Drayton Wives (Lisa Lammiman)

Our January meeting was on **Inspector Morse**. Our speaker was **Alastair Lack**, who had been a student at Oxford and had worked for the BBC World Service for 30 years. He now gives guided Morse walks around Oxford as well as giving talks.

Morse's popularity over the years showed in the number of members that came to hear Mr Lack.

Inspector Morse, or Morse as he was known, had the christian name of Endeavour which was never known until later in the series. That name Endeavour was given to him as his mother was a Quaker and his father was a fan of Captain Cook (whose ship was called Endeavour!). [ED:- Not a lot of people know that!]

Morse was a batchelor who liked a drink and did crossword puzzles, his sidekick Lewis was the complete opposite, so very much chalk and cheese.

Colin Dexter the author was a Cambridge man and then became a teacher. He often made cameo appearances in the programmes.

His first novel was the Last Bus to Woodstock but he thought it was poorly written and tried to do better, which he clearly did!!

He tried to mix fact and fiction whenever he could by portraying Morse as some of the characters he had met over the years!

John Thaw always walked with a limp because of an accident in his youth, he'd gained public fame as DI Regan in the 70s police series 'The Sweeney', then was Colin Dexter's only choice for the far more cultured and thoughtful Morse.

In 1987 the first episode was shown and 13 million people watched it. The Twilight of the Gods episode pulled in 19 million people such was the popularity of Morse. The Remorseful Day was the last episode where Morse had a heart attack and died.

The famous red Jaguar was sold for £20,000, and the money given to charity, but it was actually not in very good condition!

Although we think of the series being mainly shot in Oxford, it was actually shot in and around Herts and Middlesex, much nearer the studios for editing.

A few pubs were always used in Oxford, such as the Bear or the White Horse, because these pub scenes were used to discuss the plot and help the viewers catch up.

It was an excellent talk and if anyone wants futher information I am sure Mr Lack's Oxford talks would be very interesting!!

If there are <u>any ladies who would like to join us we</u> are a very friendly group.

From the DAMASCUS Ministry Team

Dear Friends:- "The world, the country is in a mess due to the failure of....."

Failure! We all experience it in some way or another; every day each one of us will fail in myriad small and large ways. Closely associated with failure comes blame; failure is hard to confront whilst blame is so easy to embrace. Failure is an intricate part of being human, therefore the question facing us is not "Will there be failure?" but "When there is failure, what will we do about it?". Failure can occasionally be devasting in its consequence while often the effect is small. So, the challenge for us all is "How do we make the kinds of mistakes that are safe, contained, learning about what went wrong in order to avoid making them again?".

Traditionally the Church uses the season of Lent for serious and sober thinking – this year the Archbishop of Canterbury's Lent book is entitled Failure, and written by Bishop Emma Ineson, will be the theme for our parish services and study groups. The bible is full of accounts of **serious leadership failure** including Joseph, Moses, David, Jonah. Was Jesus successful in leading his team of 12? Immediately after the resurrection the disciples were confused, scared and ineffective. **We learn from biblical historical narratives that the most spectacular disappointments and failures, public or private, are not the end of the story**. The end of the story is written by God, who knows what failure is and is not, and whose gracious love overwhelms our greatest failures. God sets a different scale for measuring success and failure, the Bible records many stories of failure redeemed, forgiven, restored.

The temptation is to use our many failures and disappointments to convince ourselves that we are not worth being loved. The bible narrative on failure says that the opposite is true. Many failures mean we have nothing to brag about but everything to be loved for. As we study some of the biblical narratives of failure, we pray that we will be disturbed when we are too comfortable and comforted when we are too disturbed and in doing so, to take comfort in God's merciful and hope-filled judgement of each and everyone. Vacancies

From the PC part of the DraytonVillage website: There is presently a vacancy for a Part-time Parish Clerk & Responsible Financial Officer (see https://www.draytonvillage.co.uk), this due to Lorraine Watling's departure before Xmas.

There are currently **four vacancies** for Councillors on Drayton Parish Council. This unpaid position involves working for the local community as part of a team of 11 Councillors. The Council's usual meetings are the 2nd Tuesday, as above.

The Council's work is varied and interesting, it's organised into topic areas ie:- Finance and Personnel, Neighbourhood Development Plan implementation, Planning, Rights of Way, Transport, etc. Councillors often undertake work on their topic, and may attend meetings between the regular monthly ones.

Any resident over the age of 18 can apply to join the council, as can non-residents with substantial links to the parish. The elections team at the Vale of White Horse District Council or the 'temp, acting' Parish Clerk (**Dianne Rickaby**) can provide further information about eligibility.

If you can help deliver the work of the Council, and would like to be considered for this position, please email an expression of interest to:- clerk@draytonpc.org Your email should include a few lines about yourself, describing your links to the Parish, your skills and interests, and how you feel you can contribute to the Parish Council's work within the community. You may also be asked to address the Council at the meeting when your application for co-option is considered.

Soooo, if you'd like to serve the village, and help with important decisions, then this is **your chance**?!

To contact any members of the Parish Council, all enquiries should be directed to the (temp) **Parish Clerk**, as above, and messages will be passed on. Any Drayton resident may also ask to be added to the Clerk's E-mailing list, so that they receive prior notice of meetings and any relevant documents.

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Eastway Bridleway

The Parish Council has secured S106 funding to **refurbish the stretch of bridleway** from the Steventon Road end of Eastway (BW1) for approximately 400 metres to where the concrete track commences. The work should commence on Feb 27th and is scheduled to complete by **Friday March 3rd**.

The work will entail cutting back the hedge, levelling the surface and then laying **a new 'hoggin' path**. This will ensure the bridleway does not become unpassable in wet weather and has a nice smooth, level surface which will last many years, rather than the undulations that tend to pool water at present.

The bridleway is not being closed whilst the work is done, we would ask residents to find an alternative route, if possible, or if that's inconvenient, PLEASE take extra care!

Bracket Fungus

Seen on a local small tree. There are many varieties of the fungus, and lots of types of tree may be affected.

They're all part of what is called the "normal woodland eco-system", and fungi generally are "crucial to the breakdown of dead wood", but some as here will develop on living trees. And DO NOT try to eat one (foraging is a 'thing' nowadays!) unless it's been identified by a pro!



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Fly Tipping - WARNING!!

You have a legal responsibility, or Duty of Care, to make sure that all waste from your household or business is disposed of correctly.

You could face prosecution and a fine of up to £5,000 if your waste ends up fly-tipped.

Always check your waste is being disposed of by a registered waste carrier, otherwise you risk your waste being fly tipped. Anyone employed to remove waste from your home or business must have an 'Upper Tier waste' licence that will start with CBDU.

You can (and should!) check the register of waste carriers on the Environment Agency website:-

https://environment.data.gov.uk/publicregister/view/search-waste-carriers-brokers

PLUS:- Record the Reg Number of any vehicle used for your rubbish - AND - ask for a proper Invoice & Receipt!

Voting – Photo ID required from MAY onwards!

I'm going to be kicking off each article between now and the local elections in May (4th) with this:- the Govt have decided to change the way we vote from now on. In all future elections where you vote in person, you will require photo ID.

<u>PLEASE NOTE</u>:- Your <u>POLLING CARD will NOT meet</u> the Govt's requirements!

<u>You must bring</u> one of the following documents to the polling station to be allowed to vote, and it must be the original version and not a photocopy (however, as long as it still looks like you, it does not need to be in date):

Passport

Driving licence (including provisional driving licence)

Blue Badge

Older Person's Bus Pass . . . or . . . Disabled Person's Bus Pass

PASS card (proof of age card issued by Proof of Age Standards Scheme)

MOD Identity Card

Biometric immigration document

National ID card issued by an EEA state

None of those? You can apply for a <u>free</u> Voter Authority Certificate at voter-authority-certificate.service.gov.uk.

The <u>deadline to apply</u> for a <u>Voter Authority Certificate</u> for the local elections in England (May 4th) is 5pm on **Tues April 25th**.

There are no changes to postal voting.

In addition, make sure you <u>are</u> registered to vote! You can check by contacting Electoral Services on 01235 422528 or by email to elections@southandvale.gov.uk If not registered, you can register on https://www.gov.uk/register-to-vote (or Electoral Services can help on the number above).



Homes for Ukraine

There has been a Government support package that has enabled Councils to provide payment of £550 to all hosts for the winter period. This support ends with the March payment; those hosting beyond the 12 month period are supposed to then receive £500 per month with all others receiving £350 in line with the government package.

We committed to reviewing what this means for the scheme in Oxfordshire and, from April 2023 until the end of March 2024, all hosts will now receive a monthly payment of £550 regardless of when the 12 month period is due.

These payments will continue until March 2024, or until hosts have completed a 24 month period, whichever comes sooner. The increase will not be subject to tax and will not affect entitlement to any benefits.



Joint Local Plan

Last month, I mentioned the Joint Local Plan timetable (where we're updating and replacing the one we inherited) and the website where specifics are held. This was

There has already been a good response with people engaging on it and giving their say. Please take a look and have your say if you haven't done so already.

It may seem boring and arcane, but it is a key element of the whole planning process, and one of the few areas where we can put our input into the legislative process. **Councils have very little discretion on planning applications** when those are made; the legal aspects and legislation dictate most of what is done (and if we don't follow them closely, developers can and will appeal any rejected decision and conditions that they don't like, and the Government Inspector will uphold their appeal).

The Local Plan isn't complete power (precedent and national policy can override it), and we are limited in what we can put into it – but it's our main way of having some control of the process.

Thames Water Plan Consultation

Public consultation is still open for the Thames Water draft Water Resources Management Plan:- https://thames-wrmp.co.uk/. Consultation is open until March 21st.

GARD (here: **https://www.abingdonreservoir.org.uk/**) will be providing guidance once more, but virtually everything that was valid as an objection before is valid still.

An **old and excessive model for population growth** is still used, instead of the latest ONS projections

Inter-region water transfers are still not targeted until later, despite the National Infrastructure Commission putting a national water network as their top-line recommendation (they concluded that inter-region water transfers were the only options with positive cost-benefit cases in all circumstances and enhanced resilience all round, and have been historically lacking).

The plan is still **non-adaptive** – tying us in to the multi-decade multi-billion-pound and environmentally damaging megaproject of the huge and unneeded reservoir (which, if they actually believed their population projection figures, would leave us exposed to drought for a generation and more in order to avoid making it redundant by the faster, better, and cheaper solution of water transfers and fixing leaks).

They claim (without any evidence) that building and operating the megareservoir (with huge amounts of earth movement required) would somehow cause less carbon emissions than the pipeline of the Severn-Thames Transfer (which would use an ever-more-decarbonised electrical grid for power...)

A Window Into Drayton's Charities

"This Indenture made the twenty eighth day of December in the fifty ninth year of the reign of our Sovereign Lord George the third by the Grace of God of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland King defender of the faith And in the year of Our Lord One thousand eight hundred and eighteen Between William Hayward of the Parish of Drayton in the County of Berks Gentleman of the one part and William Caudwell of Drayton aforesaid yeoman James Hyde of Drayton yeoman deceased and William Hyde of aforesaid yeoman of the other part ..."

These are the opening words in a **leather-bound volume** of some 150 handwritten pages which record the development of three Drayton charities between 1818 and 1993. Among the names it lists, either as trustees or beneficiaries, **are many that current residents of Drayton will recognise**; indeed, some of them are their forebears.


This indenture is a legal document relating to a bequest by **William Hayward** of some £150 to supplement an earlier trust which held funds for distribution to Drayton's poor, becoming known as the Charity of **William Hayward**. It records that on Candlemas Day 1819, £5 was distributed to the poor (Ed:- £347 today!) by **James Hyde and William Lyford**, church wardens and this continues every year, and in increasing amounts until 1839, when cash was replaced by clothing.

At some point the distribution reverts to cash because in 1887 it states, 'Distributed sums of from 1/- to 5/- money to 56 poor families in Drayton'. Two years later, church wardens **Charles Caudwell** and **Charles Lyford** distribute a total of £9 2s. to a total of 86 named individuals. Fortunately, the number of Drayton's 'poor' dwindled throughout the 20th century; it was down to just 10 in 1974 and, by 1987, the charity was having to publish a notice in the Drayton Chronicle inviting applications.

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Robert Cornevile was first indentured in 1681 'for the repair and maintenance of highways in Drayton and for such other charitable uses in Drayton as the trustees select'. However, the Victoria County History establishes that it was set up by Robert Cornevile in 1450, but little is known about Robert Cornevile

(various spellings) himself. The National Archives show that it was endowed with two cottages with five acres of land. In 1855 the charity's income was appropriated for building the school in High Street and, later, the cottages were adapted to form a residence for the schoolmaster.

Management of the charity seems to have been quite a headache for its trustees. In 1923 it is recorded that 'something must be done about the school house cesspool'. Four years later they were **obliged to give the school manager one month's notice**, but he ignored it.

The Berkshire Record Office shows that in 1903 the Cornevile and Poor's Houses charities were combined. The Poor's Houses were built in 1806 using funds remaining from a national appeal following the **fire** that swept down **Drayton's High Street in 1780**. They consisted of five tenements for 'poor widows and aged persons' and the first tenants were some of those who had been burnt out of their homes. The Poor's Houses themselves have a fascinating history which, hopefully, will be told in a future article. They were replaced by the Almshouses in 1980.

In 1977 these three charities, together with one or two smaller ones, were brought together as Drayton Parochial Charities and <u>I am grateful to the current trustees</u> for enabling me to write these notes.

Opinion Polls

It is all too easy to become excited/depressed/ anxious (take your pick) over the state of the

nation's local and national politics. It almost seems that there is a competition going on between polling organisations to grab the headlines over who can be most dramatic. **But is this the best way to test public opinion**? And more importantly, how far do these polls actually influence public opinion? There are many examples of the polls turning out to be very wrong. Do they merely solidify passing trends or do they stimulate resentment in an electorate that does not like being told how it is going to behave?

I am not clear what purpose they serve except to give the chattering political classes something to chew on. At best, polls are a vague guide as to how public opinion might be shifting and at worst, a hindrance to independent thinking.


With some important local elections in May, many media outlets are beginning to obsess on what national polls are saying. I very much hope that people will make up their own minds and, as far as possible, ignore the polls.

Budgets

After many weeks of discussion and consultation, the process of forming a Council's budget culminates in a formal Councillor Budget debate. Yesterday's near 6 hour meeting at which an alternative budget produced by the opposition had to be considered first, culminated as expected in a comfortable majority passing the ruling administration's budget. The whole exercise is called "a debate" but the outcome is almost always predetermined. It can be very frustrating for Opposition councillors as it is far too late for any of their ideas to be built into what will be passed on budget day. But having served as an opposition councillor for so many years, I have some sympathy for them.

That said, I am very pleased with the outcome this year. OCC's finances are looking remarkably secure given the amount of financial uncertainty around. In summary, more money is going into:- Adult and Child social care, Highway maintenance, tackling climate change, and protecting the most vulnerable from the worst of the cost of living crisis; as a package it seems to offer something for almost everyone with one proviso, that the increase in council tax of 4.99% (although in line with more than 70% of all other councils) is a tough ask of those in the 'next most vulnerable' category. It was a choice between the pain of a Council Tax increase over the pain that would result from cutting frontline services. Politics is about making choices - often difficult ones.

There are plenty of other risks around the corner however. Not least the impact of inflation on all areas of the budget together with the announcement from government that we need to prepare for further cuts in central government finance in 2025-6.



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Other challenges

In the next financial year, a number of issues affecting us all will have been resolved or irrevocably decided:-

The Thames Water Reservoir

The HIF 1 Road

The development of thousands more houses at Culham, Didcot and Kingston Bagpuize.

More clarity on the number of houses we need to build elsewhere.

The potential development of Abingdon airfield.

And those are just the major issues. At the same time there are a number of other Highway and traffic issues that have been outstanding for far too long.

Here's hoping the next financial year will be a little less pressured.

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WESTMINSTER VIEW



Our MP (Wantage/Didcot) is David Johnston (OBE, awarded for services to Social Mobility and Education).

I'm delighted to have secured a **breakthrough for the local AEAT Pensioners** after 10 years of dogged campaigning by them. The National

Audit Office – which has investigated high-profile cases such as Equitable Life and British Steel – has agreed to my request to look at the AEAT case and will produce a report setting out their views in the coming weeks. Parliament's powerful **Public Accounts Committee** will also hold an inquiry and are calling for **evidence for this until March 5th**:

A highlight in the last month was, of course, **President Zelensky** addressing Parliament. He gave a very powerful speech, conveying the bravery of the Ukrainian people and his **thanks to the UK for our support** during the past year.

For anyone born in the UK after the world wars, as I was, it is impossible to truly understand what his countrymen and women are going through at this time, subject to a relentless bombardment by Russian tanks and planes every day that takes the lives of their family members and causes untold destruction. The President's speech made us all feel proud of the UK's support. We were the first European country to start sending lethal aid to Ukraine and are the second largest donor of military aid in the world after the USA – a total of £2.3 billion since the outbreak of war.

In addition to all the military equipment supplied – and a major new package of air defence to help protect civilians and critical national infrastructure from Russian strikes – we've provided a £220million package of humanitarian assistance package and issued some 218,000 visas to Ukrainians.

Oxfordshire has of course been at the forefront of hosting Ukrainian refugees, many of whom I have had the privilege to meet. **Our support is very important** – and must continue.

I was very pleased this constituency was the place Michelle Donelan, the new Secretary of State for Science, Innovation and Technology, chose to make her first visit – to the **Rosalind Franklin Institute at Harwell**, to which the Govt has just committed a further £40 million. The Department will be key for this constituency and its creation has happened just before I hold the first meeting of my **Science and Technology forum** for businesses at Harwell, Milton Park, etc, with George Freeman, Minister for Science, Research, and Innovation, as the **guest speaker**. The forum is 'virtual', **March 9th**, 9.45 to 11am, featuring a talk plus Q&A session.

The other event coming up in the near future from me will be an **Apprenticeships Fair** for local young people and employers. While there has been a welcome growth in apprenticeships with the Government's Apprenticeship Levy, many employers struggle to fill their apprenticeships while, nationally, the highest-level ones disproportionately go to young people from higher income families.

And, sadly, we lost actor **Richard Griffiths**, and would soon lose **Margaret Thatcher**.


