

## ST PETER'S LETTER

#### From the DAMASCUS Ministry Team...

#### Dear Friends,

In CS Lewis's much-loved book, *The Lion, the Witch and the Wardrobe*, the lion Aslan is put to death by the White Witch in a scene which gave me childhood nightmares when I first read it. The stone table on which He is killed cracks in two, but Aslan comes alive again and meets with Lucy and Susan and he explains the Witch's failure: 'her knowledge goes back only to the dawn of time. But if she could have looked a little further back, she would have known that when a willing victim who had committed no treachery was killed in a traitor's stead, the Table would crack, and Death itself would start working backwards.'

This is a great picture of what Jesus' cross and resurrection has achieved. As St Paul writes, 'I want to know Christ, to know the power of His resurrection' (Philippians 3:10).

To understand the real Easter, we need to experience the same power that raised Jesus from the dead – the new hope, the new love and the new life that God brings to us all.

**New Hope:** Like the girls in the story, Easter highlights the sadness and confusion that loss brings. Yet the resurrection of Jesus brings new hope, as it demonstrates the victory secured by the cross over sin, Satan and death. We can face life's difficulties knowing that Jesus walks beside us.

**New Love:** Our relationships are often characterised by a lack of forgiveness, hurt and betrayal. Yet Jesus' resurrection opens the possibility of new love, as His power enables us to accept others and forgive them.

**New Life:** When we are trying to make sense of life, like Susan and Lucy in the story, Jesus offers us a living relationship with Himself. It's a friendship with God through Jesus that can begin today and continue for eternity.

When Lucy met Aslan again, she cried: 'Oh, you're real, you're real!' My prayer, this Easter, is that, in amidst all the fear and uncertainties of the current times, we too find the real power of Easter through a life changing encounter with the living Christ.





## GROUP AGAINST RESERVOIR DEVELOPMENT (GARD)

#### **News Update for April 2025**



**JUDICIAL REVIEW:** we now have a date for our Judicial Review hearing at the High Court - 25th and 26th June. The High Court Judge has ruled that our claim is 'significant' and, as the case is complex, has taken the unusual step of fixing a 'Rolled Up Hearing' where the issues of permission and the substance will be considered *together* on the same two days. The outcome of the hearing will be available in July.

**RECENT CAMPAIGN ACTIVITY:** the campaign against SESRO continues with vigour.

**Meetings:** Two meetings were held in March hosted by Sally Povolotsky (to whom many thanks) and GARD, in Drayton and East Hanney.

**New**: GARD is planning some 40 minute Zoom meetings to introduce people to SESRO issues. The dates and times will be on Facebook soon – please share with your friends. You can email gard.secretary@gmail.com for information and to reserve a place.

**Publicity:** We are placing more posters and banners – please contact the secretary if you would like any of these for your area. We have delivered leaflets to the houses closest to the proposed reservoir area in Steventon and East Hanney (many thanks to the volunteers who have helped with this).

There are plans for an Action Day (Cllr Povolotsky, 5<sup>th</sup> July probably) and BALLOONS: a helium balloon visual barrier near Hanney (May or June). More ideas? Please email gard.secretary@gmail.com

**Online leaflets:** Derek Stork (Chairman) has written short explanations answering two questions we are meeting in conversation on the street:

- what is GARD's view of a smaller reservoir? and
- how the Reservoir's effect of raising groundwater rise affects the site and the area around it.

**CLAY COMPACTION TRIALS** (Thames Water): The planning application to extend working hours on a Saturday has now been withdrawn – all a mystery. The delay because the site was water-logged was no surprise to anyone local, although Thames called it 'unseasonably poor weather'. We could all explain to them what a flood plain means. The pumping of water and silt into the Cow Common Brook is being investigated.

**FUND RAISING:** GARD's sister company SAFERwaterS has financial backing to cover the costs of the Judicial Review process. After that, GARD and SAFERWaterS need to fund themselves. ## LETTER FROM WESTMINSTER



Dear all

This month, I met many constituents in surgeries, out and about, and online—technology makes it easier to connect. And of course, our constituency is rich in technology, engineering and science; it was a privilege to meet some of the Harwell Space cluster and visit Williams Engineering. Often, I am meeting constituents who need support such as local potter, Charlotte Storrs, who highlighted challenges for small businesses exporting to Europe.

Flooding has continued to need attention, and many constituents have contacted me about the appalling track record of Thames Water. I supported Charlie Maynard, MP, in challenging Thames Water's significant water bill increases and ongoing debt-financing and will continue to do so. I am engaging with the agencies responsible for flood management, pushing to see preventative and mitigation work completed as soon as possible.

In Parliament, it was an honour to speak in the debate to mark the third anniversary of the invasion of Ukraine by Russia. The tragic situation has also shown the best of our constituency, and I was able to recognise the huge contribution of local families and charities.

During a rally at Westminster of those who provide adult social care, I was able to show my support, and since then I have been able to voice, including on BBC Radio Oxford, just how important and urgent the review of adult social care is.

As a Transport Select Committee member, I raised concerns about barriers to bus use, especially in villages, which affect many constituents.

With the All-Party Parliamentary Group for Motor Neurone Disease (MND), it was an honour to visit the Kings MND Care and Research Centre and see their work.

Finally, I was pleased to hear the local elections are going ahead in May. This is your opportunity to listen to the candidates and vote for who represent your needs. If you have concerns, would like to meet me or would like me to visit you, please contact me at:

## COUNTY COUNCIL REPORT



**Dear Readers** 

Hello, happy spring. Depending on when you read this, we might be in purdah, when we are now preparing for county council elections, which occur about every 4 years on  $1^{\rm st}$  May. For me, it is slightly different, as I was elected only last summer, in a by-election, as my predecessor stood down because of ill health, which means for this division it is less than a year since you last voted. Sorry. Happy to accept your vote again!

During purdah, I can't make promises, as I might not be in role to deliver them. Quite sensible really. But I can summarise what I have done for Drayton so far in my short time to date:

- Sponsored speed cameras and speed control work where roads are known to be dangerous shifting the effort from only acting after accidents to acting where accidents are just waiting to happen encouraging people to keep diaries of near-misses, so we can win arguments to make safer roads and paths.
- Promoted people to sign up as 'super-users' which enable us to queue-jump and prioritise bad local potholes and Fix My Street issues for urgent attention.
- Sponsored the purchase of a new defibrillator for Drayton
- Taken on role as chair of the local liaison group to work with the landfill, gravel and energy sites around our village site to provide the best long term environmental social and economic outcomes. I have started to work with the county on new Local Area Energy Plans to create the best joined up plan for proposed new solar, battery renewable energy supply and research and data centre applications around Didcot Power Station and between our villages that make us at the forefront environmentally and economically.
- Holding the multi-nationals to account to develop and implement plans that keep our communities safe from extreme flooding and weather events that affect their operations.
- Campaigning against Thames Water's excessive reservoir plans which ignore the elephant in the room of managing current excess water from flooding and leaks, and campaigning for funding for the Thames Valley flood alleviation schemes recommended by the Environment Agency.
- Helping Drayton residents stop Thames Water abusing byways and small lanes as HGV routes for drilling rigs and other reservoir development work. Thames Water have given up on some of their trials due to difficulties.
- Supporting the great work that your district councillor, Andy Cooke, has been doing to research the facts and build a better case for better outcomes with Thames Water.

I also think it might be helpful if I explain (as I didn't really know before I was elected) what the county council does as opposed to the district council

The county council runs social care services (the biggest cost and closely linked to the NHS), schools, libraries, education services, highways, roads, paths and transport infrastructure (except national highways), fire and rescue services, strategic, economic and environmental planning, public health, registration and coroner services. Generally public services where there are efficiencies and economies from running them at a county level.

Before I sign off, I should also say that things are changing so next time, the district and county councils will probably have merged, and they may well be part of a larger strategic authority, intended to help local devolution of power. But in the meantime, May 1<sup>st</sup> is important (in my opinion) to vote for what you think is best for our area.

Wild Oxfordshire – what do we do?

#### Could you be their next victim?

Whilst many crimes are falling, such as burglary - down by a third since before the pandemic - sadly we are all more at risk online. We can all feel the benefits of living our lives in a more connected way, but with the convenience that technology brings, there are also risks – however, a huge amount of cyber-crime and fraud is preventable.

Scams can take place online, on the phone or in person. Here are some of the ways fraudsters may try and target you and the signs to spot to help you protect yourself:

MAIL SCAMS Common types of postal scams include fake lotteries and prize draws, offers of investments and inheritance windfalls. What to look out for: irresistible offers that are too good to be true; unfamiliar branding; not using your name; bad spelling and grammar.

**TELEPHONE SCAMS** Common telephone scams include investments, pension or computer support scams. The person calling often sounds professional and may pretend to be from a trusted organisation such as your bank, the police or a company you recognise. What to look out for: callers asking you to share personal or financial information or a passcode or pin; callers asking for remote access to your computer; callers trying to rush or pressure you into making decisions.

**DOORSTEP SCAMS** Criminals pose as legitimate businesspeople selling goods or services that are faulty, overpriced, poor quality or non-existent. What to look out for: being asked for money upfront before providing any goods or service; No ID or proof of who they are; telling you they're doing work for neighbours to try and gain your trust.

EMAIL, TEXT AND WEBSITE SCAMS In what is known as Phishing, an email or text may appear to be from your bank or other company, in order to trick you into revealing personal details. You may be asked to click on a link which takes you to a fake website where you will be prompted to enter your details. What to look out for: spelling or grammar mistakes in emails or texts; they may not use your name; an unusual email address which may be similar but doesn't match the company email; strong encouragement to click on a link.

#### Remember, anyone can be a scam victim.

If you spot a scam, always report it. You can also look out for other people who may be vulnerable to scams by joining friendsagainstscams.org.uk to help raise awareness throughout your community. For more information visit stopthinkfraud.campaign.gov.uk.

Hi, all,

#### **Local Government Reorganisation**

I have an apology to make. By the time my previous update reached you, everything had changed. And then changed again. Sorry. Since then, the West Berkshire option came onto the table again, then off again, then on again. I'm getting reminded of that old song and wondering if it'll be "gone again, Finnegan," by the time I finish writing this update. Anyway, the latest update (that *doesn't* look to be changing) is that all the District Council Leaders and County Council Leader have written to Government saying that there are realistically three options:

- 1-A single Unitary: the County Council absorbs all the Districts to form a super-sized Unitary.
- 2 Two Unitaries: North Oxfordshire (Cherwell, West Oxfordshire, and Oxford City) and Ridgeway Council (Vale of White Horse, South Oxfordshire, and West Berkshire)
- 3 Three Unitaries: Oxford City expands and absorbs an unspecified number of wards (the hole in the doughnut I mentioned last time) and the outer remnants form a Northern and Southern Unitary, also including West Berkshire.

My own preference is for #2, if anyone can say whether West Berkshire will join in. If not, reluctantly, #1. The option of #3 looks like a half-baked doughnut, as no-one seems to be able to even say what wards are in the hole and what the northern and southern remnants will be. Still no news on the Combined Authority front. We're still tending towards the Berkshire-Oxfordshire-Buckinghamshire model to follow the NHS boundary. I probably shouldn't suggest it be called the "Combined Authority of Bob," though.

#### New Garden Waste permit and payment system

I mentioned this last year, and now it's coming live. Residents should now sign up for that new garden waste permit sticker to put on their brown bins. This should prevent some of the confusion that occurred in the past when some people who had paid didn't get their brown bins picked up, and others who hadn't paid, *did* get their brown bins emptied. It wasn't widely prevalent, but enough to cause a few issues, I understand. We're essentially copying West Oxfordshire, who successfully rolled this out a while back. Unlike in school, I approve of copying what works — we get to learn from successes and (hopefully) avoid failures.

I'll quote the release, to make sure I get it completely right: "The updated scheme, launching on 1 April 2025, introduces an annual permit sticker system. Residents need to pay for their permit to ensure their garden waste collections continue without interruption."

The new payment system is now available online

at <a href="www.whitehorsedc.gov.uk/gardenwaste">www.whitehorsedc.gov.uk/gardenwaste</a> Once they have purchased a permit, customers will receive a sticker through the post displaying their address which needs to be stuck to their garden waste bin lid to identify it as fully paid for and eligible for collection. Customers now need to make an annual payment for a permit – this replaces the existing direct debit scheme. Everyone's payment year will run from 1 April to 31 March each year. Every bin needs its own permit, and customers will receive a new sticker annually each time they renew."

"Benefits to customers include a new online system so they can manage their account, renew their permit and change their details much more easily. This will also mean the councils can contact people quickly if there are any major disruptions to the service, such as during adverse weather. When customers pay for a permit, there will be a link to sign up for an account and the account sign-up is also available on the councils' websites. Full information is also available on the council websites and each existing customer will shortly receive a bin hanger flagging the changes. Support is available for any customer unable to pay online by contacting the council."

I note that the price has gone up (to £70); this turns out to be because the cost of it to the Council has also gone up. The phone number for those less confident with doing things online is here: 01235 422422; you can also go into the Council offices in Abingdon if you'd prefer to do it face-to-face.

#### Reservoir

Thames Water continue to have problems with their trial site on Hanney Road. Despite major questions of whether a 3-metre high embankment running for a few tens of metres is even worth anything, they've been struggling to complete it within the year they'd allowed for it (which was supposed to include a 100% overrun for anything unexpected). I got an aerial photo of the site a couple of weekends back: see below

Not only the "borrow pit" from which they mine the clay, but the intended site of the actual clay bank were underwater. Perhaps they should have expected rain? They're nowhere near completion, which was why they'd put in a planning application to allow extended hours working. An application they withdrew in early March. I've got no idea if they'll try another one to run on for a second year, or whether they'll simply abandon the trial site and claim it was never needed anyway. Regardless, their timeline of 9 years to dig out and put up 25-metre-high banks in an 11,000 metre length is looking to be a total fantasy.

#### PARISH COUNCIL REPORT



#### The Council last met on 10th February

#### **Request for additional Councillors**

I am pleased to report that we have 3 potential new Councillors. They will all be considered for co-option at the next meeting on 20th March.

If all 3 prospective Councillors are accepted, we would be up to 8 Councillors, leaving 3 further vacancies.

We represent the whole of the village, modern developments and old houses alike. Despite a recent increase in Drayton's population by c. 1000 people, the Council does not currently have a single Councillor from any of the 3 main new developments. Everything that we attempt to achieve is for the village as a whole and it would be great to have representatives from Walnut Meadow, Manor Farm or the Dovecote on the Council.

#### Refurbishment of Bridleway 8 (Gypsy Lane)

The best laid plans!!!

This refurb was due to start, weather permitting, on March 24th. Unfortunately, it looks as though this will have to be postponed until later in the year. The District Council are refusing to release the S.106 money to the Parish Council as the bridleway is not registered on the Land Registry. This is very frustrating as the path is almost impassable at the present time.

#### Trees by the horse field on Henleys Lane

The Parish Council arranged for a quote for a survey of the large Horse Chestnut trees.

This has been sent to the landowner.

#### Manor Farm public open space

The Parish Council is still awaiting clarification from the District Council regarding the management of Hemlock on the site. As readers will recall, we are hoping to prevent further spraying of the site. We have offered to hand pull any emerging hemlock.

#### **Danes Store**

As most of you will know, staff at the store were recently subjected to a terrifying incident where they were threatened by someone with a knife. Obviously, this has been extremely traumatic for them. The Parish Council wish to acknowledge how important the shop is to our community and send our very best wishes and support to Mano and Georgiana.

That's it for this month. There will be more detailed report next time. The next meeting is on 20th March (sadly too late to report on for this edition of the Chronicle) and after that we revert to the normal date of the second Tuesday of every month, at The Caudwell Day Centre, Gravel Lane at 7.00 pm (ie Tuesday 8<sup>th</sup> April followed by Tuesday 13<sup>th</sup> May).

Protect yourself from Holiday fraud: don't let fraudsters trip you up this summer.

People looking to snap up online holiday deals ahead of the summer are being warned to stay extra alert and do their research before booking their getaways, as new data reveals victims lost a total of over £11 million to holiday fraud last year.

Action Fraud, the national fraud and cybercrime reporting service, has launched a <u>holiday fraud campaign</u>, urging the public who are looking to snap up their next holiday deals online to look out for suspiciously enticing offers online, including on social media, and do their research before booking their getaways.

What can you do to protect yourself from holiday fraud?

- Check the travel company is legitimate: about to book a holiday? Do some research first to check that the company is legitimate, especially if you haven't used them before. Use consumer websites, or reviews from people (or organisations) that you trust.
- Look for the logos: look for the <u>ABTA</u>, <u>ABTOT</u> or <u>ATOL</u> logos on the company's website. If you're unsure, you can use the links below to verify membership:

  - ATOL <a href="https://www.atol.org">https://www.atol.org</a>
- Use a credit card to pay: use a credit card for payments (if you have one).
   Many of these protect online purchases as part of the <u>Consumer Credit Act.</u>
- Only provide required details at checkout: when making your payment, only fill in the mandatory details (often marked with an asterisk) such as your address. Unless you think you'll become a regular customer, don't create an account for the store.
- Keep your accounts secure: create a strong and unique password for your email. If 2-step verification is available, always enable it.
- Watch out for suspicious links: whether it's in an email or social media
  post, be wary of promotions for unbelievably good holiday offers. If you
  receive a suspicious email, report it by forwarding it
  to: report@phishing.gov.uk

### **Obituary**

## Jean Hager (1932 – 2024)

- always in our thoughts -



Over the 60-plus years that Jean lived in Drayton, she became a familiar face and good friend to many in the village. Born in the East End of London in 1932, evacuated to Wiltshire in 1939, she returned to London in her mid-twenties then spent a couple of years in Oxford with her friend Gill. Jean and family moved to Drayton in 1964 after short spells living back in Oxford and then Goring. Always keen to get involved, she embraced many of the activities on offer in the village. The Chronicle you are reading now was part of her involvement, delivering it around Whitehorn's Way for many years, and she also regularly visited people's doors to raise funds for the Royal British Legion Poppy Appeal.

Whilst living in London in her twenties, Jean attended drama school, and it was there that her passion for acting began. Drayton Players was a young group when they arrived in the village, and she didn't take much persuading to join – I think she was in her early eighties when her involvement with the group finished, undoubtedly a difficult decision for her. I know she had many happy memories of being part of the Drayton Players.

Jean is survived by husband Don who is now a resident of Old Station House in Abingdon. Don is Canadian and has Jean's sense of adventure to thank for their meeting: in her late twenties she left Oxford and booked a passage to Vancouver, and it was there that they met and were married. I happen to know that Canada wasn't Jean's intended destination, having put plans in place to go to Australia. A letter from Jean to her parents tells how, on a visit to London, she decided to visit Canada House to see what may be on offer, prior to going to Australia House to see how her paperwork was progressing. She never got to Australia House and by the end of the day her passage to Canada was booked. This fortunate stroke of serendipity was to mean Jean and Don settled and brought up their family in Drayton.

Jean worked for many years at Rutherford & Appleton Lab, firstly as a Particle Scanner and then in the library. At retirement and for many years after, she kept herself busy by volunteering as a client advocate for Age Concern helping people navigate their older age.

Drayton Wives and then the Wooden Spoon were groups Jean joined early on when arriving in Drayton; these were a good way to meet new people and improve culinary skills. She became a member at St Peter's Church in Drayton, enjoying the opportunity to share her faith and becoming involved in services when possible. Whatever she did, Jean had a desire to help others, so when a chance came up to be involved with First Tuesday Connections at St Peter's, she committed herself to something she realised would be very important to many in Drayton.

#### Harcourt Arboretum

The front cover photo was taken at Harcourt Arboretum situated in Nuneham Courtenay (a 20-minute drive from Drayton).

In 1835, Archbishop Vernon Harcourt commissioned artist and landscape designer William Gilpin to create an eight-acre pinetum and Serpentine Ride in the parkland next to Nuneham House, where the Harcourt family lived. In 1947, the University of Oxford purchased the entire estate and created an arboretum that has grown over time to 130 acres. It was acquired by the Botanic Garden in 1963. It was designed as a place of beauty, to preserve the collection of North American conifers, and to grow trees for which the Oxford Botanic Garden was too small or the soil too alkaline.

University experts travel the globe to find rare trees, collect their seeds and grow them in the Arboretum, ensuring the species survive outside their threatened native habitats. Today, visitors can discover trees from around the world growing alongside tranquil British woodland and open meadows. This includes some of the oldest redwoods in the UK. Seasonal highlights include wildflower meadows, rhododendrons and bluebell woods.




