ST PETER'S LETTER

From the Ministry Team...

Dear Friends

Straight after Easter Day comes April Fools' Day — how unfortunate for Christians! Or is it helpful? The first accounts of the resurrection were greeted with scepticism and incredulity. The religious and Roman leaders would have taken the reports seriously, wanting to quell any threats to their grip on power. The reports from the soldiers on guard at the tomb must have been very unsettling for their masters and the soldiers likely fearful they would end up being the next occupants of the tomb they were guarding! Reports of fake and foolish news were rife after the first Easter day!

What we have in the gospels are not doctrinal statements about Jesus, the Church or resurrection. Raw shock and astonishment are the features of these accounts. The gift of these personal stories is to help us understand the journey into new birth through trusting in Jesus. The first members of the Christian community were not ashamed to share their struggle to fully trust in the gift of resurrection; they had been prepared for the Easter events by Jesus, but the reality of the previous four days had traumatised them. In their disorientation and fear, Jesus came to them gently and with infinite care; news of his resurrection and the gift of new life were not delivered with great pomp and ceremony but with the simple honesty of crucifixion scars and comforting words of peace.

The spirit of our age seeks signs, wisdom and power in order to believe. Resurrection may seem foolish to human wisdom however, it is not a theology to be debated or defended, it is God's sacrificial love to be received and lived out. Such love in action may be foolishness to the world but to those who receive His love, it is the strength and wisdom of God.

For the foolishness of God is wiser than human wisdom, and the weakness of God is stronger than human strength. Has not God made foolish the wisdom of the world? 1 Corinthians 1:24-25



GARD – GROUP AGAINST RESERVOIR **DEVELOPMENT**

GARD Newsletter for April 2024

Public Inquiry: Still no decision (as at 16th March) from the Secretary of State for DEFRA (Steve Barclay), either on GARD's call for a Public Inquiry, or on Thames Water's reservoir plans.

So, there is still time for you and our MPs to influence his decision.

If you have not yet done so, we urge you to follow GARD's example and write to the Secretary of State and demand a Public Inquiry. If you email water.resources@defra.gov.uk, label your email 'Public Inquiry into Thames Water's Water Resource Management Plan', and address your comments in the Email to Rt Hon Steve Barclay, Secretary of State for Environment, Food and Rural Affairs, then your comments will get through to Mr Barclay. Don't forget to copy to your MP.

Please sign our Petition: In the meantime, GARD and CPRE have launched an online petition, in collaboration with the organisation "38 Degrees", who specialise in environmentally oriented petitions. The petition which asks the Secretary of State to "Stop Thames Water's costly mega-reservoir - fix the leaks!" can be found at https://you.38degrees.org.uk/p/stopTWreservoirplease sign and share as widely as possible.

Biodiversity and Habitat on the Reservoir Site: GARD has always maintained that Thames Water have deliberately sought to downgrade the natural habitats and biodiversity which would be lost when they first devastate, and then flood, the Reservoir site. They do this, of course, to try and maintain the fiction that they can 'create more diversity' on the site as part of the Reservoir project. However, they have not, after 25 years of proposal, yet managed to do an actual survey of the site, but rely instead on desk-based 'score-sheets' which tot up the general 'score' which can (according to the government) be given to, say, an acre of woodland, or arable field. No effort has been made to catalogue special features, such as 'red listed' bird species, quality of hedgerows, or even the special trees on the site ('Ancient', 'Veteran' and 'Notable' trees lost cannot just be traded for newly-planted trees a decade or so later when the site is 'restored').

GARD has started to investigate the true state of the nature in the area, with the co-operation and support of our farming members. We have started with trees – which, as they are large, one might have thought even Thames Water would have spotted in a quarter of a century. According to Thames Water, there is just *one* Ancient Tree on the entire 4 square mile site. In a couple of days, GARD has managed to catalogue (and get validated by the Woodland Trust) a total of 4 more Ancient Trees. 43 Veteran Trees and 6 Notable Trees! We haven't even looked in Drayton and Hutchins Copses yet. After this, the main farm north of Hanney Road will be sharing the results of their Hedgerow Survey with us.

So, helping to nail yet more of Thames Water's biased views, if you have some knowledge or skill on the subject of


Biodiversity, we are hoping that all this work can count towards the Public Inquiry, please contact us (gard.chair@gmail.com) if you want to help.




PROPOSED RESERVOIR EMERGENCY DISCHARGE CHANNEL

When a new reservoir is created, it has to have an Emergency Discharge channel, or as Thames Water choose to call it, an 'Auxilliary Drawdown Channel'. In the event of the failure of the embankment wall, or any other event which would endanger life in the vicinity, or even in the event of detection of a serious fault, Thames Water would be required to drop the water-level of the reservoir by 1 metre immediately. Typically, the River Thames has a flow-rate of 26 tonnes per second; the flow-rate of any emergency discharge would be 80 tonnes per second for 24 hours, for 10 or more days, directing a huge mass of water back into the Thames.

To handle this discharge, Thames Water propose to construct an open concrete levee which would have to be at least 6 metres wide and 4 metres high for the whole 5km route to the Thames, very close to Drayton at Oday Lane. The levee would have to go under the A34 and then under B4017 and Thames Water propose to construct this at the same time as creating the reservoir.

To put the enormity of these projects into perspective, the size of the proposed reservoir is equivalent to the whole of the site of Gatwick Airport, a perimeter of 10km. The construction of this and the levee would have a huge impact on the countryside, and the water-flow energy involved in any emergency discharge would be enormous. A new bridge on the B4017 would have to be created to accommodate this channel; a visual image may help to portray the sheer scale of the problem:





Recently, it took 15 months to construct the passage under the A34 for the new roundabout at Milton, with all the disruption that that entailed. Thames Water have two preferred options: (1) to excavate under one carriageway of the A34 at a time whilst diverting traffic onto the other carriageway or (2) divert all traffic on the A34 to east or west. In either event, traffic would divert through Drayton and Steventon for the entirety of the construction programme, likely to be 21 months. Any new bridge on the B4017 cannot be built without the closure of the road, thus the only route in and out of the village would be via Sutton Courtenay.

Thames Water choose to downplay the impact of any discharge by stating that the river sees such flowrates during floods. But it typically takes 4 or more days to increase to this level, not immediately as would be required in any emergency to guarantee our safety. The rate of Emergency Discharge into the Thames exceeds the recorded flow for more than 80% of winter months, and more than 99% of summer months.

The site of the proposed reservoir is, in effect, a flood plain. If the reservoir was built, Thames Water now admit that the water table would rise by at least 1 metre around Steventon, East Hanney and Drayton. It is not hard to imagine what effect this rise would have on these villages with knock-on for Abingdon.

GARD (Group against Reservoir Development) have called for a Public Inquiry to examine the suitability of this proposal compared with other alternatives such as STT (Severn Thames Transfer). A previous proposal for a reservoir two thirds of the size of this one was rejected at a Public Inquiry in 2009

HIF1 Appeal Hearing

The hearing is now having a three week break to give all involved a break and to gather more evidence. The meetings, held at the Bee House MEPC Milton Park, are open to the public. Having attended some of the sessions, in particular those where representatives of POETS (an organisation of Planning experts opposed to the road development), I have been struck by the level of hard work and commitment in answering the rigorous questions from the multitude of KCs involved on both sides. In summary, whilst we will not hear the Inspector's conclusions for many weeks, there are two questions which will have to be

firstly, should this major project be delivered? This inquiry and the Inspector herself will eventually decide this when her recommendation is on the Secretary of State's desk in the autumn. The recommendation will also try to answer the second question – Can the project be delivered at an affordable cost? When the inquiry resumes, it will be considering the financial implications of the project and its affordability. The outcome will depend on negotiations between Homes England (the Government body with its hand on the purse strings) and OCC. We all owe considerable thanks to Cllr Greg O'Broin, representing the five most involved Parish Councils, who has been faithfully attending all sessions.

20mph zones

I sympathise with the retiring First Minister of Wales, when he expressed surprise at the strength of feeling on both sides of this issue. Evidence for the impact of 20mph policies has taken some time to accumulate but evidence from Wales is that in areas where these zones are instituted, average speeds reduce by 4-5mph. It may not seem much, but it equates to several lives saved every year.

Flooding

Water levels never cease to surprise us. Sometimes it is predictable. More often it behaves differently in each flooding event. Thankfully, water levels recede quickly if/when the rain stops, but the local impact on lives can be enormous. Milton village had a particularly bad time of it with deep water blocking roads and a number of people having to move upstairs as ground floors are inundated. All councils are well aware of the issue and are tightening policies to deal with the expectation that there will be an increasing frequency of serious flooding in the future.

The behaviour of some drivers in flood and wet conditions has hit the headlines with abandoned cars and even the large digger that collapsed into the Ginge Brook in Sutton Courtenay.



LETTER FROM WESTMINSTER



Being an MP involves a lot of travel across the length and breadth of my constituency from my home in Didcot and this means I know first-hand that the state of the roads across our area is not good enough.

I launched my **Roads Survey** last year and I'm grateful to the almost 900 people who have filled it in. More than 80% of residents agreed that our roads are poor quality. Flooding on the A417 and safety issues on the A420 and A34 were frequently mentioned, and many people spoke about issues with congestion. I am meeting with the Roads Minister to share the findings with him.

From potholes to congestion to flooding and safety issues, it is clear that we need improvements. We do not need blanket 20mph zones across our area – and the Government is rightly making clear that these should be decided on a hyper-local basis with local consent. No-one objects to strict limits in areas near schools or other sensitive areas but are they required across an entire town? Constituents regularly say no and 71% of residents who filled in my Roads Survey agreed with the Government's policies here.

I have been taking action since I was elected and have raised every issue that has been reported to me with the County Council and the Highways Authorities, who are responsible for our roads. This has resulted in some issues being fixed but I think everyone can agree that it should not take an MP writing a letter for this to happen.

I have spoken about the need to improve our local roads in 13 separate debates, met with the Roads Minister about it, and led a debate in Parliament on safety issues on the A34 and A420.

It's not all about money, but the Government has also rightly given the County Council millions in funding to help improve our roads and fix our potholes - including a substantial increase of 30% for 2023/24. We need to see this used effectively.

I will keep campaigning on this, but please fill in my Roads Survey at www.david-johnston.org.uk/RoadsSurvey.

In other news, **Didcot Powerhouse Fund** celebrated their two-year anniversary, and I was pleased to attend the launch of their new Impact Report and meet some of the local people who have received funding from them – including great organisations like the Cornermen in South Moreton.

I also took senior managers from the Environment Agency to Steventon to talk about our **flood defences** and what more can be done to prevent the flooding we have seen. Many constituents shared their thoughts with me ahead of this and I raised various issues on their behalf, including concerns about the proposed reservoir. I will remain in close contact with the Environment Agency and the Council.

Other highlights in recent weeks have included visiting Willowcroft School in Didcot, Williams Racing in Grove, the Happiness Horse Box in Uffington, and Quantum Detectors in Harwell as well as holding a Pop-Up Surgery at Tesco in Didcot.

Dear all,

Garden waste service changes next year (brown bins)

The way the brown bin service is set up will change from April 2025 – we're aiming to give <u>plenty</u> of notice of the change. The existing way of doing it has led to some issues – it can be a prolonged or even unsuccessful exercise in contacting people whose direct debits have failed, or even who have forgotten to cancel their service on moving out, and brown bins for cancelled services have been known to be left out in some areas and automatically collected (free-riding on those who have been paying).

Learning from successful changes elsewhere (such as in West

Oxfordshire), we're going to move to a permit sticker system. When customers sign up and pay for the scheme in 2025, they'll be sent a tamper-proof garden waste permit sticker to put on their bin (or bins, if they've got multiple payments). This makes it very straightforward to identify the bins to pick up. In addition, rather than direct debits, customers will pay annually by debit or credit card with a similar payment year from 1 April to 31 March each year. There will be an online account management system for customers to make it easier to manage and for customers to amend their details if needed – and to allow the Council to quickly contact people if there are any service

To try to make the changes as straightforward as possible, the Council is aiming to notify people as early as possible (it'll be more than a year from now, for example).

Extra garden waste weeks

disruptions (such as adverse weather).

Looking at the current brown bin service - Residents who are subscribed can have extra garden waste collected on their normal collection day between 15 and 26 April. You will be able to put out a maximum of up to four additional sacks of garden waste, per brown bin subscription, next to your brown bin.

To be eligible for collection, the extra waste must go in standard sized (60L) sacks and should only contain natural garden waste such as cut grass, plants or branches (not rubble or builders' waste bags – those won't be collected). It can also be placed in boxes / containers totalling no more than a standard bin full.

Budget

I know it's not exactly an exciting subject, but at the February meeting, we passed the latest Budget. I'm rather relieved to note that despite the projections before we took over in 2019 that the Council should go bust by 2024, we are **not** going bust and are, instead, in a position so we'll remain solvent going forwards. As can be seen by Councils going bust around the country (one has gone insolvent three times in three years!) due to the unparalleled cuts in Council funding from Central Government, this isn't something we could take for granted.

this isn't something we could take for granted.

Whilst balancing the Budget, we've managed to boost funding for planning enforcement. I know there are complaints and unhappiness about lengthy enforcement cases – I've raised a few myself! – but the amount of resources going into enforcement has increased considerably in the past few years. I'd like to see more still going into this (together with massively increased power and authority for enforcement, but that needs to come from Westminster, unfortunately) and I think it's somewhere we'll need to continue increasing year-on-year – as long as we can. There's also an increase in funding housing provision to

help deal with the still considerable pressures of the Cost of Living Crisis and the expected rise in homelessness.

High Street parking

The development behind Halls Close has caused a spike in parking on the High Street, especially close to the junction with Church Lane. I went down to speak with the site foreman to ask if they could do anything about it — unfortunately, the issue has continued. I've raised an enforcement case (noting that the approval forced through by the Inspector on appeal required the developer to provide on-site parking for workers, something that does not appear to be provided). I'll update as and when I get any more on this.

Thames Water

In the same meeting, we passed a unanimous motion against Thames Water's proposed huge price increases. Although we don't have the power to block them ourselves, we've let Ofwat and the Secretary of State for Environment, Food, and Rural Affairs know that we believe it's utterly unacceptable to reward Thames Water's incompetence in this area with extra money taken from the pockets of consumers who are already under considerable financial pressures. They need to sort out their own failures with sewerage provision, leak failures, and their own poor financial management rather than ask for a bail-out from all of us.

Family activities over Easter

In a cheerier vein, there are a bunch of activities across the Vale and South Oxfordshire for families.

The Beacon in Wantage: Stage show throughout Easter break – Cartoon Circus Live (clowns, slapstick comedy), plus circusthemed activities for children of all ages (including arts, craft, and "Monkey Mayhem")



PARISH COUNCIL REPORT



March 2024

Walnut Meadows

The land at Walnut Meadows has now been transferred to the Parish Council although it will be some time before Land Registry provide updated Title Deeds. We will be adding the relevant areas to the grass cutting contract and arranging for the bins (including the dog bin) to be emptied.

The MUGA (Multi Use Games Area) archeological excavation has started but has had to be temporarily halted due to weather.

The PC has agreed to go out to tender for the MUGA construction, and the contractor selected to provide the sports pitch and drainage design has started work.

A drop-in event was held in the Village Hall on 9th March. Although only a limited number of people attended, some very useful feedback was received.

The Project Manager for the PC is investigating grants for the pitch installation. Any grants received would of course, offset some of the costs to the PC.

The Dovecote

Bloor Homes are currently making bird and bat boxes available to residents of the Dovecote. Any spare boxes will be donated to the PC for use across the village.

Manor Farm

The PC has contacted Cala Homes to advise of the poor condition of the hedgerow between Manor Farm and Henleys Lane, which is of course in a Conservation Area. We have also expressed concern that Cala's agreement to review the growth of Hemlock and undertake hand pulling has not taken place. Instead, Cala have again sprayed the area. The PC is well aware of the environmental effects of this. The VOWH has opened an enforcement case against Cala as they have not built part of the circular path around the public open space to the required quality. The PC cannot take over the area of public open space until these issues are resolved.

Footpaths

Currently many paths are waterlogged and difficult to navigate. The PC is considering extending the resurfacing of the footpath that runs alongside the old scrapyard, towards where it joins Gypsy Lane.

Please let the PC know of any issues with footpaths. We think we know where the main issues are but always welcome feedback from villagers.

Traffic Calming

A further meeting between the PC and Milestone (OCC's highway's contractor) is to be held in March to agree the first priorities. The PC is particularly concerned about the lack of a pedestrian crossing on the High Street, the poor visibility at the junction of Walnut Meadows and the crossing by Manor Farm (many cars not stopping).

Traffic on the High Street

The number of vehicles parked along the road and the parking by Church Lane continues to be a problem. These vehicles are from the development at Halls Close. This is a clear violation of the original planning agreement which was for parking on site. Andy Cooke, District Councillor, is liaising with the Vale enforcement team, but the PC has been told that it is unlikely that any action will be taken in the near future!

Dog Poo

The poo bins are being emptied on a regular basis but please, if the bin is full, do not add to it or throw your bags on the ground. Please take the waste home and dispose of it in your black bin or place it in any other waste bin. Currently most of these bins are being emptied by the PC caretaker and it is a task and a half for him to pick up every bag that has been thrown onto the floor around the bin.

Defibrillator

We are almost there with the installation of an additional defibrillator in the centre of the village. The plan is to install this on the side of the Red Lion pub.

Drayton Wives

This month we welcomed a speaker from the History Group of Long Wittenham.

Janet Haylett is the secretary and archivist for the group which started in 1984 and researches, collects, studies and shares all aspects of local history.

Long Wittenham was origionally known as Earls Wittenham, West Wittenham and Great Wittenham.

Stone age tools have been found and there is a bronze age barrow at Dorchester. A Wittenham shield and sword is displayed in the Ashmolean in Oxford.

In 635AD Bishop Birinus came to Wittenham and preached to the village by the stone cross; he then went to Dorchester Abbey.

At the time English Counties were divided into shires and hundreds which remained intact until 1974. Long Wittenham was in Berkshire first in Sutton Hundred and later in Ock Hundred.

The king had the ultimate authority to collect taxes and maintain law, then a manor-based society took over. A manor was an area of agriculture land.

Alfred the Great was born in 849AD in Wantage. He was a man of learning and built towns across Wessex including Watlington to defend against the Vikings.

Long Wittenham is mentioned in the Doomsday book in the hundred of Sutton

The owner tenant-in-chief was Walter Gifford. Walter Gifford 3rd commissioned a new church in the village in 1120 AD. It has a Norman Arch and a rare lead font which was later encased in wood to protect it from desecration during the civil war and to stop it being melted down to make musket balls.

It also has the smallest monument in England: a stone effigy of Gilbert de Clare, the Earl of Gloucester, who was a Lord of the Manor. The effigy is just 26inches tall.

For a small village it has a lot of history so is well worth investigating with a walk round in the Spring.

Lloyds Bank is closing its Abingdon branch (8 Ock Street) on July 24th. This follows the closure of Barclays Bank on February 15th. The digital phone switchover

What you need to know

What is the digital phone switchover?

The UK's telephone network is changing. Between now and 2025 most telephone providers will be moving their customers from old analogue landlines over to new upgraded landline services using digital technology.

This means services that rely on the old landline system such as home phones and healthcare devices will be switched over.

How will it affect me/what do I need to do?

The good news is – your landline isn't going anywhere and for most consumers and businesses, this change will be straightforward. In fact, many customers are already making the switch when they upgrade to full fibre broadband.

Your telecoms provider such as Virgin Media O2 or BT should contact you before the switchover to check in and discuss what you need to do to make sure your service isn't affected. However, we're encouraging everyone to know what to expect

If you have an internet connection, the change may be as simple as plugging your phone into your broadband router rather than the socket on the wall.



Your telecoms provider should contact you before the switchover to let you know if you'll be affected.



In an emergency

Digital landlines cannot carry a power connection, so in the event of a power cut they will not work. If you have a mobile phone this can still be used, but if you've no other means of calling the emergency services your telecoms provider will offer a solution to allow calls to be made to emergency services.

You should tell your telecoms provider now if you have no other way of making emergency calls.
