## **DAMASCUS Parish article**

This year churches across the DAMASCUS Parish (Drayton, Appleford, Milton, Sutton Courtenay and Steventon) are inviting you to 'Follow the Star' to a church near you to experience once again the wonder of Christmas – the same wonder the shepherds experienced. Shepherds in first century Palestine would have been attuned to the wonders and ravages of nature: star-lit nights, cold and heat, storm and calm, and the unwelcome attention of predators. They would have been more aware than we of human dependency on the seasons, and more respectful than us of the precarious nature of existence. Fear, as well as appreciation, would have shaped their religious sensitivities. Some think the shepherds near Bethlehem may have been guarding sheep for the Jerusalem Temple, which used them as part of the sacrificial ritual.

Yet the kind of work shepherds did and the hours they had to keep barred them from orthodox religious observance; they were regarded as uncouth and untrustworthy and were not allowed to give testimony in law courts. It was typical of St Luke (the only New Testament writer to refer to the shepherds) to put them in the forefront of his narrative. Luke is the writer who favours the underdog: tax collectors, sinners, women, old and poor people and non-Jews all figure favourably in his account. Deliberately he sets before us shepherds as the first Christmas worshippers. They already knew how to wonder. William of St Thierry wrote: "A man who has lost his sense of wonder is a man dead." The 19th Century scientist Michael Faraday wrote: "Let us consider... how wonderfully we stand upon this world. Here it is that we are born, bred and live, and yet we view these things with an almost entire absence of wonder..." This is no plea for anti-intellectual faith, but rather for the discovery of an extra dimension. Wonder is the prime ingredient of worship, and we need to recover it and use it. It takes practice. The poet William Blake encouraged us to look into the ordinary and see the extraordinary:

"To see a World in a Grain of Sand,

And a Heaven in a Wild Flower:

Hold Infinity in the palm of your hand,

And eternity in an hour..."

The late Michael Mayne, Dean of Westminster wrote, "A sense of the sublime leads to a sense of awe, which is I suppose that combination of wonder and fearfulness you may feel in the presence of what takes your breath away. It is not afraid in the sense of feeling scared, but rather an awe-struck sense of amazement that the ordinary is rather more extraordinary than the extraordinary... it is not the rabbit out of the hat but the rabbit out of the rabbit that is so surprising..." So, in the astonishing story of heaven-come-to-earth in Bethlehem, of divinity in a cowshed, it is shepherds who receive the revelation. Not priests, not presidents, not philosophers. "An angel of the Lord stood before them, and the glory of the Lord shone around them, and they were terrified." For all they knew it might have been bad news. But the angel said to them, 'Do not be afraid; for see – I am bringing you good news of great joy for all the people: to you is born this day in the city of David a Saviour, who is the Messiah, the Lord'." The response of the shepherds was to go and see. Not to question or even to reason. The main constituent of their belief was already wonder. They were accustomed to marvelling, for they were surrounded by a world of marvels. So, they responded to the invita-

tion and went to look. And as they looked, they marvelled. Later, they were to return "glorifying and praising God for all they had seen and heard."

You can search for individual postcodes or for district council areas. I think parishes will follow later.

The topics include all the questions that were asked in the Census, such as age, sex, country of birth, household size and derived data such as population density.

As an example, 14.2 % of the Vale's population were born outside the UK compared with 35% for Oxford.

## **CYCLING**

Since the first lockdown, like many, I have been moved to use my bike to get around much more. Whenever possible, I cycle to my Council Offices for meetings. I am past the age of being a member of the Lycra brigade, and as a result of pressure from family and wiser colleagues,

I am now wearing my crash helmet. My car usage has dropped dramatically and I am becoming an expert on understanding how and why the X2 bus timetable behaves the way it does. Living in Drayton, I am fortunate to be close to a regular half hour bus service in most directions. Many people are not so lucky.

If/when the buses are late, it is almost always because they have been held up in car traffic.

It is all very well for the likes of me to bang in about encouraging people to use their cars much less, but so often the major obstacle to this is the unreliability of our public transport together with the safety of our cycle network. Here and there, we have stretches of well made, dedicated, safe and attractive routes for cyclists (Peepoday Lane being the classic example). Very few of these join up properly at present and the cyclist too often has to take his/her life in their hands as they try to negotiate busy roads and fast traffic.

Last Saturday, we decided to try a longer trip for a cup of coffee. Only about 20 miles + hills, but even after careful planning, it involved some stretches of busy roads. Most car drivers are very aware of the need to give cyclists (particularly those not in the flush of youth) plenty of room as per the new Highway Code. However, a significant number seem to find cyclists little more than an irritating obstruction. While we cannot afford to join up safe cycling routes as quickly as we would like, and so many of our roads are too narrow for dedicated cycle lanes, all of us – cyclists, pedestrians and car drivers have to accept the need for sharing the roads. In the past 30 years, the number of cars on our roads has doubled. That cannot be sustainable. Last Saturday, we decided to get off main roads wherever possible and explore usable byways. This involved carrying the bikes at various points and negotiating gates and even styles at one point.

On the way home, we took on the roads again and risked the traffic. Summing up our day, we agreed that it had been a beautiful day and we were fitter than when we started and we were still alive. But was it enjoyable? Nowhere near as enjoyable as it should have been. Having been overtaken by two electric cyclists, even older than us, shooting up Steventon Hill, we are seriously considering the latest electric adaptations to normal bikes — less than half the price of new electric bikes. We wonder if by going a little faster on shared roads might actually make us safer.

A recent VWHDC publication caught my eye recently.

"The councils intend to encourage sustainable active transport methods like walking and cycling, and to make maximum use of green spaces and the districts' waterways as it's widely recognised that spending time in the natural environment is beneficial for mental health and wellbeing."

Meanwhile, OCC is heavily involved in a "Vision Zero Summit" on road and cycling safety. Bring it on.





### £3.6 million awarded to help local business.

Using the government's Covid-19 Additional Relief Fund (CARF), to help organisations that were unable to receive previous government Covid-19 grants despite having been badly affected by the pandemic, we managed to reduce the business rates of 1,089 local businesses, saving them a total of £3,630,660. Given the Cost of Living crisis and how it's hitting local businesses, every little helps, and this is arguably more than a little.

### Flu and Covid vaccinations

It's looking like a bad flu season, and whilst covid has become endemic rather than epidemic, it's still unpleasant for many and even with immunity (which does wane) can be dangerous for the vulnerable. The vulnerable are those who have been invited for boosters. I'm eligible from February (I turn 50 then), so I can't get mine until then, but I can get my flu shot before then.

We're encouraging anyone who is eligible for the flu and Covid-19 vaccinations to book theirs as soon as possible to help boost their immunity ahead of the winter.

## Water Supply Summit on 30th November

To look at the WRSE management plans and anticipated arguments for Thames Water's commercial mega-reservoir, the County Council is holding their long-awaited Water Supply Summit. I've been invited and will report back on it. Meanwhile, Water Resources South East (aka the commercial water companies of South East England and London) have published their latest plan for consultation: <a href="https://wrse.uk.engagementhq.com/our-draft-best-value-regional-plan">https://wrse.uk.engagementhq.com/our-draft-best-value-regional-plan</a>

Thames Water are doing exactly what they did in the 2019 attempt and saying "Okay, we'll have a one hundred megaton reservoir, look, we're compromising." It's still unnecessary, mega-expensive (seriously, haven't they noticed there's a financial crisis going on?), environmentally damaging, and they're still using it to delay an actual solution to bring in new water: the Severn Thames Transfer (which they'll consider working on in the 2050s. Probably).

I've since done some analysis on their strange population projections and realised where they got them from: they're glossing over the ONS latest estimates in favour of older, higher ones. As the up-to-date figures mean that their commercial reservoir is completely unnecessary, that feels really dodgy to me.

## Solar farm public consultation

A developer has launched a public consultation for proposals for a large solar farm in the Vale, West Oxfordshire and Cherwell.

The developer proposing the Botley West Solar Farm advise that it is large enough to be considered a 'Nationally Significant Infrastructure Project', which means it will be determined by a government appointed Planning Inspector (rather than our Planning department).

We'll be responding to the consultation and local residents and parish councils should do the same.

Personally, given:

- 1 The need for energy independence and renewable energy:
- 2 The fact that farmers aren't stupid and would put their least productive land to this (and you can still graze sheep and/or grow some crops around these)
- 3 That it's rather hard to build housing developments on land under solar farms

I'm feeling favourably inclined myself. I'll be looking in further depth as more info is available.

My work experience campaign has been a great success and I'm very grateful to all of the employers who offered placements to local young people this year. I visited a number of the young people participating while they were on their placements and

they had all enjoyed their time. They found the workplaces friendly and felt they had learned new things. The whole point of this campaign was that work experience placements had dried up as a result of Covid and lots of people working from home – but they remain a vital way for young people to learn the skills the workplace needs.

It was standing room only in Westminster for the first meeting of the Community Energy All Party Parliamentary Group, which I chair and which is sponsored by Power for People. As readers know, I am the lead sponsor of the Local Electricity Bill, which is designed to remove the barriers to local generators of renewable energy selling that energy to local people.

The bill now has support from 311 MPs, within touching distance of half of the House of Commons. There was a great atmosphere in the room with people having come from as far as Scotland to attend! The bill has changed significantly as a result of conversations between the campaign team and civil servants and we remain hopeful of seeing it incorporated into other legislation.

Another issue I have campaigned on is anti-social behaviour. In my first couple of years, most of the complaints I received were about anti-social behaviour from unauthorised traveller camps. This is something I raised in the House of Commons as it was frequently accompanied by local people being subjected to abuse, theft and damage to their properties.

In the past few months, I have received increasing complaints about broader anti-social behaviour and crime, including drug dealing and business burglaries. I have made visits to businesses that have been burgled – sometimes repeatedly – and I held a crime summit in Wantage for local people to raise the experiences they've been having directly with Thames Valley Police. See my Facebook page (<a href="https://www.facebook.com/davidjohnston4wantage">www.facebook.com/davidjohnston4wantage</a>) for updates about the outcomes of this.

We also saw Back British Farming Day this month. I am a regular visitor to the constituency's first-rate farms – and a regular consumer of their meat and dairy products! – and I see first-hand how hard our farmers work. We should do all we can to support them, not least by buying local wherever possible.

I've continued my visits to every kind of organisation we have in the constituency – including sports clubs. I am a big sports fan and have recently been to both Grove Rugby Club and Wantage Town FC games. We have lots of sports clubs in the constituency. They are almost all run by volunteers and act as a great resource for the community – do visit the ones near you when you can.




