# Drayton Wives (Lisa Lammiman)

Our July meeting was about **<u>BRICKS</u>**. A strange title, maybe sounded boring -- but it was <u>very interesting</u>!!!

Our speaker was a local man, **Martin Buckland**, with interests in all sorts of diverse topics. At the age of four he watched trains at Iver with his Dad which got him interested in Industrial Archaeology. He then came to Abingdon fifty years ago and got involved with the new section of the Wilts and Berks canal.

For the last forty years he has volunteered at the **Didcot Railway Museum**, and also the **Abingdon Museum** in the Education dept. He also volunteers and raises money for BBONT, to which **he donated his speaker's fee**.

Bricks are perhaps the most ignored thing in modern life as they are just accepted as a normal construction item. Each part has a name, the most common is the 'stretcher' for the long side, the 'header' for the short side, and the 'frog' for the depression.

The London Brick Company has a 'Phorpres' brick (name originally from 'Four Press') - made in Bedfordshire - which is the **toughest brick**.

Some bricks are impressed with Royal dates such as 'Queen Elizabeth 1952-1992'. There are also **Electric bricks** (stamped to warn builders re cables), and **Rubber bricks**, which can be seen at the sea front in Torquay.

There was a <u>brick tax</u> (1784) which King George 3rd used to help raise money for wars in the American Colonies but manufacturers increased the size of the brick to get round this, and in 1850 the brick tax was abolished.

Modern bricks now can be made to accommodate **bats** and **swifts**.

The term BRICK is used in our language in many ways, in slang, songs, road names, pub names and many more. See how often you hear the term Brick used in different ways?!



#### Next PC Meeting

Now Tuesday evenings (2nd of month so next it's Sept 10th, in the Caudwell Day Centre (Gravel Lane), 7pm. All residents are welcome to attend, and raise issues



within the public participation item early in the meeting.

The agenda is published on the PC website prior to NB Parking IS a bit limited near the CDC, meetinas. so if you attend, & can walk or bike there, please do?!

The Council met on August 13th >>>

#### **Planned Reservoir**

A member of GARD attended the PC meeting. The Planning Committee met on 19th August to discuss the issue and to formulate a response to Thames Water's consultation (see p13).

#### Walnut Meadows

The PC has appointed AgriPower to install the sports pitches and drainage. We are in the process of finalising the contract and agreeing a start date for the work. Meantime they have been on site to flail the weeds on the pitch area.

The architect appointed by the PC is in the process of submitting a planning application for the MUGA, Pavilion and Car Park. This is likely to take 3 months for approval so it is not clear that the work on the MUGA will be able to start until early 2025. A start date will be weather dependent. As part of the work the PC commissioned an archaeological survey which revealed interesting items (more on this next month).

#### **Traffic Calming**

A further meeting has been held between PC representatives and Milestone (the County Council contractor). There has been a sharp increase in costs since the original planning for this work. Subsequently the PC has tailored its proposals to the:-

#### Pedestrian crossing on the High Street

Pedestrian crossing and raised table at entrance to Walnut Meadows

A footpath on the south side of the High Street between Halls Close to join the footpath outside Magpie Cottage.

Milestone are now drawing up plans for these 3 items and the PC will inform householders who are likely to be affected by this work. The precise plans for the new crossings can be seen on the Drayton Village website >>

#### Allotments

The PC recently carried out an inspection of allotment plot usage. We identified 7 plots which were either not being used or very minimally. The Parish Council will write to these plot-holders informing them that unless they have a good reason for not using their plots, they will be asked to vacate them at the end of the year. This may seem harsh but there are 16 people waiting for allotments and it is not acceptable for some plots not to have been worked for the whole of the season.

## **Daria Stimpson**

Daria Stimpson died in June, at the grand age of 95. She had been living in a retirement flat in Abingdon and latterly suffered from dementia, but had remained her typical cheerful and positive self. Daria was always interested in what was happening in Drayton and would insist that I read out the Drayton Chronicle to her, when Jean Caudle delivered it every month.

Born in 1929, Daria grew up in the Black Horse pub in Gozzards Ford, where her grandparents and then parents were the landlords. As soon as she was old enough, she worked as an unpaid barmaid, together with her two sisters. Having won a scholarship at St Helens School, she began playing the violin and later went on to perform in various local orchestras, until her eyesight deteriorated badly when she was in her forties.

At the age of twenty Daria married Norman and moved into Abingdon to live above their grocery shop. The family came to a new bungalow in High Street, Drayton in 1958 and Daria quickly became involved in village activities. She was a founder member of the Young Wives in the early 1960's and if there were things to be done at village fetes or feasts, helping at youth clubs, running fund-raising events, etc, she would get stuck in. When it came to raising money to build the village hall, Daria worked on the production of the early editions of Hall News (the predecessor to the Chronicle).

Daria worked as the Primary School Secretary in the 1970's, before moving on to a job with Oxfam. She was keen on sport and having played tennis as a youngster, became one of the founder members of the women's section at Abingdon Bowling Club. Local history was another interest and she became involved in the Drayton History Group, through which she published a book of photographs of village life, to mark the turning of the Millenium.

In 2005, Daria and Norman moved back to Abingdon. Nevertheless, she kept in touch with her many friends and loved coming back to walk around the village. Drayton was very much a part of Daria's long and happy life.

#### New Govt changes to Planning legislation & housing targets

The draft details have only just been sent to the Council; officers are going through them to work out full implications. **There are some positive elements in them:**-

1) Greater flexibilities in the use of Right

to Buy receipts.

2) Commitment to consult on wider reforms to Right To Buy eligibility and discounts.

3) Commitment to future announcements on bigger investment in affordable housing and on rent stability for social housing.

**However, there are some alarm bells ringing**. The key one of these is that housing targets are considerably increased. I haven't got full details yet, but for Vale as a whole, we're likely looking at an increase from 633 per year to around 940 per year.

The main concern in that is the power it can hand to developers, who can – if the "five year land supply" against housing targets is not deemed to be met - force through speculative developments against planning advice on appeal. Vale has met targets at that level before, but it may be challenging. I'll bring more information as I get it.

We're looking closely at our evolving Local Plan as these changes are bound to have an effect on it, and looking at legal implications.

#### **Devolution – Unitary Authority?**

In addition to the planning legislation, the new Government have contacted all councils informing them that they wish to encourage **<u>further devolution of powers</u>**. This is overall a welcome step, but there are some concerns over what devolution may be on offer.

The key concern is that there may be pressure to create a single huge unitary structure for Oxfordshire, one that would give Oxford City the freedom to push all of its unmet housing need into the districts (worsening the traffic into and out of Oxford itself, above and beyond the implications for the districts themselves, who could be treated as simply adjuncts to a single dominant city).


Huge Unitaries pull power away from the people as the sole council is more remote from the residents. **Original guidance** on unitaries was that they should be around the 300K to 400K population range (with some exceptions) and the average size of new unitaries since 2006 has been 380,000; the largest ever is North Yorkshire at just over 600,000.

Oxfordshire is rapidly approaching 750,000 residents - more than several US states (Vermont, Alaska & Wyoming). **Two unitaries for Oxfordshire would be strongly indicated**, in my mind – as long as that is accepted by Government.

My personal view is that South Oxfordshire and Vale of White Horse already are very closely enmeshed. West Oxfordshire has similar needs to us; South-Vale-West would come in at 410,200 population, which is quite large enough (leaving City-and-Cherwell at 327,500).

All of this, though, is pure speculation until the Government clarifies things more. However, that two-unitary solution above would also simplify the division of powers between District and County, something that confuses many (myself included, at times).

#### Reservoir

We have yet to hear back from the Secretary of State following our writing to him a few weeks ago, requesting an immediate pause in the 'RAPID' process and **a full** reassessment of the need for the solutions presented in Thames Water's Water Resources Management Plan (a plan that the Environment Agency recommended against accepting in its current guise).

Specifically, we strongly recommended that the reservoir option be removed and replaced with the **Severn Thames Transfer option** as part of a larger initiative to institute the National Water Grid that was recommended by the National Infrastructure Commission. In conjunction with this, a Water Transfer Authority should be set up, addressing the commercial concerns of water companies who do not trust each other.

Solutions should reflect the needs of the country, not the commercial needs of near-bankrupt companies.

We have also responded to Thames Water's informal consultation. The much-repeated message in our response was **that the need had not been made**, and that the proposals were immature and superficial, providing far insufficient information to respond against (given the many years and many millions spent on the proposal to date, this is embarrassingly poor from Thames Water); however we gave indicative responses against what could be seen of the intent.

Much of that appeared to be token attempts to promise implausible "benefits," which TW could rapidly walk back on if their plan was accepted (they have already gone back on the suggestion of a canal link to the Thames for the public to use – something that was never going to happen).

**It isn't plausible** to have an open waterway always with water for boat use – as it would need to operate between zero net flow at normal operations, and a flow of water **triple** the average flow rate of the Thames in emergencies, just how deep would it need to be, and how low would it normally operate? You'd be able to base-jump onto the boats...). {cont'd overleaf >>}

#### Halls Close

I mentioned a couple of months ago that the developers building behind Halls Close put in **an application to vary the condition regarding drainage**, to permit early occupation. I called it in to the Planning Committee as I was unhappy with anything that could look like playing fast and loose with drainage, given the problems we've had with the drains down the High Street in the past.

As I expected, it had to be approved. I don't hold it against the Planning Committee; they had no options when **the key statutory consultee – Thames Water – responded to say there would be no problems** [Ed's Note:- and with their long history of expertise and accuracy, nor the slightest hint of a broken promise, why would anyone doubt THEM?!]. Without any defensible reason to overrule them, it had to be passed.

Nevertheless, I have now officially got it on record that I don't believe Thames Water's casual claim that it will all be fine. If and when problems arise, I'll be asking for the minuted discussion to be used against them if possible.

# Parish Council / GARD - Reservoir Consultation Response

#### Drayton PC Consultation Response (Thames Water Ab'don Reservoir) >>> Pre DCO Informal Consultation on SESRO

The GARD local group have produced a comprehensive and **professionally accredited** resume of the issues regarding this, and **Drayton Parish Council agrees with their concerns**. In particular **we support their view** on the following:-

**Proof of the Need**: The need & functional case for the reservoir are not adequately proven. The Water Resource Management Plans (WRMP) have still not been approved by Govt, and the EA and Ofwat have expressed concerns.


<u>Viable Alternatives</u>: As the need appears to have been volumetrically over stated, we feel that alternatives providing adequate supply at lower cost / lower environmental impact, and earlier completion, have not been given sufficient consideration. Perhaps the Severn Thames transfer?

**Design Strategy**: The civil engineering design principles for the reservoir wall have been widely called into question as **flawed and unproven**. Similar projects have shown problems of inadequacy even during construction and not under final loading.

**<u>Competence</u>**: A real concern is Thames Water's **historic inability** to address mains supply leakage and sewage containment. This does NOT inspire confidence for the community, and neither does their widely reported financial situation as a viable business. A particular concern since large infrastructure projects of this type routinely suffer from flawed briefing and end up over-time and over-budget.

[Ed's Note:- In addition to the varied critical points re this horribly flawed project – designed to rescue TW's assets list at our expense – I'd nominate their reluctance to discuss the affect on the local WATER TABLE, already sensitive to heavy rainfall, evidenced by local flooding]





**Environmental impact/Biodiversity**: TW's 'fact sheet' on the 'Environmental Impact Assessment' provides no confidence that the environment will be enriched by the reservoir. The glossy pictures provided **bear no resemblance to the actual landscape**. The current environment is one of flat pastureland, with arable fields divided by ancient hedgerows, streams and brooks, all rich in diversity of vegetation, insect, bird and animal life.

Vegetation is characterised by very old Willow trees and streams with steep banks which are rich habitats for wildlife. The area often floods in winter, providing a habitat for birds. Currently the area is well used by the local population for walking, running and riding on the bridleways that cross the landscape. It provides a significant green space for animals and people.

Given **the lack of an environmental assessment** by Thames Water, plus the lack of any relevant detail about the current biodiversity of the area, there is no evidence at all that the proposed design of a 'bund' contained reservoir would improve on the current level of environmental diversity.

**Drayton Parish Council is not convinced by this flawed project**, and supports a <u>Public Enquiry</u>, as demanded by GARD and many local MPs, Councils, and campaign groups.

# WESTMINSTER VIEW

Our (new) MP (Didcot & Wantage) is Olly Glover (Lib Dem).

He hasn't yet sent us a missive, but I expect he's been pretty busy. The text below is an extract from his maiden Commons speech, July 22nd.

I start by paying tribute to my predecessor, David Johnston. I admire the fact that Mr Johnston entered politics because of his passion for social mobility. I have met constituents who have been personally helped by him, and I aspire to follow his lead. I was pleased that the first email in my parliamentary mailbox came from Lord Ed Vaizey of Didcot, Member for the predecessor seat of Wantage between 2005 and 2019, offering his congratulations, a warm and encouraging gesture. I arrive in Parliament following a career on the railway, serving the public, and I hope to apply my knowledge and experience to working with others to advance both rail infrastructure and public services here.

[ED:- He then referred to a number of aspects of the towns & village he now represents, and added that he lives in Milton. He also name-checked:- "organisations such as Didcot TRAIN, the DAMASCUS youth project and Sustainable Wantage illustrate the strong culture of public service and volunteering".

He referred to his experiences when campaigning on doorsteps, and suggested that his liking for cats might have gained a few votes >>> "Many a local party volunteer has come to tire of my frequent canvassing of cats as well as humans. On occasion, this has helped my cause: while I was in conversation with one voter, his cat, Matthew, intervened. Matthew took a strong liking to me, with a great deal of legrubbing, even sitting on my lap on the pavement. The voter, astonished, told me that Matthew hates nearly everyone, and that his favourable verdict on me would be taken into account"].

Turning to the subject of today's debate, my constituency shares many of the same challenges as the wider country. Access to GP appointments is often difficult, particularly in Didcot, which continues to yearn for a new GP surgery in Great Western Park. NHS dentistry barely exists, and sewage dumping in our waterways is a great concern, as are proposals for a large reservoir near Steventon and the Hanneys. Many residents desire to walk and cycle more, but need pleasant and safe routes and paths in order to do so, and while the constituency benefits from fast railway connections, the reliability and capacity of the service provided can be somewhat patchy, and we continue to lack a railway station serving Grove and Wantage.

Perhaps the greatest issue on constituents' minds is the cost of housing and recent, very substantial increases in the numbers of houses. I commend the Govt on their commitment to **genuinely affordable housing**, but ask them to bear in mind that residents would be more supportive of housing growth were **the health**, **education**, and transport facilities needed to support it delivered in parallel. I promise to work tirelessly for my constituents in the pursuit of progress on these issues, and thank them again for the opportunity to serve. It is a genuine honour to be stood here, and I look forward to working with Members from across the House to achieve those aims.



This month in 1974 – Richard Nixon resigned (due to the Watergate scandal); the first US President to do so. We lost Charles Lindbergh, famous for the first solo trans-Atlantic flight (1927). Coming into the world that year were Emilia Fox, Tim Henman & Gok Wan (Happy 50ths all?!!). On TV, BBC started showing Kojak, Porridge (after a 1973 'pilot'), and Roobarb (the dog, + Custard the cat!), ITV launched Rising Damp, and started showing Planet of the Apes, and The Six-Million Dollar Man.
