ST PETER'S LETTER

From the Ministry Team...

As I write this, today is a beautiful summer's day, with a clear blue sky and a fresh breeze. A calm June day after the recent dramatic thunderstorms. At this time of the year many of us will be trying to make the most of the great outdoors, and even taking some time to relax and enjoy the great British weather. We often take time off to do this, even take a holiday, a break, time for a change to the routine of daily life.

Jesus often took time to rest and get away from it all. On one occasion St Matthew (chapter8: 23-27) tells us, that after preaching to large crowds, Jesus, along with his disciples, took a boat to go across the Sea of Galilee. They were going to the opposite shore to find some time and solitude to rest. As they were crossing, a furious storm broke. The worried disciples thought the boat was going to sink, and went to wake up a sleeping Jesus. He wakes up and asks them why they are afraid and then quickly subdues the wind and waves.

This story illustrates Jesus' calming effect. This you can take literally and also as an analogy for our lives. DISTRICT COUNCIL REPORT



Dear all,

Splash pads in Abbey Meadow in Abingdon and Memorial Park in Wantage

Both of the district's splash pads were turned on on Saturday 27 May and will be available to use every day until the start of September. A new fence along the river front was installed at Abbey Meadow last year to help keep young children safely in the park and aim to reduce the problem of geese causing havoc for park users

This year, the kiosk at Abbey Meadow will have a seating area for customers to enjoy their refreshments and make the most of the lovely surroundings.

The outdoor pool in Abbey Meadow will be open for 6 weeks during the school summer holidays.

£100,000 now available for community climate projects in Vale of White Horse

The Climate Action Fund has opened for applications from town and parish councils and local groups who have proposals which aim to tackle climate change. Grants of up to £5000 per application can be made available.

The fund will be open for applications until 14th July.

In the past, earlier versions of the Climate Action Fund have supported projects such as tree planting and solar panel installation, as well as projects such as a sustainable eating course, funded professional ecological advice to create a community woodland and a boardwalk at a nature site to allow visitors access without damaging important habitats. We want to encourage even more groups to come forward with innovative ideas on how to help fight climate change.

Waste and Street Cleaning Survey

The District Council have launched a waste services survey. It should help identify aspects with which people are happy as well as areas which could be improved. It's at southandvale.gov.uk/WasteSurvey and is open until 11.59pm on Monday 10th July 2023.

I've sometimes mentioned my frustration at the way responsibilities are split between County and District Councils (I strongly believe that Unitary Councils that cover all aspects make for a far more straightforward experience for residents, rather than having to work out which Council their issue falls under and where to go for help), and this is a perfect example. The District Council covers collection of the various bins (waste, recycling, food waste, and green bins) and recycling from there, bulky waste collection, and street cleaning services, but **not** the Household Recycling Centres, which are controlled by the County Council. This survey is **only** for areas covered by the District Council.

Reservoir Clay Compaction Trial

One of the issues with the Thames Water proposal of "let's build up a mega-sized reservoir the size of thirty-odd average reservoirs in one place and have it solely dependent on one of the most water-stressed rivers in the country, oh, and not do the far better solution of setting up the long-required water transfer network until after the decades-long megaproject is finished," is the lack of huge swathes of required engineering and project information. Instead, Thames Water have done brochures of marinas (despite the Intrusive Non-Native Species restrictions and possible security restrictions pointing to a prohibition on recreational use) and glossed over environmental and engineering information.

At last, though, and nearly quarter of a century after first putting this mega-reservoir forward, they're proposing doing some of the necessary engineering testing. This will be carried out off the Hanney Road on land they already own, and will involve digging down into the clay floor of the Vale and building up smaller versions of the embankments on an area the size of a football field. They've given advance notice of the planning application they'll be putting in, and will be gathering information on this trial throughout 2024.

This does NOT mean they've got the go-ahead; merely that they're accumulating needed geological, civil engineering, and hydrological information for their application process. The fight against it continues, but at least they're finally looking at getting concrete data to put into the evaluation process.

COUNTY COUNCIL REPORT



Well, that serves me right for taking a holiday. We were very privileged to be taken by family - no, not a political perk - to Hawaii. I have been passionate about volcanoes for many years and this was a great opportunity to see some of the best examples in the world. Most of the dramatic pictures we see of lakes of red hot lava are taken at night and during the few days or weeks of eruptions that occur every few years. Solidified lava is very hard and can take many years to break down. The result is not beautiful but thousands of acres of piled up black rock are mighty impressive. In the months and years between eruptions, steam pours out from the craters but tourists are lucky to see any boiling red lava. We were not lucky but, as we left, a sizeable eruption began. However, whilst we missed the spectacle, it seems that we did bring home some spectacular tropical weather with us. Yesterday's thunder, torrential rain and high winds mixed in with hot sunshine in southern Oxfordshire matched anything in Hawaii.

Meanwhile, local and national politics has been stormier than even the past two years have offered. The Reservoir issue rumbles on. Evermore contentious planning applications are in the pipeline. The HIF1 Road application is due to be heard at a two-day planning meeting in late June. By next month things will have progressed on all these issues.

Other updates include:

Mill Rd Bridge, Marcham – we expect work to begin on this long running issue very shortly.


Noise at Appleford sidings – An application to extend working hours was deferred by the OCC Planning Committee.

Grass cutting – budget cuts over the last decade have reduced the timetable to one cut per year. Visibility at many road junctions is a problem and is being steadily tackled under a priority scheme – major junctions first. We are getting there, but, in the meantime, please take extra care.at junctions.

20mph limits. St Helens is now fully operational, and work has begun on Drayton.

And finally, a little.good news. VWHDC Climate Action Fund and OCC Councillor Priority Fund are offering grants for worthy local causes. More details on the right, or Council's websites or from me.

Climate Action Fund 2023/2024 Info from VWHDC

This fund is now open – closing for applications midday 14 July. Our Climate Action Fund has grants from £250 to £5,000 on offer per project to help tackle climate change, with a total of £100,000 available this year.

Which projects can the fund support?

You don't have to be a climate expert or established group to apply. We're just as keen to hear from communities who are starting their journey to take action to address the climate emergency.

How much is available and what for?

The funding is aimed at projects that help to tackle climate change and increase people's awareness and knowledge of the climate emergency. The work could focus on areas such as the natural environment, energy, waste and consumption, or transport and travel.

Organisations that receive funding will also have the opportunity to network with other grant recipients to share experiences and potentially collaborate on future projects.

Who can apply?

We would like to hear from non-profit community organisations whose primary purpose is to benefit the residents of Vale of White Horse. Town and parish councils may apply themselves, or can collaborate with local unconstituted groups to apply on their behalf.

LETTER FROM WESTMINSTER



Dear all

Thank you to everyone who completed my health services survey. In total, 2,838 people did so, 77% of whom said they had had difficulty getting a GP appointment in the last year (44% said they had had difficulty accessing an appointment with a dentist). Unsurprisingly, 97% of people felt we do not have enough GPs for the number of people we have locally and 98% felt we do not have enough dentists. I completely agree and have been banging the drum on our health services since I was elected. Not long after the survey closed, I secured a debate in parliament about our health services and intend to keep banging heads together until we get the services we need.

I was pleased to take the Children's Minister, Claire Coutinho, to a local nursery recently to meet staff and children. The Government is making the largest single investment in childcare in history, which will give parents 30 free hours of childcare per week from when their child is 9 months old until they start school, which will be very welcome to the parents who raise childcare with me when I knock on their doors. I have launched a childcare survey on my website which is designed to let parents (and grandparents) talk about their experience of accessing childcare and say what they'd like to see. It is open until the 12th July at www.david-johnston.org.uk/childcare

Sticking with education and children for a minute, I was drawn to ask a question at Prime Minister's Questions and used it to highlight the great news that English primary school children have just been ranked the best readers in the Western World – better than all other countries in Europe as well as America and Canada – and the fourth best globally. This is in large part testament to teachers and the Government's focus on phonics, which was resisted by some at the time but is clearing bearing fruit.

Depending on when you read this, you'll either just still have time to attend my 3rd Annual Climate Summit for constituents on Zoom on 4 July or it will have happened and you'll be able to watch a recording of it on my website or Facebook page. I was pleased that Grant Shapps, Secretary of State for Energy Security and Net Zero, agreed to give the keynote speech — and, as ever, local and national experts agreed to take part.

This year, I have been hosting at least one local young person for work experience every month including Anastasiia, who is originally from Ukraine. I first met her with the family she is kindly hosted by in North Moreton. It was good to have her with us in Parliament.

I've enjoyed getting into the swing of the summer events happening across the constituency, including the Hagbourne Church Fete and Uffington Fun Day. 



Drayton Wives

Our meeting this month was a talk by John Orchard on the life of Sir Alan Charles Lawrence Whistler.

Sir Alan Whistler was a renowned poet and glass engraver whose work John was completely in awe of when he saw it in St Nicholas Church Moreton Dorchester.

Sir Alan was born in 1912 in South East London and attended Stowe School from 1923-1930. He then came to Baliol College and did a degree in Arts.

He wrote a book of poems which was illustrated by his brother Rex. Because of this he gained the 1st Kings Gold medal for poetry at the suggestion of the poet John Masefield.

Brother Rex was expelled from the Royal Acadamy and went to the Slade school of Art where he excelled at murals and portraits and mixed with the likes of Noel Coward and Cecil Beaton. Some of the murals now hang in the Tate Modern Restaurant.

Sir Alan and his brother were close but unfortunately Rex died in the war at Caen in 1944 aged 35yrs old going to the aid of his men

Sir Alan then decided he would continue with his engraving and also some poetry. He married his first wife Jill Furze in 1939 and lived near Bideford where they had a child called Simon who also became an engraver.

His greatest work was engraving 12 windows in Moreton church with a 13th one to come later. The windows replaced the old stained-glass ones which were destroyed by a bomb in 1940. At first, they were just plain glass which was not liked by the congregation, so Whistler was commissioned to provide engraved glass replacements. The 13th window was designed with a theme of forgiveness featuring Judas but was at first declined to be put in the church and the in 2014 it was installed on the outside of the church.

The church also has Lawrence of Arabia buried there. A fellow of All Souls College.

There is a Whistler window in the music block at Radley college dedicated to George Butterworth a composer.

One of his other great engravings is in Salisbury cathedral which is called the Rex Prism. He died in Oxford in 2000 and had his funeral at Ewelme church although he is not buried there he is in a tomb in Salisbury cathedral.

It was a very interesting talk and I have seen the windows in Moreton church which is worth a visit if you are in Dorset.

Almost 21 million reports have been made to the Suspicious Email Reporting Service (SERS), resulting in the removal of over 235,000 malicious websites.

SERS was launched by the <u>National Cyber Security</u> <u>Centre</u> (NCSC) and the City of London Police in April 2020 to enable the public to forward suspicious emails to an automated system that scans them for malicious links. Since its launch, almost 21 million reports have been made to the service.

Mobile phone providers also offer a service that allows customers to report suspicious text messages, by forwarding them to the number **7726**. The service is free of charge and enables providers to takedown malicious websites and block malicious texts from being sent across their network.

As of 31 May 2023, **54,000 text message scams have been removed** as a result of suspicious texts forwarded to the 7726 service.

How to protect yourself from scam emails and texts

Received an email or text that seems suspicious? Report it. Your reports enable us to remove the emails and websites criminals use to commit fraud and cyber crime.

- 1: Forward suspicious emails to report@phishing.gov.uk. Send emails to this address that feel suspicious, even if you're not certain they're a scam we can check.
- 2: Forward suspicious text messages to 7726 (it's free of charge). Your provider can find out where the text came from and block or ban the sender.
- **3** If you've lost money or provided personal information as a result of a phishing scam, notify your bank immediately and report it to Action Fraud at www.actionfraud.police.uk or by calling 0300 123 2040. In Scotland, call Police Scotland on 101.

GROUP AGAINST RESERVOIR DEVELOPMENT

GARD is a local community group formed to campaign against Thames Water's proposals to build a reservoir south-west of Abingdon.

GARD UPDATE

<u>Responses</u>: Water Resources SouthEast (WRSE), Thames Water, Affinity Water and Southern Water are all delaying their response to the submitted comments on their schemes from the end of June to the end of August. This means that we cannot know where we stand until early September at the earliest, but there is clearly something significant going on with the South-East companies. If we hear anything we will let Stakeholders and residents know.

Reservoir planning: there is some news about the proposed reservoir: Thames have filed a Planning Application to build a test model dam embankment on Cow Common (halfway along the Steventon-Hanney Road). GARD welcomes the trial build but is puzzled that it is rather small, only three metres high and not very long. Will this be useful?

RAPID: we are expecting RAPID to deliver its Gate 2 decisions at the end of June. We have been requesting a meeting with RAPID to urge on them the importance of early, independent evaluations of the Reservoir safety, flooding Impact and true costs. They have agreed to meet, but we do not yet have a date. It is possible that RAPID will delay its decisions as well, in line with the water companies.

Drastic action appears to have been taken once again on the Green at Edward Park to rid the area of a toxic plant. I would make a few observations. First, the topsoil on the site was presumably earth moved from within the site by the developers, so it follows that the seeds for this weed were already present in the soil, and the weed in question must have been growing there before the developers moved in - so, this weed is not new to the area. Second, there are plenty of toxic plants all over the village already, such as laburnum, oxalis, deadly nightshade and a host of fungi. In a time when we are supposed to be re-wilding, providing insect homes and more, why are we laying to waste what was a large green space? PARISH COUNCIL REPORT



The Parish Council met on 13th June. Here are some of the main issues discussed:

- <u>Walnut Meadows</u>: After many frustrating years it appears progress is finally being made with the sports facilities at Walnut Meadows that were a key part of the Drayton Neighbourhood Development Plan. As most residents are no doubt aware by now, Miller Homes buried unauthorised waste on the site, which in turn raised the level of the site compared to neighbouring houses. They also obliterated the former Barrow or burial mound. It has taken many years, but they have now agreed to remove the buried waste and re-level the site to restore it to something akin to the original level. There is a legal agreement in place between Miller Homes and the District Council that the work must start before the end of July and be completed before the end of October. Following completion of the work, the land will be transferred to the Parish Council. The Parish Council is now required to undertake an archaeological survey.

We have engaged an architect to produce a design for the new pavilion and prepare a planning application for both the pavilion and the MUGA (multi-use games area). As part of the planning process the Parish Council will be required to undertake a further archaeological survey.

We are in the process of updating the Business Plan to ensure the proposal is financially viable whilst investigating grant funding sources.

We will be undertaking consultations with the village to share our plans for the site and update you all on the new facilities.

- In other planning matters, we will be responding to the proposed plans for an 80-house development on the Drayton side of Steventon. We will be opposing the development on the grounds that it would constitute additional development outside of the village on a rural site, which would be contrary to the Vale's planning policies given that the Vale can demonstrate that they have a 5 year land supply for development.
- The <u>Village Caretaker</u> has recently cut back a number of grass verges so that residents can get in and out of sideroads safely! Whilst the Parish Council will do its best to try and ensure safety for the village our resources are limited. The grass verges are the responsibility of Oxfordshire County Council. Please report any issues to FixMyStreet.com .
- -The <u>Eastway footpath</u> improvements are now complete, and the surface seems to be holding up well.
- We now have 7 councillors, leaving <u>4 vacancies</u>. If you are concerned about housing and development, traffic and road safety, footpaths and open spaces, recreation and sport or the proposed reservoir, you could help make a difference by joining the Parish Council. If you are interested, please contact clerk@draytonpc.org or come along to a meeting.
