

ST PETER'S LETTER

From the Ministry Team...

"Is it nothing to you?"(Lamentations 1:12)

In last month's issue, Reverend Phil Sutton wrote about using the theme of "failure" in our parish services and study groups, during the season of Lent. Reflecting on, thinking or talking about personal failure, is perhaps more difficult for us to do than talking about and remembering our successes. We would rather have the positives than the negatives in our daily lives. Yet everyday news broadcasts are of what is going wrong in the world, and the good news story, if there is one, is left to the final item. We hear so much of the negatives, of suffering, fear and poverty, of failures which are the minus sign of living.

So often the question comes, why believe and trust in God, and Jesus too, if He seems to do nothing at all? Jesus shows us God getting involved, getting his hands dirty. Jesus is crucified and has his hands nailed to that crossbeam of the cross...the minus sign.

The events which we now know as Easter, and everything thereafter, is of the positives, the good news. The story of Easter does not end with the crucifixion on Good Friday, because of the third day; then came the resurrection. On that first day of the new week, came a new start, a new creation. That is the heart of the good news. The negative of the crossbeam to the positive of resurrection: the sign of the cross.

"The end of the story is written by God, who knows what failure is and is not, and whose gracious love overwhelms our greatest failures....so take comfort in God's merciful and hope-filled judgement of each and everyone" (attributed Justin Welby)

DISTRICT COUNCIL REPORT



Dear all,

Voting – Photo ID required from May onwards! YOU WILL NOT BE ABLE TO VOTE WITHOUT PHOTO ID.

As promised, I'm kicking off each article until the elections with this.

The Government have decided that your Polling Card is NOT sufficient. Whilst there have been no issues with stolen votes through this method in Great Britain to date, they say their reason is to make it look even safer.

You must bring one of the following documents to the polling station to be allowed to vote, and it must be the <u>original version</u> and not a photocopy (however, as long as it still looks like you, <u>it</u> <u>does not need to be in date</u>):

- Passport
- Driving licence (including provisional driving licence)
- Blue Badge
- Older Person's Bus Pass
- Disabled Person's Bus Pass
- PASS card (proof of age card issued by Proof of Age Standards Scheme)
 - MOD Identity Card
 - Biometric immigration document
 - National ID card issued by an EEA state

If you do not have any of the above, you can apply for a free Voter Authority Certificate at voter-authoritycertificate.service.gov.uk or visit

https://www.electoralcommission.org.uk/voterID

The deadline to apply for a Voter Authority Certificate for the local elections in England on 4 May 2023 is **5pm on Tuesday 25 April**.

There are no changes to postal voting.

In addition, make sure you are registered to vote **BY MIDNIGHT ON 17**th **APRIL**. You can check by contacting Electoral Services on 01235 422528 or at <u>elections@southandvale.gov.uk</u>

If you are not registered, you can register on https://www.gov.uk/register-to-vote (or Electoral Services can help on the number above).

If you can't make it to the polling station on 4 May – you can apply to vote by post – the deadline for postal vote applications is 5pm on 18 April, or you can apply to allow someone else to vote on your behalf, this is known as a proxy vote. The deadline to apply for a proxy vote is 5pm on 25 April. To find out how to apply for a postal or proxy vote, visit whitehorsedc.gov.uk/localelections2023

Please don't lose your vote!

Planning

One of the key factors in whether or not the Planning Inspector will overrule our decisions is whether we have a "Five Year Land Supply." If we fall short of that, inspectors will typically overrule rejections (and have done so), regardless of the Local Plan and Neighbourhood Plans.

We have recently argued that our projected housing need should decrease from 1028 new houses per year over the Vale to 819 per year. This bolsters our five year land supply. Recently a developer challenged a refusal of planning permission on appeal saying our new method was wrong and we were right at the edge of a five year land supply. The Planning Inspector considered the case — and agreed with us, rejecting the appeal and saying we actually have close to a <u>6.3 year</u> land supply. This very much strengthens the NDP and Local Plan.

This is helped by the fact that over the past decade, we have been in the top three Local Authorities in England for rate of housing building (out of 310 Local Authorities). If the rest of the country had built at the rate of the Vale, there would be nearly three million more homes nationwide and no housing crisis. I think we can decrease our target by a little and still be doing our bit – and the Inspector has agreed with us.

Budget

This might come across as a bit boring, but it was a real concern back when I ran for election four years ago – the Council as it stood then was on track to break the financial limits, as had Northamptonshire County Council (which had just became the first council for a long time to effectively go bust).

Since then, we've not exactly had plain sailing – the covid crisis acted like a wrecking ball in the plans of a lot of councils, and the Cost of Living Crisis merely made it worse. Over the past few years, Slough, Northumberland, Pembrokeshire, and Copeland all went into Section 114. Thurrock went down just recently. Croydon just went down for the third time. Parliament had to approve an increase of 15% in their council tax.

Which means that our Budget showing us to be fully and with a considerably better forecast than we had four years ago is a massive win.

Thames Water Plan Consultation

This has just closed as I write. All the issues remain valid:

- Wrong (and excessive) population figures used in contravention of the most recent ONS figures.
- Inter-region water transfers should be done FIRST, as per the National Infrastructure Commission recommendation.
- The plan is far too inflexible, aiming to lock in an unnecessary, damaging, hugely expensive

- environmentally damaging reservoir the size of sixteen Farmoors.
- It wouldn't provide a drop of water for at least a generation (assuming that unlike all other megaprojects, it DOES come in on time), unlike the Severn-Thames-Transfer option, which provides double the water, coming from the water-rich parts of the country into the water-stressed part, and can do so in a few years.

The Vale has responded strongly, pressing Thames Water on all of the above and pressing them to fix leakage as well (simply meeting the Government targets would slash the demand). It may be necessary to pressure the regulator, who has mandated these known inaccurate and excessive population figures.

COUNTY COUNCIL REPORT



Elections

This month's contribution is as non party political as I can make it. It confines itself to the elections process.

Spare a thought for the Councils, Council officers and residents who have some elections every year. West Oxfordshire elect one quarter of their councillors every year. In Cherwell, it is one third. Thankfully in SODC and VWHDC, it is an election every 4 years. County Elections, every 4 years, happen in between. It's a complicated system and can often seem to be an irritant to busy, working people. Add national elections which can happen anytime and it is not much wonder that many residents, already confused about what different councils actually do, are further confused over which elections are about to happen and who is standing for what. It does make one wonder if those countries that have all elections on the same day in a fixed cycle might have it right. In these countries, the fixed day is often made a public holiday with the result that turnout is higher. Democracy is said to come at a cost, but the system of a fixed day for all elections is certainly more cost effective and raises the status of elections in most people's minds.

Election "purdah"

For six weeks leading up to Election Day, there is a period of purdah. In this period, Councils are run by officers rather than elected politicians. This ensures that only non party political decisions and announcements can be made during purdah. Political leafleting can still go ahead (and does) in which each party makes its offer to the electorate and tries to explain why its opponents are wrong. There are rules about what can and cannot be said in leaflets and political organisers are adept at getting around them. However, the local District Office has powers to take action against those parties that transgress.

So please vote

If democracy is going to vote, it is vitally important that people vote. If you feel that all politicians are born of satan, try ordering them in the order in which you hate them and vote for the one(s) at the bottom of your list. If the country is to be governed by those who most people want to govern them, please vote so there is some hope for the process.

Gentle reminder on new rules for voting at a polling station. Remember to bring your photo ID with you as you will need to show this to the polling station staff before you vote. You do not need to bring your poll card with you to cast your ballot, however it may speed things up if you do. There is no dress code when visiting the polling station and it is OK to wear garments that might obscure your face: for instance, hoodies or the niqab, but please bear in mind that you will need to remove any face coverings so that staff can verify your identity as part of the requirements for Voter ID, however.

LETTER FROM WESTMINSTER



Dear all

Whether you live in Wantage, Didcot, Wallingford, Faringdon or any of the 64 villages I represent, my constituency-wide survey on local health services is currently open. It's just 8 questions long and should only take about 5 minutes – no more than 10 – and you can complete it until 17th April on my website: https://www.david-johnston.org.uk/health.

Increasing our health services relative to the population growth we've had is one of the things I have campaigned on most since being elected 3 years ago — particularly the need for more GP surgeries. I've spoken about this in 19 debates in parliament and had numerous meetings with the local councils, local health leaders, ministers and local people about it. The more people who complete it, the stronger the message we can send.

I held a successful inaugural meeting of my Science and Technology Forum for the companies we have at Harwell, Milton Park and elsewhere which George Freeman, the Minister at the new Science Department, spoke at. He and I are very keen to promote what is going on here more as it is of both national and international significance – and we discussed some good ideas to do so. Watch this space!

I'll be holding an Apprenticeship Fair for local young people and employers across the constituency at Didcot Civic Hall on 24th April. I visit at least 1 school and at least 1 employer almost every week (and have been to 600 odd organisations overall since being elected) and I hear regularly that young people don't know the apprenticeships open to them and that employers struggle to recruit enough apprentices. I'm hopeful this fair will help.

My campaigning on behalf of the local AEAT Pensioners has been bearing fruit: the National Audit Office has published its report on the case following my request and Parliament's Public Accounts Committee recently held a hearing on it, with their own report to come.

A few highlights from many visits in the last month. It was good to be interviewed on Wallingford Radio which has been going great guns since it got its FM license. You can listen live on 107.3FM. I had a great visit to the new wedding dress shop in Wantage, About You Bridal, set up by Sharon to make the process of buying dresses, shoes and accessories as stress-free as possible. It's also home to Gallery Cakes, set up by Nicki, so that you can order your wedding cake too!

It was very good to see The Place in the Corn Exchange in Faringdon, having seen the space when it was just an idea, which supports parents and their children under 5. I also met Keith and Sue to talk about the Faringdon Day Centre and will be back to visit that soon. And I'm pleased to say Michael Gove was very impressed with the Greencore Construction houses I took him to see in Southmoor.



This month we had an excellent talk on fraud by Dominic and Jane from HSBC bank.

They started by describing the most well-known scams.

Smishing which is text fraud

Vishing which is telehone fraud. All those annoying phone calls from insurance companies asking you about a car crash!!

Phishing which is by email. Never click on any links

A bank will never ask you for your pin number, access to your bank details or online passwords and NEVER ask you to transfer money for safekeeping to another account. This could also be used by money laundering criminals!!!

You have the power to keep everything safe by not clicking on links replying to an email or just hang that phone up!!!

There is also something which is called Account takeover fraud when a criminal uses fraudulently obtained stolen personal information to take over an account.

So, don't complete online quizzes which includes giving out personal details. Ensure media profiles are set to personal. And always check bank and credits card statements for strange entries.

The most common one lately is saying that you have a parcel to be delivered when, actually, you have never ordered anything. It's a scam to get you to give them your details.

Another text scam is to say that you son or daughter has lost their money and could you send them some. DO NOT until you have made sure it is them.

Another major one is for anyone that does on-line dating. Lots of people that are on these sites are not real and are only after your money.

Always check sites are safe by looking for the padlock at the top of the web page.

So, after the excellent talk it is a bit worrying about what goes on with fraudsters. If you are not sure always check with the bank and never do anything in a rush - always take 5 minutes to have a think.

And remember the old saying: <u>If it looks too good to be true, it probably is too good to be true!!!!</u>

GARD is a local community group formed to campaign against Thames Water's proposals to build a reservoir south-west of Abingdon.

GARD UPDATE

GARD's Annual General Meeting will take place on Tuesday 2nd May at 7.30pm in the Millenium Room, Steventon Village Hall.

Thank you to everyone who made a response to the Water Resources SouthEast (WRSE) consultation and to Thames Water's draft Water Resource management Plan (dWRMP). We have been copied into at least 150 WRSE responses, with many more known to have been sent, an encouraging number. At time of going to press, the Thames Water responses are still being written, and many have been copied to GARD.

Where are we now with the proposals and responses?

This stage of the Reservoir proposal features a 'triple bill'. As well as the closed Water Resources South-East and Thames Water dWRMP consultations (the latter closed 20th March), there is the RAPID Gate 2 process on the individual Strategic Sources.

RAPID (Regulator Alliance for the Progressing of Infrastructure Development) will produce a draft decision on the Strategic Sources (eg Abingdon Reservoir and Severn Thames Transfer) on 30th March. Stakeholders (ie GARD, OCC, the Vale, Parish Councils) then have until 11th June to make representations. GARD will be making representations to RAPID, and we'll keep you informed.

The response of the Councils and of MPs has been very encouraging:

Layla Moran, MP for Oxford West and Abingdon, said in her WRSE response: 'Relying on large, expensive and time-consuming infrastructure projects has created a regional plan that is not adaptable to changing future conditions. True drought resilience must include more urgently tackling leakage and improving water efficiency.' Later she also says: 'I do not believe that consumers should be bearing the cost of constructing new water resources, when water companies are failing to fix their own existing infrastructure, resulting in significant waste of water.'

Councillor Pete Sudbury, Oxfordshire County Council's Cabinet Member for Climate Change and Environment and spokes-person for the Reservoir issue said: "We have consistently opposed this reservoir proposal, which we believe could turn out to be a damaging white elephant that will not be resilient to the kind of multi-year droughts we are seeing in many parts of the world. The South East Strategic Reservoir Option (SESRO) will have significant and potentially unacceptable environmental effects.

The WRSE regional plan should bring forward the Severn Thames Transfer (STT) earlier than indicated in this draft plan. ... Given the concerns, the SESRO **should be removed** from the WRSE regional plan and the company plans, and not pursued as a strategic resource option."

The Vale of White Horse District Council said, in a media release on 6thMarch, that water companies should forget the reservoir and focus on fixing leaks. They added that SESRO should be removed from the plan and is urging water companies and regulators to instead carry out further research into other water resources and to focus efforts on fixing leaks and improving water efficiency.

Cllr Bethia Thomas, Leader of Vale of White Horse District Council, said: "Building a reservoir would cause permanent and irreversible harm to an enormous area of the Vale countryside and potentially result in a significant increase in carbon emissions. We should be doing all we can to tackle the climate emergency and much more attention must be placed on the climate impact of this proposal."

How not wasting food can help in the Cost of Living Crisis

Tips from www.wrap.org.uk (Waste Resources Action Programme):

- Planning to stay ahead: create a realistic flexible meal plan for the week. Reduce weekday evening stress by cooking ahead at the weekend and freezing.
- Think before you shop: what do you actually need?
 Check cupboards, fridge and freezer. Know what food you already have.
- Stay-in-control shopping: set your budget and take your shopping list
- Storing your food after shopping: most fruit and veg should be kept in the fridge (but not bananas or cut pineapples). Fridge temperature should be below minus 5 degrees.
- Keep an eye on fresh food have an Eat Me First fridge shelf. Check the labels: Use By=food safety, Best Before= food quality
- Eat every edible morsel of food. No need to peel carrots and potatoes, or, if you do, simmer the peelings in water for 20 minutes, strain and freeze as stock

As well as saving us money, 36 million tonnes of greenhouse gas emissions could be prevented by saving food from our bins in UK homes.



Harcourt Arboretum

The Visitor and Learning Centre at Harcourt Arboretum – building a gateway to nature with local communities

Development funding of £191,420 has been awarded by The National Lottery Heritage Fund to help Harcourt Arboretum develop a new Visitor and Learning Centre. The project aims to unlock the site's unique natural heritage, landscape and collection of threatened trees.

LOCAL HISTORY

The 'Poor's Houses'

On 16 April 1780 fire broke out in a house next to the Wheatsheaf and a high wind caused it to sweep down High Street as the flames spread from one thatched roof to the next. To help those rendered homeless a nation-wide appeal was launched, raising the astonishing sum of £3066 (around £521,220 today), of which £344 was used for building the 'Poor's Houses', a terrace of five one-up, one-down dwellings on the site of the present almshouses in High Street. They were completed in 1806 and some of those who had been burned out of their homes were among the first tenants, paying an annual rent of 6/-.

The census records provide fascinating insight into who lived there. Those for 1871, for example, show that one was occupied by Phoebe Stone, a farm labourer, together with her two daughters, Sarah, aged 12 and Elizabeth, aged 8, described as scholars. At the other end of the terrace was Ann Cheer.


The accommodation they provided was probably typical for its time. There was no running water, of course, and lighting would have been by candle; however, each little house was fitted with a cast-iron range which provided both heating and basic cooking facilities. Access to the room upstairs was by way of a steep, narrow staircase in a cupboard. At the end of the terrace was a communal washroom with adjacent cesspool.

The charity that managed the 'Poor's Houses' records that in the 1930s a tender from C.S. Winter & Son was accepted to 'put them in a thorough state of repair' at a cost of £32 10s; the cesspool was renovated and, in 1939, a communal water tap was installed. Electric light was introduced 'only in each living room', extended a few years later to the bedrooms, but it was not until 1954 that they were equipped with a power point. By 1958 the local Sanitary Authority was demanding improvements; an Elsan system was discussed along with the desirability of flushing toilets but, since there was still no sewer in the High Street, the matter was deferred.

Teresa Taylor has lived in the village for most of her life and remembers visiting Lotty Harris, a tenant who was a friend of her mother's. Apart from the range and a basket next to it for logs, she remembers the downstairs room being simply furnished with a small round table, a rocking chair and a dresser, on which Lotty displayed her collection of glass ornaments. There was not much room for anything else — no sink or the other amenities we take for granted. Outside, each dwelling was provided with a narrow strip of garden, parallel to the High Street, in which to grow vegetables.

In 1969 and at the ripe old age of 91, Lotty died. She remained a tenant of the 'Poor's Houses' until the last and was never heard to complain about the conditions under which she lived. Most of the other tenants were there for life, too, but it must have been a struggle as they became increasingly old and infirm. Still, theirs was a generation that had survived two world wars and a depression and had no use for modern conveniences.

In 1964 the Rural District Council declared that the 'Poor's Houses' were unfit for human habitation, but they continued to be occupied for some years yet. Eventually, after 170 years, it was decided to replace them as reported in the accompanying cutting from the Oxford Mail (reproduced with kind permission). After much wrangling over planning permission, finance and with the owners of the adjacent property, the new almshouses were opened on 12 December 1980.
