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

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
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FIFTY YEARS OF VICKERY'S

In 1973 British Leyland launched the Austin Allegro, the UK joined the EEC, Pink Floyd released The Dark Side of the Moon and women were allowed into the Stock Exchange for the first time. It was also the year in which Arthur and Doris Vickery, together with 17-year old Laurence, came to Drayton to take over a failing hardware shop.

Arthur had been in the trade for many years and Laurence was following a similar path. They came from Bognor, so what brought them to Drayton? Apart from the business opportunity, one of its attractions was the nearby River Thames, perfect for mooring Arthur's 16-ft cabin cruiser (which he had built himself). Vickery & Son has been serving Drayton and the surrounding area with a vast range of products and friendly, practical advice ever since.

It was of course inevitable that Doris would find herself behind the counter along with Arthur and Laurence. She was involved not just in the shop, but in the wider community too. She was a member of the Women's Institute and Drayton Wives, and an active participant in Steventon Choral Society.

When I first came here, a mere 45 years ago, I was astonished to see no fewer than 11 different coal scuttles on display in Vickery's window. Moving with the times, though, the shop responded to the 1980s surge in DIY, attracting a younger customer base. Later, the wave of cooking programmes on television stimulated a demand for cookware and, according to the season, there has always been a good stock of gardening equipment. The key-cutting workshop at the back of the shop has always been Laurence's domain ever since he was trained up by Lewis Beadle, a master locksmith who used to live in Drayton.

Laurence's late partner, Debbie



There aren't many shops like Vickery's these days. You can get the same kind of products in the national chains that occupy most out-oftown shopping centres, but what you don't get with them is the depth of knowledge and experience that comes with old-fashioned personal service. As with any family business, the passage of time results in the demise of key members, and Laurence has had to cope with more than his share of losses, including his partner, Debbie; she, too, had become a crucial member of the team. Just when he needed it most, his uncle Bernard, formerly a professional musician and entertainer, stepped in to provide much-needed support. However, ever since he has been running the shop on his own, Laurence has had a series of local ladies helping him.

Vickery's is not just in the centre of the village; it has also been a central feature of village life for generations of Drayton residents. Before computerisation the Chronicle Box was the focal point for contributors and advertisers in the Drayton Chronicle and the shop still plays a role in the Chronicle's distribution.


Vickery's may be 50 years old but, I am glad to report that Laurence has no plans to retire in the foreseeable future.

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COUNTY COUNCIL REPORT



A multitude of issues all across the Sutton Courtenay and Marcham Division

OCC Children's Services

As you may have read in the Press, a recent Ofsted report listed Oxfordshire's Children's Services (along with others) requiring improvement. There is particular criticism of the lack of support given to children and parents of children with special needs. We have a number of families who have been affected by thisThe Council has accepted the findings of the report in full and has already begun to take actions to rectify the problems including increased funding (with consequent pressure on the budget). I will give further details on the actions to be taken in my next report.

20mph zones

I am disappointed that this issue is becoming a political football for a minority of residents. Just to make it clear, I was elected to take decisions some of which might be contentious. I repeat that the overwhelming number of people who have contacted me support the proposals. Rather than write separate emails to the 7 people who have contacted me opposing the initiative, I am restating my position here. 20mph zones are Parish Council proposals but I fully support them. There is mounting evidence that lives are saved and that the quality of life in our towns and villages is improved by 20mph zones – with or without enforcement.

Hobbyhorse Lane Appeal

The third attempt to get this application (turned down by planning committee several times) approved is currently being heard by a planning inspector. As such, it would be improper for me to express an opinion here. There will be time for that later. However, I wanted to commend on behalf of all Sutton Courtenay residents, the enormous amount of effort over many months put in by the Parish Council, their advisors and many well known residents with particular knowledge and experience. Whatever the outcome, it has been a pleasure to work with them.

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Accidents and the Young

With the recent tragic accident in Marcham involving young people in mind, I have signed up to a task and finish group of the Police and Crime Commissioner Scrutiny Committee. This will allow me to raise the issue of education of future young drivers in schools and colleges. Education in schools has made a considerable difference in the approach of young people to drugs, smoking and alcohol.

As a self confessed attendee of a speed awareness course, I am convinced that education is the most effective way of changing behaviour.

HIF1

Leaving aside the fact that the country is divided on whether or not road building is a solution to congestion, a decision on the future of this project is now in the hands of the Secretary of State. He has "called in" the decision of the Planning Committee to refuse the application. We should hear the result in the early new year.

MEPC

One of my roles as an elected councillor, is to Chair regular meetings of the. MEPC Liaison committee involving local parish councils and MEPC reps. Of all the meetings I have to attend, these are the most informative and constructive.

We are fortunate in this area to have such a successful and environmentally aware commercial operation in our midst. It is clearly a great place to work. I can recommend the bus services and the coffee. And, in case you are wondering, I do not have shares in the operation.

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
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LETTER FROM WESTMINSTER



I was honoured last month to be appointed the Minister for Children, Families and Wellbeing.

It's particularly special for me to be placed in the Department for Education given my pre-politics career was spent running organisations for children and young people. It often surprises people when I tell them that, before I became an MP, I had never been in politics before, whether as a councillor, advisor, or candidate.

In my new role I have responsibility for a wide range of areas such as early years and childcare – including the delivery of the Government's new commitment to provide 30 hours a week free childcare from when a child is 9 months old until they start school - as well as Special Educational Needs and Disabilities (SEND), children in care, adoption and kinship care – vital areas that help support some of our most vulnerable young people - not to mention mental health. I am delighted to have the opportunity to work on giving children across the country the best start in life.

It was also a delight to attend the unveiling of the new Agatha Christie statue in Wallingford, a place she lived for 42 years. The architect has done a really great job and it was a pleasure to meet her grandson, Matthew, who did the actual unveiling. I recommend a visit to see it when you have time!

Some other recent visits made by me included meeting with a group of unpaid carers in Wallingford, facilitated by Val Wolsey and Carers Oxfordshire, to talk about their experiences and listen to their concerns, attending an Innovator Day at Harwell Campus where I gave a speech and talked to staff and investors about the world-leading work that Harwell is doing, and visiting SeeAbility in East Hagbourne who provide support services for people with learning disabilities, many of whom have sight loss.

I have been campaigning to see Grove Station reopened since I was elected nearly 4 years ago and have now launched a petition of Parliament. This is something MPs can do on matters that are important to their constituents and I've done so to keep the pressure up. I am delighted that 1,750+ people have signed so far and the more signatures we collect, the stronger the message we send to the Department for Transport – so please do sign if you are able to and encourage your friends and family that live in the constituency to do so too. PARISH COUNCIL REPORT

Walnut Meadows

Miller Homes have now completed removal of the buried waste as agreed by the District Council. They were asked to remove waste, re-level the site and spread 100mm of topsoil across the site. The Parish Council Neighbourhood Plan Working Group inspected the site on 30th August and discovered that 100mm of topsoil was not present across the whole site and that some bricks and large stones remained. Subsequently a tractor and tine unit removed some bricks and stones, but a further inspection on 12th September revealed that large stones and rubbish can still be seen on the surface of the site. A parishioner who attended the PC meeting on 12th has also drawn attention to the levels of the site not being achieved satisfactorily. Clearly the site is still not in a fit state for the land to be transferred to the PC. Miller Homes has undertaken to resolve the issues. The PC is liaising with Miller Homes and has also communicated the issue to the District Council. If we cannot get a satisfactory resolution guickly the PC will be recommending to the District Council that enforcement action is taken against Miller Homes. This is a sad state of affairs, both for residents of Walnut Meadows who are having to put up with noise and disruption but also for the village, which is not getting what was promised in the Neighbourhood Development Plan (NDP)

Traffic Calming

This is a 'hot topic'. Two parishioners attended the PC meeting this week and told the Council of their concerns about the junction at Walnut Meadows. There was a recent serious accident at the junction. The PC has told Oxfordshire County Council that its top two priorities are a review of the junction at Walnut Meadows and the provision of a pedestrian crossing on the High Street. Representatives from the PC have met with OCC officers on several occasions to press for action. Sadly, these meetings have not led to work being started, let alone completed. S.106 money for traffic calming projects was awarded to the village and has been transferred to OCC. The PC was told recently by OCC that they did not have resources to progress the work. The PC feels that this is completely unacceptable after all this time and are lobbying OCC and Cllr Webber hard. We have been informed that there is to be a further meeting next week with OCC. We know that there is speeding through the village, that the speed indicators are either not working, in the wrong place or ineffective and also that we are not getting what was promised in the Neighbourhood plan in terms of traffic calming. The PC will be putting up signs reminding drivers of the presence of children and will also be placing hedgehog warning signs around the north end of the village following a parishioners concern about the number of hedgehogs being killed on the road around Barrow Road. The PC will take any action we can to promote safety, but responsibility for the bigger projects, crossings, lights, speed limits, etc sits squarely with OCC.

Manor Farm and the memorial stone

A parishioner attended the meeting to ask what had happened to the Edward Mott memorial stone. The Chair explained that the Parish Council had asked Cala Homes to remove the stone, which said that the area had been named in memory of Edward Mott. The Parish Council had not agreed to change the name of this area from Manor Farm to Edward Park. Historically, this piece of land has been called Manor Farm and provided produce to the Abingdon Abbey. No planning permission had been granted for the placement of this stone, and no agreement given for its maintenance. It is a shame that the bravery of Edward Mott has been caught up in this. The parishioner who attended the meeting will contact Cala Homes to find out where the stone is.

Allotments

The decision has been taken to lock the allotment gates. There has been theft of produce and break into a shed. The PC will review this in a year.

The role of Parish Councillors

I have been a parish councillor for about 3 months now. This is a completely voluntary role but I felt compelled to try and offer something back to the village. For some councillors, the role is taking many hours a week, primarily dealing with the aftermath of new developments in the village. There are 7 of us with 4 vacancies. I don't think any of us expect thanks, but it has been pretty hard recently to read Facebook comments that the PC are useless and do not achieve anything for the village. I have also read a couple of past comments suggesting a level of bribery and corruption. None of this is fair. Off the top of my head there have been so many recent initiatives by the PC:

- Provision of artwork (with money that could only be spent on artwork), Whatever you think of the walnuts, they have achieved the aim of protecting the grass on the green,
- Provision of allotment deer fencing and new water troughs,
- Upgrading and maintenance of footpaths around the village,
- Maintenance of the burial ground,
- Tireless liaison with Miller Homes and Cala to try to get land transferred to the village in a fit state (we are not there yet, but it is not for the want of trying),
- Lobbying of OCC to try to ensure the village gets what it was promised in the NDP,
- Financial support of local groups, including sports groups and Damascus Project.

We have achieved a lot of good things, but there is always more to do. Not everyone is going to agree with everything all the time, but all the parish councillors are united by a genuine wish to do the best we can for the village

"I'm so glad to have gone to the opening of the beautiful mosaic in the Village Hall. It was a lovely occasion, well attended by people of all ages from all around the village, gathered for a community celebration, appreciated by everyone.

The mosaic is the latest project to be finished, and was directed by Pervin Shahin, the PC Councillor responsible for arts installations in the village. This project was voted for in the early meeting that was held with residents just before Covid struck, and was a popular decision.

Now that the artwork is finished, we can all see why so much effort was put into its construction. The artist, Clare Goodall, said that around 700 people were involved in making it, from young people in the school, and in DAMASCUS, to elderly residents in the art group. This is why Pervin chose a mosaic as the best medium for the picture.

The opening day was kicked off with Paul Mayhew Archer ('Vicar of Dibley' fame, among other things) giving a very funny speech before the unveiling. Pervin pointed out that he had raised £100,000 for research into Parkinson's with his stand-up shows throughout the country, which was greeted with a huge ovation.

Then it was over to the band, the Cat 'n Fiddle, and tea and cake. The weather held good and as I left there were lots of people sitting outside enjoying the day.

Events like this don't happen without a lot of hard work from start to finish and I feel a big THANK YOU must go to Pervin for commissioning the mosaic, (which by the way is well worth seeing) and for organising the Grand Opening."

VOTER REGISTRATION CHECKS

This month, all households should have received a letter requiring you to check the voter registration details of everyone over the age of 16 living there.

We have to send this letter to all homes each year to ensure the electoral register is up to date.



When you receive it, please read the letter carefully and, if you are required to either confirm or update your details, please do so as quickly as possible – this will help to ensure we won't need to contact you again to confirm the information.

PLEASE CHECK IT BEFORE YOU CHUCK IT!

Keep an eye out for a sticker which will appear on your recycling bin soon encouraging you to 'Check it before you chuck it.'

Every week thousands of the wrong items end up in our recycling bins by mistake. It can be very difficult to remove non-recyclable items and, if it's food waste or other messy items then it could result in whole truckloads of recycling being contaminated and rejected.

We all need an occasional reminder to ensure we get it right, so we're encouraging everyone to check our website before you throw things away.

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
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GARD NEWSLETTER

EVENTS

Thames Water finally published their Water Resource Management Plan on August 30th. It is not good news. The saga of the Reservoir has been going on so long now that people may feel like giving up – PLEASE DON'T! It has never been more important to act. Thames Water has decided to go ahead with the 'Abingdon Reservoir' – with key developments:

- although we were all consulted on their 100 billion Litre proposal, they have enlarged this to 150 billion Litres - that's 150 million tonnes of water sitting above us, with no apparent room for flood mitigation
- They have ruled out the quicker, we believe cheaper and more environmentally adaptive Severn Thames Transfer, designed to bring fresh water from the Northwest to the more drought-prone Southeast
- Southern Water, planned beneficiary of 2/3 of the reservoir capacity, is challenging the cost and logic of the water transfer scheme from the reservoir
- Thames Water has essentially rejected GARD's and probably your objections too, including the need to challenge the inaccurate population forecasts say they are forced to use

<u>The Rt Hon Thérèse Coffey MP</u>, Secretary of State for Environment, Food and Rural Affairs, could agree for Thames Water to proceed within weeks with no further consultation necessary. However, with Thames Water now accused of illegal sewage dumping and their own financial health in doubt, everybody should take action!

Lobby your MP: we have support of the Vale of White Horse and Oxford County Councils, and we lobby within the industry, but you can still help:

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AUTUMNAL RECIPES

Pumpkin pie 8 servings 1 hour 30 minutes **INGREDIENTS** • 750g/1lb 10oz pumpkin or butternut squash, peeled, deseeded and cut into chunks 350g sweet shortcrust pastry • plain flour, for dusting • 140g caster sugar • ¹/₂ tsp salt • ¹/₂ tsp <u>fresh nutmeg</u>, grated • 1 tsp cinnamon • 2 eggs, beaten • 25g butter, melted • 175ml milk • 1tbsp icing sugar

Method

- Place the pumpkin in a large <u>saucepan</u>, cover with water and bring to the boil. Cover with a lid and simmer for 15 mins or until tender. <u>Drain</u> pumpkin; let cool.
- Heat oven to 180C/160C fan/gas 4. <u>Roll</u> out the pastry on a lightly floured surface and use it to line a 22cm loose-bottomed tart tin. Chill for 15 mins. Line the pastry with baking parchment and baking beans, then bake for 15 mins. Remove the beans and paper, and cook for a further 10 mins until the base is pale golden and biscuity. Remove from the oven and allow to cool slightly.
- Increase oven to 220C/200C fan/gas 7. Push the cooled <u>pumpkin</u> through a sieve into a large <u>bowl</u>. In a separate bowl, combine the sugar, salt, nutmeg and half the cinnamon. <u>Mix</u> in the beaten eggs, melted butter and milk, then add to the pumpkin purée and stir to combine. Pour into the tart shell and cook for 10 mins, then reduce the temperature to 180C/160C fan/gas 4. Continue to bake for 35-40 mins until the filling has just set.
- Leave to cool, then remove the pie from the tin. Mix the remaining cinnamon with the icing sugar and dust over the pie. Serve chilled.

Pumpkin curry



40 minutes

INGREDIENTS

- tbsp sunflower oil
- 3 tbsp Thai yellow curry paste, or vegetarian alternative
- 2 onions, finely chopped
- 3 large stalks lemongrass, bashed with the back of a knife
- 6 cardamom pods
- 1 tbsp mustard seed
- 1 piece pumpkin or a small squash (about 1kg)
- 250ml vegetable stock
- 400ml can reduced-fat coconut milk
- 400g can chickpea, drained and rinsed
- 2 limes
- large handful mint leaves
- naan bread, to serve

Method

- Heat the oil in a sauté pan, then gently fry the curry paste with the onions, lemongrass, cardamom and mustard seed for 2-3 mins until fragrant. Stir the pumpkin or squash into the pan and coat in the paste, then pour in the stock and coconut milk. Bring everything to a simmer, add the chickpeas, then cook for about 10 mins until the pumpkin is tender. The curry can now be cooled and frozen for up to 1 month.
- Squeeze the juice of one lime into the curry, then cut the other lime into wedges to serve alongside. Just before serving, tear over mint leaves, then bring to the table with the lime wedges and warm naan breads.
