From the DAMASCUS Ministry Team

November - **the month of Remembrance** - may be especially poignant this year as we witness the violent conflict in the Holy Land and as Russia's invasion of Ukraine grinds on, and trouble between Azerbaijan and Armenia continues. Millions of people's lives are being turned upside down, with no hope of peace and security in sight. It is indeed a time for Christians everywhere to pray for peace, based on justice and mercy. It also a time to remember the victims of natural disasters - this year alone, we have seen the Libyan flood; the Moroccan and Afghanistan earthquakes; the wildfires in Greece, Spain, Canada, and the USA.

In the season of Remembrance, which in the church covers All Souls', when we remember all those who have died; All Saints', when we remember and celebrate the lives of all the saints and of course, Remembrance Sunday, when we consider those who have heroically given their lives in war.

However, Jesus calls all of us to a radical heroism in our daily lives: 'You have heard that it was said, 'Love your neighbour and hate your enemy.' But I tell you: Love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you, that you may be children of your Father in heaven.' (Matt 5:43-45).

Love Your Enemies:- For most of us our 'enemies' are rarely life-threatening; they can simply be impatient, judgmental, self-righteous or just plain disagreeable! Whether the conflict is with a family or church member, work colleague or neighbour, our attitude toward them should be one of love. We will naturally want to retaliate, but Jesus commands us to love.

Pray for Your Persecutors:- It's only when we are ready to pray for someone whom we find difficult, that God can soften our attitude towards them. Like us, they are those in need of God's forgiveness and grace. **Dietrich Bonhoeffer**, the German pastor executed by the Nazis at the end of WW2, wrote:- "This is the supreme demand. Through the medium of prayer, we go to our enemy, stand by his side, and plead for him to God. For if we pray for them, we are taking their distress and poverty, their guilt and perdition upon ourselves and pleading to God for them".

Become More Like Jesus:- When we start loving our enemies and praying for our persecutors, we become more like Jesus Himself. He willingly laid down His life for us, prayed for His persecutors and gives us the power to love our enemies as He did. At a time when we recognise that we all need heroes; how will <u>we</u> respond to this call to radical heroism in our own life?

Next PC Meeting

Now <u>Tuesday</u> evenings (2nd of month) so next it's **November 14th**, in the Caudwell Day Centre (Gravel Lane), 7pm. <u>All</u> residents are welcome to attend, and



raise issues within the public participation item early in the meeting. NB Parking IS a bit limited near the CDC, so if you attend, & can walk or bike there, please do?!

The **<u>latest Parish Council meeting</u>** was held on Oct 10th, the main issues discussed were:-

Walnut Meadows

Two further inspections of the sports pitch area were undertaken by members of the Parish Council (PC) on Sept 12th & 28th, following the **required remedial work by Miller Homes**. The **following issues** were identified:-

1) Lack of 100mm of topsoil across the site, 2) Significant debris present on the site, and 3) The bank at the southern end of the pitch area was higher than agreed levels.

Miller Homes imported an additional 10 tons of topsoil and undertook further remedial work. A further inspection of the site took place on October 5th and found that there is now sufficient topsoil, the amount of debris has been greatly reduced and the bank height at the southern end has been reduced. Subject to Miller Homes providing confirmation that the levels are now in accordance with planning permission and completing certain remedial works, replacement of trees/shrubs and cracked paving etc, **the site should be ready for handover to the Parish Council in the near future**.

The next step is for the PC to arrange the **archaeological excavation** in the north-west corner of the site, as required by the planning permission. A contractor has been appointed, with a view to this work starting in November. A **sports consultant** has also been approached to advise the PC on the work and costs that will be needed to successfully implement the sports pitches.

Once plans for the pavilion and costs for the work are available the **PC plans to hold a drop-in event for the village** to view the plans and for consultation to take place.

A huge amount of work has been done by the PC to even get to this point and it is only with dogged commitment from PC officials that we have got this far. Our experiences with Walnut Meadow and Manor Farm are that once houses are built it is extremely difficult to get developers to fulfil agreements for public spaces that were part of the original planning permissions!

The PC would like to express particular thanks to the Walnut Meadow residents for their continued patience with the attempts to get the sports area ready for handover to the PC.

The Abingdon Bridge

<u>Gary Hibbins</u>, who grew up in Drayton and is now <u>CEO</u> of the Abingdon Bridge, attended the PC meeting and gave a summary of the incredibly valuable work being achieved by the project with young people aged 13 to 25. <u>The PC was happy to approve a grant</u> to support the work of the project.

Burial ground

The PC contracted work to **clear vegetation** at the south side of the burial ground. We are aware that this work has been left unfinished and that there is a lot of <u>dead vegetation</u> now left in the burial ground. The **Deputy Clerk is chasing this**, hopefully it will have been <u>sorted out</u> by the time of Chronicle publication. To contact any members of the Parish Council, all enquiries should be directed to the **Parish Clerk**, and messages will be passed on. Any Drayton resident may also ask to be added to the Clerk's E-mailing list, so that they receive prior notice of meetings and any relevant documents. **Clerk@draytonpc.org**

Traffic calming

20mph limits - This is **an OCC county wide initiative**. In 2021 parish councils were invited to apply to be included in the 20mph scheme. **Drayton PC requested to be included** with the aim of promoting pedestrian and cyclist safety and improving quality of life within the village. OCC carried out a consultation earlier this year. The matter was considered at OCC Highways Management committee in July and deferred after receipt of comments from local residents and the Bus Company, then considered again on October 12th. The background reports and decision of this meeting can be found on the OCC website.

My understanding from looking at the decision is that **a 20mph limit will be introduced for all areas of the village** <u>except</u> on the B4017 between the north edge of the village and Newman Lane and on Steventon Road from the southern edge of the village up to Kiln Lane. <u>These two stretches will remain at 30 mph</u>.

This will be discussed at the next Parish Council meeting. Meantime, **please contact your County Councillor Richard Webber** with further comments or queries.

A site meeting with PC members and OCC's highways contractors took place on September 27th to consider proposals submitted to OCC by the PC back in November 2021. The OCC officials walked through the village from Walnut Meadows to the High Street to look specifically at the Walnut Meadows junction and a pedestrian crossing for the High Street. Whilst in the village, the OCC officials expressed concern about the speed of traffic entering the village from Abingdon, the arrangement of the Walnut Meadow junction and also witnessed pedestrians waiting at the crossing by Manor Farm with cars not stopping! It was also noted that the speed indicator signs are inadequate.

OCC are developing a 'master plan' and aim to have this available before Christmas. The PC will be actively chasing this. Watch this space!

Conservation area

An extension to the **Drayton Conservation Area** has been agreed by the Vale of White Horse. This had been proposed by the Parish Council several years ago and after some updating, was approved following an appraisal and public consultation by the Vale. Broadly, the area has been extended to include the Millennium Green, parts of Sutton Wick, houses and land to the east of Church Lane and a small area to the west of The Green in the centre of the village. The PC noted that there had been a recent party in the village that had got out of hand and led to **damage to the football pitch**.

We also noted the difficulties caused to the <u>Antiques Fair</u> by **destruction of their signs and dangerous hazards** left at the entrance to the Village Hall and around stallholders' cars. We empathise with the organisers and wish to reiterate that the Antiques Fair is very welcome in the village.

Drayton Hall News

Drayton Community Primary School has had a busy start to the school year and we want to share an update with you all!

This year has seen some changes to our school leadership team; **Miss Spencer**, Early Years lead and previous Reception teacher, is currently taking on the role of <u>Interim Head</u>, and **Mrs Cooper**, our inclusion lead is taking on the role of <u>Interim Assistant Head</u> during this time.

On the third week of school we welcomed <u>Ofsted</u> in for a twoday "Section 8" inspection. School leaders and Governors are pleased with the outcome and feel it was a supportive and productive process, we look forward to sharing the report with the community when it has gone through the ratification process.

Children have settled into their new classes, and we are pleased to welcome a number of new children and families.

Congratulations Laurence. I lived across the road from the shop for 42 years and used it on many many occasions. My first visits were probably for paraffin, no heating then and our first Drayton winter was 62/63, one to be remembered, so cold you can't believe. My son was under 6 months and wore more clothes in his crib than in the day by the fire.

Laurence for carrying on the shop that your mum and dad started, you have to be congratulated. So many memories of you, and them, with all the various dogs and the broken telephone on the shelf.

And of course all the ladies that have worked with you. It has made the shop a treasure, there are not many of them left any more. Well done!! **You are a local treasure**.

The wooden trough which also forms part of the display will be available to place personal poppies or crosses in.


We hope you are all able to visit and appreciate the display and the effort we have all put in to make Drayton one of many proud villages during our national time of remembrance.

Walnut Meadows

The Walnut Meadows sports fields regrading and rubble removal has reached a condition where I'm advised the Parish Council are willing to accept handover. I must emphasise that the Parish Council have been absolutely fundamental to all of the

work here - with very limited resources in Planning Enforcement (albeit far higher than a few years ago), they've stepped up and been the driving force.

Bear in mind that Parish Councillors are all unpaid volunteers (and elected and sitting as non-partisan members). There are still a few hurdles to clear, but this is so much better than I've ever known it before.

There are other enforcement cases elsewhere in the village (such as on Dovecote) that are also still causing concern. Whilst the enforcement system has done a lot more in the last few years than before (when it had effectively stalled completely), this has been at the cost of much less communication (partly due to legal fears, and partly due to the fact that the very limited resource they used to have was almost entirely consumed just by answering questions). However, there are fears it's swung too far in the direction of not providing enough transparency and a review is under way, reporting in November.

Housing provision for Afghan families

A significant number of families who had put themselves at risk by working and fighting for the UK were forced to flee their home country when the Taliban regained control. Since then, many of them have spent a lot of time in hotel accommodation provided by the Home Office.

A new arrangement allows for currently unused MoD housing in Watchfield &Shrivenham as temp accommodation for these families - getting them out of hotels and into homes. These accommodations will be made available for 18-36 months, whilst we use the time to help them find and move into privately rented homes. Government grants are funding the accommodation and support. The Vale will act as landlords.

(As an ex-RAF Officer, I'm personally very pleased with this).

Thames Water's New Plans

<u>– and how to lobby the Environment Agency</u>

Thames Water published their latest plan here: https://thameswrmp.co.uk/ As expected, it effectively ignores the feedback and even re-enlarges the scheme to 150 megatonnes (about 16 Farmoor reservoirs piled into one place). The only step forward has been to increase leak reduction - but they've brushed off the complaints and kicked into touch the Severn-Thames Transfer alternative (far faster, far more water, alleviating stress on the Thames, providing the key link for the National Infrastructure Commission's long-recommended National Water Grid, and far less disruptive).

I've learned from GARD that the Environment Agency and Ofwat will be, as part of their review of the plans, accepting complaints about TW ignoring feedback. An email to the Environment Agency and/or Ofwat making clear what feedback has been ignored (such as relative costs of reservoir and STT, safety issues, floodplain encroachment, dam breach analysis, etc) could be very useful. I had a brief interview with a journalist from Oxfordshire Live (see:- https://www.oxfordshirelive.co.uk/news/oxfordshirenews/thames-water-reservoir-plans-abingdon-8816205 where I tried to make some of these issues clear.

Electric-powered food waste collection trial

A two week trial of an electric powered food waste collection vehicle took place in Aug/Sept 2023. The learning from this trial will help to influence short and medium term vehicle procurement. A previous trial of an electric waste truck last year ran into issues with the amount of range outside of the towns and the time taken to recharge, but the technology is moving forward every year.

It provides retirement living options and I was very impressed that they managed to build it on time and on budget despite the pandemic. It was particularly nice that Frances Curtis's Grandson was able to be there for the event, too.

Andy Baker is a local hero in Didcot and I am proud to be a patron of his charity, **Play2Give**. It was great to be able to be at his **2023 Gatsby Ball** last month, a really great event with 140 people in attendance. It celebrated his organisation having now raised more than £100,000 for Oxford Children's Hospital. <u>Well done, Andy</u>!

Two things for you and your families to participate in:-I've just launched my annual Christmas Card Competition for primary school children. It's open until Nov 13th, entries need to be on an A4 page – the winning design will go on the front of my card!

I've also opened a <u>survey</u> asking what you think about the PM's proposal to **increase the age you can buy cigarettes** by a year every year so that a 14-year-old today is never able to buy one. Find details about both on <u>www.david-johnston.org.uk</u>. Also **please sign** my **Grove Station Petition** while you're there if you haven't!

It's been a very busy first few weeks as Minister for Children, Families and Wellbeing. I've met with lots of individuals and charities that support work in the areas I'm now responsible for; helped to launch a new £70 million programme to improve the support children with **special educational needs** get; responded on behalf of the Govt in a debate about the role of **kinship carers** (family members who take children in who can't live with their parents); hosted visits by Ministers from Sweden and the Netherlands to share ideas; and launched more of the Government's work to reform children's social care.

There've been plenty of <u>visits</u>, too – including to nurseries, a family hub, a children's home and the Seashell Trust, a charity that supports children with learning disabilities and autism. GARD

We still don't know what the government will say to Thames Water, so please continue to write to your MP (details below) asking them to campaign for their constituents about the proposed reservoir. The decision from the Secretary of State for Environment, Food and Rural Affairs (currently Therese Coffey) will come after more deliberations by Ofwat and the Environment Agency. **Our information is that this** will be after November 20th, so until then it is still possible for our MPs to have influence.

Meeting with the Environment Agency and RAPID: David Johnston (MP) helped to arrange a meeting for GARD with the EA and RAPID on Oct 13th. We discussed GARD's view that the Reservoir would not be as resilient to drought as the Severn-Thames Water Transfer; also, the fact that the reservoir water would be undrinkable in severe drought, contaminated by algal blooms because the emergency reserve planned by Thames Water is too shallow. The EA are going to look further at the issue. We made a strong representation that Thames Water had not answered our criticisms on this (and many other points) in their Statement of Response.

Thames Water's Statement of Response: do you feel that Thames Water have answered the points you made in your consultation response? As far as GARD can see in looking at TW's "Statement of Response", they did not actually answer any criticisms properly. To get your point across before Nov 20th, you can write to the Environment Agency and/or Ofwat and complain about TW's attitude. Here are the contact details (copy to your MP):



William Johnson



This picture has been submitted by ex-Drayton resident Adrian Smith. It shows his maternal great grandfather, William Johnson and an unknown lady driving a horse and carriage during the **1953 Coronation Carnival Procession** which was held on what is now known as the Millennium Green. The carriage bears a sign advertising the **Darby & Joan Club** and the Women's Voluntary Service (with the Royal prefix being added in 1966)

It is fitting that William is shown driving the carriage at this **Remembrance time** because he had worked on a farm looking after horses before enlisting in the 5th Ox & Bucks Light Infantry in the First World War. He wore a white braid on his uniform signifying that he was qualified to look after horses and mules, a key part of the British Expeditionary Force.

William was awarded the **Military Medal** for attempting to save a wounded officer while under fire after a battle in Sept 1915 at Hooge (near Ypres). The wounded officer, Lt Woods, was trapped in a shell hole so William, under fire in daylight, crawled out of his trench and tried to get Lt Woods to safety.

Although William reached the Officer, he got hit by an exploding bullet injuring his right knee so was unable to drag both of them back to relative safety. The Officer was later rescued but sadly died of his wounds soon after. William was awarded the <u>Military Medal</u> for his bravery, received a Citation from King George V for his 'Act of Bravery' and letters from the C.O. of the 14th Light Div and the Colonel in charge of the 5th Ox & Bucks Light Regiment.

After a period of recuperation, William rejoined the war effort serving in the Labour Corps until the end of the War. He married Daisy and they eventually settled in 33 High Street, Drayton.

William died in 1961 (aged 71) and is **buried in Drayton Churchyard along with Daisy**. "We Will Remember Them"

My least favourite road?

There are some issues that just never seem to go away. The A415 between Abingdon and

Marcham has been a concern for many years. Fairly straight, not very wide, very busy but with little housing on either side, there have been safety issues all that time involving pedestrians, cyclists, private cars and HGVs. It took far too long to get the road reduced to 50mph. Increasing traffic levels and the narrowness of the shared pedestrian and cycle path on one side are prompting more calls for a further reduction to 40mph.

The section of the A415 between the A34 and Abingdon Town centre is suffering from the same traffic increase. This leads to congestion all around the immediate area – congestion that affects bus timetabling and makes the delivery of a 4way interchange at Lodge Hill ever more urgent.

It is the same A415 between Abingdon and Dorchester that is now ever more in the spotlight. The SODC local plan is for several thousand more homes at Culham. If and when the Didcot HIF1 Road is completed, it will deliver yet more traffic on this section of the A415.

One wonders what the congestion is going to be like during the construction of all these projects. <u>Roll on</u> <u>autonomous cars and buses</u>.


Drayton 20mph plans

20mph limits through our towns and villages are great for general health and a sense of well-being. As Drayton has discovered, the bus companies, understandably concerned about anything that interferes with their timetabling, <u>have raised objections to some new 20mph zones</u>. It has now been agreed that a new 20mph will be put in place in the High St and in the central section of Abingdon Rd., together with all the minor roads. Decisions on Steventon Rd and the northern end of Abingdon Rd will be negotiated when the long-awaited Neighbourhood Plan improvements are delivered. <u>Some good news here</u>, as we expect a firm timetable of delivery for these improvements <u>in the New Year</u>.

Meanwhile, it will help the argument for increasing the 20mph zone throughout the whole village, **if more of us use our bus services**. The sight of endless queues of single occupancy cars on the Drayton Rd is depressing.

HIF1, Sutton Courtenay and Appleford

With the final decision now in the hands of Mr Gove, the Secretary of State, and in expectation that the needs of District Councils to protect their Local Plans will take precedence, it makes sense to prepare arguments for every possible mitigation to be in place to minimise the impact of the new road on local residents. Such mitigation must include measures to sort out the noise issued in Appleford and the odour issues in Sutton Courtenay.

VAS (Vehicle Activated Signs)

The new signs are now in place on the B4016 together with mounting poles in various positions between Drayton and Sutton Courtenay. With Parish Councils' ability to move the signs between the poles, we hope to get around the issue of drivers ignoring the <u>speed signs</u> through over-familiarity.

Party Political Conferences

Now that the season is over [Ed's note:- HURRAY!], it is becoming ever clearer that, whoever is in power at the next election, England is going to be taking many more houses in the next few years. As one of the few parts of the country that is a net contributor to the national economy, we can expect continuous pressure to build more in our area. Hopefully, we can get the infrastructure that this housing will need. How we absorb this pressure, on top of the pressure from past lack of infrastructure provision and, of course, how we pay for it, will be the top major challenge for the new government.

Dovecote Controversy - (<u>http://dovecotedrayton.co.uk</u>)

[Ed's Note:- we received an article from the Residents' Association of the Dovecote, unfortunately too large for this issue – several items had to be deferred this time.

A brief summary follows, but I'll place the full article on the village website, probably in the Chronicle section, look for a piece called something like 'Dovecote Extra'?]



Vale of White Horse District Council has broken a commitment to the residents of The Dovecote, the Bloor Homes development, by signing off their freehold development without involving the most important stakeholder affected, the residents themselves.

Up until March 2022, the Residents' Association had been working closely with the council's planning team re preparations for handing over the public open space, BUT since then the Vale has been holding inspection meetings with the developer without engaging with residents.

The RA says:- "We hope to avoid slipping into the clutches of a developer-imposed estate management company called FirstPort, with the inherent risk of escalating year-on-year charges for servicing the large public open space. Luckily, we have a knowledgeable community, able to argue the legal case that the developer is responsible for all costs prior to full handover. Residents have now successfully recovered FirstPort-imposed expenses from Bloor Homes and that precedent has now been established.".





Down the Years

In 2013, **Sam Bailey** was building up to be Xmas #1 with 'Skyscraper' – originally by Demi Lovato – and she is still recording and in assorted shows.

Back 20 years & Sophie Ellis-Bextor had been in a 'Mixed Up World', Blue were 'Guilty', Liberty X were 'Jumpin', and Girls Aloud wanted people to 'Jump'!

Back to **1993** – this marked the final chart appearance of **Frank Sinatra** (with Bono) and **'I've Got You Under My Skin'.** From from the sublime to the ridiculous, THIS WAS the year that **Mr Blobby** was the Xmas #1. And Noel Edmonds wants to make a come-back

40 years ago (is it REALLY so long?!) and we had **Madness** (just going out, if not already, on their millionth tour?!) in the top-5 with 'The Sun and the Rain', with just behind them **Kenny Rogers** (RIP) and **Dolly Parton** ('Islands in the Stream'). **Paul Young** just missed #1 with 'Love of the Common People', but the **Flying Pickets** made history as the first 'acapella' song to top the charts with their 'Only You'.

FIFTY years ago (for real old-timers), we'd just had the **Osmonds** charting ('Let Me In'), also **Slade** with one of their lesser known tracks ('My Friend Stan') - and the #1 that month was **David Cassidy** ('Daydreamer').

In November itself both **Donny & Marie Osmond** had big hits ('When I Fall in Love' & 'Paper Roses'), as did **Alvin Stardust**, with the iconic 'My Coo-Ca-Choo'. Alvin was really one Bernard William Jewry, and had an earlier success as the lead in **Shane Fenton & the Fentones**, in which he'd replaced the REAL Shane Fenton, who'd sadly died quite young as the band were about to get famous.

The #1 that month was by the **New Seekers** ('You Won't Find Another Fool Like Me'), and coming up behind them were the big Xmas hits that year, **Wizzard** with 'I Wish It Could Be Christmas Every Day' – really?!) and **Slade** with the #1 'Merry Xmas Everybody'. As my ears hurt after typing those few words, I'll mention that the rather more melodic **Andy Williams** was in the top-5 with 'Solitaire'.

Anyone recall **1963**?! <u>Let me help</u>:- this was a terrific three months, in the top-5 had been the wonderful **Ronettes** ('Be My Baby') with **Gerry & the Pacemakers** at #1 with You'll Never Walk Alone.

November's hits had the incredible voice of Kathy Kirby ('Secret Love'), the wildly irritating (to watch) Freddie & the Dreamers ('You Were Made For Me'), one of the greatest ever female singers, Dusty Springfield ('I Only Want to be With You'), all topped at #1 by the Dave Clark Five, who were 'Glad All Over'.

Coming up just behind them was the Xmas #1, the **Beatles** and 'I Want to Hold Your Hand' (they'd have the Xmas #1 in 64 and 65 too, with 'I Feel Fine' and 'Day Tripper'). 
