This is very disappointing, but not unexpected**. It is also disappointing that the regulator has largely ignored many of the points against the reservoir raised by local groups, organisations, and councils.

The regional water company grouping, called Water Resources Southeast, will reveal their big plans in the week beginning 17th Jan and there will be a consultation period. Once we formally receive the plans and can analyse them, we will be highlighting what local people and organisations can do to help fight these proposals.

#### The proposed reservoir

As a reminder, the reservoir will be the largest of its kind in Europe, rising 25m above the ground and filling the area between Marcham, Abingdon, Drayton, Steventon and East Hanney - **the construction will be at least 10 years of misery for us**.

We know that much of the information on which the reservoir has been planned so far is **incorrect**. As a simple example, an increasing population is one of the main reasons why Thames Water argue that it's needed. For the last 4 years we have been trying to get them to use sensible figures for this increase, rather than the ludicrous worst-case scenario they always seem to use.

Only this week (mid-Jan), the Office for National Statistics published figures reducing their expectation for future UK population increases - due to the falling birth rate, deaths will now outnumber births for the foreseeable future. In fact, immigration is now the only reason why numbers will stabilise or increase. This is the 4th update in a row where the ONS has lowered its forecasts and any actual increase will only be a fraction of what Thames Water are planning on. This fact alone makes the argument for the reservoir ridiculous.
