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

ST PETER'S LETTER

This month both **Ash Wednesday** and **Valentine's Day** fall on the same day. The link between the two can be summed up in terms of the nature of real love.


Lent, beginning on Ash Wednesday, focuses on learning to love God more, as we give Him space in our lives. This is what Jesus found when He was led into the desert by the Spirit to be tempted by Satan. **(Luke 4:1-13)**. Jesus was tempted to turn stones into bread. Yet loving God and His word comes before satisfying physical desires. Satan tempted Jesus to worship him. However, worshipping God is an expression of loving God and serving Him. Finally, He was tempted to put God to the test, by jumping off the Temple. Real love for God does not put Him to the test, but wants to obey Him.

Lent also teaches us how to live out the love of God in practical ways, as we follow Jesus in the way of the Cross. We see this clearly demonstrated in the life and death of Saint Valentine, Valentine was a Christian who demonstrated the importance of sharing God's love with others. We know little about him, except that he was a priest who lived in the 3rd Century AD and that he was martyred on 14th February. Emperor Claudius felt that soldiers in the Roman Army were distracted from their duty by their wives, and so had attempted to outlaw marriage. It is believed that Valentine married couples in secret, which is why today we celebrate love on his day. In trying to understand the meaning of her revelations from God, Julian of Norwich found: 'What, do you wish to know your Lord's meaning in this thing? Know it well, love was His meaning.'

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DODDIE'S GRAND SLAM CYCLE EVENT

The Story

Motor Neurone Disease (MND) is an appalling disease that currently has very limited treatment and no cure.

Doddie Weir, affectionately known as the Mad Giraffe, died from MND in November 2022 but not before the former Scotland rugby international and British Lion had brought MND into the public conscience and had inspired millions of supporters and fellow MND sufferers. Rob Burrow described his first meeting with Doddie as like joining a new team with an inspirational skipper.

Another who has been inspired by Doddie is local man Rob Drury-Dryden from Drayton. Rob is a former rugby player and was immediately drawn to the cause to find a cure for MND. Encouraged by a cycling friend Rob joined a group of riders cycling to Edinburgh in 2019 where he met Doddie for the first time. Since then Rob has started to cycle seriously and has completed a number of events to support Doddie's charity -My Name'5 Doddie Foundation.

The Event

In just a few weeks Rob will be undertaking the biggest of his challenges to date. He will be cycling from Murrayfield in Edinburgh to the Stadio Olimpico in Rome with the match ball for the Cuttitta cup that will be played between Italy and Scotland as part of the 6 Nations Rugby Championship. Rob and his 15 team mates have decided that just cycling to Rome from Scotland is a little tame so they are visiting each of the 6 nations rugby stadia. This means that the group will cycle 3000Km in 8 days across 6 countries.

As a local, and the route planner, for the group (who are called **Doddle'5 Gr4nd S7am team**) Rob has made certain that the cyclists will be passing through Drayton as they ride from the Principality Stadium in Cardiff to Twickenham in London on 2nd March. This is a wonderful opportunity to see the riders as they pass through the village and also show support for one of our own on this epic journey.

It is hoped that some of the team will be able to stop and those rugby fans amongst us could meet former internationals Roger Baird, Huw Davies and Paul Volley who are riding with Rob.

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DISTRICT COUNCIL REPORT

Joint Local Plan Consultation

One of the most significant responsibilities of the District Council is that of planning. The Local Plan is the framework around which planning in the Vale is built. Many aspects of it are driven by requirements imposed by central Government, but we get to set the overall direction and theme under those requirements; it's one of the most crucial documents we ever get to write and pass into regulations.

We're doing it in consultation with South Oxfordshire (which is why it's now a Joint Local Plan, to avoid clashes and redundancy, and to ensure it's all robust. It should govern planning here until 2041.

Different options have been drawn up and the idea is that we meet those imposed requirements, meet the needs of our residents, protect and restore nature, and help address the climate emergency simultaneously. This is obviously going to be a challenge, which is why we need to hear from you – if we want to meet the needs of our residents, we have to hear the voices of our residents.

The consultation will run for six weeks, closing at 11.59pm on 21 February 2024. For more information, visit <u>www.southandvale.gov.uk/JLP</u>

There are also options to see and use paper copies in libraries and at the Council offices, and a number of drop-in events.

Flooding and SESRO

Whilst flooding is primarily covered by the County Council (OCC), and the floodwaters should hopefully have receded by the time you read this, residents affected by flooding can also potentially apply for government funding themselves on the gov website.

This does link into the ongoing South East Strategic Reservoir Option (SESRO) battle. Remember that a key missing piece of information is that SESRO is to be built on the floodplain that is used to drain waters away from our towns and villages? Thames Water have yet to share their new modelling that they claim shows that this will now somehow not have a negative effect (unlike all previous modelling for it over the past 25 years, which invariably pointed to a "red" risk of increased flooding in Abingdon and the surrounding villages).



For background, this is the area covered by flood warnings on the 5th of January this year. A huge chunk of that orange area would be under the mega-reservoir and its massive earthwalls. The water that otherwise should drain there (and build up there in this warning) has to go somewhere – so the floods we did see could easily be much worse (and more frequent).

Meanwhile, at the last Council meeting in December, we passed a motion opposing SESRO unanimously. Key takeaways were that we're requesting a meeting with the Secretary of State on a non-partisan basis with the MPs for Oxford West and Abingdon and for Wantage, GARD, CPRE, and the County Councillors affected as well as ourselves, to discuss the issues ignored by Thames Water to date and overall options for governance of the water system – because the latter could be crucial.

This is because water transfers – which are essential in the future and to create a longneeded National Grid of water – will need a governing authority to require the water companies to work together (they don't trust each other at the moment, which is potentially behind their resistance to the simpler, cheaper, more flexible, faster, and far more resilient water transfer schemes).

We're also requesting that the "RAPID" process be paused until the flaws and absent reports are addressed.

New Vale wards

LETTER FROM WESTMINSTER



I know it has been a difficult start to the year for some local residents with the flooding that we have seen across the constituency. I have been in contact with the Environment Agency throughout and will be meeting with them to discuss the recent flooding and our flood defences, as well as with the Council about the measures they can take to prevent flooding. Please email me if you have anything that you would like me to raise with them.

I know that of particular concern has been the flooding on the A417. I have written to the Council about this many times and have pushed them again to do the work that they had planned to do on this and other roads. I also visited local businesses like Mellor's Garage and Vale Hydrotherapy in East Challow to talk about their experiences in the recent floods, how I can help and what more needs to be done. Mellor's in particular have been losing a lot of business while the road remains flooded so do support them and others affected if you can.

If you or someone you know has had their home or business affected by flooding, which I hope you did not, there is Government support available to help people recover. This support will be provided through local councils who will announce further details on eligibility and how to apply.

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PARISH COUNCIL REPORT



Footpaths and Bridleways

It will come as no surprise to anyone in this village that we have had very wet weather and that some footpaths have been turned into impassable muddy messes. We are aware that there has been considerable surface water on Footpath 29 (past the old scrapyard) at points beyond where the footpath was resurfaced a couple of years ago. This will be given attention.

Walnut Meadows

This is taking up much of the PC's effort and the ongoing issues cannot be fun for the residents of WM. With the exception of the planting of a wetland wildflower meadow, Miller Homes have completed Phase 1 of the landscaping works, i.e replaced dead trees and hedging. The wildflower meadow will be planted in the Spring.

Negotiations are ongoing to agree the legal transfer of the land identified for the sports facility from Miller Homes to the PC. This has been, in part, held up by the PC wanting an undertaking that it will not be responsible for costs to bring the some roads up to standard for adoption by the County Council and clarification of future maintenance costs. The PC thinks it is important to protect village resources from maintenance costs in the future.

Once the PC is satisfied with their future liabilities, the transfer the land will be completed. The next step will then be to complete the archeological survey requested as part of the planning conditions.

The PC's Programme Manager is currently involved in drawing up a detailed design and a business plan for the sports facilities.

We are planning to hold a consultation with the village in the near future. This has taken longer than planned. The PC is well aware that sports facilities were an intrinsic part of the original planning permission for this site. Quite frankly this programme has been held up by Miller Homes' delayed compliance to the terms of the planning permission. We have tried to hold them to account to make sure that the land is ready for handover in a state fit for the development of the sports facilities but this has taken years.

Manor Farm

At the PCs request, Cala have now implemented the missing path from the public open space at Manor Farm. However, the repairs to the perimeter path are still unsatisfactory with membrane exposed in parts. The PC will also be ensuring that a review of the Hemlock takes place in early spring. We are really hoping that Cala can remove remaining Hemlock by hand pulling as we are well aware of the environmental effects of wide-scale chemical spraying.

The Dovecote

The PC has been contacted by a representative from Bloor Homes to improve biodiversity on the site. We have been offered a number of bird boxes. Whilst these are always useful, we think that there should be effort to replace some of the dead planting on the site, and improve the variety and quantity of planting. Bird boxes are great but we take the view that we can do a lot more to attract birds and wildlife to the area. The PC will be attending a meeting with Bloor Homes to discuss.

Traffic calming

A productive meeting took place with Milestone (OCC's Highway contractor) in early December. A number of traffic calming measures will now be taken forward to the design stage. A further meeting is planned for this month to review designs and costs. These plans include work on the Walnut Meadows junction, the crossing by Manor Farm and a crossing on the High Street. The PC has requested that the Vehicle Activated sign on the High Street is replaced. It has been broken for years. We don't have a date for when the new device will be installed.

Defibrillator

An additional defibrillator is to be placed at the side of the Red Lion pub. The PC is now consulting with the District Council to ensure that there is permission to place this on a listed building.

Parking on the High Street

The PC has been made aware of parking on the High Street by contractors who are working on the Halls Close development. There have been several 'near misses' as the visibility for those entering High Street from Church Lane is often really impaired. Andy Cooke, District Councillor, has been asked to take this up with the District Council.

Flooding

In 2007, more than 100 homes in Abingdon had to be evacuated, some for more than a year. Problems with insurance companies and the overstretched environment agency were compounded by confusion over who was responsible for what. While some of those problems were addressed, the volunteers in the flood group began work on clearing Sandford Brook from Tescos to the Thames.

Clearing the debris and removing the dams caused by supermarket trolleys, bicycles, collapsed trees and branches and the like, it was not long before the brook was flowing clear and fast. Within a year, the gravel bed was clear and to date there has been no repeat.

Unfortunately, memories fade. The flood group is no longer operating for lack of volunteers. There is not the same sense of urgency as there was from 2007 to 2012. Flooding was more the concern of people in Gloucester and Cumbria than in Oxfordshire.

The recent heavy rain and local flooding have reminded us that we may have been lucky. Flooding is, of course, a regular occurrence in Sutton Courtenav but the statistics around the 2023 rainfall suggest that it exceeded 2007 measurements by at least another 10%.

Photographs of the B4016 and Ginge Brook suggest there is no room for complacency. Even more significant are photographs of the proposed land for the Hobbyhorse Lane development (the appeal having been granted).

It becomes ever more important that the drainage scheme for that development works and works well. As the development goes through the various stages of the planning process, it is going to be vitally important that the drainage plans are throughly challenged.

I would encourage all concerned residents to respond to the consultation on the developing South and Vale Local Plan 2041 to ensure that Flooding is taken fully into account.

The six-week consultation began on 10/1 and will run until midnight on 21/2 2024. Visit: southandvale.gov.uk/JLP to find out more and have your say.

Other urgent news

The "call in" hearing of the Hifl planning application begins on the 20th February at the Bee House on Milton Park. This is likely to continue for at least two weeks.

As a result of the recent Local Government settlement, it seems likely that OCC is going to have to find more than £10m of savings in order to balance its budget.

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LOCAL GROUPS AND CLUBS

DRAYTON WIVES

Before Christmas, we had a Bee-utiful talk by Mr Busby the local Bee man.

Mr Busby was interested in the keeping of bees since childhood, when no pesticides or chemicals were used. We learned, if bees aren't happy they will simply leave the hive and go somewhere else.

He shared the different types of bees:

- **Solitary bees;** which are ground bees, harmless, and move around as a family
- **Bumble bees;** where there are 25 varieties, they don't bite, and don't collect for honey.
- Masonary bees; which live in holes in the walls and keep away wasps.
- Honey bees; with 250 varieties in the United Kingdom.
- Black bees; the only protected bee.

The different jobs bees have:

- Male bees do the housework
- **Female** bees do the shopping which means collecting the pollen
- Queen bee is looked after and likes it clean

And the importance of flowers:

- Bee keepers like to know which flowers etc the bees are eating as it makes the honey tastes different.
- Bees find honey by sight as they have five eyes so they can see infrared and ultra violet. They look for certain colours in flowers as blue and purple have the most nectar ie plants like lavender will always attract the most bees.

As well as a huge host of other facts:

- There are **50-60 thousand bees** in a colony in the summer but in the winter the males die
- They can fly nearly three miles from the hive
- They are also very faithful to the Bee keeper because if he dies the hive has to be told!!
- Honey is a good anti inflammatory, anti microbial and promotes health body tissue, as well as protect against colds.

This was a short summary of an interesting talk where we learnt bees are a very complicated insect but are needed in our gardens. All the honey is local and Mr Busby can be found at Didcot and Abingdon Farmers market.

DOVECOTE DRAMA



The residents of The Dovecote, the new housing estate just off the High Street, have voted overwhelmingly to take control of the handover process when Bloor Homes Ltd is ready to walk away from the development.

This follows the residents being let down by Vale of White Horse District Council, when they failed to engage or inform residents that they had issued a Certificate of Practical Completion to Bloor Homes in April 2023.

Out of 140+ homes on the development, 102 homeowners voted (71% turnout) and 101 voted (99%) to take control.

When the Residents' Association informed Bloor Homes of this outcome, the developer refused to respect the views of the residents and reaffirmed its intention of handing over the public open space to FirstPort Ltd, which the residents have explicitly stated they want to avoid.

Bloor Homes joins Vale of White Horse District Council in failing miserably in treating their customers fairly.

As a result of Bloor's rejection of residents' wishes, the residents have now voted unanimously to request an EGM be called of the Management Company as soon as possible, with a turnout of over 60% in a vote that only lasted 36 hours.

The chair of The Dovecote Residents' Association said "We have now submitted a request to the Company Secretary to call an EGM of the Management Company. The residents have secured sufficient votes so there is clear justification for that EGM to be called, Resident Directors be elected and the residents should then be able to take control of the Management Company. But the Company Secretary (run by Innovus, which is controlled by FirstPort) is challenging the validity of this request. "This is a classic example of an industry monopolised by one company, which attempts to take advantage of consumers that typically do not understand what they are getting into. Bloor Homes and FirstPort is focused on giving the residents, who are the most important stakeholder, no choice in the way they manage the public open space.

"What the public might not realise is that this is all very incestuous. Bloor Homes has a strategic relationship with FirstPort. FirstPort controls Innovus, which provides company secretarial services. Innovus is supposed to be representing the members of the Management Company, for which all homeowners are members of. But the Company Secretary appears to be more interested in protecting the money-making opportunities for FirstPort after handover".

The Residents' Association sees this as an opportunity for all parties to learn lessons about how to best represent residents in the way Section 106 agreements are delivered. So far, there is little evidence from Vale of White Horse District Council, Bloor Homes or FirstPort in wanting to improve.

Support from Councils and other organisations

Oxfordshire County Council have written to DEFRA citing unresolved issues from the consultation (see above), as have Steventon Parish Council and CPRE.

There was good support for the anti-reservoir demonstration, organised by East Hanney and Steventon's county and district councillor, Sally Povolotsky, at East Hanney, outside the Thames Water 'drop-in' event on the Reservoir on 10th November. Inside the drop-in, it was the usual 'brochure stuff' from TW, no proper details of the design, or about the 10-plus years of disruption, but lots of pictures of butterflies and birds in unspecified locations.

GARD remain absolutely convinced that there will be major damage to biodiversity by the reservoir project. We are taking legal advice on whether Thames Water's Environmental Assessment of the project, which we know to be flawed and biased, is actually illegal, not meeting the standards set down by the government.

Both the County Council and the Vale of White Horse have passed unanimous council motions re-affirming opposition to the Reservoir, asking for talks with the Secretary of State, and for the reservoir plans to be suspended until issues have been resolved. GARD supports these calls. Thanks to those councillors who proposed and seconded the motions: at the County, it was:

- At the Vale it was Robert Clegg (Marcham District Councillor) and Andy Cooke (Drayton District Councillor)
