

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Local Groups & Clubs

Drayton Wives (Lisa Lammiman)

This month our speaker was Martin Buckland. He is a local man who often helps at the Didcot Railway Centre dressed as a Victorian Railway Navvy in the re-enactors team. But he is also very interested in Industrial Archaeology and has been since the age of 14yrs.

Our talk was on the Wilts and Berks canal and remember at one point we lived in the county of Berkshire before we The canal opened in 1810 after 15 years of moved!!!!! construction but had a chequered career until its legal closure in 1914. In 1977 retoration began in a few places but in 2004 full restoration of the 62 miles was decided upon.

A canal is artifically made, and it can go up and down, whereas a river is natural and goes its own way. Canals were used for moving pottery and where there wasn't a convenient river a canal was made. Potter was a very desirable commodity and needed moving in a way that didn't break it. Pack horses were used up to the 18th century but were not good and broke the crockery. A healthy horse could pull two tons!!.

So the Wilts and Berks canal was created, and opened in 1810 to provide a transport link to the area.

Coal from Somerset was brought into the Kennet and Avon, then the Oxford canal on its way to Coventry. Also the Drayton Brickworks used the canal up and down its length.

A local man called William Strata, who was born in Churchill, noticed that ground was in layers as the canal was built thus the word Strata was created to mean layers.

In 1793 the the canal had arrived in Steventon on its way up. The canal was not allowed to progress past Oxford and was going to Wallingford but ran out of money, and so went to Abingdon. After the canal came the Great Western Railway and Steventon station opened in April 1951.

Drayton still has part of the lock and some parts can still be seen. The new canal is in Peep-o-Day Lane.

Martin does guided walks around the canal and river, and his contact address is martin.buckland@ntlword.com if anyone is interested. It was a very informative talk and only a part can be mentioned here, so we look forward to inviting Martin back.

Vacancies

From the PC part of the DraytonVillage website :-

There are currently **three vacancies** for Councillors on Drayton Parish Council. This unpaid position involves working for the local community as part of a team of 11 Councillors. The Parish Council usually meets in the evening on the second Tuesday of each month in the Caudwell Day Centre.

The Council's work is varied and interesting, it's organised into topic areas ie:- Finance and Personnel, Neighbourhood Development Plan implementation, Planning, Rights of Way, Transport, etc. Councillors often undertake work on their topic, and may attend meetings between the regular monthly ones.

Any resident over the age of 18 can apply to join the council, as can non-residents with substantial links to the parish. The elections team at the Vale of White Horse District Council or **Lorraine Watling, the Parish Clerk**, can provide further information about eligibility.

If you can help deliver the work of the Council, and would like to be considered for this position, please email an expression of interest to the Parish Clerk, that's to email id:-<u>clerk@draytonpc.org</u> Your email should include a few lines about yourself, describing your links to the Parish, your skills and interests, and how you feel you can contribute to the Parish Council's work within the community. You may also be asked to address the Council at the meeting when your application for co-option is considered.

Soooo, if you'd like to lend your shoulder to the wheel and try to progress the delayed Walnut Meadows development, or perhaps you either especially love or hate the walnuts on the village green, then this is <u>your chance</u>?!

To contact any members of the Parish Council, all enquiries should be directed to the **Parish Clerk**, Lorraine Watling; she may be contacted at clerk@draytonpc.org or 07909 176061, and she will ensure that messages are passed on. Any Drayton resident may also ask to be added to the Clerk's E-mailing list, so that they receive prior notice of meetings and any relevant documents.



Weather Getting Colder?

Don't forget your Garden Birds!

Many folk put food out for them, but they like a drink too (and of course, YOU like a shower, well, they rather like a bath, keep the feathers clean!) A large flat dish like the



one pictured is good (if you can). Keep it topped up with water every few days, you'll get some regular avian visitors. And when it gets frosty, please check it's not frozen over!

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Fly Tipping – WARNING!!

You have a legal responsibility, or **Duty of Care**, to make sure that all waste from your household or business is disposed of correctly.

You could face prosecution and a <u>fine of up to</u> <u>£5,000</u> if your waste ends up fly-tipped.

Always check your waste is being disposed of by a **registered waste carrier**, otherwise you risk your waste being fly tipped. Anyone employed to remove waste from your home or business must have an 'Upper Tier waste' licence that will start with **CBDU**.

You can (and should!) check the register of waste carriers on the Environment Agency website:-

https://environment.data.gov.uk/publicregister/view/search-waste-carriers-brokers

Extra advice:- Record the Reg Number of any vehicle used by a waste carrier for your rubbish – AND – ask for a proper Invoice & Receipt

Motions – Fracking & Cost of Living

When I became a councillor, I was a bit cynical about the value of motions passed at Council. After all, wouldn't Govt just ignore what they didn't want to hear? I thought the key part was representing residents and pressuring on their behalf, balancing the books, pushing on planning and enforcement

- and those are as crucial as I thought, but **the motions turn out to be worthwhile after all.**

After the Expressway was cancelled and the Government thought again about their algorithm-based changes to planning policy (both following motions calling on Govt to do these, **from multiple Councils**), I thought again. Individual Councils might be easily ignored, but when lots of Councils write to the Government saying the same thing, they seem to *have* to listen. It's a way of sending a strong signal up the chain, and it's well known as a function of Councils (I was actually too cynical, I'm pleasantly surprised!).

In addition, there are sometimes useful things we can do, even if it's just getting set up and with people keyed up and processes worked out and legal kinks ironed out ready to administer what we've asked for or suggested, but sometimes getting people connected with services that can help them, or providing advice.

On Oct 12th, in Full Council, we passed a couple of motions that I want to mention. One was on fracking, and one was on support to businesses in the Cost of Living crisis.

Fracking

Proposed by the Conservative Group Leader, and seconded by myself on behalf of the Liberal Democrat Group, and following a consensus approach where both parties amended the original motion to improve it, we passed a resolution that the Council Leader would inform Government (who say they want to take local consent into account) that our position on fracking is unanimously negative: it is an unacceptable energy source for the Vale of White Horse, and they should focus on production and infrastructure for renewable energy. We hope this will have extra impact on the Government, because of the totally cross-party way it was done (they may expect the Lib Dems to criticize this; that the Conservatives joined us on it and we worked hand in glove on it will have been noticed by them).

We do not believe that there are currently any (known) plans for exploratory work here, but it is not implausible that the Jurassic Weald Basin (which has had exploratory drilling) may extend this far. We would like to lock that door before anyone pushes at it, and add our voice to the other Councils calling the same way.

Before anyone accuses us of being **anti-technology or NIMBY about this** (despite lots of engineers and scientists as Councillors), I'll point out that the arguments raised on the groundwater pollution risk, seismic issues, environmental damage, and emissions were solid. For me, <u>one huge alarm bell</u> is the regulatory system:- whilst <u>offshore drilling</u> is covered by **exhaustive regulation and safety & environmental cases** (with massive criminal implications for avoidance) to the point where rain falling on an oil rig must be collected, analysed, and disposed of properly – *those rules don't apply to fracking*, the regs are far lighter, despite such activity occurring far closer to peoples' homes and near farms and streams.

Moreover, as the gas is not in a single reservoir, fracking requires the drilling of dozens of wells scattered every few hundred yards across the countryside, and until they were thoroughly fracked, the owners wouldn't even know if their field was viable. And if it wasn't – they'd fold the company, walk off, and leave the environmental damage for someone else to clear up.

And that's for something that even Cuadrilla say is not economically viable in the UK! Why the current Govt insist on trying to push this is beyond me, but we can certainly push back.

Cost of Living support - businesses

The other key motion was on **support for small businesses** in the Cost of Living crisis – who have seen huge increases in their costs, reduction in business, and were left as a late afterthought in the Energy Cap guarantees. This has left them with still huge increases in prices, and guaranteed only for six months – at a time they need stability.

I grew up in a pub. I've seen just how hard the life is and how much work goes in for how little reward – and I know many other small businesses are the same. They've taken a huge hit from the pandemic and **need stability now**; six months is not stability.

We've asked the Government to reconsider the short planning horizon, and to look at additional targeted support for businesses (such as pubs and restaurants, but also others) who use a lot of energy for cooking, heating, and lighting for customers. We understand that many other Councils are calling for the same thing.

Meanwhile, we're going to ensure the **existing South and Vale Business Support (svbs.co.uk)** is ready to send out any grants or support that do get issued from the centre as immediately as possible (preparing now can mean saving days in the future – if they do get set up. And days can make the difference).

It's not much. It's not as much as we want. But this was also unanimously passed, so maybe the Government will listen. This sort of thing has worked before, and now it's more important than ever. It's got to be worth a shot. [See <u>page 19 for further info</u>]

Drayton's Fruity History?

Drayton's Apple Heritage

Drayton and its surrounding villages in north Berkshire (we only joined Oxfordshire in 1974) were once **a noted apple-growing area**. Indeed, some of the older gardens in the village have gnarled and ancient apple trees of unknown variety that are still productive. Many of the old varieties have an interesting history and they have been well catalogued. One such reference is <u>www.pomiferous.com</u>, an online encyclopaedia of over 7000 apples.

When Mike Habermehl drew up the original plan for the Millennium Green, he incorporated an apple orchard of **heritage varieties** that were once planted hereabouts, but which are now seldom seen. His schematic plan is reproduced below, but a few of the trees have failed since they were planted so reliance on the plan alone makes identification of the remainder difficult. A further problem is that fruit trees tend to become biennial, meaning that they crop on alternate years and this year, several of them have not produced any fruit at all.

<u>Here is a list of the varieties</u> originally planted on the Millennium Green, together with their locations on the plan:-

Old Pearmain 20 & 21. Golden Pippin 19. Cockle Pippin 22 & 26. Oaken Pippin 23, 24 & 25. Charles Ross 27 & 28. Leathercoat Russet 29 & 30. English Codlin 31. Court Pendu Plat 32. Grenadier 35, 36 & 37. Winston 33 & 34. Encore 38, 40 & 41. Blenheim Orange 39. Deacon's Millenium 42. Isaac Newton 43 & 44. Reverend Wilks

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Pippin, as the name suggests, is an apple grown from a pip, probably resulting from random pollination. The grower would have to wait several years to determine whether its characteristics were worth preserving; if it was, the tree would be propagated by grafting cuttings onto an established rootstock. **Codlins** are soft-fleshed cookers which quickly simmer to a sweet and frothy mush and are the main ingredient in the traditional pudding of 'codlin cream'. **Russets** are so named for their rough, brownish skins, a common feature of older varieties; they often have an aromatic flavour.

There is evidence that **Pearmain apples** were under cultivation in the 12th century. The name does not imply an association with pears; it's actually derived from the Old French *parmaindre*, or endurance, reflecting their long shelf life. Quite a lot of our older varieties seem to have originated in France; indeed, the term **pomology**, or the study of fruit trees, is derived from the French for apple, pomme.

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WESTMINSTER VIEW

Our MP (Wantage/Didcot) is David Johnston (OBE, awarded for services to Social Mobility and Education).

I've been pleased with the response of local companies to my **work experience campaign**. We've now got a great set of

placements happening for over 30 sixth-formers at schools across the constituency, I'm very grateful to organisations from Oxford Sigma and Hachette UK, to Rebellion and Astroscale.

Work experience is really important to help young people understand the world of work, but **placements have dried up** due to Covid and lots more people working at home for at least part of their week, meaning **young people are not getting the opportunities others used to**, particularly disadvantaged ones. I'm hoping this will improve in the years to come.

We were given the shortest time limit for speeches I've ever had in my time as an MP - 90 seconds each! - in **a debate about sewage discharges**, secured by a Conservative colleague of mine. The reason was that there were 33 MPs present for just a 90 minute debate. It was still enough to make some key points: that we all agree too much sewage is released into our waters - it should be rare but water companies don't adhere to this - it is not a new problem and it can't be fixed overnight as the alternative is sewage backing up into people's homes instead.

It was also important to highlight that the claim MPs voted to allow it to happen have been shown by independent fact-checking organisation, Full Fact, to be false - whichever way the vote in question had gone the sewage would not have stopped. I welcomed the new legal duty the Govt has put on water companies to reduce this harm and the £56 billion that is being unlocked by its **Storm Overflows Plan** to tackle the problem. I particularly welcome that the Govt is increasing the maximum fine that can be levied from £250,000 to £250 million.

Sixteen-year-old Niamh from Wantage came to see me about <u>negative behaviour</u> she and her friends have been experiencing from boys and men, including rape 'jokes', which adults around them have dismissed as 'boys will boys'. She is keen to campaign on this area and I am going to help her - I am setting up for her to meet Sharon Gaffka, whose spiking campaign I have helped, and I raised the topic in the House of Commons the following week. As I have said before in Parliament, it seems pretty obvious that if we can ensure boys grow up respecting girls, **they're unlikely to become men who disrespect women**.

Also in the top 10 were **Clannad** with the haunting 'Theme from Harry's Game', and **Madness**, with 'Our House', one of the most played and performed tracks ever since?!

FIFTY years ago (for real old-timers), we had **Elton John** with 'Crocodile Rock', & **The Osmonds** 'Crazy Horses', with a 'novelty' #1 by **Little Jimmy Osmond** ('Long Haired Lover from Liverpool'), which surprisingly he survived to perform more than once! Coming up in the charts were the far more memorable 'Jean Genie' (**David Bowie**), & 'You're So Vain' (**Carly Simon**).

More results from the first release of 2021 Census data. This diagram shows the age and sex of usual residents in the **Vale of White Horse** in 10-year age bands.




