### From the DAMASCUS Ministry Team

<u>Today, the spiritual disciplining of rest</u> is a challenging one. We are pressured to cram more and more activities into fewer hours. This has been described as 'hurry sickness' and is an enemy of our spiritual life. August is a month for resting, and so is a good time to look at this discipline.

In the Bible story God instituted the discipline of rest in the creation of the world. He created everything in six days and rested on the seventh (Gen 2:3). He instituted the Sabbath, a weekly day of rest (Lev 23:3). However, it is helpful to draw a distinction between busyness and being hurried. Busyness is an outward condition, while hurry is about our inner state, resulting from too many competing priorities. Jesus was often busy but never hurried! What questions should we be asking about getting more rest?

### Balancing Rest and Work:

What is a helpful rhythm of work and rest in our lives? How can we take seriously the Sabbath principle of having one day a week to rest and not work? How might we use our time differently eg taking a long walk or having an unhurried conversation with a friend?

### Using Our Leisure Time Creatively:

When we actually take a break we often end up simply watching TV, surfing the net, shopping unnecessarily or eating when we are not hungry! Can we choose leisure activities that really refresh us? It's not a case of more leisure time, but using the time we have more creatively.

And some further thoughts on the importance of rest and being happy as we enter the 'sabbath' month of August:

"Every morning I open the window for my King's grace, and every evening I sleep upon the pillow of his love and care". (Celtic Saint)

"Come to me, all who labour and are heavy-laden, and I will give you rest". (Jesus, quoted in Matthew 11:28)

"The solution to an over busy life is not more time. It's to slow down and simplify our lives around what really matters." (The Ruthless Elimination of Hurry: John Mark Comer).

"The moments of happiness we enjoy take us by surprise. It is not that we seize them, but that they seize us."

Our recent outing was to **Dudley and the Black Country 'Living' Museum**. The idea started in 1967 to try and recreate the Black Country's heritage which included mining and the use of canals as the sole transportation system.

It's a **living museum** so it has historical characters that you can talk to who will tell you all about stepping back in time along with going into shops, school and even pubs!!! And even being able to have fish and chips cooked in dripping!!!!!

If you are keen you can even head underground for glimpses of life as a miner, or go for a ride on the canal under the bridge where they used to do something called "legging" to get the barge through the tunnels!!

[Ed's note – some readers may have seen 'legging' in travel shows featuring canals, this was where tunnels were so narrow there was no towpath – often horses got used to pull boats along – so the boatmen used to lie down, push their feet against the tunnel walls and lever the boat along.]

There are about 60 buildings so far but on the 8th July they opened up more to include shops from the 1940 – 1960 period, a newsagents shop, a record store and a butcher's shop. There is room for another development to include a gas showroom. Unfortunately I will be able to remember all those old cookers and fires!!!!

But **as an idea for the school holidays** it is an interesting place to visit to see what happened in the past - even though some of us were recognizing the items in the shops!!

### Next PC Meeting

### <u>All residents</u> are welcome to attend.

Now <u>**Tuesday</u>** evenings (2nd of month) so next it's **August 8th**, in the Caudwell Day</u>

Centre (Gravel Lane), 7pm (NB A couple of this year's meetings had a late venue change, in one case, a date change, due to various unfortunate circumstances. PLEASE check social media for any late change?).

NB Parking IS a bit limited near the CDC, so if you plan to attend, & can walk or bike there, please do?!

The <u>latest Parish Council meeting</u> was held on 11th July. The main issues discussed were:-

### Walnut Meadows

By the time you read this, Miller Homes contractors will hopefully have commenced work to remove the buried waste material and level the sports pitch land. They will erect Heras fencing around the site before the vegetation is removed, the waste material removed and disposed of offsite, the site is re-levelled and topsoil imported. The work is planned to be completed in early September. There will be a small compound established on the site at the end of Chestnut Drive where contractor's vehicles will park. We have asked Miller Homes not to park on Chestnut Drive and hope there will be minimal disruption to residents. Once the work is complete, the land is due to be transferred to the Parish Council and we can start putting in place the sports facilities that were promised in the Neighbourhood Plan.

### Manor Farm

Representatives from the Parish Council met with Cala Homes recently to discuss the remaining work needed to the public open space before it can be transferred. We are aware of the issue with Hemlock and understand concern about the widespread usage of weed killer to try and manage the issue. Cala have undertaken to let the PC know what their management plan is for Hemlock moving forward. Depending on the level of regrowth in Spring 2024 it may be possible to hand pull any remaining plants. The PC will continue to monitor this carefully. The fencing is likely to stay in place until April 2024. Currently there are still outstanding tasks on footpaths and landscaping to be completed by Cala before the land can eventually be transferred to the PC.

The PC has also agreed to fund repairs on the roof of the **Drayton Football Club** building. This is likely to involve removal of the existing asbestos sheeting and replacement of the roof.

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
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# **Another Drayton**

Pre-Lockdown we carried a set of articles (very kindly researched by Andrew Bax) describing the various other **Drayton villages round the country** (either just 'Drayton' or where 'Drayton' is in the name, eg Fenny Drayton).

There are about a dozen assorted other Draytons in the UK, and every so often people from one of the other ones get confused by Google and make an enquiry for the village hall here.

This piece arrived more recently, from the Parish Council of <u>**Dry Drayton**</u>, which is a small village of about 650 inhabitants, lying in mostly arable countryside four miles northwest of Cambridge.

We have a small primary school, village hall, and the Black Horse pub which successfully reopened in 2018, following a vigorous campaign by villagers to prevent it being sold for residential development.

The village church dates to the 13th century and is unusual in the area for its three-manual organ, five 18th century bells, and medieval palimpsest brass. At the end of the High Street there is Woodie, an old tree stump, who is decorated at various events through the year.

For over 90 years Dry Drayton Village Hall has been the centre of a thriving local community. The current building replaced the old hut, opening as Dry Drayton Village Hall in 1967. The current management team has been leading a number of modernisation projects to provide better resources and making everything easier to manage.

# **Planning Changes??**

### Extensions & Lofts?

[Ed:- Just as this edition was about to go to the printer, this item was mentioned in the news, "**Michael Gove** to **slash planning red tape** for home extensions and loft conversions". It looked an interesting change, so I've included it – running the risk with THIS Govt of a U-Turn, afterthought, Minister being reshuffled, etc?!

And of course it hasn't happened YET, so don't start knocking down walls or hacking holes in the roof based on an 'intention' from a politician!!]

The Housing Secretary will argue that Britain must 'make better use of the buildings we already have' to ease the housing crisis.

Homeowners will benefit from plans to slash red tape around building an extension or loft conversion to create an extra bedroom or bathroom, Michael Gove will announce (late July).

In efforts to address the housing crisis, the Housing Secretary said rules will be drawn up to give greater freedoms to carry out property extensions and to open up lofts.

Officials said the proposals will allow owners to expand their home as their family grows but while still ensuring neighbours' interests are protected.

Flexibilities will be introduced to allow shops, takeaways and betting shops to be turned into living spaces, with Mr Gove arguing that Britain must "make better use of the buildings we already have".

The Department for Levelling Up, Housing and Communities said the proposals to relax rules around the use of retail space is designed to help **rejuvenate high streets** and provide greater density of housing in inner cities, rather than encouraging urban sprawl.

Lisa Nandy, Labour's shadow housing secretary, said the announcement was a "drop in the ocean" that failed to address the scale of the housing shortage.

Mr Gove, in a speech in London on reforming national permitted development rights, is also expected to announce that the Government will cut red tape to enable barn conversions and the repurposing of agricultural buildings.

Ahead of his speech, Mr Gove said: "Britain needs more homes to fulfil more dreams of home ownership and increase choice for renters.

"But they must be of the right type and targeted in the right places.

"So we must build more in the places that make sense – in our inner cities so that we protect our countryside.

"And we must make better use of the buildings we already have – empty shops or offices cannot be gathering dust while we have an urgent need for more homes.

"That is why we are reviewing the rules around permitted development rights to make sure we can regenerate, build and grow."

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 $\Rightarrow$ > The announcement comes only two weeks after a cross-party panel of MPs warned that Tory ministers are unlikely to deliver 300,000 new homes per year after making the target advisory rather than mandatory.

Prime Minister Rishi Sunak decided (Dec) to downgrade the target's status as he looked to see off a potential Conservative backbench rebellion.

The Levelling Up, Housing and Communities committee, in a report published earlier this month, said its inquiry into the policy change had seen it told that the six-figure target would be "impossible to achieve" by the mid-2020s.

Clive Betts, the **Labour committee chairman**, said Mr Sunak's decision was "already having a damaging impact on efforts to increase the building of new homes".

\*\*\* Labour's **Ms Nandy** has already announced plans to make it **easier to build on unsightly parts of the greenbelt** if party leader Sir Keir Starmer is elected prime minister at the next election.

[\*\*\* Ed:- Yes, BUT, er, WHO decides on that `unsightly'??!]

Sir Keir has also pledged to restore the 300,000 housing target. Responding to Mr Gove's plans, Ms Nandy said: "Britain desperately needs more homes, but another review is a drop in the ocean compared to what is needed to fix the crisis.

"We don't need more reviews or press releases, we need bold action to get Britain building.

"That's why Labour has set out plans to reform the planning system to build the homes we need.

"We will restore housing targets, reform compulsory purchase rules and take the **tough choices to** <u>back the builders</u>, not the blockers."

My first reaction to being told that Miller Homes were actually ready to start work on removing the rubble and waste that was buried under the sports

pitches area, bringing in high quality soil, and regrading it was:- has Hell literally frozen over?!

But it's true. They started on Monday July 17th and should be done within three months. This is a huge (and well overdue!) step forwards at last.

<u>I have to pay tribute</u> to the huge amounts of sustained hard work from the Parish Council, the Enforcement Officers at the Vale, and the County Archaeologist for giving us the final ammunition. It is not ideal – the long delay has caused significant financial impacts to the Parish Council's budget for completing things (due to considerable inflation, if nothing else), but after so long, things are FINALLY moving.

### Sewerage Issues at VofWHDC

The issues our water companies have with controlling sewage are not just limited to the frequent sewage discharges into waterways.

We've had issues with new developments and their being hooked up to the sewage mains – and we aren't in the worst position, not by a long way. In East Challow, there are new houses that are next to a sewage treatment plant and still not hooked up, **years after they were supposed to be**.

We put a motion in the latest Council Meeting proposing that the new Local Plan needs to highlight provision of adequate sewerage capacity in all development, to make this a planning condition going forwards (known as "Grampian conditions"), to seek ways of holding Thames Water accountable for their infrastructure maintenance and progress, to ask MPs to pass national legislation to do the same, and to have the local sewage discharges and related data continually monitored.

<u>This was passed unanimously</u>, so should be incorporated into the Local Plan currently being drafted.

This, to my mind, is all linked with water companies failing to update and upgrade ancient plumbing and fix leaks in all aspects – provision of water as well as removal of waste. **Thames Water leak a quarter of all their water** between their sources to our taps – leaking out the total capacity of Farmoor Reservoir every fourteen days. Should we be surprised that their control of sewage can be as poor?

We're in the twenty-first century. We need a water and sewerage system that meets our needs, that doesn't dump sewage regularly into our waterways, that doesn't cause floods in our villages, and we can insist that developments can be compatible with that and that the water companies can damn well do their jobs.

And if we have to prod them repeatedly, watch over their shoulders constantly, and write these requirements into planning, **then that's what we'll have to do**.

### **Electric Car Club Pilot Scheme**

Local Authorities across Oxfordshire have partnered with car club providers Co Wheels, Enterprise CarClub, and Thame EV Car Hire to offer **pay-per-use EVs on a 12-month trial basis**. The scheme gives people the chance to access an electric vehicle when they need one, **without the expense of owning or leasing one outright**.

Car clubs can make it more affordable for people who do not drive every day and they provide real-world experience of driving electric without a long-term commitment.



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# WESTMINSTER VIEW



Our MP (Wantage/Didcot) is David Johnston (OBE, awarded for services to Social Mobility and Education).

As I mentioned in my last article, access to childcare is something that is regularly raised with me on the doorstep, and I launched a **Childcare** 

<u>Survey</u> last month to give parents and guardians across the constituency the chance to tell me about their experiences. Thank you to everyone who took part.

I'll be sharing the findings with Ministers at the Dept for Education, but the headline results included 95% of people saying we need <u>more childcare infrastructure</u> (much like most other infrastructure!) and 95% of people supporting the Govt's plan to expand free childcare to 30 hours every week for children from 9 months old until they start school. This is the largest ever childcare investment and will hopefully make a huge difference to the 75% who said that cost has been an issue in accessing childcare.

This month I was pleased to host my third annual **Wantage and Didcot Climate Summit** featuring a keynote speech by Grant Shapps, the Secretary of State for Energy Security and Net Zero, who took questions on everything from renewables to transport. We also welcomed local and national experts including Mike Blanch from the Westmill Sustainable Energy Trust, Jack Richardson from Onward and Professor Adrian Bull from Manchester Uni to talk and take questions about wind, hydrogen and nuclear energy. This was followed by the chance to question Thames Water's Director of Sustainability on water quality and tackling storm overflows. It was a very interesting event, and you can watch the recording on my website.

I also hosted a <u>Crime Summit</u> with TVP in Wallingford this month after a local resident wrote to me with concerns about crime. It was a productive discussion about lots of issues and there were several things that TVP committed to follow up – including the time it takes to **report an incident of anti-social behaviour online**.

In addition, I hosted a **Farmers' Forum** for local farmers with the Farming Minister, Mark Spencer. We had a wide-ranging discussion about food production, farming incentives, the challenges for beef /pig /dairy /arable farmers, the environment and much more.

It is always a pleasure <u>to welcome constituents</u> to Parliament, and it was great to meet with Sarah and a group of young people from <u>SOFEA</u> when they visited again for a tour. We organised this after a recent visit I made – they do great work for the local community.

As one of the patrons of <u>**Play2Give**</u> I try to get to as many of Andy Baker's events as I can and this month he was running a great football tournament in Wallingford, which raised over  $\pounds4,000$ . Well done, Andy!

In other news, my campaign for the <u>local AEAT</u> <u>Pensioners</u> hit another milestone as Parliament's Public Accounts Committee finished their inquiry that I helped secure and made recommendations to Government. This is a campaign I will continue to support.

# GARD

**THAMES WATER**: Everyone will have read about the Thames Water financial situation and the fact that the company is negotiating with the government about how to continue. Will it be new money coming from existing shareholders? Or new shareholders? Or the government? Over the coming weeks we shall see what happens. It is not clear what this means for the reservoir proposal.

**RAPID**: The RAPID Gate 2 report came out but as we expected there was no commitment to a particular direction (Reservoir or water transfer). It is disappointing to see that RAPID have not answered GARD's critricisms of the water companies cost or carbon footprint estimates, nor have they insisted on an early evaluation of Reservoir safety.

**GARD** has had an online meeting with RAPID and the Environment Agency to discuss these issues, with local Councillors being present and supportive; this is leading to several more meetings, including two with GARD and Ofwat/Enviroment Agency, and one between RAPID and the Councils. These meetings are scheduled for the coming weeks and we will keep you updated.

**WRMPs**: as we reported in July, the Water Company and WRSE responses to stakeholders' and residents' criticisms have been delayed. These plans will not be made public until early September.



# **Richard Webber - Oxon CC**

### **Drayton 20mph Zones**

3 years ago the County Council unanimously passed a motion calling for the consideration of

**20mph limits** in any County Parish that requested them. At the time I do not believe any of us thought that such a policy would be quite so well received. To date, only a tiny majority of Parishes have failed to take up the offer or show interest. If my own mailbox is anything to go by, I would say that those in favour outnumber those against by more than ten to one.

Understandably, the police are concerned over the potential pressure on their resources of enforcing these speed limits. However, the evidence so far is that 20mph limits do indeed bring down average speeds in our villages making life for residents, quieter, safer and more pleasant. Of course there are some concerns over **potential consequences**. Some Bus companies argue that the limits could make it harder for them to keep to their timetables. \*\*\*There is not enough evidence one way or the other to know the answer.

[\*\*\*Ed:- However, I gather from local social media that Bus Companies HAVE OBJECTED to this plan].

A minority of residents argue that 20mph is annoyingly slow and leads to impatience and bad driving. Again, there is too little evidence to be certain, and it seems probable that it will take some time for drivers to become accustomed to slower speeds in all built up areas. What evidence there is, suggests that there is a driver learning process, but that 20mph limits lead to traffic flowing more smoothly and there is little impact on journey times.

In our immediate area, Shippon's 20mph zone is already operational. Drayton's is well underway and all the other Parishes are investigating where 20mph limits might be needed.

Changes in the way traffic and driving is managed bring out strong feelings initially but Oxfordshire's immediate path on this issue is set.  $\rightarrow \rightarrow$ 



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### **Grass verges**

There has been much local concern around grass cutting and road safety in recent weeks as the weather has encouraged rapid growth of roadside vegetation. There has also been concern that cycle and pedestrian paths have become restricted and even blocked. If we are trying to encourage people to get out of their cars and cycle or walk, it is important that we keep our paths open and conducive to cycling and walking. Many people are passionate about roadside plant diversity. Growth at road junctions is a major concern for road users of all types. Budget cuts over the past 20 years have led to reduced amount of grass cutting down to one per year leading to very careful decisions having to be made over when to carry out grass cutting depending on each year's weather patterns.

Clearly, there is a balance to be had over how we treat our roadside verges. The present policy is one cut per year and junction cuts where safety is the major issue. Junctions are currently cut on a priority basis - major junctions first.

### Mill Rd Bridge, Marcham

Good news for Marcham (and indeed Drayton) residents is that work is due to start on the bridge imminently and the work completed this summer. Both Parishes are keen to work together to restore access to the bridge as soon as possible.

### HIF1 Rd

A major concern for Appleford, Sutton Courtenay and Milton is the OCC Planning and Regulation Committee's decision on the proposed new HIF1 Road. After 4 postponements, the application will have been heard on July 17th and 18th, before this Chronicle is issued.



### HIF1 Plan Rejected

Following on from page 15, that reference to the **HIF1 relief road decision by OCC**, it was announced just before we went to the printer that the plan had been rejected.

This led (courtesy of the Herald series papers) to a predictable range of responses, delight from the assorted campaigners who'd sought to block the scheme, but dismay from a number of residents affected by the issues.

Oxford Friends of the Earth, Oxfordshire Roads Action Alliance, and the Green Party, had all been campaigning against the plan, and were therefore very happy, BUT Long Wittenham residents stated :- Many residents will be disappointed to hear that the planning application for the Housing Infrastructure Fund (HIF1) project to build a new road bridge over the Thames, amongst other infrastructure, was rejected by the OCC planning committee.

It had been hoped that a new road bridge over the Thames would reduce the traffic through Long Wittenham and other local villages.

'RC' said:- What do you expect from a Council that is anti motor vehicles. They seem more interested in providing money for cycling schemes and pedestrrians than keeping the roads in good order.

'CC' wrote:- And yet the house building continues, the traffic through the villages increases, and the rush hour queues for the single lane bridge crossings get longer and longer.....

And from 'DS':- This is an absolutely unbelievable decision by OCC. I thought one of the conditions when planning permission was granted for thousands of new homes in Didcot, was the new relief road. The builders should stop NOW. How can our small villages cope with all of the cars travelling through?? Clifton Hampden bridge was built for horse & cart & not juggernauts.
