Dear Friends

The general election results are now known or will shortly be, depending on when you read the church page. Are you feeling optimistic or dejected at the results? Or does the very mention of politics have you reaching for the off switch?

At least the heated political debates have offset the chill of this 'summer'! 

GARD – GROUP AGAINST RESERVOIR DEVELOPMENT

GARD Newsletter for July 2024 New 'Consultation'

Most of you will have received a postcard or letter from Thames Water headed 'Have your say on our Reservoir Proposals' in a 'consultation' ending on 27th August.

Another consultation (!): what does it mean? It does not mean that the outgoing government has accepted any of Thames Water's plans. The situation is just the same as it was when we sent out our last newsletter: the Thames Water plans for 2024-29 and beyond are not yet approved by the government, and the Environment Agency's advice to the government is that the plans should not be accepted without further revision and probably public consultation.

This exercise is <u>not</u> the Public Consultation sought by the EA. It is an <u>optional</u> stage in the process for approving the Reservoir itself (not the plan as a whole). Thames Water have chosen to press ahead without a government decision (they can do this because the government allows them some of <u>your</u> money to spend on these 'studies'!).

As an optional consultation, Thames don't have a legal duty to take any of your comments into account. This is in contrast to the formal consultation last year, where they must record your comments, publish them, then try to answer them in a way which avoids the points you are making, but still keeps within the law (!). So, it's even easier for them to avoid criticism with this 'informal' approach, whilst appearing to go through the motions.

So, what to do with this consultation?

GARD urges all residents to respond to the consultation and express your opposition. Although this is 'informal', Thames Water will take the opportunity of a 'low turnout' to try and convince the incoming government that the tide of public opinion is somehow turning, and people are coming to 'accept' the reservoir. There is no need to get involved in questions of what the least-worst option of the reservoir would be – all of Thames Water's options (focussed as they are on mega-scale, and very long construction phases) are unacceptable and they should be told.

Also, please turn up to the local 'events' they are having and let them know your mind! (There is a full list of events on the postcards sent and at the foot of this article). GARD will have a presence at all these events. GARD will be putting the real facts about this reservoir design into newsletters for the public, so you can call Thames Water's bluff.

Please make sure your written objections are copied to whoever is elected as our new MP on $4^{\rm th}$ July. We ask you also to seek the assurance of opposition to the Reservoir from any candidate you intend to vote for.

GARD's call for a Public Inquiry into Thames Water's plans will still be on the desk of the new Secretary of State on 5th July. Please, if you

have not already done so, **sign our petition** calling for a Public Inquiry at:



General Election

Reservoir

Thames Water have taken to circulating pretty pictures mocked up by artists in their PR department to try to drum up support and gloss over the many issues (which I've previously raised at length). One thing that's recently come up, buried in their documentation and inexplicably not inked in to their PR pictures, is that the water inlet from the Thames is to be 150m downstream of a sewage discharge point (which has had more than 800 releases so far this year, an average of every 5 hours day in, day out, week in, week out) and they're now lobbying the Environment Agency to allow this!

Assuming they ever do fill it full of water from the massively water-stressed Thames (hopefully between the sewage discharges), we've now found out in addition that the emergency drawdown capacity will run within a couple of hundred metres of Drayton (just north of Walnut Meadows and Sutton Wick Lane) and this will need to be able to sustain a capacity of over 75 tonnes of water per second for up to twenty days (in case of an emergency scenario, hopefully the emergency will be able to deal with taking three weeks to run down the water levels...).

To put this number into context, the "hands off flow" of the Thames at Sutton Courtenay is 17 tonnes per second and the average year-round flow rate of the Thames there is 26 tonnes per second. This would add three average entire River Thames's to that flow for those three weeks, certainly causing floods downstream (and coming back on the floodplain south of Abingdon all the way to Steventon and into Abingdon proper, as well as downstream of there). Not to mention the quality of the water – filled downstream of that regularly-used sewage outlet – would leave much to be desired.

Then again, the one saving grace is that it's extremely unlikely to ever be anywhere near full, seeing as it would need as much water as eleven more Farmoor reservoirs when that one was filled to the brim (filled from the most water-stressed major river in Britain, when they couldn't even fill up *one* Farmoor after the wettest winter on record).

All the while, Thames Water uses this to deflect from its requirement to reduce leakage and to dodge the NIC recommendation of water transfers from the far-less-water-stressed areas to make a National Water Grid – which would help, would work, and be constructed far more cheaply, more safely, with much less environmental damage, and much, much quicker. Why, yes, this does wind me up, what gave it away?

Homelessness

I've received a detailed update on the work being done by the Council to address homelessness and affordable housing. One key aspect of this is that we have recently become a registered housing provider ourselves, for the first time in nearly thirty years. We can now get access to Homes England funding where appropriate to develop homes and can provide social housing directly.

Obviously, we've had to start pretty much from scratch, but the journey that takes the longest is the one that's never started. We've started with two hostels, a two-bedroom house and two

three-bedroom houses and have refurbished our ten-bedroom temporary housing accommodation and re-opened it. We're purchasing 18 properties in the Vale with help from the Local

Authority Housing Fund which will be part of our housing stock in the longer term. We've also leased 24 houses from the MoD's current surplus to house families from Afghanistan who had to flee the country after openly (and in many cases at great risk) helping our forces out there (this is something close to my own heart, given my former history in the RAF).

We also lay down requirements for affordable housing in new developments, with 353 now completed over 2023/24 alone (253 affordable rented, 21 social rented, 79 shared ownership). I have my personal disagreements with the definition of "affordable" (I believe it's often not really affordable) but we need Government legislation to alter that.

Net Zero

We've made considerable strides towards becoming a carbon neutral council (target to achieve that is 2030, with an interim target of a 75% reduction by 2025). This has been helped by work done on decarbonising the leisure centres (which have been a big chunk of our emissions, rivalled only by the waste collection service). I'll make no apologies for seeing reduction in carbon emissions as crucially important – the climate crisis is extremely important – but even to anyone who disagrees, the reduction in energy bills from the leisure centre decarbonisation is definitely be very useful going forwards and I think we'd all agree that reducing our dependence on fossil fuels often sourced from certain regimes abroad, such as Putin's Russia, has to be a good thing.

We're looking at trialling an Electric Refuse Collection Vehicle for twelve weeks (we tried one before, which wasn't very successful, but the technology has already moved on noticeably). Hopefully we'll be able to transition up to six council vehicles during 2024.

Even with all of this, I think we'll fall a bit short of the interim target (unless we purchase carbon credits, which would be costly as well as a bit of a cheat, so we're not looking at doing that). Rather than try to change the interim target, we'd rather try to get as close to it as possible and if we fall short, we'll face up to that and do our damndest to catch up and still make the 2030 target. It's better to aim high and fall just short than to aim lower.

PARISH COUNCIL REPORT



The Council met on 28th May and on 18th June

Oak Tree

A member of the public attended the meeting and expressed concerns about the future of an oak tree at the back of the white cottages on Abingdon Road. The PC has now applied to the Vale of white Horse District Council for a Tree Preservation Order on this healthy mature oak tree (located in Meads Close)

Sutton Wick Pond

A resident who lives near the pond is exploring grant funding so that we can get this pond in a clean state. The PC supports this and will offer any help we can to achieve a living pond.

Quotes are being sought for the pollarding of the 3 willow trees that surround the pond.

The Dovecote

The PC is aware that the residents of The Dovecote have a 'snagging list' of items for Bloor Homes to fix. Once this list has been resolved the PC is prepared to enter into negotiations with the Management Company to consider taking over the areas of public open space, if this is what the residents want.

Manor Farm

An offer has been put to Cala Homes that the Parish Council will take on responsibility for the public open space area, including management of hemlock, if Cala remediate the outstanding work on the paths and area around the children's play area. The PC is aware that Cala's continued use of Heras fencing and spraying of the area is unsightly and detrimental to the environment and we would like to take over the area of open space as soon as possible so that we can get the area into shape. The agreement was always for the PC to take over the area as open space for the village but we have been held up by the fact that some of the areas of the site have not been completed to appropriate standards.

Walnut Meadows

An Extraordinary Parish Council meeting held on 21st May shortlisted two suppliers from the 5 responses received for development of the MUGA (multi use games area). We have completed the checks required (credit check, references and accounts) on our preferred supplier and will be proceeding with the preferred supplier for the construction of the MUGA. Next steps are to agree a contract and start date for construction.

The tender for the sports pitch drainage is ready to be issued.

Miller Homes have reinstated the Heras fending around the former barrow. The PC now has responsibility for maintaining this fencing.

Miller Homes are due to commence work to repair the cracked perimeter pavement at the Walnut Way public open space on 18th June. The PC has posted this on Facebook and delivered letters advising local residents.

Bird and Bat boxes

We have a number of bird and bat boxes to give away. The bird boxes are specifically designed for either Sparrows, Starlings or Swifts. They are high quality heavy boxes that need to be fixed to a solid wall. If you live in Drayton and think you have a good place to put one, please email the

Sue later had to return to England as she had caught Malaria, but Bunny and Sue continue to see each other every year.


Sue will always be the first wife of a Tribal King and hopes one day to return home to Africa.




